**Oak Sawflies** 

Stripping Trees

Frankfort, Ky. — Oak sawflies are defoliating oaks throughout eastern

Frankfort, Ky. – Oak sawfies are defoliating oaks throughout eastern Kentucky. According to Harry Nadler, director of the division of forestry in the Kentucky bepartment for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, the larvae of this insect prefer to feed on the leaves of on off feed on the entire leaf. The slug-like larvae, which have a yellowish-green cast, feed almost en-tirely on the lower surfaces of the leaves, leaving only the upper surface and a network of veins. This type of feeding activity characterizes them as skeletonizers. Although the toak sawfly is not con-sidered a serious forest pest, it is capable of completely striping the oaks by late summer. In most cases, however, defoliation caused by insected during late summer: is less harmful to trees than that which occurs in the spring and early summer.

which occurs in the spring and early summer. Uak sawfiles have been reported causing defoliation in a number of neigh-boring states. Last summer this insect caused scattered defoliation on 335,000 acres of forested land in southeastern and south central Kentucky.
