"Layne House"— An Honor for Long Work with Alcoholics

Frank Layne, native Prestonaburg man, was recently honored by Mountain Comprehensive Care Center when the district alcohol and Drug Crisis In-tervention Unit, formerly called the SID Unit, was remained "Layne House." The gesture was in honor of Layne's relierment after 25 years of service on behalf of America's No. 1 social Illness-siccholism. More than half of those years and those the social those years included four years of service with the Kentucky State Health Department's Division of Acholism and eight with Mountain Comprehensive Care Center.

Mr. Layne began his employment with Mountain Comprehensive in 1967 with the community mental health program for District 11 was little more than a dream in the form of words upon paper (grant proposals). As district alcoholism coordinator, he helped plan and develop a comprehensive alcohol and drug abuse plantam. The the five counties in the similar Dirocd, Johnson, Magoffin. The mest recently developed service of the alcohol and drug program is the district emergency drop-in unit located

at the rear of the Mountain Com-prehensive Care Center district office building on First Street here. It is a place where people who are experiencing a crisis situation as a result of the abuse of crisis situation as a result of the abuse of alcohol, or some other drug, may go for immediate help. The unit is a part of the district wide HELP. Center—a crisis intervention unit for other kinds of problems. The alcohol and drug crisis intervention unit has been named "Layne House." Although Frank Layne has not had a drink for 28 years, he still refers to himself as a recovering alcoholic. He is

an advocate of the popular school of thought which says, "once an alcohalic; always an alcoholic," and contends that alcoholism is an incurable disease which may become arrested indefinitely but which, nevertheless, is always there, lurking beneath an exterior, sobriety, waiting to wreak havoc with the victim's life with the first drink. "A perion who is an alcoholic," Layne emphasized, "cannot afford to take just one drink, He can awver stop there. One cancholism is a person's failure to be able to drink with moderation."

Feeling that alcoholism is both psychologically and physiologically based disease, he says that the most an alcoholic can hope for is a life of total

alcoholic can hope for is a life of total abstimence. "To achieve the ability to live a life of total abstimence is not easy for the alcoholic," he adds, "but it can be done, and the difference it makes in a person's life and the lives of those who are close to him is well worth the effort." What kind of difference has effort made in the life of Frank Laynet At 40 years old, he was a down and outer; al of he is up and with it. In addition to his

work in the cause of alcoholism, he has over the past 25 years developed a suc-cessful and stable insurance business, a notable place in his community, and strong, solid family and friendship relationships which enrich his life daily. On the side, he has reported the or-nold Avenue with his wife, Mary Lou, and has furnished it with antiges which the two of them have restored. What more? He has also become a local history buff and has traced his geneology back to the 1780's.
