
We liked what Brother Benedict said in his morning radio hour Saturday over WPRE. He said that differences in churches are nearly always due to ignorance to failure to know all the facts and to appreciate the other's viewpoint. He gave a clearcut illustration.

There is a Biblical plan for settling differences, and God's children will always gladly follow. Some will go the second mile, refusing to make an issue. Instead they will say that it takes two to quarrel, so they forgive, forget and ignore the problem. An old adage says there is a little good in the worst of us and a little bad in the best of us, and it still holds true. Most of us live long enough to learn there is considerable difference between hating sin and hating the sinner between opposing evil and just finding fault with some individual. One old preacher grew so weary of hearing words and sermons that he formed the habit of carrying with him a tract of the Sermon on the Mount. When some good soul began usually to rail on another, he quietly handed him a copy of this jewel in literature, with Matthew 7:1-6 underscored. Sometimes it worked, and he enjoyed a little peace.

Brother Benedict's fine discussion brought to mind the story of Joseph, which appeared in the September, 1942 issue of the Adult Student Sunday School Quarterly. Several members of our church had met to consider procedures against Josef Marlene, about whom there were evil whispers. He was careless in attendance, in arrears with his church dues, known to be drinking. The majority were ready to exclude him. But old Dr. Boone, pillar of the church, a man past eighty, made a plea for young Marlene, who was to lose his job, and his family would suffer. Marlene needs God more than ever now," he said. "He does not need a talking. He needs love, forgiveness and understanding. We must hold him to God."

The session lasted into the night. A wall of Christian brotherhood was created around Marlene. He never knew how the day the bank let him go a store called him to work. He was puzzled and pleased to see the friendly calls church families made in his home, evenings. He and his family were invited for dinner in church homes they had never before entered. His heart at home began to look better than the bar at Pete's. He was scared and pleased when the Men's Club asked him to talk to its members one Sunday morning. The whole picture of life began to change for him. The friends had not talked about God but they had translated Him for Marlene. The reclamation of any man takes time.

In Richmond Concerts At Foster Music Camp

Two Frankfort students, Jay May, clarinet, and Michael H. 

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



Burchett's Answer

During this campaign some of my opponents have made statements in the newspaper and by means of radio calculated to discredit me as an officer and to damage my reputation personally. When any man is attacked personally we should ask two questions. Who made the attack, and what is the reason for so doing? These statements were made or written by men who seek the same office I am seeking, and I submit to you were made for the purpose of influencing voters.

I learned as a small boy that it was bad policy to speak or write anything disrespectful of any man or his family, and that if I couldn't say something nice about my opponents to say nothing at all. I have three children and I am teaching them these same basic principles of honesty and decency. Any man that will make false accusations or distort facts for the sake of other votes is a dangerous man to elect to public office. I have never seen anyone that could "sling mud" and keep his hands clean.

Although some of my opponents have no children, I still think it would be better for one man to be defeated for a public office than to make unfounded and prejudicial statements damaging to the reputation of any candidate or his family. I seek office on the basis of the service I have rendered—not upon some "smoke screen" I can throw up to mislead or prejudice the minds of the voters.

One candidate says you should vote for him because there is a "black top" road up Cow Creek. Every candidate for County Attorney lives either in Prestonsburg or on a "hard top" road. I am proud that the people on Cow Creek have a good road. I am glad that a mile of the Big Mud Road and part of the Clear Creek road, one mile at McDowell, one mile at Wayland, both forks of Middle Creek, Shannon Branch, Brandy Bull and other places were black topped. I am also glad that Abbott, Anxier, Bull Creek, and Stephens Branch will be black topped in the next few weeks. There are many other roads that I should and will be black topped in the near future. One thing is sure, if the people of Floyd county have a County Attorney in office that can get any road he wants black topped, they had better keep him there. Not many County Attorneys in the state have that much authority. It so happens that these roads are improved by and under the direction of the State Highway Department. The Cow Creek road, along with some other roads, was promised by Earle C. Clements when he was a candidate for Governor. This was done before I moved to Cow Creek and while I lived in Prestonsburg.

He says you should vote for him because I have two small bridges across the creek in front of my house. They are still there as positive proof of what I am saying. The cement that went into the bridges was bought and paid for by me. Buck Miller, Ed Fred Burchett, Cal Clay and myself hauled the sand and gravel and built the bridges. The steel used in these bridges is mine railroad steel. Come and look at it. Floyd county has helped people all over the county to build bridges and approaches to the road. It did not help me one dime in any way on either of these bridges. They were built by the sweat of my brow and at my expense. When the bridge was taken out of Johns Creek and moved to Spewing Camp there was a large amount of the bridge that was not used. It was taken to Allen and stored behind the highway garage. A large pile of it is still there. Anyone that wanted any of this steel for bridge purposes was permitted to get it. I needed some pieces of handrail to keep my children from falling over the bridge but instead of getting this hand rail as others had done, I bought it from the Fiscal Court and paid for it. I thought that somebody somebody might try to "smear" me. I was right. The bridge is here, come and look at it.

Although each of my opponents have pledged themselves to make a settlement each year and they over any fees they earn in excess of the Constitutional limit, I have been criticized for doing this. An appeal was prosecuted from my settlement for each of the years 1947 through 1952 but was dismissed on motion of the plaintiffs. If there was anything wrong with these settlements why did they dismiss the appeals?

I have been criticized because I own a home on Cow Creek located on land given to me by my parents. It is our home place. It is an ordinary home, but it is where I live with my wife and children. It has been called a "mansions" and other harsh names by certain office seekers. We welcome you, one and all, to come and look it over and visit with us. You can see for yourself. You will be glad you came. My neighbors are helping me look for that herd of pure bred cattle I am supposed to have. They wonder where I have been keeping it.

Some of my opponents seem to think it is wrong for me to help my friends, neighbors and relatives with legal advice and in other ways. It is true that I have helped and accommodated a lot of people in many ways. I do not consider it wrong, but if it is wrong, I will continue to do so.

I see no reason why you should vote for my opponents because of misleading statements they have made about me. The bridges, the cattle I am supposed to own, the house I live in or the place where I live, I was born and reared in the very spot where I now live. I hope no one holds that against me.

I have never changed my politics for political expediency. My opponents can speak for themselves in this respect. I hope to be able to give you continued accommodations as your County Attorney. I have never contested an election and will not contest this time. I invite my opponents to make this same statement.

Announces Garrod To Conduct Clinic For Crippled Tots

Two important coming events in the field of public health were announced this week by M. V. Clark, Floyd County Health Department administrator. One of these is the crippled children's clinic which will be held at the high school building here, Aug. 25, by Dr. Garrod of Ashland, and his staff. The clinic will screen crippled children to determine those who can be benefited by treatment or surgery, and those who can be successfully treated will be taken to a hospital of the Kentucky Crippled Children's Commission. The assistance of physicians and citizens in having crippled children appear at the clinic is being asked. Second of the events will be the beginning on August 28 of the work of the rabies mobile clinic in the county. The unit will remain until Aug. 29 and will visit every section of the county. It will be equipped with immunize dogs against rabies. The only cost to the dog-owner will be that of serum, which will be approximately \$1.00. Services of the veterinarian will be free. Women's Clubs over the county will sponsor the rabies clinic. Mr. Clark said a meeting will be held Aug. 11 at Martin high school to organize a publicity campaign here, adding the mobile clinic. Dr. John Skowronek will be at the health department on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays. The times had been erroneously given the second day of weekly work as Tuesday.

REPLY TO JARVIS ALLEN BY SENATOR DOUG HAYS

Jarvis Allen, who is opposing my friend Henry Stumbo for the candidacy on the Democratic ticket for the office of County Judge, last week put in the paper an article in which he takes credit for a large portion of the successful highway program which Floyd county has had during the last four years. It would appear from Mr. Allen's article that while he was County Court Clerk he spent most of his time getting roads for this county, and one would think from reading the article that he was the only person working with the Frankfort officials to get new road construction here.

As your State Senator from Floyd county, and as one who has spent a great deal of his own money going to and from Frankfort with County Judge Henry Stumbo and other officials of this county to obtain new roads, I wish to take strong issue with Mr. Jarvis Allen as concerns his part in the road construction program for Floyd county.

Back when Kentucky Highway 30 was being constructed, up Right Beaver, I endorsed with others a note for \$10,000.00 to buy right-of-way for this road. Mr. Allen's name did not appear on this note. I mention this to show my deep interest in and how far I have gone in securing new roads for our county. In the article in the paper he has taken complete credit for the construction of the Sizemore Branch-Wayland road. So far as I know, Mr. Allen did not have one thing to do with the State furnishing funds to construct this highway.

At the time this road was being approved and surveyed, the allotment for the Floyd county road program had been completely used up, and Congressman Carl Perkins, Henry Stumbo and myself had numerous conferences with Doc Beauchamp, the then Commissioner of Rural Highways concerning this road. I was especially interested in it because while I lived at McDowell on Left Beaver I operated a sawmill on Caney Creek on Right Beaver, and this road saved me personally many miles in traveling from my home to the mill. At our insistence, Doc Beauchamp took money from other portions of the Rural Highway Construction Fund and allotted sufficient funds for construction of this Sizemore Branch-Wayland road and marked it on the highway map as a "Saw-loggin' Doug Hays Road". If Jarvis Allen was ever present at any of the conferences on this road I certainly don't remember it.

It appears to me that Mr. Allen may have been interested in seeing that he got publicity for something which he had nothing to do with. At the time of these occurrences it was my understanding that Mr. Allen was attending an out-of-state law school, in Florida.

I think these statements I have made here in connection with the Sizemore Branch-Wayland road apply also to the other roads for which Mr. Allen takes credit. If Jarvis Allen spent as much time in working for improvement of the highway construction in Floyd county as it would appear from his article, then we can all understand why he did not have time to give proper service to the people during his term as County Court Clerk, which resulted in his defeat at the hands of the people in 1949.

It's a frame of mind that is not the exclusive property of a coach or his team, but can be induced to a large extent by the fans who may not have too high an opinion of a particular opponent for lack of information.

A trio of such teams — Memphis State, Villanova and Vanderbilt — admits the University of Kentucky's 1953 schedule and each and every one deserves serious consideration despite the fact that the average person may not be aware of their full potentialities.

VILLANOVA PROVIDES a prize example. Aside from the fact that the Main Lineers had talent, one of the big reasons for their speed at the Wildcats last season was certainly the fact that everyone took them too lightly. Experience is a good teacher, they say, so there should be no underestimate of the visitors this year.

Outstanding returns from the first 1953 squad include All-American halfback Gene Filipek and halfback Ben Adiego. With one of the nation's best defensive units and a strong scoring team, Villanova presents a combination that raises as one of the East's best and could give the Wildcats trouble when coupled with the fact that his 52 eleven also was one of the nation's best defensive units. Vandy will have an experienced team including 47 lettermen.

VANDERBILT IS IN THE MIDDLE of a re-building program under the guidance of new Coach Art Ooms. He had a good record at Virginia and developed some outstanding offensive teams — an offense that could spell trouble when coupled with the fact that his 52 eleven also was one of the nation's best defensive units. STATE TIMBER WORTH \$72,000,000 YEARLY

Frankfort, Ky., July 20 (Sp.) — Kentucky's forests, embracing 11,487,000 acres or 45 per cent of the land area of the State, are growing more timber than is being removed each year, according to a study completed by the Agricultural and Industrial Development Board.

However, the best hardwood timber is being depleted, while low quality hardwoods and softwoods are being utilized at less than half the rate of annual increase by growth, estimated at 100 board feet an acre, an increase which is "only one-half to one-third what it could be."

Kentucky's timber business brings in \$72,000,000 a year but could be increased to at least \$100,000,000, the study shows.

The study pointed out that "improvement of stands by removal of low quality timber and cuts is dependent on development of economical methods of harvesting and creation of markets."

The report disclosed that of the 11,487,000 acres of present forest area, only 51,000 acres is now commercial. Largest commercial forest

area is in the Cumberland, comprising 26 counties and embracing 3,287,000 acres. Other regions and the acreages are:

Eastern, eight counties, 1,897,000 acres; Pennyroyal, 20 counties, 2,112,000 acres; Western coal field, 20 counties, 1,750,000 acres; western, 11 counties, 724,000 acres; Blue Grass, 36 counties, 1,281,000 acres.

The acreage includes 10,770,000 acres in private hands, 828,000 acres owned by the federal government and 83,000 acres by the state.

Citizens Point Up the Facts



We Citizens and Taxpayers of this county, were greatly surprised to read in the FLOYD COUNTY TIMES a political ad written by the County Judge which apparently was designed to mislead the voters of this county.

The Judge pointed out certain state-constructed Rural Highways that had been built during his term of office but he did not tell you that these roads had ALREADY BEEN APPROVED, SURVEYED, and CONTRACTS LET on many of them BEFORE HE TOOK OFFICE in January, 1950.

COMPARE THESE FACTS WITH THE JUDGE'S ADVERTISEMENT!

- 1. He listed the HAROLD-JACON-HI-HAT ROAD. That road had been approved, surveyed, and was advertised for bids on construction in September of 1949. (See FLOYD COUNTY TIMES, Page 1, September 8, 1949.)
- 2. He lists the DAVID-BRUSH CREEK ROAD. Yes, this is the road often referred to as the JARVIS ALLEN HIGHWAY because JARVIS ALLEN fought so hard for its construction. It had been APPROVED, SURVEYED, and much of the right-of-way secured in 1949.
- 3. He listed the CANEY-STEPIENS BRANCH ROAD. That road, too, had been approved and surveyed before the Judge took office.
- 4. SIZEMORE BRANCH-WAYLAND ROAD. This road had also been approved and surveyed prior to January 1, 1950.

With reference to the last two roads there appeared in THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of August 31, 1950, the following news item:

"Rural Highway Commissioner Emerson "Doc" Beauchamp last week promised Former County Clerk Jarvis Allen that the Caney-Stephens Branch Road and the Wayland-Sizemore road will be let to contract within the next few days."

Citizens of this county, we believe you are entitled to the facts concerning your road program and if you should check the record you will learn that JARVIS ALLEN did as much, or more, than any other person in securing the above roads. He was a special friend of the governor and made trips to Frankfort everytime the other county officials went, and made numerous trips alone fighting for road improvement in this county.

In addition to the above roads the Judge lists certain roads for improvement at Backtop Surface. This improvement takes no effort on the part of county officials since it is the policy of the state to blacktop the rural highways as soon as practicable after construction since it is cheaper to blacktop a road than to maintain a gravel road.

He says the contract has been let on the Jacks' Creek Road and we wonder why so late???

The JACKS' CREEK ROAD was approved for construction in 1949. It was stated in an ad in the FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of July 28, 1949, that a State Highway map was available for inspection in the County Judge's office showing that the JACKS' CREEK ROAD had been approved for construction.

You, Judge, we wonder what has happened to our rural road program in the last 3 1/2 years. We are still paying the gasoline tax but WHERE is it going?

How many roads were built in 1951?
How many were built in 1952?

The Judge also boasts of his county-road work done with YOUR TAX MONEY. He lists numerous roads up the creeks of this county but the total mileage is approximately 15 1/2! Some of these roads were done in a period of two days with the county equipment, with the citizens furnishing much of the work at their own expense.

With the men employed by the county at the taxpayers expense on a monthly salary and the equipment owned by the county the total mileage of roads built could have been done in a period of 3 or 4 months. What have they been doing the rest of the time, Judge? WE KNOW. WE ARE NOT BLIND. You say in your article that you are satisfied with their work but WE ARE NOT and YOU WOULDN'T BE EITHER IF YOU WERE PAYING THE BILL.

How many of your relatives are you working or keeping on the county payroll?

You say that the equipment has not been used for private persons but we hear different. You would probably tell the people that you have built no PRIVATE ROADS and BRIDGES in the last year but we know you have.

You listed a bridge you have built across Beaver at SPWING CAMP but that bridge was ADVERTISED FOUR BIDS in the FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of July 21, 1948.

Judge, you can't keep fooling the people. They are smarter than you think. Four years ago you promised a road up practically every creek in this county and the majority are still waiting. You promised bridges that have not been built and blacktop that has not been poured and NOW YOU'RE AT THE SAME OLD GAME OF PROMISING.

Regional Center Meets First Emergency Call; Bloodmobile Visit Set

The first emergency call for blood made on blood centers in the eastern part of the United States was issued July 11, and the Huntington regional center began receiving donors at 10 p.m.

By 3 a.m. Sunday, volunteer donors had supplied 101 pints of blood and had met the emergency quota.

The emergency call was for blood for Korea, where Type 'O' blood in particular is needed. The reason for the call was not fully explained, although it was said similar demands had previously been made on west coast centers and that this was the first to extend to eastern United States.

The regional Red Cross bloodmobile will be at Wayland, July 31, and any resident of Floyd county who desires to make a contribution of blood to the wounded in Korea may give blood there, it was pointed out this week.

LAW REPEALED

Frankfort, Ky., July 20 — The law limiting pay of county patrolmen in counties having a population of from 25,000 to 70,000 to \$7,200 has been implicitly repealed by the 1950 Salary Act passed in pursuance to the new salary limitations in the Constitution. The ruling given by Assistant Attorney General H. D. Reed, Jr. held fiscal courts might fix the pay of patrolmen at any point not to exceed the Constitutional limit of \$7,200 a year.

DORMITORY PLANNED

Frankfort, Ky., July 20 — The State Property and Buildings Commission will receive bids August 12 for a U-shaped dormitory building at the Kentucky Training Home, estimated to cost \$175,000. The building is to be 140 by 150 feet, with a recreation yard enclosure.



OLD MOREHEAD NORMAL ALUMNI HOLD REUNION

Morehead, Ky., July 12 — To the tune of "Onward Christian Soldiers," white-haired alumni of the old Morehead Normal School stood up and sang their alma mater's praise here today.

They sang, "Morehead Normal, How We Love Her," with more bounce than the class of 1953 could put into a football song.
 Morehead Normal is no more. It lives only in the hearts of the men and women who attended the old school which operated from 1887 to 1922 under the sponsorship of the Christian Women's Board of Missions.

With 27 former students of the old school in attendance, the Alumni Association met this morning in the Allen Young Hall of modern Morehead State College to talk over old times and make plans for the future. They talked of Dr. Frank G.

Buston, who served as president of the normal school and of the succeeding college until he retired in 1926. They discussed plans for naming Dr. Buston's name perpetuated in the naming of a college building for him. He died in 1927.

They recalled how the quiet, mild-mannered little man came to the village of Morehead with his mother who established the normal school in a two-room frame building.

The building and the first campus had been donated by the late Col. Tom Harris of Louisville.

Only a few of those at the reunion remembered the starting of the normal school. But one of them recalled the occasion vividly. He is George M. Johnson, Ashland, who was the second "scholar" enrolled back in 1887.

He came back to the campus with his son, Ellis Johnson, who has been football coach of Morehead State College since 1950. Ellis was a four-letter man at the University of Kentucky.

The elder Johnson chuckled at the memory of Morehead as it was the year Morehead Normal School opened. The town had a population of about 260. Now it claims more than 5,000. Then the main street was a road, now U. S. Highway 50 splits it down the middle. Then there were only a few homes. Most of them furnished between 1885 and 1890. And about every other business house shattered a blind tiger.

Now the saloons have been replaced with churches. "The famous Turkey County Jail is all but forgotten, and the descendants of the feudists are fast friends. And Morehead is a thriving, prosperous community. More than 100 colleges and its more than 700 students.

Following the business meeting this morning, the homecomers attended a luncheon on the campus where they sang the old school song and elected officials.

Leo Oppenheimer, Morehead, was named president to succeed Mrs. Otis L. Nickell, Ashland. Cliff Tussie, Lexington, was re-elected first vice-president, and Miss Anna Carter, Morehead, was re-elected secretary. Mrs. Ruby Woods, Morehead, was re-elected treasurer.

Prior to the luncheon the normal school alumni heard an address by Dr. Charles L. Spain, president of the State College which was established in 1922. He spoke of the old normal school as a significant forerunner of the college and the "great contribution" of the Morehead Normal School graduates.
 "An institution's worth," Dr. Spain said, "is judged by the quality of its students. It is judged by the adequacy of its plant, its instructional facilities, and the service it renders. It is judged by the service and leadership shown by its graduates."

The greatest needs of the college now, he said, are a new gymnasium and a student union building. A prime goal of the college is for many faculty members with doctor's degrees.

Among those honored at the luncheon was Prof. John W. Hatcher, Berea, who served as president of the normal school from 1908 until 1919. He remembered Dr. Buston as a valued member of his faculty and his successor as president.

Mrs. Nickell presided at the business meeting, and the ladies, Mrs. Ethel Ellington, Ashland, led the devotional, and Aodl Bayant, Huntington, W. Va., delivered the address of welcome.
 Alumni were present from several Kentucky counties and from Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Indiana, and Washington.


