



DR. STEPHEN MEEK FERGUSON (1822-1904)

Dr. Stephen Meek Ferguson, physician, soldier and industrialist, was born at Elk Garden, Virginia, in 1822 and educated at Emory and Henry College. He came to the Big Sandy valley in 1843 and married Lucinda Weddington in 1847. He resided at the mouth of Hurricane Creek near the present Boldman.

Dr. Ferguson became associated with James H. Law, of Cincinnati, in the lumbering and mining business and founded the town of Boldman. He joined the 39th Kentucky Infantry, Union, as a surgeon of Company K. He was commissioned a major October 22, 1862, fought in several regional battles and was mustered out at Louisville, September 15, 1865, as a lieutenant-colonel of the regiment.

Following the war he again became interested in lumbering and mining and finally in promoting a railway up the Big Sandy valley. He died in 1904 after being blind for several years. He lies buried in the Ferguson cemetery at Boldman.

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

Don Hale, head of the Bureau of Instruction in the Department of Education, said some of the districts have lost as many as 10 days.

"We do not advise Saturday teaching," Hale said. "But if they have to do it, we give them special permission."

The state requires a minimum of 175 days of teaching each year. Some districts schedule more than the minimum to take care of emergencies.

Not all of the lost days will have to be made up on Saturdays. Vacations and extension of the normal year for a few days also can be used.



Thirty Years Ago

(February 3, 1933)

County school superintendents will continue to be appointed by county school boards under a decision of the court of appeals Friday, holding unconstitutional a 1932 act attempting to provide for popular election... Floyd county's total indebtedness for the 30 years was \$80,000... W. M. Greenwald, proprietor of the Greenwald Service Station here, sustained the loss of a Willipet sedan, which was destroyed by fire, and approximately \$35 worth of cigarettes, cigars and candy taken from the service station by burglars Tuesday night... The Sandy Valley Coal Company, incorporated of which are J. R. Hurt, Charles Alley and G. W. Rorer, will operate the mines of Prestonsburg Coal Company, from which it has leased property on Bull Creek... A county-wide poll among schools to determine the site of this year's district basketball tournament resulted in a tie between Martin and Maytown, and the decision is now up to the state high school athletic association... Although the Beaver Valley Golf Club has voted to abandon the golf course near Allen, the course there will remain open this year... Martin high school will initiate basketball play in its new gymnasium on Tuesday night, when the Buckeyes take on Virgie... There died: Bill Osborne, 70, of Prestonsburg.

Twenty Years Ago

(February 4, 1943)

Tuesday, this week the last payment on the \$46,000 firefighting equipment loan made, also announced by the city of Prestonsburg, was made, Mayor E. P. Arnold announced... To qualify Floyd county for its share of approximately \$25,000 of the state's \$2,000,000 rural highway fund, the fiscal court last week lusted project covering approximately 128 miles of rural roads in this county on which the fund may be expended...
