Three inmates at the Otter Creek Correctional Facility in Wheelwright were transferred to another prison earlier this week because Kentucky Governor Brereton Jones issued an emergency order Wednesday which put stricter rules on housing of vio-lent criminals.

Search for **Paintsville** teen ends: body found

A six-day search for a missing Paintsville Middle School student ended Thursday morning, when the teen-ager's body was found floating in Paint Creek.

icen-ager's body was found floating in Paint Creek.

The body of Darrell Michael Preston, a 13-year-old eighth-grader at Paintsville, was found about a half mile downstream from where the youth disappeared Saturday night following a canoeing mishap.

Preston and three other Johnson County teens had apparently stolen two canoes Saturday from Johnson Central High School, where the boats had been used in safety classes. Both canoes reportedly capsized in the swollen stream behind the Johnson County Library when the youths attempted to cross a small waterfall created by an underwater utility line crossing.

Police said all four teens escander.

Police said all four teens escaped the water but said Preston dove back into the creek in an attempt to recover one of the boats.

A joint recovery effort between Floyd, Johnson and Magoffin counties was initiated Saturday night and continued until Thursday morning, when Preston's body reportedly surfaced downstream.
Funeral arrangements were incomplete Thursday.

Governor Jones ordered on Wednesday that murderers, arson-ists, kidnappers and sex offenders be kept behind bars, instead of in mini-

mum security prisons such as the Otter Creek facility. Minimum security facilities house inmates in a dormitory-type setting and do not have cells with bars or fences around the prison grounds.

Jones' action came after a con-victed murderer walked away from the Lee Adjustment Center in Beattyville 11 days ago and killed a man in northeastern Tennessee.

Otter Creek warden Tim Maguigan said Thursday that three inmates who "met the criteria estab-lished" had been transferred from the Wheelwright prison Tuesday to a more secure facility.

"They were genuine minimum security inmates," Maguigan said. "We got a call late Monday afternoon and then the transfers were made the next morning."

Maguigan said he could not recall specific charges against the three

inmates,
"I don't have their files anymore because their files went with them,"
Maguigan said.

The governor's order is expected to have an impact on the number of The governor's order is expected to have an impact on the number of prisoners housed at the Wheelwright prison in the "short-run," Magua said, but it would be difficult to measure the effect it would have in the long run.

'I think in the short-run, it certainly may," the warden said. "In the long-run, I'm not so certain it will."

The governor's order will keep all inmates convicted of Class A felonies and felony sex crimes from being transferred to minimum security facilities, county jails and halfway houses

State officials had begun review-ing the state's prisoner classification system which determines which in-mates pose the lowest security risks. Across the state Tuesday, 114 in-

mates were transferred from mini-mum security prisons and county jails to medium security prisons.

Tammy DeRossett, 35, of Prestonsburg, was indicted for murder in connection with a car accident which killed a Magoffin County woman.

woman. The grand jury charged that DeRossett was driving under the influence of alcohol when her vehicle ran off the road on September 23 and stuck a culvert on Route 23 near the Holiday Inn in Prestonsburg. Paula Minix, 36, who was a passenger in the vehicle and was pronounced dead at the scene.

"Not only are they getting money for school, but (for some of them) they are earning money for the first time on their own by attending the monthly meetings."

The presentation lasted for about 45 minutes followed by a question and answer period. Interested students will be allowed the opportunity to tour the National Guard Armory and in some cases accompany the unit on field exercises.



PCC professor gives address at Gettysburg

Dr. Thomas D. Matifasic, professor of history at Prestonsburg Community College, presented a paper at the Lincoln and Gettysburg Symposium in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, on November 20.

sium in Gettysburg, Pennsylvana, on November 20.

The two-day symposium commemorated the 130th anniversary of Lincoln's Gettysburg Activity War Round Table Associates.

Matijasic's pre-sentation explained the influence of Lincoln on the political thought of Thomas Massaryk, the first president of Czechoslovakia, Masaryk was so impressed by Lincoln that he made a trip to Gettysburg in 1918 to visit the site of the famous address, the professor said.

Largely because of Masaryk's efforts, the Czechs created one of the first functioning democracies in East-Central Europe.

Other speakers at the Gettysburg symposium were Harold Halzer of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, John Simon of Southern Illinois University, Milliam Harriso florth-Carolina State University, Michael Vorenberg of Harvard University, and Frank J. Mayfield reached the championship game by winning over Fort Knox last Friday night when sophomore Mike Bright became aone man wrecking crew by scoring four touchdowns in his team's 28-10 win.

Prestonsburg, as the whole world knows by now, knocked off defending champion Danville last Friday night 16-15 in double overtime. Prestonsburg is on a 14-game winning streak. The Cardinals are 11-3 having won their last nine games.

Coach Leahy's scouting report.. Coach Paul Leahy is in his first year at Mayfield after spending the last 22 years as an assistant to Jack Morris. Coach Leahy has certainly paid his dues and is very deserving of the head coaching job

The Cardinals come into the playoff picture minus 17 seniors that faced Danville last year. But Coach Leahy believes that this year's group will be just as up for this one as last season's cron.

"We're excited about playing Prestonsburg," he said. "They are an excellent football team and we do have some similarities. Both teams play good defense and it should make for an interesting afternoon of football."

Coach Leahy said that his ballclub will have to finds ways to avoid the play of middle linebacker Larry Morris.

"He's a solid defensive football player," said Leahy.




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
