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PO worker indicted

PIKEVILLE — A County postal worker was indicted on theft charges and will now face those charges in U.S. District Court in Pikeville.

According to the federal indictment, postal employee Amanda Reynolds is charged with three counts of theft of mail matter by an officer or employee.

Reynolds is scheduled to appear next in court tomorrow on the charges.

Those charges, spanning from Nov. 1 through Dec. 3, allege that Reynolds on three separate occasions took mail addressed to unnamed recipients, embezzling them while on duty as a postal worker.

The first count says only that the Floyd County worker took mail addressed to "S.B." The indictment claims Reynolds took this individual's mail between Nov. 3 through Nov. 18.

In the second count alleges Reynolds did the same again to a victim referred to only as "J.F." between Nov. 19 and Nov. 22, while the third count alleges that during the full period of time stated in the original charge of the indictment — Nov. 1 through Dec. 3 — Reynolds embezzled 3 mail intended for "J.O."

The indictment against Reynolds was handed down by a federal grand on July 22. A motion for summons was issued for Reynolds that same day.

Tech could put end to snow days

EASTERN — The Floyd County Board of Education may soon have an option for providing instruction to students when inclement weather or other circumstances keeps the doors to schools closed.

Supt. Henry Webb addressed the board and those in attendance at a meeting of the Floyd County Board of Education at Allen

Central High School on Monday, talking briefly about a suggestion from the Kentucky Department of Education to form a committee that will research ways to utilize computers and technology to continue instruction despite the fact that students are not in the classroom.

"We know that it will include using technology so teachers can provide assignments and instruction to students when they are at

home and count that as an attendance day," Webb said. "The commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Education is open to looking at alternative kinds of ways to meet the needs of kids. The committee will be having conversations with the KDE about the feasibility of making this happen."

According to Webb, the committee to discuss the proposed idea will be formed this week and should meet soon to learn more

about what the option will entail.

While Webb is excited about the idea, he also said there are plenty of questions that need to be addressed, including how to utilize the option for those students who don't have computers at home.

"It's a wonderful idea and a terrific option," Webb said. "It's just making it happen that is the next step. There are a lot of questions that we have to get answered before we go down that road."

Court clears way for state funds

PRESTONSBURG — The Floyd County Fiscal Court approved incoming funds through House Bill 1 Friday morning, authorizing them into a priority list covering 2010, 2011 and 2012.

"This list of projects that fall under that bill will be prioritized in the coming weeks," said Floyd County Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall.

For 2010, the court gave authorization to Marshall to prepare proper documentation for \$65,000 in funding to the Disabled American Veterans Post 128 for equipment and operating expenses, according to court records provided during Friday's meeting.

For the list of projects relating to 2011, the county voted for the same authorization on some 20 projects when funding becomes available through the Department of Local Government.

Among those projects were \$100,000

Small effort to help turns into major relief

PIKEVILLE — A flash flood that hit Pike County Judge-Executive Wayne T. Rutherford, a five-term judge, said was something "unlike anything" he'd seen during his

time in office, dropped nearly 10 inches of rain across Pike County Saturday.

The areas of Raccoon Creek and Harless Creek were hardest hit, according to statements released by county officials in the days following the flooding. Raccoon, it has been reported

by emergency officials in Pike County, was close to being completely destroyed.

"It's awful," Rutherford said. "I've never seen anything like it in all my years of public service. It's a disaster if I've

Program to target at-risk families

Floyd County families will be among many from several counties throughout Kentucky that will benefit from efforts initiated by Sunrise Children's Services in the coming weeks.

Beginning this month, the organization will be offering help through the Kentucky's Family Preservation Program, which has the goal of helping families avoid abuse and neglect, and to offer help to those in trouble before trouble becomes crisis.

"The goal of the program, which actually encompasses a number of various short-term intervention strategies, is to help prevent the removal of a child from their home or to help successfully

PIKEVILLE — Relief efforts for flood victims in Pike County continue on a number of levels, including community, local, state and national, with President Obama recently issu-

ing a disaster declaration.

Considering this outpouring of help, it should be no surprise, then, that the American Red Cross is directly in the middle of that effort.

According to Winn Stephens, public affairs officer for the Red Cross, across Pike County alone

there were some 250 homes either destroyed or considered having experienced major damage.

"What they call 'major' is if there was 36 inches of water in the house," Stephens said.

The total damages are, at this time, unable to be determined as the losses were so widespread.

And that loss, unlike the flooding that took place in May, claimed the lives of two county residents.

Reports from Kentucky State Police Post 9 in Pikeville say that Craig Morris, of Carrie, stopped on a bridge along U.S. 119 in the Zebulon community and got from his car to look over the northbound shoulder into the Raccoon area.

Police say Morris was attempting to check on a family member's residence when he fell from the bridge. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

The second person who officials have confirmed as having died during the flooding was Chloe Creek resident Donna Sue

Walters. On Sunday there were still several people reported as missing but by Monday, Pike officials released statements saying that all those who had been reported missing were accounted for.

The Christian Appalachian Project started training volunteers to help in victim recovery and cleanup Monday morning at the First Presbyterian Church in Pikeville, said Pike County Emergency Management Director Doug Tackett.

Tackett said also that volunteers were needed to help field calls at his office and that bottled water was badly needed at Kimper, Johns Creek and Millard Fire Departments to be distributed to those in need.

"We have established several water distribution

points throughout the county," Tackett said. "All of them either have water or have water on the way."

Over 7,000 people were left without power after the flood but that number was growing smaller by Monday, officials said.

Gov. Steve Beshear toured the county Sunday with Rutherford to access damage following his declaration of a state of emergency for the county.

A legislative perspective

For thousands of children attending school, the biggest challenge of the day may not be tied to the classroom, but to their health.

A little more than 18 months ago, the General Assembly's Program Review and Investigations Committee began taking a closer look at this issue, to see what more the state might do to help those students facing a chronic disease or a potentially life-threatening allergy.

Though exact numbers are hard to pin down, the committee's survey of the state's school districts estimates that they have about 32,000 children with asthma, 2,500 with epilepsy and 1,700 with Type 1 diabetes — the three most common chronic conditions in our schools — plus 4,600 children with severe allergies to such things as peanuts.

The report, prepared by the committee, concluded that Kentucky needs more statewide consistency when it comes to these students' healthcare. It recommended more oversight of school health services by the Department of Education and greater coordination between local health departments and the state's Department for Public

Health.

The results of the committee's survey suggest that more day-to-day care is needed as well. It found that about 17 percent of our schools don't have ready access to a licensed healthcare provider at all, while nearly half have one who is there part-time or on-call. Only a little more than a third have one onsite throughout the day.

If the districts hired additional nurses to provide what they think is adequate coverage, it would take over 370 more working full-time in the schools, according to the committee. That would increase the number currently working by more than half, and take us below the 750-students-per-nurse ratio recommended by the National Association of School Nurses.

When it comes to severe allergies, the best medicine is often prevention. The vast majority of school districts said they would make sure cafeteria staff is aware if any student had a food-based allergy. About two-thirds of the districts would provide a nut-free classroom if necessary, and a fourth would eliminate nuts from the school altogether.

This year, the state is taking further steps to improve the health needs of our youngest citizens. During the legislative session that ended in April, for example, the General Assembly adopted a prominent new law to extend better insurance cover-

age to children diagnosed with autism.

Those whose families are enrolled in large-group health insurance plans will now be eligible for up to \$50,000 annually between their first and seventh birthdays, and \$12,000 annually from then until they turn 21.

In the United States, one child in 110 is diagnosed with autism, and a 2006 study said that this applied to nearly 2,400 children in Kentucky. Research proves that proper treatment — the earlier the better — can result in near-miraculous results. Without that care, other research shows that the societal cost for each child could top \$3 million over his or her lifetime.

This cause is very dear to me and to our region. Recently, I was proud to host my annual fundraiser at Stonecrest to help families with their costs, and the Highlands Center for Autism is a renowned leader in providing world-class care. It is a true jewel for Kentucky.

In another healthcare-related matter, five- and six-year-old children entering public school this fall for the first time will now have to have a dental exam before next January, under a requirement that became law in 2008. This builds on other required health screenings for vision and immunizations.

The General Assembly made this possible to better tackle the

House week in review

Keeping DUI offenders off the road with breathalyzers linked to their vehicle's ignition system is not a new idea.

It's certainly not new in Kentucky, where judges have the discretion to order ignition interlock devices for DUI offenders. What judges cannot do, despite legislative attempts, is mandate use of the devices as part of every DUI sentencing in the state. And some-including the Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy, which represents about two-thirds of the state's DUI defendants-want to keep it that way.

Public Advocate Ed Monahan told the state legislative Interim Joint Commission on Judiciary in mid July that his office has three main concerns about legislation that would make the device mandatory: the cost of the device (estimated at \$70 per month per vehicle), the effectiveness of the device, and taking away judicial discretion on when the device is necessary. Most states that have made the device mandatory for DUI offenders include provisions in their law that make the device affordable for indigent clients, said Public Advocacy employee Damon Preston, but, he added, there is still the question of the

device's effectiveness.

Preston said there is plenty of information as to when the system does not work, and said "When they don't work, it's a real consequence." Failure or ineffectiveness of the device could, for example, prevent someone from getting to work or making an emergency trip to the hospital, he said, whether that individual is the DUI offender or a family member.

A representative of the Canadian-based Traffic Injury Research Foundation who spoke to the committee before the Department of Public Advocacy described the devices as very effective. Robyn Robertson said the devices generally reduce recidivism-or being re-arrested for DUI-at a rate of between 35 percent to 90 percent and are considered the third most cost-effective way to prevent recidivism in some cost-benefit analyses.

Then there are situations like a case in Letcher County that Preston shared with lawmakers. In that case, Preston said, a sober man with an ignition interlock device on his vehicle was unable to start his engine because his device confused the scent of bologna sandwich on his breath with the smell of alcohol.

Sen. Ray Jones, a Pikeville-based attorney who has represented many families whose loved ones were involved in drug or DUI-related crashes, said he believes the state should require probationary licenses for

those who have been convicted of DUI and are on probation or who have had a prior license suspension as a result of DUI. Stricter penalties for those who do not follow an order to use an ignition interlock device could also be imposed, he said.

Jones said he plans on drafting a piece of legislation between now and December of this year that would address the issue.

A 2010 state law that Jones was instrumental in passing will discourage drugged or drunk driving by creating a "per se" DUI offense allowing drivers to be charged with DUI if illegal drugs or certain prescription drugs not prescribed to the driver are found during a blood test.

The law will also make it easier to prosecute a DUI offender who injures or kills someone in a car crash while driving while intoxicated.

Committee Co-Chair Sen. Tom Jensen of London asked Robertson if states which require use of ignition interlock devices are using the devices in lieu of suspending a person's license or in addition to license suspension. Robertson said suspension is limited when devices are used, in most cases, and suspension is short. She added that some states mandate the devices early "instead of letting (offenders) learn that they don't need a license to drive."

I am spending part of this week in Louisville, where I will

ongoing problems we have seen in dental care. In 2001, state health officials found that a little more than 40 percent of two- to four-year-olds had untreated dental decay, which was nearly double the national average. Another survey several years ago discovered that most of our counties don't have a pediatric dentist, and 15 only had one dentist for the county's total population.

All of these health concerns, not to mention the problems caused by seasonal and now swine flu outbreaks, underscore the importance of doing even more to improve the health of our children in school. Our task as a state is to make sure all of our students can focus on academics while knowing that care, should they ever need it, is always close by.

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"With foundations included in that, you're talking about homes that saw four feet of water."
 To put this number in perspective, neighboring counties also feeling the hit during the flash flooding, including Carter, Lewis and Rowan counties, collectively had some 50 homes that

fell into those two categories.
 In addition to the homes either destroyed or damaged, there were 90 other homes with minor damage. 85 homes considered affected and 32 homes still inaccessible as of Sunday morning. Again, Stephens said the "vast majority" of these

were in Pike County as well.
 The Red Cross currently has about 100 caseworkers on the ground in Pike County at this time, each of those traveling through the areas hardest hit, such as Harless and Raccoon Creek, but, at times and not surprisingly, finding no one home.
 "It would be helpful if they had to evacuate, if they would go back and see if a caseworker had been there," said Stephens. "The workers will have left a note if the people were not at the home. If they would see if that note has been left and then contact us, it would go a long way in helping us continue to help these people as much as possible."
 Extending help is the idea, said one caseworker. "Now that all the damage assessments have been completed and the situation has stabilized, we're about to reach out to individual clients to determine their immediate disaster-related

needs," said caseworker Alice Ferrell.
 In addition, Stephens said if residents could return to their evacuated homes and see if a note was left, it would then let them know to contact the Red Cross for help.
 The caseworkers will be traveling the area until at least Aug. 3, Stephens said, adding that it could go longer than that if needed.
 The Red Cross is still operating a shelter at Pike Central High School where 26 residents spent the night Saturday.
 Flood victims have also been encouraged to contact the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) if they have not already.

community services," he said.

The assistance will vary based on the needs of the individual families and can last anywhere from 4-to-27 weeks, Shindlebower added.

The program is envisioned as a "proactive step" to help families stay together and help them learn how to deal with situations in a "constructive, nonabusive manner." There is also added incentive the organization says that a state evaluation of the program suggests it can be a significant savings to Kentucky taxpayers.

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


Allen Central preparing to host preseason volleyball event





After a standout career at Madison Central, Warford jumped right into the lineup as a freshman in 2006. But, injuries and academic problems sidelined him the next two years.

Warford took a redshirt season in 2008 after he was ruled academically ineligible.

He also missed two games in 2007 because of a fractured collarbone and missed two more games last season because of a quad muscle strain.

Warford had two interceptions and 16 pass breakups during his career at UK. He played in three bowl games and recovered a fumble in the 2006 Music City Bowl.

Warford was a three-year starter at Madison Central as a running back and defensive back. He helped the Indians win three-straight district titles and was a part of two region runner-up teams.

Flood Aid radiothon tops \$200,000 in donations

PIKEVILLE — The Pike Ministerial Association, Pikeville Medical Center and East Kentucky Broadcasting joined forces on Sunday for a five-hour radiothon to provide relief to victims of last week's flooding in Pike County. As of Sunday evening, the total of financial donations and pledges was \$153,715.83, and the seven truck-loads of donated items was valued at more than \$50,000 — making the grand total well in excess of \$200,000.

The event began at 1 p.m. and was broadcast on the nine radio stations of East Kentucky Broadcasting. The radiothon was also streamed live on the internet from EKB station websites.

Donations ranged from a \$5 bill donated by a 3-year-old to a \$5,000 pledge from local attorney Gary C. Johnson. Donations and pledges came in from as far away as California and Hawaii.

Pikeville Medical Center employees donated more than \$30,000 by way of payroll deductions, cash and unused vacation time.

At around 5 p.m. Sunday, PMC President and CEO Walter E. May announced that Pikeville Medical Center would match all donations made by its employees, pushing the financial total well over the \$150,000 mark by the time the event concluded at 6 p.m.

The Pike Ministerial Association will distribute the funds and the material goods directly to victims of the flooding. 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
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
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State Department of Education reorganizes

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) is embarking on a new model of organization that is designed to make the agency more streamlined and efficient and to help provide services more effectively.

This reorganization proposal delineates a model that focuses on next-generation learners; next-generation schools and districts;

support and services for all the agency's constituents; information and data services; and more. KDE began operating under this new structure on Monday, July 19, and an executive order from the Governor's Office formalizing the new organization will be forthcoming.

"This proposed reorganization addresses two major issues," said Kentucky Education Commissioner Terry Holliday. "First, this

model will incur annual cost savings of approximately \$500,000 in salaries with the elimination of higher-level positions and increase the efficiency of the agency. Second, this model enables the agency to directly address priorities related to Senate Bill 1 and other legislative mandates, Kentucky's Race to the Top application and the Kentucky Board of Education's strategic plan."

The highlights of this model include:

- a structure that provides more direct reporting to the commissioner of education from KDE offices
- a logical distribution of programs, projects and teams based upon KDE's core, guiding and support processes
- grouping of efforts that address common activities and issues

The proposed organiza-

tional hierarchy is as follows:

- The current structure of eight offices is streamlined to six offices, with a primary focus on the Kentucky Board of Education's strategic priorities.
- The number of operational divisions in KDE also is reduced by a third due to consolidation and redirection of strategic priorities.
- Some office, division and branch names have been changed to reflect the changes in priorities and work.

KDE's mission is the same: to prepare all Kentucky students for next-generation learning, work and citizenship by engaging schools, districts, families and communities through excellent leadership, service and support.

The proposed new organizational model will enable the agency to target the areas of greatest importance and provide the services schools and districts need to ensure student success, while complying with additional budget reductions required by the biennial budget shortfall.

AG warns against price-gouging in wake of flooding

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Jack Conway last week put Kentucky businesses on notice that price-gouging will not be tolerated during times of emergency.

Gov. Steve Beshear declared a state of emergency for the state on July 21, after severe thunderstorms and deadly flash flooding in a number of Kentucky counties on July 17 and 20. Gov. Beshear also signed an executive order to implement Kentucky's price-gouging laws statewide.

"Gov. Beshear and I both want to ensure that Kentuckians who are suffering as a result of these deadly storms are not victimized a second time by unscrupulous businesses," General Conway said. "I will investigate and prosecute those who seek excessive profits during times of emergency."

Gov. Beshear's emergency declaration triggers several consumer protection measures that will remain in place for 30 days. As a result, the Attorney General is empowered to investigate and prosecute, where appropriate, those who sell gasoline, generators, building supplies, chain saws, hotel rooms and other necessary goods and services at an exorbitant price during a time of disaster.

Attorney General Conway launched a price-gouging investigation following Hurricane Ike and the subsequent wind storm that swept across Kentucky in September 2008. Investigators followed up on more than 2,000 emails and calls from across the Commonwealth on possible price-gouging complaints related to the storm.

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EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE

The queen of oils

A few years ago, my husband and I were lucky enough to take a vacation in Crete, a truly magical place. We stayed in the ancient city of Rethymnon, which apparently was built on the site of an even older city called Rithymna, which flourished during the Mycenaean era between 1600 B.C. and 1100 B.C. Many of the buildings in Rethymnon, including the hotel where we stayed, date to the 1500s.

Mixed in with the unforgettable sights and scents of Rethymnon (especially at an eye-popping spice store located near a gorgeous Venetian archway) was the incredible experience of the foods there. Rethymnon is where I really came to love and appreciate the "queen of oils": olive oil, so light and lovely and flavorful, I was almost tempted to drink it from a glass!

Of course, if you're up on your health news, you know that virgin olive oil is a great choice for preparing meals or even dipping breads. But an international team that included a scientist from the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) has given us even more reasons to love the queen of oils: the impact on our genes.

The researchers already knew, from the findings of other studies, that consuming high-phenolic-content virgin olive oil reduces certain pro-inflammation, pro-oxidant, pro-blood-clotting biomarkers in our bodies, compared with consuming low-phenolic-content olive oil. But they wanted to find out if olive oil's beneficial effects could be the result of gene activity.

The researchers fed 20 volunteers — all of whom had metabolic syndrome — with two virgin-olive-oil-based breakfasts, one at a time. In case you're wondering what "metabolic syndrome" is, you probably know someone who has it. It's a combination of abdominal obesity, high triglycerides, high blood pressure and poor blood sugar control, all of which increase the risk of heart disease and diabetes.

One of the experimental breakfasts in the study contained virgin olive oil with high levels of phenolic compounds (398 parts per million), and the other breakfast contained olive oil that had lower levels of the phenolic compounds (only 70 parts per million). All the volunteers ate the same low-fat, carb-rich "background" diet during all phases of the study.

After the volunteers ate, the researchers tracked the expression of more than 15,000 human genes in the volunteers' blood cells. The results? Seventy-nine genes were "turned down" and 19 genes were "turned up" by the high-phenolic-content virgin olive oil. Many of these genes affected by the virgin olive oil are linked to obesity, high blood-fat levels, type 2 diabetes and heart disease.

Most important of all: Several of the genes that were "turned down" by the virgin olive oil are known promoters of the internal inflammation that often accompanies metabolic syndrome. This could help us understand why there's a reduced risk of heart disease among people living in Mediterranean countries where virgin olive oil is the main source of dietary fats.

Another important element to include in your diet: vitamin D. As I've mentioned previously, vitamin D is easy to find in the foods we eat: it's in cheese, butter, cream and milk, and it's also in fish, oysters, many fortified breakfast cereals, and margarine.

New information from research funded by ARS supports the evidence that there's a link between vitamin D and the functioning of the brain, called "cognitive function." Cognitive function is measured by the level at which the brain is able to manage and use information to carry out the activities of daily life. Metabolic pathways for

According to Floyd County Treasurer David Allen and County Judge Executive Paul Hunt Thompson, the county will receive grants this year that will match or exceed the county's budget. Just over \$12 million will be received by the fiscal court for the 2000-2001 fiscal year. \$8,126,000 will be from state grants, \$2,025,000 by the LGED, \$90,000 from Big Sandy ADD, \$196,857 from KARP, \$75,000 from the Department of Agriculture, \$170,709 from the Kentucky Housing Corporation, \$42,252 from an ADF Grant, \$16,110.58, from a BSADD-ADF grant, and a \$1.5 million in a federal PRIDE grant.

Twenty Years Ago

How Floyd County plans to handle the out-of-county, out-of-state dumping of hazardous or household garbage was one question addressed during the Friday meeting of the Floyd County Fiscal Court. The answer on the surface appears simple: regulate it. But, according to County Attorney Jim Hammond, this is not such an easy task.

The US House of Representatives last week approved a comprehensive education and labor funding bill that includes increases for black lung claimants and the Job Corps training program, according to Congressman Chris Perkins. "The fund is the only means by which thousands of former coal miners can receive compensation for the problems afflicting them," Perkins said.

In response to recent discussions with Kentucky Secretary of Transportation Mike Bryant, Prestonsburg City Council at a special meeting, Tuesday, made a formal request that the Bert T. Combs Bridge be removed from the extended weight coal haul road system. This relieved Prestonsburg from the liability for the bridge, said City Administrator Fred James. Once the resolution is received and processed by the Department of Transportation, the bridge will be permanently closed to trucks weighing more than 80,000 pounds. Trucks over that weight will be rerouted to the Mountain Parkway (KY 114) to Salyersville and then over US 460 to Paintsville, where they may once again travel US 23 North. Unloaded trucks would be allowed to continue passage on the bridge.

In a month or two, all property in Floyd County will begin to get a long-desired second look. Floyd is one of 25 counties in Kentucky, most of them in eastern Kentucky, that will experience a complete property reassessment over the next two years, according to State Property Tax Commissioner James Coffman. The reassessment, Coffman says, is being done by the Frankfort office. "Doesn't mean every parcel will go up in valuation. Some may go down, others

will stay the same." The commissioner said the reassessments in the 25 counties are being made possible through additional funding approved by the General Assembly in its recent session with the extra \$6 million in state monies, revenue officers can go into each county for a systematic reevaluation of property.
