# NO TAXES in KENTUCKY For at Least 50 Years

## KENTUCKY'S SHARE OF TIDELAND OIL REVENUE IS TEN BILLION DOLLARS

This is the headline that could have been written—but won't. Why won't it be written? ### County's Income Rate Given by UK

Floyd county's per capita income in 1954 has been placed at \$722.90 in University of Kentucky reports which have been compiled in a new study on personal income in Kentucky.

Kentucky's slow but persistent climb from its lowly position among the states in personal income has continued for another year, it was declared in the study entitled "Personal Income in Kentucky Counties, 1954."

The steady progress being made by Kentucky is reflected in various phases of the UK work—prepared under the direction of Dr. John L. Johnson, acting director of the UK Bureau of Business Research.

One of the most important trends of Kentucky income is the gradual decrease percentage wise of the difference between per capita incomes in Kentucky and the nation," Dr. Johnson said.

According to the study, Jefferson county ranked first in per capita income in 1954 with a figure of \$782.00. Plating second and third were Madison and Fayette counties with \$1,729 and \$1,680 respectively. In only nine other counties was per capita income greater than for the state as a whole. These follow with the per capita income amount:

Daviess, \$1,077; Mc Cracken, \$1,012; Woodford, \$1,038; Franklin, \$1,056; Boyd, \$1,055; Bourbon, \$1,029; Campbell, \$1,094; Mason, \$1,466; and Boyle, \$1,422.

At the other extreme of the income scale, 22 counties had a per capita income below \$500. Listed in order with their amounts, they were:

Clinton, \$393; Breathitt, \$502; Edmonson, \$508; Casey, \$531; Carter, \$509; Lee, \$535; Wolfe, \$564; Elliott, \$571; Jackson, \$532; Clay, \$539; Lawrence, \$570; Wayne, \$594; McCracken, \$502; McLean, \$475; Powell and Butler, both \$472; Knox, \$444; Owsley, \$427; Magoffin, \$419; Leslie, \$235; Knott, \$384; and Martin, \$339.

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### Coroner's Association Lists Causes of Death Reportable to Coroner

Coroner James Carter has notified the Times that the secretary of the Coroner's Association of Kentucky, Dr. W. W. Shepherd, has listed the types of deaths which must be reported to Carter's office. Deaths which result from some form of violent means such as homicide or suicide must be reported to the office of the coroner even though the actual report subsequent to the case is 90 days after the crime or self-inflicted, accidents of all forms, such as blows or other forms of mechanical violence, crushed beneath falling objects, cutting or stabbing, drowning (actual or suspected), electric shock, explosion, exposure, firearms, fracture of bone, falls, gas poisoning, illuminating gas, automobile exhaust or any other means, hanging, heat exhaustion, sun stroke, poisoning, food-poisoning or resulting from occupational or any other means, strangulation (accidental, homicidal, or suicidal), suffocation, vehicular accidents, deaths suddenly, when in apparent health, in any suspicious or unusual manner such as an abolitionist, by poisoning in any form, (b) sudden death on the street, home in public places, at points of employment, or with more witnesses, (c) death under unknown circumstances, whenever there are no witnesses or where the cause of death can be clearly determined, (d) deaths of still-born babies, (e) deaths in persons who are otherwise persons cannot be found and of who have not been seen in previous years, (f) deaths from burns before sudden death.

Carter also issued warnings to fishermen and swimmers alike who should use the facilities of Dewey Lake-Ely summer to take the greatest care of themselves while on the lake. Last year a man was thrown from a boat while fishing. He was drowned because his clothes, required to him down, although the shore was very near. If he had worn a life preserver, there would have been another life saved, he said.

Swimmers be advised are advised to stay within the limits of the swimming area. He said that unless everyone uses common sense while in the water the public can expect to see an upsurge in drownings this summer.

### Children Advised To Shun Blasting Caps

Frankfort, May 14 (Sp.) — "If you ever find a blasting cap, don't touch it—nor even with a ten-foot pole."

Commissioners of State Police P. A. B. Widener today advised children of Kentucky. He described blasting caps as small metallic cylinders about an inch around in diameter and from 1 to 3 1/2 inches long. Commissioner Widener said, "Some caps are bright aluminum or copper with plain or colored wires at one end. All are charged with sensitive explosives that can be set off by careless handling, shock or heat."

"Scores of boys and girls were hurt in blasting cap accidents last year," Commissioner Widener said. "Every injury was needless. The pity of it was that many of the children were only bystanders when another child foolishly played with a blasting cap."

The limit for a 24-hour season is 15, from noon to noon, while a 10-session limit of 20 has been set after two or more days of brogging. More than four frogs may not be taken and have not more than one barb.

## THE LATEST THING

A 63-year-old angler, Samuel Mantel, Atlanta, Pa., New York, has invented a fishing gadget that may take all of the jobs of telling about the big one that got away. It has an invention that really work it out. It is a revolutionary great outdoor sport and make our local editor one of the happiest fishermen in history. If he can invent something to make the fish strike—Editor's fish strike—Editor's fish strike.

His invention for which he is seeking a patent is an 18-inch aluminum strip—adaptable to a fishing pole—equipped with a hook-setting gadget and a device to prevent a line from snapping under tension. It also is equipped with a plunger and spring attachment that acts as a shock absorber when a fish is hooked.

This prevents the line from breaking under great weight when you get 70% from the end of the line, explained Mantel. You also get enough weight so that when you reel in the pole won't be jerked out of your hand by a fish. The hook-setter is free to snap back instantly, once a fish bites. It can be set for different degrees of sensitivity.

"This is important in itself," says the fishing expert. "Often the fish gets on and off the hook before the fisherman can do anything."
