

## Mystery minutes obscure racing picture

One set adopted, different set filed; neither are accurate

Members of the Floyd County Public Properties Corporation on Monday approved one set of minutes purporting to reflect actions taken during a controversial special meeting held on August 20 and August 23, but a totally different account of that meeting has been filed with County Clerk Court Carla Boyd as the official record of the proceedings.

Neither set of minutes accurately report actions taken by the property corporation.

An agenda and a set of minutes of

the August 20 and August 23 meeting were faxed to members of the media prior to the August 30 special meeting of the properties corporation. Those minutes were apparently adopted by the corporation Monday over objections from the media that the minutes were inaccurate.

No response was given to those objections by corporation members or County Attorney Jim Hammond.

On Tuesday, a second version of the August 20 and August 23 special meeting surfaced in the county court clerk's office and were certified by the clerk as being the official record

of the August 20 and August 23 special meeting.

County Court Clerk Carla Boyd said Tuesday the second set of minutes had been delivered to her Monday night after a special meeting of the properties corporation.

Boyd, who is secretary of the properties corporation, said she prepared neither set of minutes.

The minutes filed with the clerk apparently do not correspond with the minutes approved by the corporation Monday afternoon.

Delores Dingus, finance officer for the county who served as the corporation's secretary Monday, said

Tuesday that a vote had been taken to approve the minutes originally distributed to the media. She was unaware of the second version.

The initial minutes contain glaring inaccuracies in relation to actual issues involved in the August 20 and August 23 special meeting, including:

• A reference in the minutes that County Attorney Jim Hammond was unanimously elected to serve as temporary chairman and called the meeting to order on August 20.

No vote was taken by corporation


## Commission approves dates for Floyd, Boyd

## Bidding time sliced, bond sale approved for facility

Contractors who wish to submit bids to build a stadium facility adjacent to a harness racing track in Floyd County have just over two weeks to get them in.

Members of the Floyd County Public Properties Corporation voted at a special meeting Monday to require potential contractors to have their bids submitted by September 16 at 2 p.m., the regular meeting date for the corporation.

County Attorney Jim Hammond said that a contract will be awarded that day to build the stadium facility at the race track.

The project has not been advertised for bids and Hammond said it would be up to project architect Randy Burchett and Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo to get the bid solicitation out.

At a special meeting of the corporation on August 20, Hammond and former Governor Julian Carroll, representing Mountain Racing Inc., said that contractors would have until

September 30 to submit bids for the project.

Hammond's and Carroll's comments on August 20 were in response to Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens who complained about a move to have the corporation approve a contract with Simpson & Associates to build the facility. Owens also opposed declaring the project an emergency so that the corporation could enter into negotiations with Simpson & Associates.

## Auxier thefts prompt call for crime watch

A recent rash of burglaries in the community of Auxier has Floyd County Sheriff's detective Lloyd Powers urging citizens to organize a neighborhood watch program.

Over the past several weeks, thieves have stolen merchandise from Lynn's Country Store, several riding lawnmowers and bicycles from private homes. Also several months ago, the Auxier Market was burglarized and thieves made off with cigarets and money.

Late night patrols by sheriff's deputies have resulted in a decrease in criminal activity, but citizens need to be on the lookout for anything suspicious.

"If people see something suspicious, call us," detective Powers said Tuesday. "Not just in Auxier; all over Floyd County. I'm a strong believer in a neighborhood watch program and we'll do anything we can to help them get started. Auxier is a real fine community."

"In order to make a better sheriff's department, the people need to help us help them," Powers added. "It will help us serve them as well or better than we have been if they will call us when they see something happening."

Recent layoffs in the sheriff's department have created long days and nights for full-time deputies, but auxiliary officers have stepped in to help fill the void to keep patrols at their

usual level, Powers said.

Powers blames economical "tough times all over" for the rash of thefts and said that one of the best ways to deter criminal activities in communities is for neighbors to keep an eye out for each other.

"People need to form a neighborhood watch group and to post signs telling would-be thieves that they are looking out for each other," Powers

said. "Once a community does that, it usually cuts down on the amount of crime. Several neighborhoods have formed watch groups and crime in their communities has decreased."

The theft cases reported in Auxier are still under investigation and Powers asks anyone with information about those crimes or any criminal activity to report it to the Floyd County Sheriff's Department.

## Adams students having tough time keeping cool

With temperatures soaring into the 90s, students at Adams Middle School are finding it difficult to concentrate on learning when their classroom temperatures match those outside.

Problems with the three-year-old school's air conditioning units have the school system's new facilities director hurrying to solve the problem.

Greg Adams, who began his duties on August 16, said Tuesday that maintenance workers are trying to find out why two of the school's four air conditioning units are on the blink.

"I went up there this morning and called the maintenance department and had some help come down and we started trouble shooting," Adams said Tuesday. "We found out that zone three and four, which are the

loops that cool the compressors down on the air conditioners, have no water flow through them at all. We think it's air trapped in the system. We're trying to go to the first unit and try to get some water flowing."

Adams said the problem at the middle school has "hit him in the face" during his first days on the job and he's trying his best to correct the problem.

"I'm trying everything I can do to help out and get it back on line to satisfy everybody," Adams said. "We're on top of the problem and I hope we can get it corrected. I want everybody to be happy."

A call to Adams Middle School principal Janice Allen was not returned Tuesday.

Adams said he hoped the problems could be solved within two weeks.

## Fire victim making a home in what used to be her house

Friday, for the first time in eight months, Molly Chaffins slept in a bed.

Since January 11, when her home at Cable Roberts was devastated by fire, Molly has been sleeping on a board she once used as the base of a waterbed.

During the day, Mollie goes to work at the Floyd County Judge-Executive's office where she is a clerk. Her co-workers and visitors at the office see a county employee with

a cheerful smile. Her proud bearing and her polished sense of style make her donated clothing seem expensive.

At night, she returns to the room where she has lived since the fire, her bedroom. Molly was at work the day her world fell apart. When the call came that the home she and her former husband Paul had built to raise their two children was on fire, she didn't believe it. When she arrived on the scene and saw the flames, she was in shock. She dashed into the burning home to save her pets, her cats Carly Fry and Fat Cat and her dog Baby.

Prestonsburg firefighters brought her out of the inferno and saved her pets, giving Baby oxygen.

When the home cooled, Prestonsburg firefighters put plastic over the burned-out roof and returned a few weeks after the fire to replace the roof for her.

After the fire, she had nowhere to turn for help. She had no insurance on her home. She discovered too late that a premium she had paid apparently did not go toward an insurance policy.

## Dwale man hurt in mishap; one killed

A Floyd County man escaped serious injury Saturday following a three-vehicle accident that left a Grayson man dead.

James Cox, 24, of Dwale was treated for minor injuries and released after the vehicle in which he was riding was struck by a pick-up truck on Route 23 just south of Paintsville.

The driver of the truck, Steven Smith, 18, of Phelps apparently crossed the center line first striking a car driven by Jack P. Harper, 36, of Grayson. Harper died about three hours later at Paul B. Hall Regional Medical Center.

Smith was listed in critical condition this week.

**Fire damages Prestonsburg business**

A Prestonsburg firefighter suffered heat exhaustion while battling a fire, believed to be caused by arson, Monday night at a Prestonsburg business.

Mike Blackburn was overcome by heat exhaustion while fighting a fire at Winchester Pest Control

Firefighters removed Blackburn's gear, gave him oxygen and plenty of liquids, the fire chief said. He was not hospitalized.

The fire, which caused approximately \$8,000 worth of damage, began in the rear room of the business, believed to be used by the night watchman, Blackburn said. Someone shattered a window and entered the room, said Blackburn, and a flammable liquid was poured on the room's con-

tents, then ignited. On arrival at the scene, firefighters hesitated to enter the building, fearing that hazardous chemicals might be stored there, Blackburn said.

"We're trained to be ready for the worst and seal it down," he said. Prestonsburg firefighter Tim Blackburn and volunteer Jason Kent took hand lines and a half-inch hose into the building and searched the premises. When they radioed back that no pesticides were found, firefighters began their attack on the blaze.

The fire was confined to one room, Blackburn said. Firefighters stayed on the scene until 2:30.

The business is owned by Norman Hampton.

The fire is being investigated by Larry Adams, fire marshal.

**Sweet 16 plans get underway**

Plans for the 1993-1994 Sweet Sixteen Academic Showcase were announced recently at a news conference at Transylvania University.

Sixth District U.S. Representative, Nancy Baesler, founder and chairman of the statewide academic program announced that plans have already begun for the annual televised auction followed shortly thereafter by the regional and statewide academic competitions for high school students. Money from the auction and private sponsor donations goes directly to provide scholarships to Kentucky high school students who win in the academic competition.

Since the Showcase was founded by Baesler in 1985, over \$570,000 in

scholarships have been awarded to 550 Kentucky students. Last year 1500 students from 190 high schools competed in the Showcase with \$700,000 in scholarships awarded.

The occasion for the news conference was the official opening of the Sweet 16 offices in space donated by Transylvania University and announcement of the beginning of the auction process. The office located at 421 North Broadway in Lexington will be staffed from 10 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday. The phone number is (606) 233-8136.

Informational packets to all the high schools in the state will be going out in September so students can get registered for their various competitions.

Owens claimed that the emergency declaration was an attempt to bypass bid procedures. Owens told Hammond and Carroll that he wanted local contractors to have an opportunity to bid on the project.

Carroll pledged to Owens that local contractors would have an opportunity to bid on the project and that Mountain Racing Inc. needed to have a contractor lined up to secure racing dates from the Kentucky Racing Commission. Owens later's committee was meeting August 30.

Owens was not at the August 30 special meeting of the public properties corporation.

In other business Monday the corporation

authorized the sale of \$2.6 million in bonds to fund the racetrack, fairgrounds and convention center.

Authorized corporation president John M. Stambaugh and Jim Hammond, acting as Floyd County Attorneys, to execute all documents necessary to close the bond sale and the transfer of property from the Prestonsburg-Floyd County Public Properties Corporation to the Floyd County Public Properties Corporation, and

adopted and ratified all motions,

resolutions and actions taken during the corporation's first meeting on August 20 and continued on August 23.

Carla Boyd, secretary for the corporation, was absent from Monday's meeting. The regular monthly meeting of the corporation will be Thursday, September 16 at 2 p.m. at the courthouse annex. The meeting is open to the public.

was unanimous in its acceptance." The commission also approved dates for a harness racing track in Ashland, which has not been built.

Monday's award of racing dates does not mean that Mountain Racing Inc. will automatically receive a license to conduct inter-track wagering (ITW).

Fulkerson said the deadline to apply for an ITW license is October 1 and that the racing commission will award licenses on November 1.

Last year East Kentucky Racing Inc., now Mountain Racing Inc., was awarded an ITW license and ran a betting parlor at Center Stage in Prestonsburg. The racing commission denied an ITW license to Mountain Racing for this year because the harness racing track was not built by the first of the year.

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Prestonsburg can stop striving and become equal to other larger cities throughout our state.

This goal to move forward can be a gifted movement for our city and for our residents to be proud of.

She could not turn to her family. Her son, Billy, lives in Lexington, though he returns to Prestonsburg to help her every chance he gets. He began his new job with a Lexington Fire Department on the morning of the fire. Her daughter, Crystal, has a new husband and a new baby. Her grandmother and namesake, Mollie Greene, was 96, and was too ill. (Mollie died in March).

She went to various agencies for help, but was turned down because she has a job. A friend, Joey Dilling, took her to Christian Appalachian Project where she was given jeans and shirts to wear to work. Christian Appalachian Project also gave her money to purchase additional work clothing.

Since that time, Mollie has lived

with the fire and smoke damage in her home.

"I could apply for Black Lung," she said.

Damage to her home was extensive. Electrical wires in her home were burned, leaving her with electricity only in her bedroom. The home was unheated. She shut off the water during the winter months, fearing that the pipes would freeze and burst.

"It was so cold (in this house) you could see your breath," she said.

Molly kept warm by using a blanket at night, a small heater given to her by her daughter, and, occasionally, a small kerosene heater. Because she has a bronchial asthma, she could only keep the heater on for short periods of time.

"Just about froze to death," Molly said.

Molly carried water in milk jugs.

To take a bath, she had to heat about 15 to 20 coffee pots of water.

"Believe me, it took many, many pots of water," she said. "But my grandmother always told me that cleanliness is next to Godliness."

Refusing to seek help from individuals because "people can be cruel," she borrowed about \$7,000 through the FHA to start getting her house in order.

After work, Mollie has tried to clear away some of the debris. She is getting about three hours of sleep at night. The work has proven too much for Mollie, who has lost about 35 pounds and is "bone tired."

Exhaustion is taking its toll and Molly is trying to fight off a strep throat infection.

Molly is "just too stubborn" to ask for help, said Tom Blackburn, Prestonsburg Fire Chief, who learned of Molly's plight Friday.

Members of the Prestonsburg Volunteer Fire Department immediately rallied to the aid of their former co-worker. Molly is the first woman in Floyd County to become an official member of the volunteer squad. Chief Blackburn and his firefighters retrieved a hospital bed at one of the fire stations and set it up at Molly's house Friday. They returned Saturday to burn the debris that filled her yard. They also cut the grass, which was so high they had to cut it five times with a weed eater before a lawnmower would go through it.

They plan to return and remove the damaged furniture from the house. Help is needed to restore the house.

Blackburn said. "She needs plumbers, electricians who are willing to lend a helping hand, or people who are willing to help paint," he said. She also needs furniture, dishes, silverware, and other household items.

Anyone willing to help out can contact Blackburn at 886-1010.

Molly, who thought she was fighting a losing battle, now sees a light at the end of her dark tunnel thanks to the fire department.

"Same as eight months ago, the Prestonsburg Fire Department is still sowing seeds of kindness through many, many neighborhoods just like mine," Molly said.

"They are very busy people helping others with their needs. They are not rich or noble — or possessed with master minds. They are only humble people who are blessed for being kind."

When Molly recovers from her bout with strep throat and returns to work, the smile on her face will reveal the hope that has been restored to her heart.

# Train, semi collide at Hueysville

No one was seriously injured Saturday when a tractor-trailer and a CSX train collided at Hueysville.

Earl Stevens, 51, of Noctor, was driving the tractor-trailer hauling heavy equipment when it apparently stalled on the railroad tracks at the mouth of Salt Lick near Hueysville Saturday morning.

While Stevens was trying to get his vehicle off the tracks, he saw the approaching train and managed to get clear of the truck before it was struck by the train, according to Kentucky State Police report.

Two CSX workers, William Deaton, engineer, and John Roark, conductor, were injured as they jumped from the train prior to the collision. Deaton and Roark were admitted for observation at Our Lady of the Way Hospital in Martin.

The accident is being investigated by state troopers Byron Hansford and Bobby Johnson. Members of the Garrett and Wayland volunteer fire departments also responded to the scene.

A reference in the minutes that "it was unanimously understood that the regular meetings of the Board of Directors, from and after August 20, 1993, should be held immediately following the regular meeting of the Fiscal Court of the County of Floyd, Kentucky."

The corporation voted on August 23 to hold its regularly monthly meetings, as outlined in the by-laws, on the third Thursday of the month at 2 p.m. in the fiscal court meeting room.

The minutes show that the action setting the regular meeting date was taken on August 20 and erroneously reflects that regular meetings will be held following the regular monthly meeting of the fiscal court.

The minutes omit entirely the declaration of emergency that was declared in order to enter into contract negotiations with Simpson & Associates to build a stadium facility at the site of a proposed harness racing track in Floyd County.

A reference in the minutes that the August 20 Floyd County, Kentucky Public Properties Corporation "regular" meeting reconvened on August 23 at 5 p.m.

The meeting reconvened at 5:30 p.m.

When asked after the August 30 special meeting about the apparent differences, Magistrate Gerald DeRossett agreed that the minutes were inaccurate. He did not explain why he voted to approve them.

The second set of minutes, which turned up Tuesday, more closely portrayed the events of the August 20 and August 23 special meeting, but those minutes also fell short of the true account.

The minutes failed to note that a vote was taken to establish regular meeting dates and times which were set for the third Thursday of each month at 2 p.m. at the courthouse annex, and included one action that apparently did not happen.

The minutes also suggested that the incorporators agreed to execute the minutes of their first meeting and they would waive notice of that meeting and consent to all proceedings taken.

No such issue was discussed or voted on at the August 20 or August 23 special meeting.

State law requires that an accurate account be kept of proceedings and actions taken by a public agency, setting forth an accurate record of votes and actions at such meetings.

On Tuesday, we obtained another copy of the special meeting minutes which differed greatly from the set we had received by fax.




Judge Callahan was a tireless booster of his home county and a constant supporter of regional projects designed to better our way of life in the Big Sandy. He was as comfortable roaming the halls of Frankfort's bureaucracy as he was walking the streets of Inez.

In fact, travelers from our area to the state capital were as likely to bump into John Callahan as they were their elected representatives.

His persistence often paid off, and his departure will create a sizable void that is not likely to be filled soon.

## Repealing a "sacred cow" would help ease annual fiscal crisis

Editor:  
Our commonwealth finds itself in a fiscal crisis where expenses exceed revenues in the current year by over \$300 million. In the last three years, with annual budget shortfalls of between \$50 million and \$100 million, the State Revenue Cabinet has simply withheld income tax refunds from Kentucky taxpayers until the next

fiscal year as a way to balance the budget (on paper at least). Since deficit spending is unconstitutional in this state, it is hard to see how this pattern of punishing people who have overpaid their state taxes will stop. One can only imagine how serious it will get with deficit spending three times what has been the norm in recent years.

It is absolutely necessary that state government look at every "sacred cow" to help cut our wasteful spending. One of these is the so-called "prevailing wage."

If Governor Jones is really serious in his attempt to rescue us from our ongoing fiscal crisis, he should suspend the state's prevailing wage law, thereby realizing annual savings to Kentucky taxpayers of up to \$45 million on state construction costs.

The "market wage" for construction workers in Kentucky ranges from approximately \$8.50/hour (for unskilled labor) to \$13.00/hour (for journeymen), plus fringes. Yet, the "prevailing wages" established by the

Department of Labor in Frankfort generally range from \$12.00 to in excess of \$20.00 per hour, plus fringes which are often two to three times the going rate. As a result, the taxpayers of Kentucky must shoulder an increased cost burden of approximately 15 cents on every \$1.00 of the state funded "prevailing wage" construction. Additionally, these "prevailing wages" apply to some local projects in which there is no state funding at all.

It is time for Kentucky's antiquated prevailing wage law to be repealed. It is time for Kentucky taxpayers to again be able to receive timely tax refunds. It is time for the Commonwealth to get out from under the burden of enormous annual budget shortfalls.

## Regional News Briefs

### John Callahan, 56, Martin judge-executive, dies

John Benton Callahan, Martin County judge-executive for the last 12 years and owner of Richmond Callahan Funeral Home in Inez, died early Saturday after a heart attack. He was 56.

Mr. Callahan, vying for his fourth consecutive term, ran unopposed in the May Democratic Primary and was to face Republican Russell Lowe in the November general election.

Gov. Bertton Jones can appoint someone to serve the last two months of Callahan's term, but it was unclear who would replace him in the election.

Mr. Callahan became the first Democrat to win the county judge-executive's office in 1981.

During his tenure, Mr. Callahan served as president and vice president of the Big Sandy Area Development Council, which serves Martin, Johnson, Magoffin, Floyd and Pike counties, and as president of the Aging and Advising Council.

About a month ago, Mr. Callahan persuaded three coal companies to contribute to a \$2.5 million water line extension, which is currently under construction. The lines will run from Pike County, on Ky. 292, to Warfield, in eastern Martin County.

Mr. Callahan took over the funeral home after his father, Kelly Callahan, died in 1960. He served as president of Eastern Kentucky Funeral Directors for two terms.

Mr. Callahan also served as Martin County coroner for two terms. *The Lexington Herald-Leader*

### Hearing set on \$100 million factory

The state Division for Air Quality has scheduled a public hearing Sept. 8 on a construction permit for a proposed wood products factory in Eastern Kentucky.

A new Minnesota partnership called Iris-Joe MacMillan want to build a \$100 million plant on Ky. 15 near Hazard. The plant would produce pressed wood panels made from laminated strands of area poplar, and eventually could employ 120 people.

A construction permit is needed because emissions of particulates, carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compounds would exceed 100 tons a year, division officials said. The agency has given initial approval for the permit.

The project involves building a 240 million Btu per-hour furnace. The company has proposed a number of dust- and particulate-collection devices to control emissions.

International Inc. of Boise, Idaho, agreed to the project last week, and MacMillan Bloedel of Canada is expected to approve the plan at a Sept. 15 meeting. The joint venture is expected to begin operations in 1995.

### Help for Arthritis victims

The Arthritis Foundation and the Pikeville Methodist Hospital Physical and Occupational Therapy Department are offering help for people suffering from arthritis.

Beginning September 29, Pikeville Methodist Hospital will offer the Arthritis Self-Help Course on Wednesdays from 6-8:30 p.m. in the 8th floor classroom. It is a six-week course designed to give people with arthritis the knowledge and skills they need to take a more active part in their arthritis care.

The course is taught by Pikeville Methodist Physical Therapist Sandra Morris and Occupational Therapist Janie Franklin who are both specially trained and certified by the Arthritis Foundation.

The key subjects covered in the course are exercise; relaxation; ways to save energy and use joints wisely; the role of medication and nutrition; and coping with depression, pain and other problems that result from arthritis. Participants use a textbook titled *The Arthritis Helpbook*, which is written in easy-to-understand language.

Arthritis is a chronic condition which can be painful and crippling. Physical limitations caused by arthri-

tis can often be accompanied by social isolation, depression and pain. The Arthritis Self-Help Course was designed to reduce the impact arthritis can have on people's lives and encourage a positive approach to the problem. The course has proven to be an effective way for people with arthritis to educate and encourage each other. It is designed to complement, not replace, professional health care services. Pre-registration is necessary and enrollment is limited.

Pikeville Methodist Hospital is also offering a unique opportunity for arthritis victims to borrow equipment needed for their care which is not covered by insurance. This new program is called the Arthritis Loan Closet and is available to persons with arthritic or rheumatic diseases.

Wheelchairs, crutches, paraffin baths, canes, quad canes, walkers, and bath benches are currently available in the Loan Closet, and all of the equipment is provided by the Arthritis Foundation.

There are only a few requirements for borrowing the equipment: patients must have a prescription from their physicians; and patients must fill out a Loan Closet application.

### Disaster benefits for Floyd farmers

Floyd County farmers can file for disaster benefits with their Floyd County ASCS office on Wednesdays at the Post Office building at Prestonsburg if they have suffered crop losses because of damaging weather and related conditions in 1993. The sign-up period ends March 4, 1994.

"Producers that have suffered a total crop loss can complete their disaster application and receive payment at this time," said Hampton Henton Jr., executive director of the Kentucky Agricultural Stabilization on a Conservation Service (AKCS). Applications for other 1993 disaster related crop losses can be filed at this time, but cannot be finalized until after the crop is harvested.

Public Law 103-75, signed by President Clinton on August 12, authorizes payments for 1993 losses to be made in an amount equal to 100 percent of each eligible claim. The payment rate will be 65 percent of the applicable basic payment rate for the crop.

"Farmers with crop insurance will be eligible for payment on losses in excess of 35 percent and farmers without crop insurance will be eligible for losses in excess of 40 percent," Henton said. "Each producer must agree to obtain multiple peril crop insurance for the succeeding year," the ASCS official said.

Running, jumping, playing games, and participating in sports are all considered routine childhood activities for healthy children. However, for children with asthma, any type of physical activity brings with it the possibility of triggering an asthma attack. Ask any parent of an asthmatic child about what happens when their child has an asthma attack and they will relate a variety of incidences ranging from slight coughing spasms to severe respiratory problems sometimes requiring hospitalization.

This summer, for the first time in Eastern Kentucky, children with asthma had the opportunity to attend summer camp and participate in a variety of activities they would otherwise have been unable to participate in because of their asthma. Camp Incredikids, held July 19-23 at Archer Park in Prestonsburg, was a free week-long day camp for children ages 7-13 who have moderate to severe asthma. The camp was cosponsored by the American Lung Association of Kentucky and Highlands Regional Medical Center.

Camp Incredikids was staffed by a team of physicians, respiratory therapists, and nurses. Sonia Shell from Paintsville, a representative of the Kentucky Lung Association, and Margo Bayes, R.N.C., clinical manager of the pediatrics department at Highlands Regional Medical Center organized the camp.

Eleven children attended Camp Incredikids. Supervised activities included swimming, skating, tennis, softball, basketball, and arts and crafts. An important component of the camp was asthma education. Breathing exercises and relaxation techniques were among the topics discussed to help the children better understand and manage their asthma.

Asthma is a condition caused by an inherent sensitivity or twitchiness in the airways (breathing or bronchial tubes). During an asthma attack the muscles around the airways tighten pinching the airways partially closed (Bronchoconstriction). Next the lining of the airways swells and pushes inward (a condition known as edema) taking up more space and leaving less room for air to pass through. Then the mucous glands begin to secrete more mucous than is needed and cause a further blockage

of the airways. In addition, the mucous may become thick and stringy and form plugs in the airways. The wheezing sound that is typical of asthma is caused by air forcing its way through the narrowed airways and vibrating the mucous.

During a serious asthma attack, the lungs become over-inflated because the air becomes trapped in the air sacs behind the points of obstruction in the narrowed airways. Even after breathing out as hard as possible, air remains trapped deep in the lungs and becomes stale and contains excessive amounts of carbon dioxide. The carbon dioxide laden air sends signals to the brain that the body's supply of oxygen is not adequate. The breathing control center then directs the involuntary nervous system to speed up the rate of breathing to overcome this deficit of oxygen, which explains why children breathe rapidly during an asthma attack. Asthma attacks occur sporadically and can vary in severity, depending on the degree and location of the airway blockage. Some children undergo asthma. Others do not.

Asthma is different from other chronic lung problems because the symptoms of asthma are reversible. This means that normal breathing can resume in most children with asthma until something triggers the next attack.

Medicines help control asthma, but as with most other medications, must be taken as prescribed in order to do their job effectively. Serious asthma attacks can often be prevented by avoiding situations that trigger asthma, such as pollen, dust, mold, animal dander, smoke, emotional stress, and too much exercise.

Asthma attacks that get progressively worse and do not respond to

asthma medicines normally used during an attack require emergency treatment in a hospital or a doctor's office.

### REBELS OFFENSIVE...

Much has been printed of late concerning the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People's (NAACP) desire that eight high schools in Kentucky drop the nickname "Rebels" because of the offensive implications of the name to the past, especially for African-Americans.

Allen Central High School is one of the eight schools that could be asked to change the school's mascot name, flag and other logos that pertain to the Civil War era.

John Wells of Paducah, who has authored two books on the Civil War and is currently working on his third, entitled "Mays' 10th Kentucky Cavalry," shared some interesting information concerning the issue after reading the article in the Times.

Says Wells, "The Civil War had little or nothing to do with the race issue. There were less than 40 slave owners in Floyd County. On the Confederate side, there were only five slave owners in the county. There were more slave owners who joined the Union (which were the Republicans)."

Wells said that Floyd County was overwhelmingly Confederate in sympathy. That is why Floyd County is an overwhelmingly Democrat county today.

Wells continued to say that "the war was a family and political war. It involved family against family."

"It has always been the tradition in Floyd County that the people resented and were suspicious of central authority."

Wells said the main issue in the Civil War was not race, but an interpretation of the Constitution.

"It was an issue for the people to decide whether they should have a strong central government or should a local government prevail."

Wells said that the Rebel mascot Allen Central has is the most natural one that the school could have.

"What is happening today is that they are trying to take our history away from us. I'm proud of Allen Central for choosing the Rebel mascot," said Wells.

Wells sees the request by the NAACP as a publicity stunt to gain more members.

"They have no real interest in Allen Central," the author stated.

Wells also feels that Allen Central should leave the mascot in place as well as other Civil War logos.

"Today's students had nothing to do with the Civil War and it is, and always will be, a part of our American heritage. The Rebel mascot and all the logos that go with it are just part of school spirit and are not being used to remind anyone of the past war."

got to do a better job in that area." With 6:57 left in the fourth period, Betsy Layne took over the football on loss of downs and marched 55 yards for their second touchdown. Craig Hamilton tip-toed his way into the end zone in the midst of some confusion as to whether he actually crossed the goal line. Hamilton ran in from 8 yards out for the TD. The running of Hamilton brought praise from his coach.


"We just didn't get it done mentally. We made a bunch of mental mistakes and that killed us. We're going to have to do a better job of correcting that."

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

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

Until Friday, good sports everyone and be good sports!

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

Kevin (Vaughn) and Brad (Wells) did. It was just a whole team effort." Prestonsburg scored quick and often in the game, putting 28 points on the scoreboard in the first half. They went on top 7-0 late in the first period on a 35 yard touchdown run by Dwayne Garza. Thomas Ratliff added the extra point with 51 seconds left in the first quarter. On their first possession in the second stanza, Ratliff hit Jason Sparlock with a 42-yard TD pass and then kicked the extra point to put the Cats up 14-0.

"I just saw Jason wide-open," said Ratliff, "and he made the catch." Sparlock made the grab on the 16-yard line, turned and then stumbled the remaining 6 yards into the end zone.

With 7:28 remaining in the half, Jody Cornette raced 48 yards for the Blackcats third touchdown to give the Cats a 20-0 lead. Garza took a Clay County punt and galloped 69 yards for a touchdown. Seth Hyden ran the ball in from 3 yards out for the conversion and a 28-0 lead.

Prestonsburg led 35-0 at the half when Garza scored his third TD of the game on a 1-yard plunge. On the score, it was just Garza and the defensive line on the goal line. Garza won out as he broke the plane of the end zone.

"Dwayne and Seth ran the ball hard for us tonight," said quarterback Thomas Ratliff. "Our line really blocked well and the defense was great. They stepped up and stopped De-Shea (Henson). It was a good effort."

Prestonsburg coach Bill Letton liked the play of his ballclub.

"Offensively, we spread the ball around," he said. "Thomas did a great job of running the offense. We're still figuring what to do offensively, but we'll get better."

"I thought we were pretty balanced. We definitely need to work on our passing game more. Our speciality teams looked great tonight."

Garza had five punt returns for 128 yards scoring on two returns. William Marsillett had one return for 10 yards.

Prestonsburg put six points on the board early in the third period with Cornette breaking tackle and going in from 14 yards out to make it 14-0. The final two points came late in the third period when Roberts was nailed in the end zone for a safety.

Coach Letton substituted freely the remaining time of the third and all of the fourth quarter. The junior varsity saw playing time, as well as the freshmen.

"I was real pleased with the junior varsity team," said the Prestonsburg coach. "They had a big defensive stop for us that kept the shutout in place. I was tickled to death to see our freshmen group come on at the end of the game and move the ball down field."

Freshman Jon Morris, with Mike Castle calling the signals, carried four times in the closing minutes and netted 15 yards.

Clay County had moved the ball inside the Blackcats' 20-yard line but the younger Cats held their ground in the trenches and held the Tigers from taking over the ball on loss of downs.

Seth Hyden led the ground game for Prestonsburg with 105 yards on 10 carries. The speedster saw little action in the third-and-none in the fourth. Garza rushed for 66 yards on nine carries, scoring three TD's in the game.

"I never thought we would come in here and win by such a margin as we did," said Hyden. "Our lines did a

great job tonight and held them for a shutout."

Blackcat center junior Jason Spencer said taking Henson out early contributed to the Blackcat win. "Our backs ran real hard tonight," he said. "I believe we'll do good this year. We took Henson out early in the game and that helped a lot. We came in fired up."

Jody Cornette had a quiet 97 yards on just five carries. He scored two TD's for the Cats.

Defensively, Morris' 11 tackles led the defense. Risner came up with eight tackles, including the safety. Ryan Elliott, John Lyons and Paul Collins each had six tackles. Collin had one sack in a good defensive effort for the junior.

Vaughn and Wells each had five solo hits. Cornett had one interception in the safety position.

Coach Letton said the game went as they had hoped.

Corey Reitz is playing his first football since his eighth-grade years at Allen Elementary and feels the excitement of being part of the Blackcat team.


"It feels great to be playing football here again," he said. "Tonight our offensive line did a great job, as did our defensive line. I'm just glad to be playing."


## Kid's Health Kamp : Oasis for special children

### PULLINGEST CLIPPERS I EVER SAW

**H**enry K. Ward; Booten Hall; Ray Burchett; Hampton Frazier; George "Coon" Lyons: names not likely to be found in some encyclopedia listing famous eastern Kentuckians, but perhaps they should be.

You see, these folks were among the old-time neighborhood barbers from this area whose names were sent to me as a response to a plea I made in this column a while back. And, not only did I get names, but most of the contributors chose to add an extra word or two as to what made these men so memorable.

For instance, Dorse! H. Sparks of Thealka remembers that when he was a kid living in Offutt, Henry K. Ward would not only cut his hair, but he'd also deliver a short sermon while he did so.

"The length of time it

took to give the haircut depended on the length of his sermon," Sparks said.

Mr. Sparks also recalls that it was Jephtha Ward (from up on Greasy Creek) who'd give him his "baldy" when school was out in the spring. "If you had a quarter, Uncle Jephtha would also snap a tintype picture of you. For fifteen cents, he'd play you a tune on his fiddle," Sparks added.

Helen Mollette of Louisa remembers that when she was a girl down on Hammond Creek, her dad, John Adams, was one of the community haircutters. She also reports that both John Childers and Fred Rowland cut hair in that area of Johnson County.

In the vicinity of Charley (in Lawrence County), George "Coon" Lyons did the honors when it came to free haircuts, according to his

daughter, Laura Abshire, of Hazel Park, Michigan.

"On many Saturday and Sunday afternoons, we'd have a whole living room full of people who would sit around

and talk and get their hair cut," she said.

Both Roger Short and Emalene Mullins

reminded me that Booten Hall was one of the favorite neighborhood barbers in the Meally community, and Cecil Frazier, who was reared in Elna, recalls that his uncle, Hampton Frazier, always cut his hair when he was a youngster. "He had the pullingest clippers I ever saw in my life," Frazier said.

Bob Daniels said that when he was a boy, Don Preston, who lived on Silk Stocking Row in Van Lear, used to cut his hair.

"And," Daniels added, "if she liked you, his wife Mary might just also give you a big

slice of freshly-baked apple pie."

Apparently, food offerings weren't all that uncommon, for Johnson County librarian Pat Patton, who grew up at Flat Gap, said that when people would come to her house so that her dad, Ray Burchett, could cut their hair, they also—whether they were relatives or not—were welcomed and invited to eat.

"I miss those days of free haircuts and meals unplanned... just good food, good friends, and not much money," Patton said.

The good news is, though, that while those days may indeed be gone forever, the good Lord has equipped us with a memory. As long as it's working, we can still enjoy those people, places and things of our youth; days when folks still helped one another, and the philosophy was "what can I do for you?" instead of "what's in it for me?"



## Tomatoes, potatoes are alike in their genes

One vegetable grows underground like a root, the other grows above ground on a stem. One is sold, stored and eaten, while the other is soft, watery on the inside and usually turns red when it's ripe.  
At least that's how most backyard gardeners think of potatoes and tomatoes. Yet, some potato and tomato plants are quite similar in the wild, said David M. Spooner, a U.S. Department of Agriculture scientist.  
An analysis of genetic DNA found that these popular vegetables have

such similar genetic backgrounds that tomatoes actually belong in the potato genus Solanum, he said. Spooner, Gregory J. Anderson of the University of Connecticut and Robert K. Jansen of the University of Texas did the research.  
"It's not unusual to find a cherry tomato sized fruit growing on wild potato plants in the Andes mountains in South America," said Spooner, a researcher for USDA's Agricultural Research Service. "And most wild tomatoes have small fruit that may never turn red."

What these findings could mean to gardeners in the future is that they may be growing a tomato that has a valuable gene—such as for drought resistance—that's borrowed from a wild potato. That's in contrast to today's practice of crossbreeding only the same species, whether tomato or potato, to capture a desirable trait.  
"Actually, potatoes and tomatoes once were classified together in Solanum. In 1753, Swedish biologist Carl Linnaeus put them in that genus. Shortly thereafter, English botanist Philip Miller moved tomatoes into

the genus Lycopersicon. Scientists have debated the issue ever since.  
"I think we've made a good case that the potato and tomato are sister species that belong in the same genus," Spooner said. He said the name debate is likely to continue. "Scientists aren't required to use Solanum or Lycopersicon for tomatoes, they can use whichever one they wish. It will be interesting to see which name scientists use in future research papers." (Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture)

## Electric pyramids zap houseflies

A weak electric current on a three foot high, plastic pyramid kills house flies that breed on farms and migrate to nearby suburbs.  
"Flies, but not beneficial insects, seem to be attracted to the light reflected off the white pyramid," says Lawrence G. Dickens, a U.S. Department of Agriculture scientist. But, the pyramid is harmless to humans, animals and birds.  
Dickens, one of the inventors of the pyramid, says solar powered electric grids on the sides and top produce just enough of a shock to zap the houseflies.  
He says the pyramid was designed for use on farms that generate manure-bred houseflies. "They are unsanitary and can become a nuisance at neighboring homes," he says.  
"With so many people moving into the suburbs, farm-bred flies have become, in some instances, subjects of lawsuits," says Dickens, an entomologist for USDA's Agricultural Research Service. On an average farm, controlling flies with insecticides can cost a farmer \$5,000 a year.  
Pyramids could be placed along the flyways on farms, between the manure where they breed and the areas where they become pests, Dickens explains. "In some cases, they would be effective at home sites to intercept the pests before they get into the kitchen."

other potential uses, he says, would be at beaches, zoos, landfills and cellars—anywhere that house flies can breed.  
He says the fly-zapping pyramid operates completely on solar power. No batteries are required and the solar panels are easily replaced. Practically maintenance free, the pyramid needs only an occasional cleaning during the fly season.  
Over the past 16 years, Dickens and colleagues at the Beltsville, Md., research center developed and refined the pyramid concept to control farm-bred houseflies. About five years ago, they began developing the electric zapper.  
Olson Products Inc. of Medina, Ohio recently began marketing a version of the pyramid for farm use. A lower-priced model for homes may soon be on the market. (Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture)



## USDA's "Farm" to document sustainable ways to grow crops

Tomato plants are thriving without chemical fertilizers this summer on a U.S. Department of Agriculture farm outside Washington, D.C.  
"Hairy vetch plants make the difference." They are used as a mulch instead of plastic to cover the soil around tomato plants. "Vetch fixes its own nitrogen and slowly releases it as fertilizer for the tomatoes," says Donald D. Bills at the Beltsville, Md., research center.  
"Our experiments this summer have shown that vetch eliminates the need for adding any nitrogen fertilizer," he adds. "As a result, the tomatoes look as healthy and tall as plants that have 150 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer added per acre."  
The tomato plots are part of a new sustainable agriculture project headed by Bills for USDA's Agricultural Research Service at Beltsville. Scientists are documenting the results of using little or no farm chemicals on various crops, from tomatoes to strawberries, blue corn, soybeans and other beans.  
Plant physiologist Aref A. Abul-Baki, who started the tomato-vetch experiments several years ago, says he at first used only half the chemical fertilizer usually applied on conventional tomato fields. Now he will use no chemical fertilizer. He says the vetch also squelches weeds, keeps away major insect pests, reduces soil erosion, adds organic matter and helps the soil hold more water.  
Bills says that tomatoes planted in vetch has averaged 20 percent higher yields at lower operating costs. "Any alternative system that balances environmental and financial concerns of farming over the long run is sustainable agriculture."  
Whenever possible, he says "what's used on the farm should come from the farm and stay on the farm. Vetch is an example and so is our recycling of manure from the dairy barns onto crop fields."  
Farmers and representatives of agribusiness and agencies that help farmers are "working with us and regularly touring the project sites," Bills says. "Maryland farmers will serve on an advisory board, helping us deliver answers to farmers." (Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture)

## Look out below! It's the kamikaze kitties

I have some very good news for those of you who have committed the unforgivable lapse of not paying attention to your cat at all times and therefore discovered that Morris has leaped 30 stories out an open window: HE WILL LAND ON HIS STOMACH AND NOT BE HURT.

Scientists in New York City have proven this remarkable phenomenon in a study of 132 cats that fell an average of 5.5 stories out of tall buildings. Ninety percent of them survived, including Sabrina, who fell 32 stories and chipped a tooth and was hungry because she'd traveled a long way without eating.

**SPECIAL NOTE:** Dr. Wayne Whitney and Dr. Cheryl Mehrlaff of the Animal Medical Center in Manhattan have had their lives ruined by reporting this research, and they want to emphasize **THEY DID NOT THROW 132 CATS OUT OF SKYSCRAPER WINDOWS ON PURPOSE.** The cats just fell. Since High-Rise Syndrome, or HRS, has been reported from Los Angeles to Miami to Washington, D.C., this summer, "Wild Things" offers a safety guide to Frequent-Flier Felines:

- **Move to a Higher Floor.** Among 13 felines that fell more than nine floors, there was only one fracture and no deaths. This is because after falling about five stories, cats spread their wings like squirrels, scientists suppose, parachuting to the ground on their bellies and softening the impact. Cats are believed to have nine lives because of their remarkable ability to land on their feet, but HRS superstars survive by landing stomach-first. In shorter falls, cats do land on their feet, causing greater injury (fractures and hemorrhages are common), but few deaths.

- **Don't Try This at Home.** Cats, remarkably, study the horizon (even at night) and torque themselves right-side-up for a proper landing in the **FIRST THREE FEET OF A FALL.** Then they reach a maximum speed of 60 miles per hour while cruising in for a gentle landing. Humans, however, tumble out of skyscraper windows at disastrous angles and reach an impressive maximum speed of 120 miles per hour. People cannot be taught to right themselves like cats, experts say. It's innate.

- **Don't Assume Cat Intelligence.** If cats are so graceful and smart, why do

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they fall out of open windows? Sixty-four percent of "high-fliers" are 2-1/2 years or younger and are making the bad judgments of young creatures everywhere. Cats, so confident of their superior balance, commonly play on open ledges, leap for insects or tumble in playful kitty duos out the window. In Dade County, Fla., where a Himalayan named Bailey is the HRS record-holder with a 24-story injury-free flight, cats leap after taunting birds. "The cat leaps at the bird. The bird flies away. The cat keeps going," says a Miami vet. "Cats are instinctive hunters." Alas, cats can't judge depth. Ten stories looks like two stories to them.

- **Don't Let Your Dogs Try This.** Dogs are more careful around the window ledge, but in 81 cases in New York City over several years, canines chased, among other things, a squirrel, cat, another dog—and, in one case, a burglar—right out the window. Dogs also reach impressive speeds in midair and don't fare as well as cats landing on sidewalks from great distances.

- **Don't Assume Human Intelligence.** Falling pets are common in summer-

time, when it gets so hot people just fling open the ol' window. We recommend a window air conditioner, and Dr. Whitney suggests investing in a remarkable lightweight, perforated-aluminum technology that allows air to pass in and keeps cats and dogs from going out. "Put in a window screen." But even this isn't infallible: The fearless Johnson, a feline companion of one acquaintance of ours, crashed right through a screen in hot pursuit of a pigeon. Our friend then designed a screen that can only be pulled inside, not pushed outside, which has served to confine Johnson's subsequent flights to those of mere fancy.

#### What Is Proper Etiquette When a Pet Dies?

We're not Miss Manners, but we believe a personal note, phone call on pat on the shoulder will do, depending on your relationship to the bereaved. But American Gretings, one of the world's largest greeting-card companies, has a new option: the first line of pet greeting cards. With cuddly pet photos on the cover and pawprints

padding across the envelopes, this new line of \$1.65 cards congratulates new kitten births, mourns dog deaths and bids you happy birthday from a friend's pig, goldfish or rabbit. Our favorite: the hind parts of a cat pictured, with the legend: "You're nobody 'til you've been ignored by a cat."

#### Tail End

What's it like to live to 150 without ever seeing a member of the opposite sex—or even your own sex? This is the plight of the gentle gopher tortoise, the only tortoise indigenous to the southeastern United States and now an endangered species in Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, where there are fewer than 200 left, says Southeastern Louisiana University biologist Richard Seigel.

In the Depression, the gopher tortoise was a major food source for area residents, who dubbed it "Hoover chicken."

**Judy Moberly West, the first woman state Court of Appeals Judge, was appointed to that post by Martha Layne Collins, Kentucky's first female governor. Judge West won re-election to the seat.**

In 1983, more than one hundred people with a net worth of a million dollars or more lived within a ten-mile radius of Pikeville, making the area the largest concentration of millionaires in Kentucky.

At age 84, A. B. "Happy" Chandler, twice governor of Kentucky and who left his seat in the U.S. Senate to become the second commissioner of baseball (1945-1951), was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

Porter Paint was founded by Bonne Porter in Louisville in 1921. Porter is one of the nation's 20

largest paint manufacturers.

**Wallace Wilkinson carried more counties in his 1987 victory than any gubernatorial candidate in the state's history. He also won by the largest percentage of the vote. It was the first time ever for a candidate to carry 115 of the 120 counties.**

In a time period of less than 20 years, coal mining raised Martin County, from the poorest all-white county in the nation to the third richest in the state of Kentucky in terms of per capita income.

Henry P. Scalf, who died in the late 70s, was the only man in Kentucky who lived in his own personal county. Known as Little Floyd, the 10,000 acres where he lived is officially part of Floyd County, yet totally surrounded by Pike County. A brother of his great-grandfather who was in the legislature and didn't like being a

part of Pike, helped to get a law passed in 1845 to keep Scalf's great-grandfather's farm in Floyd County.

The first major battle on Kentucky soil during the Civil War was fought near Prestonsburg, January 10, 1862.

Since 1973 Pikeville has led the

nation in per-capita consumption of Pepsi-Cola. Hazard is 2nd in the nation, Corbin is 3rd, and Portsmouth, Ohio (barely across the river) is 4th.

Actor Lee Majors, the Six Million Dollar Man, lived in Middleboro, and attended Eastern Kentucky University as Harvey Lee Yeary.

Pike County is the largest coal producing county in the nation. Pike is also the largest county (land mass) in the state of Kentucky.

The largest single project ever to be undertaken by the U.S. Bureau of Highways was at Pikeville. A cut through Peach Orchard Mountain to reroute the Big Sandy River, the C & O Railway and a four-lane highway involved the removal of 17 million cubic yards of earth to create a cut 532 feet deep and 1000 feet wide at the top.

Flavored chewing gum was invented in Louisville, around 1800 by a man named Colgan.

The parents of Jesse James and his brother, Frank, were born in Kentucky, and Jesse married a Kentucky girl.

The first bank actually known to have been robbed by Frank



#### Indian Pipe (Monotropa uniflora)

Indian Pipe, a member of the heath family, is a weird, wax-white wild-flower of Shawnee Indian legend. It can be found in the deep, deep woods, out of the reach of sunlight.

Through death, it lives.

Indian Pipe grows in clusters from the dark fertile mold of decaying leaves. Instead of leaves, it has scales and must take its nutrients from the roots of other plants or from decaying organic matter.

It is no wonder it is also called ghost flower or corpse plant. The plant has a pale, ghostly appearance. It turns black when touched by human hands. It feels clammy to the touch.

It was named Indian Pipe by early settlers, probably because when it begins to grow, it resembles a long-stemmed pipe. As it reaches maturity, it droops its head and resembles whiterobed nuns.

Indians crushed the plant into pulp, steeped it in water and then used it as a lotion to treat certain eye ailments and injuries.

Indian Pipe blooms in July and August—if there is plenty of rainfall.

#### Long-leaved Pine (Pinus palustris)

This tree grows from 100 to 120 feet tall. The wood is hard, strong and coarse, much valued for lumber.

The leaves are 8 to 18 inches long. The cones are 6 to 10 inches long.

When Kentucky was admitted as a state of the union in 1792, there was not one native-born individual old enough to cast a vote under the laws of the constitution.

Four Kentuckians have been elected vice-president of the United States—Richard M. Johnson, John C. Breckinridge, Adlai Stevenson, Alben W. Bartley.

First called Mount Pleasant, Harlan was settled in 1819, the same year Harlan County was formed from sections of Floyd and Knox counties.

The home of the Kentucky Derby was first called the Louisville Jockey Club Course. The track was called Churchill Downs for the first time in 1886.

Started in 1875, the Kentucky Derby is the oldest continuously run horse race in the world, and is still the most prestigious of them all.

Each town in Kentucky has its place in history. Take, for instance, the town of Hodgenville, located about 43 miles south of Louisville. It can boast that it gave birth to the end of slavery. The town lists one of the United States' most famous presidents among its native sons.

Abraham Lincoln, the sixteenth president of the United States, was born on February 12, 1809 near Hodgenville, on the Sinking Spring Farm on the south fork of the Nolin River. His father, Thomas Lincoln, a carpenter, cabinet maker and farmer, purchased 350 acres of land on Nolin Creek in 1808.

The family lived in a one-room, dirt-floored log cabin when Lincoln was born. Abraham Lincoln was named after his grandfather Abraham, who was killed by Indians while working near his cabin in the wilderness near Green River.

The land at Nolin Creek proved barren. When Lincoln was two, his family moved about seven miles northeast to Knob Creek. Lincoln always said his earliest memories were of the time he spent on the farm at Knob Creek.

He and his sister Sarah learned to read and write in a small backwoods school near the farm. He also helped his family plant corn and pumpkin seeds and in later years told of watching a hard rain wash all the seeds away.


Much of the lore of the young Lincoln revolves around his time in Kentucky.

Speculation during Lincoln's term in office made the rounds that Lincoln was illegitimate. To quash the rumors Lincoln wrote to county officials at the place of his birth and

asked for a copy of his parents, Nancy Hanks and Thomas Lincoln's, marriage bonds.

Hardin County courthouse officials wrote back that they did not have the marriage bond. This fired the gossips, and Lincoln went to his grave believing that his

parents were never legally married, according to Thomas D. Clark in his book *Travels Through Kentucky History*.

The marriage bond was discovered in 1878 in the Washington County clerk's office.

A reproduction of Lincoln's boyhood cabin is located on farmland occupied by the Lincolns from 1811 to 1816, Knob Creek Farm. The farm is on U.S. 31 E. about

Lincoln was born, the settlement was a social center of activity. The settlement kept growing and in 1818 the Hardin County Court created the town of Hodgenville at the request of the widow and sons of Robert Hodgen, an Englishman who moved to Kentucky from Pennsylvania.

Robert Hodgen built a mill in 1789 on the North Fork of the Nolin River. The mill was located near Phillips' Fort which was built in 1781.

The town became incorporated on February 18, 1839 and became the county seat on March 4, 1843 when Larue County was created out of Hardin County. The county courthouse was built in 1844.

The Civil War came to Hodgenville. On October 13, 1861, North and South skirmished on the streets of the town. Confederate guerrillas burned the county courthouse on October 23, 1861. The Confederate troops burned the courthouse because it had been used to house Federal troops.

A second courthouse was constructed in 1866 using the foundations of the first. A third courthouse was built in 1964.

The Civil War slowed the economy in Hodgenville, and farm prices became unstable. But then the railroad came through town and with it came an economic boom.

The Illinois Central Railroad (now Illinois Central Gulf) opened Larue County to markets in the South and West when it built a spur from Hodgenville to Elizabethtown.

Hodgenville has continued to grow. The population in 1970 was 2,562; in 1980, 2,531 and in 1990, 2,721. Its economy has mainly remained agricultural, but the manufacture of clothing and lumber products has aided the economy.

# HOME PLACES

Herman Porter is a walking-talking history of the community of Allen — at least about the events of this century. He even lives on the site of the town's namesake pioneer store.

During his 88 years as a resident of Allen, he has lived through the Great Fire of 1924, witnessed several train wrecks, and survived at least six floods. He saw gunfights in the street, the paving of main street, the advent of electric lights, the telephone and refrigeration, and he put in the town's first modern water plant and cable television system.

What Porter doesn't know about the town's first hundred years can be gleaned from history books, namely The History of Floyd County.

Unlike several Eastern Kentucky towns that were established by coal development, water

"There were feuds here. They shot each other in the streets. It was like the Wild West. One shooting was during an election.

"Garfield Wright was a policeman and he was a nervy fellow with the drunks and he had a Wild West style. He got right up with them. He got shot and he killed others."

April 24, 1924 was the day of the Great Fire.

"It was a windy day," Porter remembered. "At that time we had coal fires in a hearth in the houses. The wind would blow through the chimneys. The fire started at Bill Malone's when sparks blew out of the hearth and caught his house on fire. The fire was an inferno. It was over with in a couple of hours because of the wind. No one could fight the fires. We had to save our lives. I was trying to help my father take the washing machine out. We had to drop it and run for our lives. No one was injured. Some animals got burned up was all."

In a couple of hours, 29 houses, most of the hotels (including his father's), several other businesses and the Allen depot were leveled. "The fire was so hot it burned the railroad track," Porter said. "They couldn't run the trains until workers came and straightened out the track."

The townspeople rebuilt and, by 1926, the town had a grocery, a hardware store, a newspaper and printing company and a new depot.

His family didn't rebuild their hotel, he said. Instead, Standard Oil placed a gasoline and oil plant on the site.

His father held the first light plant distributorship and he helped his father sell and install Delco light plants in houses. "When electric lights were installed, people came from all over to see," he said. The lighting system ran on batteries. "Gradually, the batteries got old and wore out, so we hooked onto the (Appalachian) Power Company."

Until 1937, when the government paved main street, the town "had no roads," he said. "We drove oxen and mule teams. In the summertime the roads were dry and you could go places."

The town was the site of a few train wrecks, he said. But the most memorable one occurred during World War II. A train transporting soldiers derailed near the town bridge. "The soldiers milked the cows and ate everything up in town. Some went AWOL while they were here. The engineer kept blowing the whistle. They like to never get them back on the train."

His father was the first to sell refrigerators. "My father sold them at Prestonsburg and all over," Porter said.

His father got out of the refrigeration business when World War II caused a slump in the refrigeration market and he opened a coal mine at Salisbury. His father also installed the first telephone lines in Allen.

Meanwhile, Porter built the first modern water filtration plant and later he wired the city's first television cable system.

The town was inundated with floods in 1937, 1946, 1957, 1962, 1977, and 1984. The worse flood got up to 30 inches in his house. "I spent more money on repairing the house than I did on building it," he said. "Everybody built their houses back."

Though the town has faced many setbacks throughout its history, the townspeople are survivors. And a new generation of leadership promises a bright future for the city.

Mayor Chris Waugh said that after years of decline, "a lot of exciting things are happening in the city of Allen" — one thing being a city sewer project due to start in less than a year. "The town is on the upswing," he said.

transportation was the key to the development of Allen.

Early residents settled along a creek bank known as the Mouth of Beaver Creek. The land, now known as Old Allen, was owned by Thomas Jefferson Allen (1848-1920) who had been deeded the land by his father-in-law William J. Mayo. Allen took advantage of the water transportation afforded by the creek by building a general store nearby. The store became a drop-off point for steamboats and barges that delivered products from Ashland. The boats then carried farm products to points on the Big Sandy River. The store became known as Allen's Place and the community became known as Allen.

From the time of its establishment until recent years, Allen was a hub of activity, serving as a distributing point for supplies going up Beaver Creek. In 1902, construction of a line of the Big Sandy Railway was started and then finished with the first engine crossing the Beaver Creek Railway Bridge November 4, 1905. The Allen Post Office opened May 16, 1905 and twice a day mail was brought from the nearby C & O Railroad Station.

The town had a stove mill that built oak barrels for the liquor industry, a hardware store and four hotels, among other businesses. Churches and schools were established.

The town was extended in the 1940s when Town Hall built and sold a number of houses in what is now known as New Allen. The Big Sandy River separates the two sections. Old Allen was incorporated in 1913 and has its own mayor and city government. New Allen remains unincorporated.

Porter, born in 1905, has sharp memories of his early childhood. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Porter, owned Mountain Hotel located in the heart of town. "Traveling salesmen would stay all night with us," he recalled. "Father had 12 to 14 horses. Salesmen would take them and would ride them up Beaver Creek and make their sales rounds and come back in about three days with the horses. Then the salesmen went back to their main store in Huntington. People ordered from the salesmen and then picked up their orders at Allen depot."

He said the town "was a hub during World War I. It was a rushing place. They put in the mines up Beaver Creek and were shipping coal through Allen for the war."

The occupations were farming, oil and gas well drilling, coal mining, and sawmilling. "There was kind of a variety of businesses," he said, including a doctor's office and a casket shop, which were kept busy when Porter was a boy.



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# Resource centers designed to serve communities and schools

In January a student at East Carter High School walked into a senior English class and shot his English teacher and a school janitor in front of 22 students.

Within minutes after the arrest of the student, the East Carter Youth Services Center had responded to the tragedy, by setting up a crisis center through the help of local mental health agencies and the school system.

Students who had been held hostage and had witnessed the shootings were provided with counseling to deal with the aftermath. The 24-hour crisis center was also opened to the entire community as counselors were brought in from surrounding counties.

Before the 1990 Kentucky Education Reform Act this kind of help probably would not have been so swift and so organized.

While KERA addressed changes in school finance, governance and curriculum, it also addressed the physical and emotional needs of students. The creation of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers has been the link between schools and social service agencies.

Family Resource Centers, which serve children under 12, and Youth Services Centers, which serve older students, are set up in or near schools where 20 percent or more of the students are eligible for free lunches.

As of July 1 there are now 226 Family Resource Centers, 88 Youth Services Centers and 50 combined centers across the state.

Family Resource Centers are required by law to provide services such as preschool and after school child care, prenatal education for new parents, parent and child education, training for day care providers and health services

Youth Services Centers provide referrals for health and social services, employment services, summer/part-time job development, drug and alcohol abuse counseling as well as family crisis and mental health counseling. They are prohibited from counseling or making referrals for abortion.

In Muhlenberg County FRC coordinator Myra Bender was instrumental in putting together a plan with the local health department to create satellite health departments in local elementary schools.

While the local health department was a well-used facility, a study revealed that 85 percent of those people who had scheduled appointments failed to show up because they lacked transportation.

"I thought why not take health care to the people. The school is the center of many communities. It's where baby showers and receptions are held so why not make health care available there too?" said Bender.

The director of the county health department was able to get permission for staff flextime which enabled the department to extend its hours beyond 4:30 p.m. Health department personnel moved into three elementary schools with hours

Readifast provided an opportunity for children to get free shoes, socks, underwear, tee shirts and school supplies in a festival-type setting.

Grocery stores, fast food restaurants, health care professionals and hair stylists all donated services. Free personal care products such as shampoo and toothpaste were available. Kids received free hair cuts, a dentist examined teeth. Hearing and eye screens were given. Balloons, refreshments and trinkets were given out to over 600 students from preschool age to grade 6.

In Bowling Green the youth services center has tackled conflicts adolescents have at school. Bowling Green Junior High School officials were concerned about a rise in the number of suspensions because of student fights.

"What we were finding was this was sometimes a situation where a parent was sending a message to kids that fighting was an answer to settling problems," said Patty Alford, YSC coordinator.

The center designed a conflict resolution plan using student mediators. Peers and teachers recommended students who then underwent a three-day training session in providing feedback, role playing and confidentiality.

Students involved in disputes meet with the mediator to resolve differences, whether property disputes or boyfriend and girlfriend problems. They write up an agreement that both parties must sign.

Last year Bowling Green Junior High School resolved over 300 disputes with the help of 10 student mediators and the number of suspensions decreased.

"We've found that many kids don't want to fight and this is a way they can save face. And these are skills that they can take with them for the rest of their life. It's a win-win situation."

As one Fulton parent wrote in a letter to Ronnie Dunn, manager of the Cabinet for Human Resources Family Resources/Youth Services Branch, "When I walked into the resource center you could feel the warmth. It wasn't like an office. It was more like a home."

"They really care about our children, parents and our whole community... Everyone should know what their resource center can do to help them."







## Move the countyseat?

In recent years, a school of thought has developed to suggest that Eastern Kentuckians should take more notice of our state's motto: We should stand together more often.

Such thinking led directly to the creation of two groups working to unite Eastern Kentucky in the critical areas of jobs creation and leadership development—the Eastern Kentucky Leadership Foundation and the East Kentucky Corporation.

Both of these groups include leaders from throughout the mountain counties who realize that when we divide and compete with one another we are more apt to fail—and fail.

When we are united and work together we can win.

An industrial plant in one mountain county brings benefits to neighboring counties as well. We have seen this with the American Standard Plant in Johnson County, which employs many Floyd Countians.

Pike County's success in attracting its cookie factory helped Floyd County's efforts to bring in the new lighting plant near Martin.

The same principles should guide us in how we work to improve Floyd County.

Suggesting that the county courthouse be moved from Prestonsburg to another town in the county sets us into an unhealthy competition that divides our local cities.

Such a move would bring no new benefits to Floyd Countians. The Courthouse and the jobs for people working there are already in our county.

Moving them to another town in the county would have a disastrous economic effect on Prestonsburg, but would not improve the overall economic welfare of Floyd County.

It is more like robbing Peter to pay Paul.

The Floyd County government and the individual cities in the county have had a good working relationship over the past few years.

Judge Stumbo, the Fiscal Court, the other Mayors and myself, have worked on many joint projects, including jobs development, tourism, roads and community programs.

Prestonsburg is spending more than \$100,000 per year on tourism promotion and advertising—not just for the city but for the entire county.

One result has been that Floyd County is one of the few in Kentucky to show an increase in the dollars spent here by tourists year after year.

In fact, in the last five years, tourist spending in Floyd County increased by nearly \$6 million, going from \$16.3 million to \$22.2 million. And 162 new jobs were created in our tourism industry—about as many as a small factory.

By agreement, while the city focuses on tourism, the county is working on economic development, for which it created the Floyd County Economic Development Commission.

Just this month, through its efforts, Floyd County was able to announce the new lighting plant which will create 60 new jobs the first year and up to 300 in three years.

Competition can be healthy but I would rather see Prestonsburg or Martin or Allen or Wayland or Wheelwright compete with Winchester for a new plant's home office than to be in competition to take that plant's office from one of us and give it to another.

As I leave the Mayor's office in December, I hope we will continue in this direction—all Floyd Countians working together in a united effort to build a better Floyd County.

Because united we stand—and succeed.

As a lot of you people in Floyd County know, I have "openly opposed" paying a half million dollars for the municipal parking lot in the middle of Prestonsburg for the construction site of the proposed new Floyd County Courthouse.

As nearly everybody in Floyd County knows, there isn't much parking in Prestonsburg as it is right now.

There will be even less when the new jail is constructed, because the new jail is going to be built on the present courthouse parking lot behind the courthouse.

If any of you have ever tried to park behind the courthouse now, you know what I am talking about.

I voted against putting the jail right in the middle of Prestonsburg, surrounded by people's homes and businesses because usually when a jail comes, people's property values go down.

There is no room to expand the jail in the future.

This jail could have been located on an abandoned strip job where the roads would have already been built to and away from anybody or any businesses where the land would have been extremely cheap and possibly even donated to us.

People, we have got to look to the future — not just look at today. We are about to reach the year of 2,000.

It's time that we looked at what it's going to cost our kids and their kids in the future.

I'm not opposed to building a new courthouse in Prestonsburg. I'm opposed to paying a half million dollars for a lot to the city of Prestonsburg that's so small I could throw a baseball from one side to the other side of it — not to count that the city of Prestonsburg will not have a parking lot for two years or longer.

I know the City of Prestonsburg has had a problem with their budget, but I don't think they ought to try to rob the Fiscal Court, though. I believe that the business people of Prestonsburg — lawyers, restaurant and motel owners, etc. — should think about what they stand to lose if this courthouse doesn't go there.

I think they should put pressure on the mayor and the city council to work with the Fiscal Court.

It would be to Prestonsburg's advantage if they gave us the parking lot. It would pay off in jobs during the construction to these people — not to count the payroll taxes that would go to the city for years to come.

I hope that this November Election brings people to power in Prestonsburg who would have a different outlook on this project.

I could have gotten this on the ballot this fall to let the people of Floyd County decide whether or not they want to move the courthouse out of Prestonsburg, but I didn't for two reasons:

\*I'm optimistic that there will be changes in Prestonsburg and that there will be a different outlook on this project and.

\*Due to budget cuts, this project could be delayed for approximately two years and I would still have time to get it on the ballot if necessary.

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This program is designed for use in the 7th and 8th grades and uses teen leaders to teach younger teens how to postpone becoming sexually involved. This is a very effective program whose goal is to reduce the number of teenagers who become pregnant. These programs will be offered at Adams Middle School and McDowell Elementary.

# FACES IN THE

Artist Brenda Crouch knows the importance of accessibility.

After earning an A. B. degree in commercial art at Morehead State University, Crouch, 31, a native of Sharpsburg in Bath County, worked at the Floyd County Times, first in ad layout and then as ad manager.

But her calling as an artist drew her back into art. She quit her newspaper job and began working out of her home as a free-lance artist. Although she sold her work at local festivals, she realized that to be successful, she needed a more accessible location. "I needed to rent space where people could find me and where I could work," she said.

So she hit upon the idea of a business where local artists and craftspeople could display their work for retail sale and where she could have a studio.

She contacted Floyd County artists and plans started to evolve.

In April, 1991, the group of artists had formed the Floyd County Arts. They also had a June deadline for their first art show — the Floyd County Chamber group art exhibition at the Convention Center at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park.

Preparation for the show was a new experience for Crouch.

"This was my first time to try to get a display of Floyd County artists' work together," she said. It was hard work, but worth it.

She credits members of the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce with giving the organization the initial boost. "Charlotte McFall was at the Chamber at the time. She sent out letters, mailings and organized things. Delores Smith, who was president of the Chamber, helped, too. We had the support of the Chamber."

The exhibit was a success and other shows soon followed.

"That fall we did an exhibit at Prestonsburg Community College and we decided we wanted to do another which would be a Christmas-type exhibit," Crouch said.

This time the exhibit would have its own home — the vacant Dollar Store building on Court Street, the present home of the shop — and a new name: The Mainstream Art Expo.

Volunteers spruced up the building with elbow grease and paint and by the end of

November, the building was ready for the art expo.

This exhibit, too, was such a success that the Floyd Arts decided to keep the building open as a retail gallery. There was one big obstacle: a lack of funds.

"We wanted funding secured to keep the building open after the Expo," Crouch said.

"We closed down and replanned the concept. We made it into Mountain Heritage Arts and Crafts with plans to include more than Floyd County artists. We got funding and reopened in April, 1992."

Mountain Heritage Arts and Crafts was and continues to be, subsidized by the City of Prestonsburg, Prestonsburg Tourism Commission and Prestonsburg industries and corporations in an effort to promote tourism.

Since the reopening, Mountain Heritage has

As a child growing up on a farm at Toler Creek, Julie Johnson learned how to take ordinary things and turn them into something extraordinary. She never dreamed that her crafts making skills would be more than a hobby.

But today, she is a successful craftsperson and her handmade corn shuck dolls, flowers and grapevine wreaths are sell-outs at regional crafts shows and festivals. In addition, her work is sold at David Appalachian Crafts and Mountain Heritage Arts and Crafts Center, local businesses which sell the work of area artists and craftspersons.

Johnson's involvement with David Appalachian Crafts and Mountain Heritage extends beyond that as just marketplaces for her crafts. Since 1985, she has been director of sales and marketing at David Crafts. Recently, she joined the board of directors at Mountain Heritage.

Johnson, 46, started making crafts as a childhood pastime. "I went to a country school, Toler Creek school, and we didn't have a lot to do, especially in the winter and our teachers encouraged us to do projects. They gave us a sewing class. Then, too, my mother was always working on a craft to be used in the home, such as quilts. Everything was utilized because we lived on a farm. We used wood and other natural material.

"My sister and I had played at making corn shuck dolls when we were kids," she continued. "They weren't very good. Then about six years ago I started making them again. A friend in Western Kentucky showed me how to improve my dolls and breathe life into them. She had been making them for years. She showed me how they could have more personality and how to decide what setting they would be in. All of them have personality."

She took out several dolls from her work

basket and stood them on the table beside her. The dolls included were a school marm, complete with a corn silk bun and wire-rimmed glasses, a nurse dressed in a long-skirted uniform and a tiny Mary ready for a manger scene - all folksy creations not more than 18 inches high that are all the more charming because of their humble origins.

Johnson said

that she sticks mainly to caricatures of women simply because they are easier to make. "Most of my dolls have skirts. With men, you have to make trousers and they are a lot harder to make. I've made Daniel Boone, Pilgrims and occasionally a Santa Claus. As a rule, I prefer to do women and little girls. I do Joseph for nativity scenes because he wears a robe. I do animals when requested, but it's hard to get the shape right.

"I'm slow making dolls. It takes me a couple of hours. I work in stages. The face is slow. Other steps are quick. I start with the arms — I use wire as a form to bend, shape and to hold different items — a basket, a broom. Then I do the head. I work from the top down."

As much as she enjoys creating the dolls, she prefers making corn shuck flowers. On a table nearby, a large basket is stuffed full of

Mountain Heritage has

become what Crouch originally envisioned — a retail business that sells the work of about 90 artists and craftspeople from Floyd, Johnson, Martin, Perry and Pike Counties. Items the store carries include hand-woven rugs, baskets, handmade knives, quilts, cornshuck dolls, pillows, afghans, prints, twig furniture, and wood pieces ranging from musical instruments to furniture.

Still, Crouch is not satisfied. "We've been here a little over a year and we are still not where we need to be. We are starting to work on long-range planning and how to be more self-sufficient...The local economy can't keep it going. This is not a typical retail business. There is not a great deal of production. Ninety-eight percent of craftspeople have full-time jobs."

Ironically, as proprietor, salesclerk, bookkeeper and janitor of the shop and as a paper carrier for the Floyd County Times, she's had to put her artistic career on hold.

"It is hard to switch from bookkeeping to paperwork and doing day to day stuff and then go home and get into a creative mode. It all but makes it impossible."

Her specialty is pencil portraits, although she said, "I dabble with airbrush and, here

lately, just about anything. I'm fascinated with carving and, lately, leatherwork.

"The length of time I've been working on Mountain Heritage. I've taken names of customers and put them on a waiting list. If at some point we can get Mountain Heritage organized to stand on its own, then I should be able to work on my own work.

"I never dreamed I'd do something like this," Crouch admitted as she sat relaxed at her desk at the shop. "I got out of the newspaper business to pursue my work. I either had to leave the area or do my work here. So far, I've opted to do my work here."

During one particular afternoon, within an hour, she had at least three customers who browsed through the shop, looking at artists' prints and at the various craft items on display. Although the shop has its share of foot traffic, especially during the summer and during Christmas time, most people who visit the shop "just browse," she said.

"Mountain Heritage needs volunteers at this point," she noted, "to baby-sit the shop or to work on a committee, such as the workshop committee or with the education program or publicity committee."

Also, Mountain Heritage needs more artists and craftspeople to participate, especially those who create their own pottery, jewelry or leather craft items. "We would like to find someone who makes jewelry," she said. "Even people who are willing to instruct a work-shop."

Mountain Heritage also has an education program that includes various workshops about the arts. The shop is also the site of the Floyd County Schools art program for gifted students.

Eastern Kentucky artists who are interested in placing items for sale at the shop may call Crouch at Mountain Heritage at 886-1842 or bring in sample items.

The store hours are 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

## Who do we elect?

Section 99 of the Kentucky Constitution requires each county to elect, "a Judge of the County Court, a County Clerk, a County Attorney, a Sheriff, a Jailer, a Coroner, a Surveyor, and an Assessor, and in each Justice's District one Justice of the Peace and one Constable."

Other Kentucky constitutional provisions authorize the legislature to take certain action affecting the county officials named in Section 99.

The General Assembly may consolidate the offices of sheriff and jailer in any county. In such cases the office of sheriff is retained, and the duties of the jailer are assumed by the sheriff (Ky. Const., sec. 105). The offices of sheriff and jailer have been consolidated in Jefferson County. The office of jailer is discussed in Chapter VIII of this report.

The legislature may abolish the office of assessor and provide for the assessment of property by other officials (Ky. Const., sec. 104). The 1968 General Assembly replaced the office of tax assessor with the office of property valuation adminis-

trator (KRS 132.370), Section 107 authorizes the creation of additional elective county offices, but none have been created. Section 101 requires the jurisdictions of constables and sheriffs "to be coextensive with the counties in which they reside." Section 144 requires counties to have a fiscal court composed of justices of the peace (magistrates) or commissioners.

county clerks. The age, residence and special qualifications for each official are discussed in the chapters which follow.

The power of the General Assembly to add to the qualifications stated in the Constitution is negligible, if existent at all. The Kentucky Court of Appeals in *Broughton v. Pursifull* has held that it is "incompetent for the Legislature to pre-

scribe additional disqualifications not recognized by the Constitution."4 In this case the court cites

several authorities which hold that constitutional qualifications for public officials restrict the legislature's power to prescribe additional qualifications.

### Terms of Office and Qualifications

The county judge/executive, county clerk, county attorney, sheriff, jailer, coroner, surveyor, constables, justices of the peace, county commissioners, and property valuation administrator are elected for terms of four years (Ky. Const., secs. 99,144; KRS 132.370). These officials may be elected to an unlimited number of consecutive terms (Kentucky Const., sec. 99). No person is eligible for any of these positions unless he meets the age and residence qualifications prescribed by the Constitution in Section 100. County attorneys must also meet the legal qualifications set forth by Section 100. Section 100 also enumerates special qualifications for

## The Cost of Dropping out

In 1990, Kentucky's General Assembly enacted a new statute that affects a good many high school students in the state who are old enough to obtain their driver's licenses.

The law is often called the "No-pass, No-drive" statute, but it gener-

ally addresses those students who drop out of school before their 18th birthday and who have not obtained their high school diplomas.

According to the law, students aged 16 or 17 who drop out of school are declared to be "academically deficient." Students may be declared academically deficient after they amass nine or more unexcused absences during any semester or if they do not receive passing grades in at least four courses in a semester.

Within ten days of being declared academically deficient, a student's name and Social Security number are forwarded to The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet and, as soon as possible thereafter the cabinet will notify the student that his or her operator's license, permit, or privilege to operate a motor vehicle has been revoked or denied.

The student may appeal the decision to District Court and show cause why his or her operator's license should not be revoked.

In order for a student to have his or her license reinstated, the court must be satisfied that the license is necessary to meet family obligations or that its revocation would create an undue hardship. A license may also be reinstated if the student returns to school and completes his or her course requirements.

Not all high school students are subject to the provisions of the dropout law.

The statute does not apply in school districts that do not operate an alternative education program, approved by the state Department of Education, which is designed to meet the learning needs of students who are unable to succeed in the regular school setting.

Prior to the passage of this law in 1990, students could drop out of school without legal penalty at any time after their 16th birthday.

The new law was enacted to keep students in school.



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Prestonsburg and Martin

In the United States and Canada, Labor Day is a public holiday that honors all wage earners. Banks, schools, government offices and most businesses are closed for the day. For most citizens, it is a day of rest and recreation that generally marks the end of summer and of vacation.

Many countries observe Labor Day with labor union parades and mass meetings. In Australia, the day is known as Eight Hour Day, celebrating the Shorter Working Day Law.

**The first Labor Day observance**

Over a century ago, a great parade marked the first observance of Labor Day. In 1882, Matthew McGuire, secretary of the Central Labor Union of New York City, suggested the idea of a labor holiday to the leaders of other labor organizations in New York.

September fifth was the day chosen for the holiday and the city celebrated with a huge parade sponsored by the Knights of Labor. The holiday was a tremendous success and became an annual event on the first Monday in September.

In 1877, Oregon was the first state to make

States entered its greatest industrial period in the early 1900s. As late as 1870, more than half of all workers made their living in agriculture. Although many families left the farm for jobs in the city, their lot was hardly improved by the change. Wages were so low that in most cases entire families, including children, had to work to keep food on the table. Employees often worked 12 to 14 hours a day for another man's profit and who had little regard for the workers' need for a safe working environment. In the garment industry, women and girls often were made to work in dangerously crowded and unsanitary conditions.

Individually, a worker had little voice in the workplace. Anyone who protested too vigorously about poor working conditions could lose his job. The additional threat of being blacklisted by other employers effectively kept the worker in his place.

Workers in a trade or factory began to form one organization called a trade union or a labor union with one spokesman to represent them. Union demands were to seek higher wages and improved working conditions for laborers. By the late 1800's, a strong united labor movement led by Gompers and others had begun.

**The Industrial Revolution and the rise of the labor movement**

The first great labor leader in America was an English immigrant. Samuel Gompers rose from humble beginnings as the son of a poor Jewish cigar maker in London to become a founder of the giant American Federation of Labor.

Due to the efforts of Gompers and other labor pioneers in the late eighteen and early nineteenth century, the rights of men and women who labor in the United States were established and protected.

The labor movement began in England in the 1700s with the Industrial Revolution. The invention of power machinery heralded the mass production of goods in factories and brought sweeping changes in the way people earned a living. People began leaving the farm for life in the city and the steady employment factories and other industries offered. Not all people worked in factories. Some workers were hired to produce material needed by factories and others to transport products to consumers.

**Gompers' work as a labor union leader**

At age 10, Gompers had to leave school to help support his family. He worked for a shoemaker and later became apprenticed to a cigar maker. At 13, his family moved to New York City where he worked in a cigar factory.

In 1877, Gompers became president of the local cigar makers union. He knew that in order for a union to have a strong voice in the workplace, it needed to be united with other unions on a grand scale. He and other labor leaders who shared his idea, worked to build local unions of a craft together into a single, strong national union.

By 1881, Gompers had organized a group of national unions into The American Federation of Labor, a body of almost 150 unions with 4 million workers. Gompers was president of the powerful union and held the office, except for one year (1895) until he died in 1924.

In addition, in 1921, he became president of the Pan-American Federation of Labor. He was also the founder of the International Labor Organization, an agency that is a part of the League of Nations.

Under the guidance of labor pioneers such as Gompers, labor unions pushed for reforms in the workplace and for the rights of laborers. The achievements of the labor movement include securing the right of laboring people to organize on their behalf; and the creation of fair laws, regulations and standards for working people.

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

This picture of a Little Leaguer is drawn line-by-line. A television does the same thing and does it very fast. Your brain puts the lines together and you see a picture.


**experiment #1**

Line By Line

**WHAT YOU NEED:** Paper - scissors

**WHAT TO DO:** Fold the piece of paper in half lengthwise. Use the scissors to cut a very thin, tiny, narrow slit like in the drawing. Unfold the paper and hold it about 12 inches from your face. Look through the slit at a window. Doesn't look like much, does it - until you wave the slit up and down quickly.

**WHAT IS GOING ON:** When you flash the slit up and down, it's a lot like the picture tube in your TV, drawing a picture really quickly with a very skinny line. Your brain puts the images together, and instead of seeing a lot of slices, you see the whole window.



Here's where it gets interesting. Your TV draws 30 different pictures every single second. That makes them seem to move.


**experiment #3**

A Clue From TV Light

**WHAT YOU NEED:** Pencil - TV

**WHAT TO DO:** Wave a pencil back and forth as fast as you can. Do it in front of a window. Look carefully at it. Now turn on the TV and do the same thing about 12 inches from the screen. What's different?

**WHAT IS GOING ON:** When you waved the pencil in front of a window, you saw a blur. The pencil was moving too fast to see. But when you did it in front of a TV, you saw five or six pencils, and they seemed to bend.



That's a clue. Every time the TV changes a picture, the light blinks. Your pencil got lit up by the TV every time the picture blinked. That's why you saw many pencils. There was 1 pencil for every different picture the TV showed you.

**WHAT IS GOING ON:** The little guy or girl walked across the bottom of your phone book, right? Well, not really; it just seemed to. We got confused by all the different pictures changing so quick that our brain just put it all together. We call that an illusion (ee-LU-shun).

When something on TV seems to move, it is only because we are looking at lots of different still pictures at a high speed. If you have a VCR that has a feature called *frame advance*, you can look at each picture by itself. Try it.

**experiment #2**

You Actually Need A Brain To Watch TV

**WHAT YOU NEED:** Phone book - pencil

**WHAT TO DO:** Draw a copy of drawing #1 on the bottom of the first page of your phone book. Then draw #2 on the bottom of the next page, but move it over just a tiny bit. Go to the next page and draw #1, moving it over a bit more. Go to the next page and draw #2 again. Keep going till you have drawn 40 or 50 stickpeople. Now grab the book and flip the pages with your thumb.


A big thank you to Mike, Tim, Hannah and Willie for their contribution to the tab.

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# New coach, new season brings excitement to Allen Central

The 1993 high school football season hasn't started yet,

but there's already excitement in the air at Allen Central.

New head football coach Glenn Reeves has the players and fans believing that this season will be better than the 2-8 mark the Rebels posted last year.

There is reason for the high optimism that fans and players alike have for the start of a new season. Coach Reeves is a defensive-minded coach and that is the strong part of this year's team.

However, while the defense is in place, the offense will not be lacking any itself.

Returning quarterback Brad Blackburn has noticed a difference in camp already.

"Coach Reeves has really turned a lot of heads," said the third-year signal caller. "All of us are looking forward to the season. We're different."

Blackburn said the difference was "probably in the defense and the way we're tackling."

"We have a lot better form in tackling," he said.

Blackburn looks for the coach to let him throw the ball more this year.

"I think we will throw more this time," he said. Blackburn named off some of the receivers that he will be targeting.

"We have Thomas Jenkins who has good hands and is just a freshman. There's Austin Shelton, a good receiver. He also has a big body for blocking. Then we have Rondal Stewart and Jeremy Hall."

Blackburn believes that four wins in the district could put the Rebels in the playoffs this year and he looks for Pikeville and Fleming-Neon

to battle for the top spot.

Coach Reeves has noticed a lot of positive things about the Allen Central program since arriving on campus in July.

"We have good work ethics here," he said. "The boys are working real hard. We haven't had any discipline problems as of yet and most of the kids show up for practice."

Reeves clarified that, saying he hasn't had any who have missed practices since it began the first of August.

This will be a very young Allen Central team even though it will return eight seniors. But the eight returning are short in playing time and some will be at new positions.

The youth part comes in that the younger players are going to be expected to fill key positions and still have a lot to learn, according to Reeves.

"We're still a young football team. We have a lot of things to learn about football yet. Basically, we're just learning the fundamentals of the game."

Coach Reeves believes that once his team does learn their roles and the fundamentals "they would be all right."

Coach Reeves liked the way that Blackburn has handled himself in the team's scrimmages this year.

"He is throwing the ball well and making good decisions on the field. I'm really

pleased with his option play. That has been real positive."

Reeves said that the offense that his team runs will make it difficult for the opposition and cause them to play the Rebels honest.

"Basically, what we have out of formation is when we go to the left it's usually in a wing 'T' and then when we come back to the right we're talking about a wish-bone type offense. So, they can't play us either to the left or the right. That's been proven in our scrimmages."

Glenn Floyd (6'0", 195 senior) will run the fullback position for the Rebels and was a strong runner for Allen Central in his junior season. He is deceptively quick for his size.

"He's done a great job for us," said Coach Reeves. "He

just does a great job of running the football."

James Osborne (5'7", 180 senior) will join Floyd in the backfield for his final year. Osborne is a finesse runner where Floyd likes to power his way through.

"James is a hard-nosed football player," said the Allen Central mentor. "He loves it. He gets after it when he is on the field. I can always call on James when I need him."

A coach doesn't know just when a player will bloom and step forward to add to the offense, especially when he wasn't being counted on to start with. But Shawn Howard has been a pleasant surprise to Coach Reeves in learning a new position.

"He has been a bright spot for us," said the Rebel coach. "It's a new position for Shawn. Basically, what he has done in the past is played defensive nose. We want to use his size and blocking ability in the backfield. He has very good work ethics."

The new Allen Central coach views his offensive line as the mainstay of his ball club.

"We're going to try and teach our kids to fire off the line. We'll have Kevin Dye

on the line. He has done a very good job for us there. Then at left guard will be Shawn Robinson and Mike McKinney will be one of our tackles. Mike's a big boy.

"We're still young there but we're going to have these kids one more year."

Reeves said that it will be the "kiddie corps" who will have to handle the receiving part.

"Our offensive line will have to be able to pick up the blitzing linebackers," said Reeves. "They will have to be able to block the gap."

"So far what we have practiced is a straight six then a five front. We need to get these things taken care of."

"Basically, we want all our boys to be able to block anything they see. We want them not have to wait to get a scouting report but be able to make that decision on the spur of the moment."

The team seems to be enthused about the new coach and the feeling is mutual with him.

"I'm enthused about them," he said. "Their attitude is great and I feel positive about them. I believe that nothing but good things will come out of Allen Central."

Coach Reeves concurred with Blackburn's assessment and looks for Pikeville and Fleming-Neon to be at the top.

"After those two we will be evenly matched with the other teams," said Reeves.

Reeves will measure the success of this year's team not in the number of games won or lost, but in their ability to put points on the

scoreboard.

"Being able to score when we get hold of the ball is going to determine if we are a successful team or not. Being able to make first downs is another. The kids coming off the field feel positive about themselves."

"On defense, we've got to be able to stop them. Of course, if they don't score and we score once, then we win. We have to play defense. We just want to find a formation these kids can work out of which looks like a six right now."

Reeves said that he wants his team to air it out this year and they will throw the football more.

"Austin Shelton is going to help us out a lot there at right end. He's caught some good passes in our scrimmages."

"Floyd can run out of the backfield. Any one of our backs coming out of the backfield can handle the ball."

Jeremy Hall should be able to help us there, also. He's a first-year player but reportedly a great athlete. We want to utilize that talent. But, again the line has to give us time to throw."

Excitement, enthusiasm, high expectations are the ingredients for this year's Rebel football team. Winners of just two games last year, the Rebels hope to be better than a .500 club this season.







## The only question for Blackcats is who will do the kicking?

When the 1993 football season gets underway on August 28 for the Prestonsburg Blackcats, there will not be too many pressing questions that need answering.

However, two stand out as the Blackcats come off a 12-2 season and a final four appearance in the state football playoffs last year.

Question number one that is being asked about this year's ballclub is who will replace Marcus Araujo and do the kicking.

Araujo was a big addition to the Blackcats' football team last season. He set a school record for the most consecutive PAT attempts. He had 17 consecutive kicks that split the uprights. He was a threat from 35 to 40-yards out for a field goal.

Question number two is who will do the receiving this

season with the loss of Jason Day (5'10", 139) is a good candidate for that position as well as John Stout (5'9", 134) who also is a junior.

Outside of those two areas, the Blackcats have to be the top choice to repeat as not only district champions last year but regional as well.

Prestonsburg is expected to receive some stiff competition from Russell, who fielded a young but talented regional team last season.

The backfield for Prestonsburg returns intact as the "dynamic duo" of Seth Hyden and Dwayne Garza (5'10", 197) return for their senior year. Both runners have rushed for over 2,000 yards in their previous three years and will be a threat again this year coming out of Coach Bill Letton's backfield.

Garza will be returning to the Blackcats offense after injuring his knee against Russell in last year's play-

offs. The running fullback says things look good.

"I feel great," he said and is excited about the upcoming season. "It's a 100 percent and no pain anywhere. I'm ready to go out and play football."

Garza is the power runner on this Prestonsburg team and has been known to get the extra two to three yards after being hit. An excellent third and short runner.

Hyden is the finesse runner. Good speed and quickness make him a constant threat to break away and run the long yardage.

Hyden picked his blockers well and gives Prestonsburg a solid outside threat.

But there is a third person in the backfield, Jody Cornette, and look for Coach Letton to utilize him more.

While not the explosive runner that Garza and Hyden are, Cornette is an excellent back with good hands. He will add to the receiving game

out of the backfield.

Matt Porter (5'10" 167), a senior, has been impressive in preseason scrimmages and will see some playing time in the backfield.

Porter is a strong player who is deceptively quick. If he gets outside on the opposition, he can be trouble.

The Blackcats lost perhaps their most athletic player in quarterback Aaron Tucker, who will be at Sue Bennett College this season. Tucker's replacement will be junior Thomas Ratliff (6' 1", 155), who was moved into the signal calling spot.

Ratliff, also very athletic, will not be a stranger to the quarterback spot having quarterbacked the junior varsity team as a sophomore.

The junior possesses a strong throwing arm but must learn to read the defense better. Ratliff will have to recover quickly from any hits

on the getting the job done." It will be a big offensive and defensive line that will line up for Coach Derossett in 1993. The kind of line that has gotten him singing their praises.

"I'll tell you this, if they decide to line up and play we can put anybody behind them and run the football," he said of his offensive line. "We do have a good offensive line and that's one thing I'm blessed with."

Anchoring the line will be Brandon "Bubba" Combs and everybody knows how good Brandon is," said Derossett. "We also have Shannon Hall and I have one of the best linemen in Tim Hunt, who is just a sophomore. He's 210-

pounds and a go-getter. He comes everyday with fire and ready to practice."

Good young players who can play the game and carry the future of Bobcat football will make their impact as well on this year's ballclub.

"We have a lot of good young players," said the Bobcat mentor. "Darrin Reynolds and Shawn Keathley are doing a real good job for us. Brad Kimbler is another one who will be a help to us."

"Craig Hamilton is a bright spot for us. He weighs about 125-pounds but runs like he's 175. He's one of those players who doesn't have strength or speed but when he goes out there and the lights come on he gets ready to play."

One player that Coach Derossett is high on is sophomore Rodney Hamilton. Hamilton did not play football last year but has made a move to play this season.

"Last year at this time Rodney wasn't even playing football. Right now he's our middle linebacker and leading us in tackles," stated Derossett.

Like most local schools this season the kicking game could be lacking for the Bobcats this year but it isn't because they haven't concentrated on it.

"Our kicking game could be a problem for us," said Derossett. "We've worked awful hard on it. During our camp we took one practice a day and worked on special teams alone. We've got some good kickers though."

Derossett said that the duties will be handled by Roberts, Robinette and Combs.

"They all can kick the football," said the second-year coach. "The problem comes in getting the snap back cleanly and that is where we are seeing the problems."

The coaching staff at Betsy Layne will be well in place with the loss of one and addition of another.

"We lost my brother James who went back to school at Eastern. Losing him was a big loss to us because he really was like three or four coaches. He ran the grade school team, coached on the varsity and anytime there was a job to do he would go and do it," Derossett said.

Also helping out the Bobcats will be Solomon Kilburn, Dwight Newsome and Jeff Speaks, along with veteran Jody Cecil.

"Solomon has been here at the school working with us and he's a help. We have Jody Cecil back and he will be our defensive coordinator as well as coaching the grade school team."

"Jeff Speaks is a new coach for us this year. He's from Raceland and played at UK. He will be a big help to us."

Derossett said that he is going to implement the Little League Football program this season.

"It will be a lot like the one at Prestonsburg. We'll squeeze the yard lines in to 30 yards wide and 80-yards long for the smaller ones in grades third through six. We will have our eighth grade program that will run a full season."

Derossett said that he wants his team to get better each day in preparation for opening day against South Floyd.

"We need to control the line of scrimmage. We need to do the fundamental things. We're not going to finesse or trick anyone but we will come right at them. We want to work hard for August 27."

Betsy Layne will be in their second year of not competing for a district title. They also tried to tone down their schedule some but as Coach Derossett said, "Everyone is getting better."

"I don't know that we did tone down our schedule any," he said. "We have Allen Central and South Floyd on it and

I was impressed with them both in the gridiron, especially Allen Central.

"We've picked up East Carter and they are expected to have between 60 and 75 players out this year. So, I don't know if we helped ourselves or not. Teams are getting awful competitive anymore with weight programs and off-season training."

The difference in this year's team from last season can be summed up in one word—expectation. The Bobcats expect to win this season.

he will experience and come back strong.

The new quarterback will be a very good option quarterback but may lack that rushing ability that Tucker had.

When you measure the two lines for Coach Letton's ballclub you have to remember that this is probably the biggest they have been for some time. The offensive line, which will average over 200-pounds, will not only be talented but experienced as well.

Kyle Fitzpatrick (6' 2", 251) will anchor the offensive line as the Blackcats should afford Ratliff plenty of time to throw the ball. Fitzpatrick is a hard-nosed player who enjoys winning and hates to lose. That makes him even tougher to get through.

Shane Ball is a third (and also a tight end) who has suffered an injury of one type or another. But Ball's problems has come from none other than blisters on his feet.


While Pookie Jones will return for his third year at quarterback, the Cats need to find someone with sure hands to play the end slots.




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# New name and new season for Coach Daniels

The 1993 football season will enter the year without a Wheelwright Trojan squad, but some of the veterans from the school, along with Coach Donnie Daniels, will try to make this season one of success in the first year for the South Floyd Raiders.

Coach Daniels will have only two new identities when the season starts and that is a new season and a new name. But the coach also knows that this is going to be a rebuilding year for him, personally.

"We will be working on blending our younger players in with our returning ones," the Raider mentor explained. "We have 18 kids returning who played varsity ball last year. The rest have no varsity experience at all."

Out of the 18 returning players, 15 are seniors and that gives some experience to the new season. But the Raiders coach has other problems.

"We're not getting any harmony on the field," he said. "Our biggest problem is consistency. When you think you're over the hump you turn around and you don't think they are doing a very good job. We go from being average to being below average."

While Coach Daniels looks to put together a consistent offense, he is pleased with the way his team has looked defensively.

"We've always been a good defensive ballclub," he stated. "I look for us to be a more solid defensive club than last year. Of course, your defense is always ahead of your offense."

South Floyd will be a consolidation of McDowell and Wheelwright High Schools and sometimes that creates problems.

"Not here. There is a great relationship between these kids," said Daniels. "The older players have picked up the younger ones and are helping out."

"What this team needs to understand is that they can't identify with Wheelwright or McDowell but South Floyd. They need to communicate with each other and, hopefully, it will carry over in the school."

Gone will be speedster Muntu Oden and Steven Shelton, part of last year's nucleus. But the Raiders will not be without last year's leading rusher, Arnold Adams.

"Arnold is a four-year

starter for us. We will be looking to him for leadership on the team. He is more knowledgeable than last season."

Adams makes few mistakes, according to his coach, and will be a versatile player for South Floyd.

Last year's EKMC Speciality Player of the Year, Adams will handle not only running the football but the team's punting. He averaged over 38 yards per punt last season.

Jason Martin (5'11", 275) will move from center to tackle this season in just one of several moves that Coach Daniels will make.

"We will also move Charles (Johnson) from tight end to split end in order to free him up more," Daniels said.

Johnson, a 6-foot, 180-pound senior has good hands for the outside position and was Wheelwright's top receiver last year.

"He runs the patterns real well," said Daniels, "but he hasn't been blessed with speed."

Coming off the line from last year and moving into the backfield will be Cruse Caudill (5'11", 170 senior) who will run at the fullback position.

"Cruse didn't get to see too much offense last year, but he is a heck of a blocker," said Daniels.

Playing both sides will be John Caudill, who will handle the defensive guard slot as well as seeing some time on the offensive side.

One person whom Coach Daniels is looking for speed in the backfield will be from Patrick Tackett (5'8", 150) and that is the reason he will move from the split end position to the backfield.

"We don't have the speed in the backfield that we once did," said Daniels, "and Patrick will give us that. He has that 'burner speed' and if he gets into the secondary he could do some damage."

Others that Daniels will be looking at will be Shannon McKinney (5'10", 295), Kelly Lackey (6'1", 221) and newcomer Mike Tackett (5'11", 205).

"Kelly will be a big plus for us on defense," said Daniels. "This will be Mike's first year out and he could start at center."

Shawn Howell (5'10", 185) and Jackie Kedrick (6', 170) are from McDowell and Daniels believes both will be a help this year.

But every team has a question mark at the start of a new season and the Raiders will not be without theirs. Who will call the signals this year?

Justin Ray, heir apparent to the departing Steven Shelton, was counted on to fill that void this season but Ray will have to sit out the season because of injuries from an automobile accident.

"We have four right now that we are looking at," said Daniels. "Two freshmen and two sophomores."

The two sophomores includes Aaron Hall (6'2", 190) and newcomer Terrance Mullins (5'9", 150). Eric "Scotter" Moore and Scotty Johnson are the two frosh.

"Aaron runs the better of the four," said Daniels, "but Terrance can run the deep pattern plays. We will take a close look at both of them."

"I've also been impressed with both freshmen. But if I

had to go to someone today it probably will be Aaron."

Goals for the Raiders this year are twofold. First, be competitive against all opponents.

"In key positions we are going to be green as a gourd," said Daniels. "We're doing a lot of things that need improving."

Secondly, Coach Daniels wants his team to show improvement during the season.

"I want us to show a lot of improvement during the season. If we do that, regardless of the won and loss column, it will be a good season."

While Pikeville was a rebuilding team last year and advanced to the final four in the high school playoffs, Daniels views the Panthers as a clear choice for another district championship. Fleming-Neon will have a new coach but the Pirates rate a second-place finish.

"After Pikeville and Neon,

it looks to me like the other four teams will be about even and can knock one another off on any given night."

Daniels likes the numbers he has this year (56) and it "gives us the most depth we have had in a number of years."

"I want to get away from going both ways with the same kids," said the Raiders coach. "But I will go with the best players I have at the time. I would like to get away from

going both ways with the same players."

Several will join Coach Daniels as assistants this year as excitement is in the air about the upcoming football season. Keith Smallwood, Robert "Catfish" Jackson return to help develop this team this season.

Vic Rhea, former Trojan, Bob Hall, John Osborne, Robbie Harris, Dennis Harris, Charles Jeff Hall and Anthony Rhea will be on hand to help out.


The Floyd County connection has been made with Coach DeBella and look for other stars from the county to find their way to London.
