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BLADES OF BLUEGRASS

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Thirty-nine years ago J. P. Corn penned a poem for The Kentuckian, the student yearbook of Kentucky State University. Called "The Investigation," it is concerned with the report of an imaginary citizen bent on looking into conditions in the school. Here is the way it goes:

"Though I've never been to college and I haven't a degree
In a pretty cunny 'ol boy and seems quite plain to me
That our dear old University from assembly hall to dorm
Needs a raking and a scraping and a bunch of other reforms.
Why the 'profs' are drawing salary for just eight hours work per day—
There are hands on my plantation who would work for half the pay.
And extravagant 'They'll break; they will drain us dry,
Why a grocer said that one year bought a half a dozen eggs!
In the dormitories also can be seen a shuffling war."
In each grand palatial room they have only three plates! And the discipline is dreadful; in some rooms I chance a shock—
I did verify six students boldly whispering in class.
And the citizens informed me—Oh I gave me quite a shock—
That the students would sometimes stay out as late as ten o'clock.
Now in view of the above I suggest I would make a suggestion I would make:
Let us from the University stop appropriation take;
Let us take all resources left to use them fruitfully.
Then we'll make it in the end a model University!"

By some host of late, three men who have since done much to make Mr. Corn's alma mater one of the finest universities in the world were listed in the same issue of the annual as members of the 1914 graduating class. They are H. L. Townsend, president of the University of Kentucky, and Guy A. Rugeley and H. D. Palmore, trustees.

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Invariably book reviews are written about books which already have been published. However, here is a review where the reviewer's name is one which hasn't been written—but one which many Kentuckians hope will be written sometime in the future.

Historian friends of William H. Townsend, Lexington attorney and nationally-known Lincoln authority, have urged us to write a biography of Cassius Marcellus Clay, the famous third-cousin of Henry Clay. It's been felt generally that Townsend is probably the proper contemporary Kentuckian to undertake such a work since his Cassius Clay collection rivals even his Lincoln material.

Yet, few Lexington historians realized the full scope of Townsend's study of "The Old Lion of White Hall" prior to a talk he gave recently before a history honorary society at the University of Kentucky. He left little doubt there as to his capability to write the full story of the man who is perhaps the most colorful of all Kentuckians.

Many hitherto unknown facts of Clay's life have been uncovered by Townsend, and some of those throw new light on Kentucky history that day. With his usual sharp wit, Townsend delighted his audience of historians with events of Clay's life. Among these was an account of how James Lane Allen, a young Lexington newspaper reporter who later achieved literary fame, covered the wedding of Clay, then in his 80s, and the 15-year-old daughter of Clay's tenant. Details of the ceremony, performed at Clay's home near Richmond, were not available to Kentuckians of the present day before Townsend began his study.

Descriptions of Clay's anti-slavery speeches were included in Townsend's remarks, standard equipment which the author placed in full view of his audience, as related by Townsend, included the comment: "For those who respect the law of man; the Bible; for those who respect the law of God; and two black-buried pistols. For those who respect neither."

As a result of this talk, most of Townsend's audience are hoping that his law practice won't prevent him from writing this book in the next few years.

Kear' Facts-

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Some of the leading supporters of the strange talk about de-emphasizing athletics have gone to great lengths to emphasize pointing up what they call the "best" features of our athletic programs at our universities. I understand one learned authority even has suggested the approval of having a stable of horses to represent a university in inter-collegiate athletics.

It seems to me that all such talk borders on the ridiculous, and in fact even theoretical, nonsensical. And, the occasion of examination week here at the University of Kentucky provides an excellent opportunity to briefly point out some of the facts which readily dispute such talk.

Spies will not allow a complete rebuttal, but I believe one of the biggest arguments in favor of a major athletic program is the fact that it affords an opportunity for advanced study to a very large number of boys who otherwise would never have been able to attend a university because of financial reasons. And, as I have often pointed out, it is my firm conviction that athletics are just as much or more out of university study as do non-athletes. We have found in football, for example, that the boys study harder and get more out of their studies (both higher grades and general knowledge) during the season than when there is no competition to keep them on their toes.

Of course, there are always key players on the borderline of passing or failing, and the coaches sweat out their lives, then stand by and watch good-fellowship come from every pore when they meet their enemies. Having done so, you'll decide neither the heat nor anything else is real.

THEY LIKE PRESTONSBURG
Russell Shaw is being transferred to a new location as an inspector for the U. S. Bureau of Mines, and he, his wife and daughter aren't happy about it. It would be good for those who yell Sedon and Geomorra at mention of Prestonsburg to talk with the Shaws.

GAIN IN SCHOOL SPENDING OVER 5-YEAR PERIOD TOLD

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Kentucky periods compared, whereas the average increase for the nation was 63 per cent.

Noting that advocates of federal aid to education "now believe the scope of federal aid can be driven by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce," the study revealed that operating expenses rose from \$36,320,000 to \$54,412,000 in the five-year period. The expense per pupil on average daily attendance jumped from \$86 to \$135 — an increase of 57 per cent from 1945-46 to 1950-51.

The survey, prepared by the Washington Research Office of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, shows comparative figures for all states. The study revealed that operating expenses for the entire U. S. rose from \$2,707,960,000 in 1945-46 school year to \$3,584,000,000 in the 1950-51 school year — a national increase of 32 per cent. During the same period Kentucky's increase was 77 per cent. The average national expense per pupil on average daily attendance jumped from \$136 to \$224, or 65 per cent in the same period. A 52 per cent increase was registered in Kentucky.

The KCO survey shows only five states which pay less per pupil in average daily attendance for current operating expenses. The five and their per pupil expenses are: Mississippi, \$93; Arkansas, \$117; Alabama, \$129; South Carolina, \$132; and Georgia, \$133. Fourteen states registered smaller percentage gains than Kentucky.

The study pointed out that this is a record the states and localities have made on their own, not with federal aid. It added, "It is almost certain that current spending for schools is greater than it would have been under a federally assisted program. And equally important is the fact that control of education is still in local hands with no federal strings attached."

Reviewing the efforts of so-called "poor" states, the study reported that eight southern states increased their per pupil expenditure 70 per cent or more in the

2 East Kentuckians Killed, 4 Are Hurt As Bolt Hits Tree

Two East Kentuckians were killed and four were injured Monday when lightning hit a tree five miles south of Delaware, O.

The dead are: James Maynard and Monroe Dalton, both of Adair Lawrence county. Injured were Donald B. Phares, 9, and Preston Smith, both of Ivyton, Magoffin county; William Brown, 21, and Therman Horn, 29, both of Inez, and Willie F. Flowers, of Delaware, O.

All were track laborers for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company. The two killed were said to have taken refuge from a rain and hail storm under the tree which was struck. The injured were taken to a Delaware hospital.



SPORTS AFIELD

The sportsman preparing to buy a binocular is confronted with a confusing problem. He is faced with hundreds of specifications, makes, models and prices. Often if he goes the binoculars and takes a close look through them he can't detect anything on the inside.

Pete Brown, associate editor of Sports Afield magazine and expert on guns and glasses, has examined hundreds of binoculars and has talked to a lot of binocular specialists. He has interviewed a number of repairmen to get their ideas and his reports that he has yet to find anyone who has been tested or repaired all or even nearly all of the various binoculars on the market.

Seeing one binocular is not sufficient to make a purchase. Comparison in regard to construction is general. In addition to the possibility of getting hold of a particularly good one of a generally poor make, and vice versa, there is the possibility that a manufacturer has just improved his product since you saw the one you were considering. It is futile and decidedly unwise to try to list the hundreds of binoculars and evaluate them.

In general, from what I have seen, the American-made binoculars are the finest on the market today. Some German binoculars are very good. English binoculars in general are well made. The majority of the imported French binoculars are cheaply made and not what you call good glasses. Japanese binoculars are the most controversial. Some call them junk, others praise them highly. The answer, of course, is that some of the Japanese imports are good values and give good performance while others are poor through out.

YALE AWARDS DOCTORATE TO HARRY MAYO, FORMER PRESTONSBURG STUDENT, WHO GAVE UP CAREER IN NAVY FOR THE STUDY OF LAW

Louis Harry Mayo, formerly of Prestonsburg, has been awarded by Yale University the degree of Doctor of the Science of Jurisprudence. Dr. Mayo is an associate professor and one of the two assistant deans of the law school of George Washington University, Washington, D. C. He received his doctor's degree after attending Yale one year on a fellowship.



TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

"I'M NOT SUPERSTITIOUS, BUT..."

In the series of times that my freshmen have recently written about folklore in their own lives I often found some such statement as this: "Of course, I am not superstitious, but I do think of signs when I see them. Maybe it is half in fun." It would be a real achievement of a psychiatrist to separate the superstitious ones from those who merely remember superstitions somewhat nonchalantly. As I am not such a specialist, I will not attempt to make such an analysis. However, suppose we try to test ourselves. If the questions ask mean absolutely nothing to you, you are devoid of those superstitions, at least. However, if I were wise enough, I might keep on until I was uncovered in your life some area where superstition is very much alive.

Suppose we start with night. Are you equally as brave after dark as you are in broad daylight? Do night noises register in the same fashion as day noises? Is there nothing about the hoot of an owl that arouses in you a sort of strange feeling that approaches fear? If dogs howl, do you pay no attention to the howling? If cats yowl in ones that suggest human voices, do you just accept this as a matter of course? When you are driving your car at night, do you get no folkish thrill when the headlights spot the gleaming eyes of some varmint? And if left to your own devices, would you walk through dense woods as slowly after midnight as you would in the daytime?

How about luck? Is thirteen no more powerful than twelve or fourteen? Do you ever invite guests in such a fashion that there will be thirteen at the table? If you forget something and go back after it, do you perform some act to neutralize your luck or, at least, think about doing it? And, by all means, does a black cat mean nothing when it rubs across your road or path? Is Friday the thirteenth just another day? And would you dare to be married in some off-color, one that appears in rhymes like:

"Married in red;
You'll wish yourself dead;
Married in yellow;
Ashamed of your fellow?
Now let's look at the weather. Is a katydid just a katydid, or a weather prophet? Have you ever kept a record of the first note of the katydid to determine whether frost will come early or late that season? Are you chinks merely to cover up the ears, or do they hold secrets of what is to be in the following season? I would you risk losing all your meat for the winter by slaughtering your hogs on the wrong day? And would you plant just anything in the field or garden when the ground was dry enough without realising the phase of the moon or the stars of the zodiac?

Now that your potatoes and corn

and beans are planted so they will go best, suppose we go to a funeral. As you are not superstitious, the pall-bearers will take the dead man out head first. The sexton is not superstitious, either; he will dig the grave just any old way say, with the feet to the north. Nobody present will be any more afraid of the dead man than they were when he was alive and loved by all the community. And, after the funeral, nobody would object to remaining in the cemetery until after dark.

It is possible that you have scored PERFECT to this point. On the other hand, I may be getting close to some concealed fear or superstition that you would not admit. Probably I had better stop before I invade the last stronghold of superstition.



Floyd County Historical Notes

A letter comes to this column that recalls vividly the bitterness of the Civil War, recalls also the prayer of Mark Twain who asked from the God of all the most terrible restrictions upon the enemy that the mind of man could conceive. The prayer of Twain was in protest of war, the written letter is of the battles that made the agency itself. It is written upon stationary, widely used in the North during the Civil War. A design of the earth, the United States of America on the side, the Goddess of Liberty standing behind it holding aloft a torch. Behind it all the rising sun glows in blue and gold.

It is quoted almost in entirety below:

"Hole Township, Shelby county, Indiana. Direct your letter to Wilber F. Stanbery, Walden, Shelby county, Indiana."

"January the 27th, 1863.

"Dear Brother-in-law, Dear Sir: I take the now offering opportunitly sending you a few lines to let you know that we are all well at the present. Hoping that these few lines may find you enjoying good health. I have just received yours of December the 3rd last which gave me great pleasure in hearing from you that was well and your family also. I have strage to write to you at this time the health of this county is tolerable good at this time. Money plenty and every thing is high. Rogas is worth \$3.00 and \$5.00 per hundred gross. Wheats \$1.00 per bushel. Corn from 30 to 40 cts. Potatoes 75 cts, ry 60 cents per bushel, beans \$2.00 per bushel. Everything is high, groceries and cotton goods unreasonably high though money plentiful and everything else but horses.

"We have sold all the horses that would go in to the army and some more than would do good but we have plenty of young ones coming on. Fight on John till the last man and Reebel is dead and in hell and the Devil will make fun of them coming to hell on such a pretence as they have for trying to overthrow this government.

"Tell the boys generally that they have the prares of all the goodmen women and children and such as do not pray for the success of the Union Army and the downfall of the rebel arrakones (arrakones?) will have their lot in the lake of fire and brimstone that burns ever and ever and if I should happen to be there I believe God will say they have for trying to overthrow the on the traitors heads.

"You requested to pite how I am getting along. I have eighty acres of land well improved and have plenty to live on. I got crippled six years ago this January that prevents me from tending my farm. I hire near all my plowing done. There is land plenty here for sale from \$50.00 to \$50.00 per acre cash in hand.

You may envelop this letter or again and send hit to John Stanbery or Ira Stanbery. If you must close my letter but remain your affectionate Brother and Sister until death.

"To John Hammons From Wilber F. Stanbery and Hannah Stanbery, Right soon and direct your letter Walden, Shelby County, Indiana."

Such is the letter and the prayer of Wilber Stanbery.
