FIRE FOLLOWS FLOOD, DESTROY MANY HOMES

Fire became a destructive aftermath of last week's flood in this county and at least six homes and one business were destroyed and another home severely damaged.

Many of the fires were caused, it is thought, by short-circuited electrical wiring due to water. In several instances fire department personnel and neighbors could not reach the blazing homes by the surrounding water.

FEDERAL, STATE AID SEEN ON ROAD REPAIR ROAD DAMAGE FROM FLOOD WORST EVER

\$250,000 Loss Seen To Roads, Bridges; Study Half Finished

Federal and state help toward reconstruction of flood-rimmed roads and bridges has been promised by Floyd County, County Judge Henry Stumbo said Tuesday night after the State Department of Highways engineers and three of the county's magistrates had inspected the damage created by last week's waters.

The listing of damaged highway projects had been completed in Magisterial District 2 as of Tuesday night. The inspection party had two other districts only half finished and the survey in the other district was even less complete.

Stumbo said it appears at this time that 100 bridges are out and that from 125 to 150 sections of road have been washed away. "We had nothing like this before," Judge Stumbo said. Stumbo said federal representatives were expected to arrive in the county Wednesday. Prolonged freezing weather had reduced county roads to pluffin conditions long before the water came. But last week's flood left no road in many places, it was pointed out.

SBA OFFICE OPENS HERE

Three Counties Sited For Service Here; Loan Specialist Is In Charge

Announcement was made Tuesday by R. B. Blankenship, manager, Louisville Branch Office of the Small Business Administration serving Kentucky, that a Small Business Administration building has been located at the Allen-Walton building Tuesday. Office hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Mondays through Saturdays.

Murray J. Ferguson, loan specialist from the Louisville branch office, is in charge of the disaster office, assisted by C. L. Davis, also a loan specialist of the Louisville office.

The office is being opened to assist those in Floyd, Johnson and Martin counties who have suffered losses as a result of the recent flood. Applications will be accepted and loans will be made to eligible persons to rebuild and repair damaged or destroyed property. They are low-interest, long-maturity loans, and anyone desiring assistance from the SBA should contact Mr. Ferguson or a member of his staff at the office here. Disaster loans are limited only by the amount of loss brought about by the flood and can be made to eligible applicants who have the ability to repay and who are able to obtain the funds from private sources. Both homes and business properties are eligible.

Additional offices are at Martin, Johnson and Johnson counties. Saturdays, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; at Garret, in the Bob Griffin Hotel, Sundays only, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Aged Hippo Timberman Passes Away March 6





In Pike Circuit Court; Armed Robbery Charge Made by Former Clerk

Given trial Monday in the Pike circuit court on charge of venue from Floyd county, Gordon May and Jack Salyers, both of Martin county, were convicted of armed robbery.

The river broke its bank, near the Prestonsburg high school, flooding the school and gym, and also entered the northern sector of town via May's Branch, flooding 10 or more business places and many homes.

Some belongings of Governor Combs and his family, stored in the basement of the home near the Cliff bridge, were damaged by the water.

The highway was cut by water at both approaches to Prestonsburg, and at Lancaster the floodwaters were prevented from causing major damage to the Lake Bowling Lanes only by a night-and-day fight, with men using sandbags and pumps.

Both radio stations here went off the air as water inundated their studios, and communication depended upon "ham" radio operators who worked throughout the area.

Many of those hit by last week's flood borrowed money after the 1937 disaster in order to return to business. Pacing the ruin of their stock and fixtures, wading through the mud and debris left by the receding waters, some openly declared they "had had it." Others stoutly prepared for resumption of business.

The American Red Cross set up distribution points at the First Methodist Church here in the Church of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon) at Martin and in Griffith's Furniture Store at Garrett.

The first stage of work is to meet immediate needs of stricken families with food, bedding and clothing. Later the work of rehabilitation will be undertaken.

The Flood County Emergency and Rescue Squad, as usual, worked around the clock at Martin and in other stricken communities, as did Kentucky Highway Department employees, using trucks and earth-moving machinery.

Food and clothing collected by the Ashland Kiwanis Club at the request of the Rev. Ira McMullen, pastor of Unity Baptist Church there and formerly pastor of Trem Cole Memorial Baptist Church here, was brought to the county by trucks.

Another Ashland shipment brought drinking water in milk containers directly to Martin and Allen. The town of Wheelwright sent drinking water to Martin, and the H. B.



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STATE TEACHING JOBS MORE POPULAR, NOTED

Frankfort, Ky., March 5 (Sp.) — "day-of-honor" attitude is getting more and more popular among young Kentucky schoolteachers.
Here, says Miss Louise Combs, director of Teacher Education and Certification for the State Department of Education, the number of teachers enrolling in Kentucky to teach after college graduation is at its highest point ever.
"Instead of going outside the state to find a position," Miss Combs said, "many more young college graduates are choosing to stay at home in Kentucky to teach now."
She attributes this increased interest to three main factors:
1. Higher salaries and benefits.
2. Better school buildings and facilities.
3. An improved public image of the teaching profession in Kentucky.
"An atmosphere of progress in the state's educational system. Salary boosts for teachers since the advent of the sales tax in 1960 have raised the average yearly wage about \$1,100. The average salary this year is \$4,275, which is still \$1,450 below the national average."
Kentucky has had a school building boom during the past three years. Since 1960, a total of 50 new elementary and 28 new high schools have been built; additions have been made to 165 elementary schools and 72 high schools; and improvements made to 794 other school buildings. The result of this has been to provide an additional 3,585 classrooms for Kentucky school children.
Miss Combs noted that there is an increase in the number of men entering the teaching profession in the state. "Men can now earn enough teaching to support their families," she said.
"Along with salary increase, an improvement of the public image of the teaching profession has been a factor in influencing many qualified teachers to stay in the state," she continued. "Young people have a greater feeling of importance now than ever before. There is a spirit of progress in education systems in Kentucky today and more young men and women want to be a part of this progress."
Miss Combs also estimated that within four years Kentucky will have enough school teachers with college degrees to fill all available positions if the present salary level is maintained. She based the estimate on the rate of increase of fully qualified teachers during the past three years.
More teachers are fully qualified for their jobs this year than ever before, Miss Combs stated. An all-time high—89 per cent of all teachers in the Commonwealth this year have college degrees.
"The increase in teachers with degrees has been so great since 1960," she said, "that Kentucky is now recognized as one of the nation's high-standard states in teacher qualification."

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Easter Seal Campaign For Crippled Children Set March 14-April 14

The 1963 Easter Seal Campaign, for the benefit of thousands of Kentucky children crippled by many causes, will be held March 14-April 14 by the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children.

Funds raised in the annual appeal help support a statewide program of services, ranging from hospitalization and out-patient therapy to summer camping camps for the physically handicapped.

This year 400,000 letters containing Easter Seals will be mailed to residents in all 120 Kentucky counties. In addition to the mail appeal, volunteer workers throughout the state plan special campaign events.

The twin seals suggest the struggle faced by crippled children in overcoming their handicaps. Drawn as stylized silhouettes, they picture a small girl on crutches and a boy leaning on the Easter Seal symbol of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children.

Last year the Society served 3,964 children and nearly 300 adults, reported W. T. Isaac, Danville, state campaign chairman.

"They included accident victims, children with birth defects, and those who had been disabled by such diseases as polio and cerebral palsy," he said. "No other private agency in Kentucky offers so wide a program for those crippled by so many causes."

Isaac is a board member of the Society, which is now in its forty-first year of service.





GARRETT BLACK DEVILS BEAT McDOWELL HIGH

KENTUCKY'S WHITE BASS RUN OFFERS FINE FISHING

Frankfort, Ky. (Special)—Kentucky's fishermen are blessed with an excellent population of white bass in the larger lakes as well as in many of the major streams according to recent population studies conducted by fisheries biologists of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

White bass run to the headwaters of these major lakes and streams and during that excursion large strings are harvested. The most famous section in Kentucky for these runs for many years has been the Dix River area, and the upper reaches of Cumberland Lake and Dale Hollow, as well as other impoundments, are fast becoming haunts for the ardent white bass fishermen.

Old-timers say when the dog-wood and dandelion are in full bloom the white bass will be on the run. Bernard Carter, director of Fisheries, is more scientific in saying that white bass generally run when the water temperature ranges around 62 degrees.

When the white bass make their run the fishermen have to wade the lake, lures and baits. The purist, known to many as the flyrod artist, can account for many white bass by fishing with a spinner or spin-casting outfit.

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Two McDowell Men Stationed in Korea

The daily limit for white bass is based on a midnight to midday period, with a daily and possession limit of 60. There is no size limit on this species of fish in Kentucky.



Garrett's Black Devils

There was the devil to pay Saturday night at the Prestonsburg fieldhouse, and it was the Garrett Black Devils who collected.

They defeated the McDowell high school Daredevils for the 15th region championship and a place in the "Sweet Sixteen" who played in the state tournament last week-end.

Garrett's Black Devils froze the ball for three minutes in an overtime period, ripping the net for the game-winning basket with one second remaining to play to edge McDowell, 56-54.

The reverse battle, which saw a Garrett lead melt away in the fourth quarter, and McDowell's Daredevils forge ahead by four points, was decided on a one-handed tip by guard Keith Lawson.

In the overtime which saw the contest knotted at 55-55, Garrett was able to grab the tip and freeze the ball for nearly three minutes. Guard Jimmy Cox was set up for a floor shot which went off the mark, but the Black Devils were able to get the rebound. The ball was tipped twice before hitting the net, to enable Garrett to meet the winner of the Second region in the "Sweet Sixteen" at Louisville.

Heading the scoring for both squads was McDowell forward David Turner with 22 points. The team guard, Shawn Howell, bombed the basket for 16. Two Black Devils were in the double figures. They were forward John Bolen with 15, Lawson with 14, Cox, 13, and forward John Chaffins with 10.

The Daredevils led at the end of the first frame, 15-13, but were only able to rack up 13 in the second quarter to the Black Devils, 18 and were behind, 29-26, at the half. Shortly before the end of the third quarter, Garrett broke away with a 48-40 lead. McDowell, with two straight buckets, slashed the lead to 46-40. The red-hot Daredevil five bombed the baskets for—three more consecutive baskets to lead by one, McDowell tied the score at 56-50. The score was knotted 58-52, but again the Daredevils' forward five banged away for two more baskets for a 56-52 lead.

Two quick jump shots by Chaffins and Cox tied the game again, and with one minute and 26 seconds remaining, McDowell snatched control of the ball. Turner blazed away at the basket and missed and Garrett got the rebound. They froze the ball for one minute and 14 seconds which set up Cox for a one handed shot from the floor missing as the buzzer sounded ending the regulation period of play.

Garrett and McDowell earned the right to meet for the championship.

In one of the top games of the year in the 19th Region, Garrett held on for a 61-59 win over defending regional champ Virgie. McDowell was never pressed in coasting to a 100-55 win over Pikeville.

After an 18-18 first quarter, Virgie moved ahead of Garrett, 34-31, at halftime. Garrett then bounced back in the third quarter to take a 43-40 advantage and set the stage for the hard fought fourth quarter.

Virgie closed the gap to one point at 55-55, but Jimmy Cox hit a free throw with 48 seconds left for a 58-55 Garrett lead. Cox hit another free toss with 28 seconds remaining, but Lynn Tackett came back with a goal for Virgie and Garrett led 58-57.

With two seconds remaining, Cox was again fouled and calmly dropped through two free throws for the clincher. Virgie scored on a long pass in bounds for the final margin as Garrett did not attempt to block the attempt for fear of fouling.

Cox finished with 23 points for Garrett for game scoring honors. Also in the figures for Garrett were John Chaffins with 13 and Keith Osborne with 10 points.

Virgie finished its season with a 25-9 record as Don Blair led his team's scoring with 18 points and Lynn Tackett registered 11. Dale Osborne followed with 14 points.

McDowell zoomed to a 12-0 lead en route to its win over Pikeville as the winners registered 52 points in the final half of play to 22 for the Panthers.


