FISHTRAP JOB ON SCHEDULE, PERKINS TOLD

Railroad Relocation Must Await Changes In Highway Report

Work on the Fishtrap Reservoir project on which much of the Elgin flood valley is pinning its hopes of protection from flood devastation, is moving along on schedule, but that schedule may not envision its completion till the summer of 1968.

So, in effect, wrote Brig. Gen. Howard W. Perkins, acting director of Civil Works to Congressman Carl D. Perkins who had inquired about the progress made in negotiations between the Corps of Engineers and the C. & O. Railway Company toward effecting relocation of the railroad across the reservoir project and its desire to expedite in every way possible its completion. Write Gen. Perkins in part:

"It is recognized that the devastating floods which occurred during the spring of this year have caused considerable agitation for early completion of this project and we are sympathetic with the desires of the people in the area to finish the project as soon as possible. However, as you know there are limitations, funding and otherwise, within which the project must be structured so that it can be completed. Our current schedule is for completion of the dam structure by the end of fiscal year 1965 and completion of the overall project by the summer of 1968. Meanwhile the funds made available in date have been utilized primarily for highway relocation, land acquisition, and construction of detailed planning. During the past year last highway relocation, necessary to replace roads affected by the project and to provide access to properties which will be flooded by the reservoir will be continued. The land acquisition program and utility relocation currently under way will also be continued during fiscal year 1964 and in progress on negotiations with the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway permit for relocation of the railroad. You may be sure that every effort is being spared to assure completion of the Fishtrap Reservoir project on schedule as the urgency of providing flood protection in the Elgin flood valley is fully appreciated."

INTERSTATE, PARKWAY SYSTEMS 46% COMPLETE

Frankfort, Ky., July 29 (Sp1.)—Forty-six per cent of the interstate and parkway road system planned for Kentucky is either open to traffic or under construction, according to the State Department of Highways. About 220 miles of interstate highways and parkways are open and 244 miles are under construction, the department reports.

Under construction and partially completed are Interstate 61, 65, 75 and 264 and the Mountain and Western Kentucky Parkways. Either in planning or engineering phases are Interstate 24, 71, 275 and 471 and the Central Kentucky Parkway.

The department gives this review of Kentucky's multi-million dollar program under the direction of Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, beginning with projects in the west and continuing across the state: Interstate 24—route to be established by Federal Bureau of Public Roads, Hazard, Mo., University department suggests it begin at Tennessee border, pass west of Hopkinsville, connect with Western Kentucky Parkway near Princeton, continue west to near Paducah and then bridge the Ohio River into Illinois.

Western Kentucky Parkway—under construction. This route extends from I-65 near Elizabethtown to Princeton, 127 miles. If I-64 is located in this area, the Parkway will extend to the Paducah area. Paving is more than half completed and this Parkway is scheduled to be opened this fall.

Interstate 65—fifty-six miles, from Louisville to Union, including the Kentucky Turnpike now open, with progress through downtown Louisville and superstructure of bridge across Ohio River to Jeffersonville, Indiana, being placed.

Central Kentucky Parkway—this 72-mile four-lane highway will extend from I-65 at Elizabethtown through Hardin, Meigs, Washington, Anderson, Mercer and Woodford counties to US-60 near Versailles. When coupled with other Turnpikes, this Parkway will give Kentuckians their first east-west cross-state route. It is estimated to cost \$35.5 million.

Interstate 44—forty miles of this 192-mile route are open from Louisville to US-60 east of Frankfort and 18 miles from Winchester to east of Mt. Sterling. I-64 will extend in Kentucky from Louisville to the West Virginia border. Eleven miles from the Big Sandy River to Boyd county to the Carter county line are expected to be completed this year.

Fourteen miles from near Lexington to west of Winchester are under construction. This route will serve 12 counties and the cities of Louisville, Shelbyville, Frankfort, Lexington, Winchester, Mt. Sterling, Morehead and Ashland.

Interstate 24—Watterson Expressway—this is a 14-mile route circling Louisville from Shively to US-42. It will be in later with I-64 and then stretch 22.5 miles to I-71. This expressway system will be capable of handling Louisville's heavy traffic volume.

Interstate 71—mainly in planning stage, although some right-of-way acquired in Louisville area. This 77-mile route will reach from I-264 near Louisville to I-75 at Walton, south of Cincinnati, and then continue bearing both I-71 and I-75 markers by Cleveland, Ohio. It will cross seven Kentucky counties.

Interstate 75—will extend 186 miles I-70 m Covington-Cincinnati bridges (now under construction) to the Tennessee border, estimated to cost \$240 million. Open to traffic are 34 miles from Covington to Williamsport; 42 miles from Foster road to Georgetown; eight miles from Clay's Ferry Bridge (Kentucky River) to Richmond, and four miles from Saxton to the Tennessee border. Under construction are 18 miles from Ky. 36 near Williamsport to Foster road north of Georgetown; 6.2 miles from Georgetown



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Strict Enforcement Of Strip Mine Laws Pledged by Matlock

Frankfort, Ky., July 29 (Sp.)—The state's strip and auger mining laws must be rigidly enforced, Commissioner of Reclamation and Conservation Matlock said recently in commenting on a recent WVA-TV film concerning strip and auger mining in Eastern Kentucky.

Matlock said he issued orders in April, 1960, that every effort would be put forth by the Department of Conservation to bring about complete compliance with the state law regarding strip and auger mining.

"The law had not been rigidly enforced prior to 1960. On July 1, 1960, an investigation showed that only nine out of a total of 100 operators in Eastern Kentucky had posted bonds and obtained permits as required by the law," Matlock said.

The 1959 and 1962 Legislatures strengthened the law by regulating auger mining, increasing the total bond required from \$100 to \$1,000 and permitting legal action to be instituted in the Franklin circuit court for non-compliance with the law.

The basic requirements of the present act require an operator to post a bond of \$100 on a acre, furnish a plan of the area, and pay a fee of \$50 plus \$15 for each acre he disturbs. It also requires some grading and reclamation of the area.

Reports from the Division of Strip Mining and Reclamation show that as of June 1, 1963, all operators of record were in compliance with legal action against them had been initiated.

"Bringing about compliance has not been easy," Matlock said. In January, 1961, 112 operators from Eastern Kentucky were cited to appear in hearings held in the Commissioner's office to show cause why they should not be forced to stop their operations.

Eight operators in Eastern Kentucky were sued in circuit courts for operating without a permit. Nine of these suits resulted in fines from \$100 to \$1,000 each, one was dismissed because the operator had left the state and five are pending in the courts. Eighteen bonds have been forfeited and the money is being spent to reclaim the areas for which the bonds were posted.

"Most of the unpermitted areas were disturbed prior to 1960 when the law was not so rigidly enforced and during the period when auger mining was not regulated," said Matlock.

"Under present statutes there is nothing our office can do to reclaim these old areas but we can and will insist on complete compliance on all current operations. Orders were issued today," Matlock said. "The Director of the Division of Strip Mining and Reclamation and his fieldmen to redouble their efforts to see that all operators are adhering to the law and regulations."

Matlock has also requested the Director to furnish his office a complete report on the status of all operations in both Eastern and Western Kentucky, within 30 days.

"If there are any current operators not fulfilling their responsibilities under the law," Matlock said, "this office would like to know so that action can be taken to bring about compliance or cancel their permits."

Facts useful to those interested in developing programs and analyzing trends of public health and medical care are illustrated by colorful graphs and charts in the report.


