### Scholarships in Fuel Technology Established at Pennsylvania State

Six scholarships in fuel technology have been established by the Pennsylvania State University in recognition of the coal industry. The appointments were made by Dr. E. F. Osborn, dean of the College of Mineral Industries, and Earl C. Payne, consulting engineer of Consolidation Coal Company, who has been active in recruiting the awards.

The scholarships are available to high school students who can meet the entrance requirements of the College of Mineral Industries at Pennsylvania State University. They begin with the 1956 fall term, pay the student \$500 per year, with renewal each year contingent on satisfactory academic performance.

The annual scholarships have been established by Bituminous Coal Research, Inc., Eastern Gas and Fuel Associates, Koppers Company, National Coal Association, Fitzhugh Consolidation Coal Company, and an anonymous alumnae executive of a company serving the coal industry. The American Coal Sales Association had previously established a \$1000 annual scholarship in the same subject. Several other companies are considering similar sponsorship. These grants are in addition to scholarships in mine engineering sponsored by the same companies.





The Upside Down Picture

This is not a picture of any particular home; it applies to several, perhaps even to many, in Floyd county. It is a picture that belongs to many other counties, also.

The picture is of a neatly painted farmhouse, with a well-kept lawn, a barn, green pastured land, an orchard, a field in corn, grazing livestock. An electric power pole is a few yards from the scene. Modern life is taken into the home.

Inside are a radio, a television set, a deep-freeze unit, a kitchen refrigerator and perhaps one or two other electrical appliances. The battered family car parked outside isn't so neat as the other properties, but it is perfectly suited to peaceful, comfortable living.

But everything isn't perfect. Not by a long shot. For the modernity of that farmhouse is without a solid foundation. In fact, the improvement structure there has been inverted. From what you might call the top with the bottom resting on something that is far from solid ground.

The thing that is missing in this picture is a good year-round road. Here is a family (or families, we should say) that has, materially speaking, just about everything it needs—security, seclusion from the helter-skelter of modern-day living, yet with most of the modern touches enjoyed by urban families. Only, everything started wrong there; not from the ground up, but from the top down.

That home still needs a way to market, to church, to school, to the outside world. It doesn't belong here where there is no road. Here ambition is a transcendent thing; else, such a home never would have existed here where mud and water for most of the year provide its tenuous link with human-kind elsewhere. Where there is no such ambition the Tobacco Roads of the long-ago past in neglected communities where men have lost hope.

What to do about it? We have no plan. But we do have an idea that there are in such valleys, the next roads the state and the county build should be located.

Road-builders should not at long last, go prospecting for people to serve rather than voters. In fact, they should realize that trails that were blazed long ago and left to remain little more than trails, have no place in this modern age, and that every day they permit them to exist will millions of dollars are spent on serviceable roads that already exist in another day and in many years of neglect of duty to good American citizens.

A total total of \$740,000 was raised in Kentucky's 1955 March of Dimes drive in January. Dr. Frank Krass, Harrison county chairman, announced the news. All 120 county chairman-directors have submitted reports to date.

Floyd county's contribution was \$47,000—an average of less than 12 cents per person.

Last year \$30,000 was collected in Kentucky to fight polio. The 1956 total represents an average contribution of 25 cents per person. Dr. Krass said about five cents below Kentucky's average of the past two years.

Small county population 8,500, a good deal of counties in total dollars collected, \$18,000.

Nationally, the March of Dimes went well beyond its goal of \$47,000. Over \$5,000,000 was donated to carry on the program of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

One of the best single hosts to the year's campaign came from the American Legion. Dr. Krass pointed out. The organization conducted a statewide sale of Blue Crutches during January which brought in over \$13,000. Most of the American Legion's 225 posts in Kentucky participated.



Frankfort, May 28 (Sp.) - J. E. Luckett, state revenue commissioner, said today that under Kentucky's new income tax law, effective July 1, the average taxpayer in the head of a family of three who earns \$4,000 a year.

How will the law affect the family of three earning less or more than \$4,000?  
If the family earned \$1,500 a year, it will pay no state income taxes, \$2,000 a tax of 66 cents a month, and \$3,000 a tax of \$1.33 a month.  
Families earning more than \$4,000 will pay additional taxes at these monthly rates: \$1.66 on \$4,500; \$5.00 on \$5,000; \$9.67 on \$5,500; \$14.33 on \$6,000; \$19 on \$6,500.





### Tourist Influx Expected To Set New State Record

Frankfort, May 28 (Sp.) — The greatest tourist wave in history will hit Kentucky this year—if the tremendous number of requests for travel data and information received since January 1 by the Division of Publicity is competent evidence. G. M. Pedley, director, said this week.

Each year vacationers are showing more and more interest in Kentucky's many and varied attractions. Pedley said. The horse farms, Mammoth Cave State park, My Old Kentucky Home, Churchill Downs, the Capitol, the Gold Depository at Fort Knox, Cumberland Falls, as well as fishing and boating are popular with Kentucky's visitors, he said.

During the February-March-April period, the Division of Publicity received an average of 1,353 inquiries a day through the mails. The peak day was Monday, March 5, when 4,222 pieces of mail came to the Division offices, he said. Much of the mail is in response to advertising done by the Division of Publicity in 33 specially-selected metropolitan newspapers throughout the Nation. The Division also conducts advertising campaigns in magazines such as *Holiday*, *National Geographic* and *Sports Illustrated*, Pedley said.

### State Agency Plans Survey of Adoptions

Frankfort, May 28 (Sp.) — The Department of Economic Security will launch July 1 a comprehensive survey of the number of adoptable children in every county of Kentucky. This is the first survey of its kind in the United States.

Barnes said approximately 500 field workers will join child welfare workers, doctors and lawyers in making the survey. When the survey has been completed, the Department will be in a position to provide a sharp increase in the number of children available for adoption by Kentucky couples, he said.

Commenting on a U. S. Senate subcommittee hearing in which a Kentucky legislator testified that so many babies vanish on the inter-state black market that none are left for people seeking to adopt a child through official channels, Barnes said he would not be surprised if hundreds of Kentucky children have been sold annually for adoption in other states.

He said responsibility for this deplorable condition might well be traced to the recently abolished Youth Authority Act. "I deplore the bad publicity Kentucky has received but cannot say it is unwarranted. Conditions were such under the Youth Authority that hundreds of children could have been sold annually for adoption in other states," he said.

A total of 722 children were adopted in Kentucky in 1955. Barnes said he did not believe the figure represented an accurate picture of Kentucky children adopted elsewhere. "The number of children which we know to have been adopted in Kentucky is less than 20 per cent of the number that should be available," he said.

Barnes conceded that the couples seeking to adopt children far outnumber the children available. The national average, he said, ranges from 10 to 17 couples for each child available.

### College, Academy Pay 'Distinguished Alumnus' Tribute To Miss Record

Pikeville, Ky., May 29 (Sp.) — Pikeville College and Academy alumni last Saturday paid unusual tribute to one of their number, Miss Alice H. Record, Bluefield, W. Va., a member of the school's faculty for a total of 28 years before her retirement last June, became the first "Distinguished Alumnus" to be named by the Pikeville College Alumni Association. A resolution suggesting the creation of the honor, and proposing Miss Record, was presented by James Wine, Pikeville, vice-president of the organization at the group's annual banquet and it was adopted unanimously.

Miss Record and her father, the late Dr. James F. Record, were connected with the Pikeville school over a period of 56 years, starting when Dr. Record became the fourth president of the Pikeville Colgate institute in 1899, Mrs. W. B. Stone, alumni-association president, said. The relation was broken only by his furlough from 1912 to 1915 for reasons of health and a six-year interval after Dr. Record's retirement in 1932.

From 1926 to 1938 Miss Record was professor of Latin at Centre College, Danville and registrar of the Women's Division of Centre. She was an instructor at Pikeville from 1915 to 1926, then returned there in 1938 as registrar, a post she held until last year.

She now lives in Bluefield with her mother, Mrs. Margaret E. Record.
