

ISAAC SHELBY PORTRAIT BY JOUETT IS DISPLAYED

A rare portrait of Isaac Shelby, first governor of Kentucky, now hangs in the Senate Chamber of the Old State Capitol.

The likeness was painted by Mat-
thias H. Jouett, probably Kentucky's most celebrated artist. It is one of eight portraits Jouett painted of Shelby during a promising career that death ended in 1827 shortly after the artist's 40th birthday.

The Shelby portrait is the second Jouett painting acquired by the Kentucky Historical Society. (It also possesses some copies.) The other is the Marquis de Lafayette. The Legislature commissioned Jouett to paint the latter's portrait during the French general's visit to this country in 1825. It hangs to the left of the speaker's rostrum in the House of Representatives Chamber in the Old Capitol.

How was the valuable Shelby portrait acquired? Miss Susanna Preston Shelby Crismon, Shelby's great-granddaughter, presented the painting to the Historical Society last month after she gave up her residence in New York to return to Lexington to live.

Miss Crismon also gave the society a portrait of her great-grandmother, Susanna, Mrs. Shelby's wife of the Governor. One of few known pictures of Mrs. Shelby, it was painted by Patrick Henry Davenport, identified an art dealer, 605 1/2 as a Kentucky artist.

It is not known when Jouett painted the portrait of Shelby but it is believed the work was done in the early 1820's. Shelby died in 1826.

The painting has been described as "traveller's jacket." It measures 24x28 inches.

The Liverpool painting of Mrs. Shelby is unusual because it is of wood rather than canvas. A fire on her left hand gives a three-dimensional effect when viewed from a certain angle. A shadow on the back of the portrait indicates it was painted in 1827 in Danville. Each painting was insured at \$1,000 for shipment, but no other value has been set on them.

The Historical Society maintains a museum at the Old Capitol. Walls of the Senate Chamber are lined with oil portraits of the 44 past Chief Executives of the State in order of seniority. The only woman is a "little" portrait of Shelby painted by Edward Neck in 1850. The face was copied from a Jouett work. Shelby was elected Governor in

Lowman Plans To Seek
Study of Tax Problems

ASHLAND, Ky. — State Representative Harry King Lowman, Ashland, said last night he plans to introduce legislation in the next General Assembly for a nonpartisan commission to study the State's tax problems.

The commission would report its recommendations to the 1958 Assembly, he added. Lowman appeared at a forum at Ashland High School to discuss proposed legislation for education in Kentucky. The forum was sponsored by the Ashland League of Women Voters.

Asked about a possible State sales tax, Lowman said he was committed against enactment of the during the coming session. He added that the "only way" he would regard a sales tax as acceptable would be in conjunction with an income tax in a modified form.

Others in the panel were Roy Smith, Ashland school superintendent, and Floyd Hall, Boyd County school superintendent. They told of the pressing needs of the schools and called for enactment of legislation to finance the proposed minimum-education program.

Smith said that for his program to be effective the school fund must have an additional \$12,500,000.

AEC STUDIES PLANT SITE

Assurances Are Given
That Kentucky Sites
Are Being Considered

Atomic Energy Commission officials said last week that they are giving full consideration to Kentucky sites for a proposed industrial nuclear power plant to be constructed by the Commission.

Assurances that Kentucky sites are under study was given by Webster J. Williams, acting general manager of the Atomic Energy Commission, at a meeting held in Washington Friday with representatives of the Agricultural and Industrial Development board of Kentucky. The meeting with Commission officials was arranged by Senator Clements. Those in attendance were Harry LaViera, Paulville, AID board member, Joseph Taylor, Frankfort, executive director of the board, and Phil Mills, Eminence, chief of the Maps and Minerals Division, AID Board, representing Governor Lawrence Wesley and Frank Evenden, representing Senator Clements. Other Commission officials present were Cmdr. E. B. Rugh, USN, and Admiral Rickover, who will direct the construction of the plant, and Lawrence H. Hafstad, director of the Reactor and Development Division, AEC.

In discussing the interest of the AID Board in the location of the plant, Mr. LaViera pointed out to AEC officials that the Governor did not request the meeting for the purpose of recommending any particular site in Kentucky but rather to emphasize the many advantages to the AEC if the plant is located in Kentucky. In reply Mr. Williams briefly discussed the interest of AEC in coming to this decision, noting that there are many special factors which apply to the problem of locating a project of the type involved. Names of AEC officials that the Governor was to discuss the question of disposal of intermittent power in large amounts, the proximity to supporting technical facilities, the policy of purchase of additional government land and the general questions of water supply, transportation and other factors affecting costs.

In commenting following the meeting, Mr. Taylor said that he felt they could take back an encouraging report to Governor Wesley, that although the AEC has apparently made no decision as to date, he will have a much better idea if an additional visit to the plant site is made. He also said that Williams advised that the Commission has invited interested industrial and utility groups to participate in the project, remarking that the extent and nature of this participation will obviously be a factor in selecting a location. Taylor also said that Williams indicated it would be several months before any final decision would be announced by AEC.

The Agricultural and Industrial Development Board is an official agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, composed of nine leaders of business, labor, agriculture and education, appointed by the Governor and serving without compensation. The board is charged with the responsibility of developing agriculture and industry in the entire state.

States' Compacts Ready For Legislative Approval

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Two compacts between Kentucky and other Southeastern states were studied and discussed by the Legislative Research Commission here.

The compacts to be presented to the 1954 General Assembly for ratification, would establish:

1. An interstate forest fire protection program among Kentucky, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.

2. A Tennessee river basin water pollution control plan among Kentucky, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia.

Pike Man Sentenced For Murder of Woman





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LOGAL OPTION REPEAL, AIM

**Of Temperance League;
Legislation to be Sought
On Billboard Advertising**

Repeal of Kentucky's 1948 local-option amendment will be a major aim of dry forces at the 1954 General Assembly.

Representatives of the Temperance League of Kentucky planned an onslaught on the act at a meeting in Frankfort, Tuesday. Present law permits cities of the first four classes to vote separately from their counties on local option.

Before the 1948 act, if a county were legally dry, a liquor election could be called on a county-wide basis. If a county were wet, any district or precinct in it could call for a separate election and vote that area dry.

The 1948 General Assembly changed the historic local-option law after a hot legislative fight.

The Rev. Walter C. House, Louisville, executive director of the league who presided said the legislation was having a bill drawn up to change the 1948 amendment. He said this bill and others would be ready when the Assembly convenes January 5.

The league agreed to support legislation reorganizing the alcoholic study commission to provide for rehabilitation of alcoholics. However, Mr. House said, the league favors legislation to prevent alcoholism more than a bill to remedy it, but doesn't now plan separate legislation on it.

And Now the Kentucky River valley that is asking for navigation facilities through water impoundment.

Hard hit there, as in the Big Sandy, business men, including coal interests, are working toward a hearing in Congress on the feasibility of such improvements.

And who will be the marplot there? Will the L. & N. Railway be the Kentucky what the G. & O. has been to the Big Sandy? Can the railway companies continue to convince, in one way or another, the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the Congress that water power and water navigation are not needed in these sections of the United States where less production potential?

Some of the Kentucky's dams and levees are still in operation, and these provide navigation — except in time of drought such as was experienced during the past summer and fall — as far upstream as Beattyville. The river thus is in use, is actually being used for the shipment of coal. This undertaking, incidentally, is being carried on mainly by a former Floyd county coal operator who saw the work of public-spirited citizens toward the future of the valley.

Elsewhere, wherever river navigation has been made possible, water traffic has mounted in volume till even the sternest foes cannot deny its worth. Whenever inland America is mentioned for industrial development, one requirement invariably is this, that the area under consideration have adequate waterways.

The Big Sandy region, as well as the Kentucky, is an area as inaccessible to enemy attack as any on the American mainland. Its coal, gas and timber and its native brand of loyalty are of first importance in national emergency such as we shall — God forbid! — some day face. But to those who would hold in thrall their potentialities and in economic bondage their people these are sections to be denied their place in the sun within the lifetime of living Eastern Kentuckians and to be held in reserve till their resources are more sorely needed or till their development will satisfy the whims of strangers to these hills and the needs of the people.

We wish the Kentucky well. But we are not among those who are predicting an early victory over there.

A Withholding Tax Is Not the Answer

This plan of the Wetherby administration to have the General Assembly enact a state withholding tax law lacks appeal to us.

It appears to be an adroit bit of temporizing, of hedging in the face of a big issue and resorting to weak expediency.

In the first place, to call on the employers of the state to withhold for the Revenue Department the taxes workers owe, or will owe, is to admit the Department is not doing a good job now of collecting income taxes.

It has the personnel to do a good job. Moreover, the state has available at all times the record of federal income taxes paid by Kentuckians as an aid to its own collection job. If the state did not have these, a withholding law might be justified.

It is true, withholding next year, for instance, plus collections on 1956 incomes, would enrich the state treasury in 1954 with income tax collections for two years. But this would afford only a mere stopgap to declining revenues. The next year, the situation would revert to that of past years, except that some citizens who have not paid taxes through the Revenue Department's laxity might be located.

The Times feels certain that any new taxpayers found through withholding would not afford the revenues the state needs if it is to do the job it is expected — we should say, commanded — to do. Revenues are declining all along the way, and the income taxes picked up under this system would in all probability no more than compensate for losses otherwise suffered.

The people of Kentucky by an overwhelming vote for amendment of Section 186 of the state constitution in 1932, was given by the November election. That mandate calls for a Minimum Education Program. That program, it must be remembered, is calling for a minimum — not a maximum — to do the job it is expected — we should say, commanded — to do. Revenues are declining all along the way, and the income taxes picked up under this system would in all probability no more than compensate for losses otherwise suffered.

As a citizen and taxpayer I would like to see a new ordinance regarding this matter. In the first place, what difference does it make what street that taxis are parked as far as bootlegging is concerned?

If the City Council and Mayor desire to stop bootlegging, it is my opinion a solution for the problem is to enforce the law!





Educational Requirement Cut for Pilot Training, Says Local Recruiter

The Air Force has lowered the education requirements for young men who want to get into pilot training from civilian life, according to an announcement by Sgt. Glenn R. Walke of the local recruiting station.

Besides having a high school education, you must be single, a United States citizen in good health, of good moral character, and between the ages of 18 through 26.

Applicants who apply at the local recruiting station will be forwarded to Ashland, for physical and mental testing and if they qualify they will be sent to Chanute Air Force Base, Illinois, for further testing and appearance before a selection board. If an applicant qualifies he will be given a deferment from the draft for a period of 120 days for the purpose of attending a cadet class during that time. All persons who qualify are given the opportunity to enlist for a period of two years.






