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Fourth result investigation

PIKEVILLE — Authorities in Pike County are investigating the possibility of a serial arsonist, following a string of suspicious fires in one small area.

The most recent blaze occurred New Year's Eve, shortly after midnight. At that time, Pikeville 911 was notified of a trailer fire on Fife Creek Road. Pikeville Fire Department responded to the call, finding the trailer fully engulfed upon arrival.

The fire was the fourth trailer fire to occur in the immediate area since April. All of the trailers were not occupied when they burned.

Pikeville Fire Department and the Pikeville Police Department are asking anyone who might have observed suspicious activity prior to or during any of the fires to contact the Pikeville 911 Public Safety Center by calling (606) 437-5111.

Martin sues county for unpaid fees

PRESTONSBURG — The city of Martin filed a lawsuit last week against the Floyd County Fiscal court for allegedly failing to pay nearly \$60,000 in fees.

According to filings in Floyd Circuit Court, on March 18, Martin entered into an agreement with the county to provide disposal of wastewater produced from the county's landfill located at Garth Hollow at a rate of \$38 per 1,000 gallons of wastewater/

leachate processed. Court documents state that the county has "failed and refused to make payment as required."

The City of Martin's suit states that they terminated the service effective May 15, though the county continued to use the

service "for sometime thereafter."

Martin is asking for the remainder of the outstanding balance of \$57,089.55, with late charges of 5 percent per month on all unpaid balances. Additionally the suit asks for 12 percent

interest annually on any judgement until it is paid in full.

Martin's city attorney, Clyde Johnson, could not be reached for comment. Calls seeking comment from county attorney Keith Bartley were not immediately returned.

Couple sues prison owner for damages

PRESTONSBURG — The company that owns Otter Creek Correctional Center was sued this week in Floyd Circuit court for damages caused by an escaped inmate.

According to the lawsuit, filed by attorney Ned Pillersdorf, on behalf of Linda and Dennis Holbrook, Corrections Corporation of America, the company which owns Otter Creek, was negligent in its handling of an escape by Larry Crump in September.

Pillersdorf says his clients are deeply concerned with the case as other prisoners seem to be escaping from Otter Creek. "It's a public safety issue," said Pillersdorf, adding that Crumb was an escape threat, having escaped twice before from other facilities.

In the complaint, the plaintiffs state that when Crump escaped, outside authorities were not notified for over an hour after prison guards noted him missing. The Holbrooks state that Crump came to their home, which is located less than a mile from the prison after breaking out, rifled through their medicine cabinet and "drank a soft drink" before stealing the couple's 2005 Cadillac CTS automobile.

During the apprehension of Crump, court documents allege that he crashed the vehicle. "Larry Crump then attempted to elude the police while driving the Plaintiffs' vehicle and caused it to crash and be demolished."

The Holbrooks are seeking punitive damages for the "grossly negligent and reckless conduct" of CCA, and they additionally seek damages for trespass and violations that the alleged negligent acts caused.

The Holbrooks have brought the litigation to try to force CCA to change its behavior, Pillersdorf said, adding that hitting a company in the wallet is sometimes the best way to get its attention.

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Legendary political fixture Gatewood Galbraith dies

LEXINGTON — Notable politician and marijuana legalization advocate Gatewood Galbraith passed away early Wednesday morning at the age of 64.

Dea Riley, Galbraith's running mate during his most recent campaign for governor, made the announcement on Facebook Wednesday morning.

"Dear Friends I have just been notified that Gatewood passed away last night. I am heading to Lexington to be with his family. Please say a prayer for his family and friends and all those who loved him."

According to a report by Fayette County Coroner, Galbraith died at home in

his sleep after developing pneumonia that was complicated by chronic emphysema. He is survived by his three daughters.

Galbraith, born Jan. 23, 1947, in Carlisle, has been perennially in the spotlight as a regular candidate for state office in Kentucky. Galbraith had just finished his fifth race for the governor as an independent in November, having previously run as a Democrat in 1991, 1995 and 2007, and as Reform Party candidate in 1999.

His autobiography, "The Last Free Man in America: Meets the Synthetic Subversion," was released in 2004.

Galbraith said his 2011 campaign was, "Totally independent. I'm an

American and I'm a free man. And that's my dogma."

Galbraith addressed his numerous runs for governor at Fancy Farm in 2011, saying, "People say I'm a perennial candidate. Well, Kentucky has perennial problems, and if the people who had beaten me had fixed them, I wouldn't have had to run again."

Many of those who knew him fondly recalled their times with Galbraith over the years.

"I have known Gatewood personally and professionally for 30 years and was part of two statewide races in which he also took part. He was a true character, and I enjoyed his wit and

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Ky. immigrants speak out against Alabama, Arizona laws

FRANKFORT — A group of Kentuckians who are professional legal immigrants from India went before the House Local Government Committee Wednesday to ward off any attempt to file immigration legislation in Kentucky that resembles controversial laws passed recently in Alabama and Arizona.

The Alabama and Arizona legislation require police to try to determine someone's immigration status during the course of lawful "stop, detention, or arrest," bans undocumented immigrants from receiving public benefits from state or local governments, and forces companies doing business with those states to use the E-Verify system to verify someone's eligibility to work legally in the U.S., among other provisions.

And while no blanket legislation covering those issues has been filed in Kentucky, the panel led by Louisville immigration and international business attorney and India immigrant Nirupama Kulkarni wants to keep it that way.

Kulkarni and three other Indian immigrants testified before the committee, including Kulkarni's mother, Surekha Kulkarni, gave varying examples of how any bill similar to the Alabama and Arizona legislation would discourage successful immigrants from bringing their business or expertise to Kentucky.

Rachel Alexander, who testified after Kulkarni, has one child attending Harvard and another working as an engineer in Silicon Valley. Both attended public high school in Louisville. But, Alexander said, legislation like the Alabama or Arizona laws would keep both of her children from returning home to work if it were passed in Kentucky.

Nirupama Kulkarni said

such a law would also hurt Kentucky's agriculture economy, just as it has hurt the agricultural economies of Alabama and Arizona.

"On their farms, there are crops that are just rotting," she said. "They cannot find workers to simply take over person-by-person the jobs that have been left behind by the agricultural workforce in those states."

Additionally, Nirupama Kulkarni said, a similar law could cost Kentucky millions of dollars to enforce.

Rep. Stan Lee, R-Lexington, who has filed immigration bill in past sessions and has filed a few for consideration this session — although no bills he has filed this session take over the laws in Arizona and Alabama — said no one wants to drive immigrants out of Kentucky. But, he said, he has seen some evidence that the Alabama and Arizona laws have worked.

"I'm hopeful that this session we can discuss this (immigration) issue... Let's look at some numbers," said Lee.

Nirupama Kulkarni said no one in her group testified before the committee implying that Kentucky wants to round up its immigrants and drive them out of state. Rather, she explained, the group wants to stress that the possible effects of immigration laws akin to those in Alabama and Arizona have "a practical face."

"The economic costs to the states where this has happened — businesses have left, businesses are not coming there, investors have left, people are not coming back that might have come back; that cost is not something that you can dismiss ... And you can see that this is exactly what has happened in states where these laws have been enacted," said Nirupama Kulkarni.

House Republican files bill seeking to provide tax credit to volunteer firefighters

FRANKFORT — Rep. Michael Meredith, R-Brownsville, (19th District) has filed a bill for the 2012 Regular Session that if passed would create a \$1,000 refundable tax credit for any certified volunteer firefighter in the Commonwealth.

"As the son and brother of volunteer firefighters in my hometown of Brownsville, I know the great risk and the little reward those that volunteer to protect their neighbors receive," said

Rep. Meredith.

"It is my hope that this proposal in some way is a thank you for those men and women who serve their communities and counties as volunteer firefighters, and reimburse them for a little of the cost they incur."

Under Rep. Meredith's bill, any volunteer firefighter who is certified by the Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education would be eligible for a refundable tax credit

of \$1,000 beginning on January 1, 2013. Eligibility for the tax credit would be based on certification and that the individual must be a certified volunteer firefighter for the entire taxable year.

House Representative Sara Beth Gregory of Monticello and Jill York of Grayson are co-sponsors of Rep. Meredith's proposal.

The bill is filed as HB 193 for the 2012 Regular Session.

Three hits and one miss made for a better-than-average chance of finding top-notch entertainment this week.

"Justified Season 2" — Timothy Olyphant returns for a second round as the iconic U.S. Marshall Raylan Givens. This time out, he is dealing with lots of personal baggage in the aftermath of season one's shootout that brought down the Crowder crime clan. Unfortunately, a new family moves right into the void and is led by the mighty matriarch Mags Bennett. She proves to be more than up to the challenge of running things in Harlan. This is an excellent blend of character, culture and crime. Hats off to Elmore Leonard for guiding the series that is based on several of his crime novels and short stories. The standout season is stolen by Margo

Martindale, who won an Emmy for her portrayal of Bennett. She is riveting and downright threatening, the perfect foil for Leonard's imperfect hero.

"Don't Be Afraid of the Dark" — Monsters threaten a family that accidentally awakens them when they open a furnace, in this remake of the ABC Movie of the Week that gave nightmares to countless Baby Boomers. Here, the concept gets a big budget, A-list actors and state-of-the-art effects. Sadly, they just don't achieve the same level of creepiness as the original film was able to muster, using cheap camera gags and midgets in clown white.

"The Guard" — Fish-out-of-water flicks should aim to be half as good as this crime drama. Here, you get a tightly wound FBI agent sent off to Ireland to team up with a rule-wary cop (or "guard") to use the vernacular who operates on his gut. It all works

thanks to an extremely sharp script that allows for the comedy to spring forth from the characters in a natural manner. It also helps when you cast veterans like Don Cheadle and Brendan Gleeson ("Gangs of New York") as your leads.

"Contagion" — The director of "Traffic" returns with another all-star cast that interprets different reactions to a deadly epidemic. Taut direction keeps this action moving so quickly that you'll forget you have seen a lot of this before. Matt Damon and Gwyneth Paltrow lead the cast, but the film is stolen by Jude Law, as an ethically-challenged reporter with ill-tinting dentures. It is a selfless performance that will have you forgetting he was ever considered a pretty boy.

Next week brings Brad Pitt in "Money Ball" and Steve Buscemi in the HBO series, "Boardwalk Empire."

A couple meets and falls in love before realizing that California is being attacked by enraged eagles, in this no-budget horror flick.

The story begins with a missed opportunity. It amounts to seven minutes of driving footage as we follow lead character, Rod, all the way to work from his home. This is an excruciating scene that goes on forever. When the Rod stopped for gas, I got myself ready for some action, but he merely filled up and got back in the car and drove some more. This bit could have served a purpose if they shot it from a bird's point of view.

Over dinner, we find out that Rod was a software designer before becoming a salesman and we witness the startling revelation that Natalie wants to make enough cash to adopt 10 house cats. They bond over all of this soul searching and retire to a cheap hotel for an adult encounter. They wake up in a different movie. Rod and Natalie awaken to find that eagles are attacking people, and they barricade themselves in their room. Come morning, the eagles depart, so they find another couple and team up. They decide to

grab some coat hangers in case they are attacked. They are attacked and the hangers actually ward off the birds of prey (who knew?).

wisdom tremendously. He will definitely be missed." Speaker of the House Greg Stumbo said in a statement.

Those on the opposite end of the political spectrum who were often the target of Galbraith's political attacks also offered their condolences.

"He was a truly memorable character who loved our state and its people," said Sen. Mitch McConnell.

In his 2011 campaign, Galbraith particularly targeted younger voters, proposing a freeze on college tuition and a \$5,000 grant to high school graduates for college or technical school. He raised \$100,000 of his \$500,000 budget and was endorsed by the United Mine Workers, the first time the union has backed an independent.

Galbraith has been one of, if not the most vocal advocate of the legalization of marijuana in Kentucky. In a speech given during a Hempfest rally, Galbraith said, "And the question of hemp, the question of cannabis, is the most vivid illustration of how this government has overstepped its bounds in policing the private behaviors of citizens."

In a candidate debate on Kentucky Educational Television on May 14, 2007, Galbraith noted that 15 states have legalized cannabis. All did so after Galbraith first began

his advocacy on that issue as a candidate for statewide office.

Floyd County Judge Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall said Galbraith, "ran to have a voice."

"The one thing that always impressed me about Gatewood was his courage, and his convictions," said Marshall.

Galbraith was honored on the floor of the House of Representatives with a legislative citation. Speaker Stumbo said on the House floor Wednesday, "One of the most admirable things that could ever be said about someone was that they had the courage to stand up for what they believe, and whether you agreed with Gatewood, or you didn't agree with him, I think we all would say we admire the courage that he had in advocating his convictions."



In the 48 hours since his death became public, many have remembered the man as a political maverick, one who said exactly what he believed and believed exactly what he said. All who speak of his memory commend him for never compromising his beliefs, even if it meant he would never reach the governorship he so fervently sought.

Galbraith is also remembered for the controversial positions he took during his campaigns, particularly his belief that marijuana should be legalized.

All of that is true, but it only scratches the surface of who Galbraith was.

Friends remember a man who was a friend to everyone he met. He displayed a courtesy and respect for others that sadly seems out of place in the current time.

His intellect was staggering; his compassion, even more so. He could commiserate with you on your darkest day, and his superb sense

of humor would almost always have you laughing in the end.

And he cared deeply for all Kentuckians. Shortly before he died, he left a New Year's message on his Facebook page, which now echoes as his last public statement:

"Another great day in all our lives. Call up someone you love, or would like to, and let them know it! Make a resolution to lift someone's spirit each day and follow through with it. It doesn't take much — a smile, a kind word (words are magic and can create reality) and a desire to be loved yourself, because that is what will happen to you when you give your smile. Try it and see. God bless you all! Gatewood."

Gatewood Galbraith lived life on his own terms. He had a unique vision for how to address many of the world's ills, and he never wavered from espousing it, even if doing so would have been convenient or would have benefited him personally.

Surely, there can be no better icon for the spirit of Kentucky than that.

He seems to have confused the "bully pulpit" with a "bully suggestion box." He's been channeling his inner Teddy Roosevelt lately, but he has a ways to go. Let's hope he gets there before we wake up with Newt Gingrich as president.

Talk about surprises, Gingrich's rise from the dead during this election was nothing short of astonishing.

I thought he was washed up 20 years ago when his colleagues in Congress turned on him. Even when he turned

up this year running for the GOP nomination, I didn't take him seriously. Nor did he, apparently. The first thing he did as a candidate was run off to the Greek Isles with his wife. Then he surprised everybody by coming back with the same wife.


Eventual Mountain School Girl Classic champion Magoffin County claimed its fourth straight win.

Twenty-five Kentucky residents drawn for late season quota cow elk hunt

FRANKFORT — Twenty-five hunters from Wallins, David, Hyden, Pineville, Pikeville, Barbourville and other areas in southeastern Kentucky have a second chance to hunt elk in the state.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources recently drew 25 names for a late season quota

hunt for cow elk. The late season begins Jan. 28 and ends Feb. 10.

"Kentucky Fish and Wildlife listens when people contacted us about ongoing problems with nuisance elk," said Tina Brunjes, deer and elk program coordinator for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "This hunt helps reduce elk numbers in targeted areas while giving residents of the

southeastern Kentucky's elk restoration zone an opportunity to put meat on the table for their families."

The late season hunt is open for cow elk only.

Those drawn for the hunt will receive notification in the mail. Hunters may also see if they were drawn by going online to the department's website at fw.ky.gov.

Each hunter is randomly

drawn from the pool of those who applied for the regular quota elk hunts. Hunters must reside in the 16-county elk restoration zone to be eligible for this hunt.

Only two Elk Management Units (EMUs) are open for this hunt: Knott County EMU and Stoney Fork EMU. Stoney Fork EMU includes sections of Clay, Leslie, Harlan, Bell and Knox

counties. Hunters may take cow elk in either unit. Only private lands are open for this hunt. All public lands within these EMUs are closed to elk hunting. Hunters who check online can follow links to maps of these areas.

Those participating in the late season hunt must pay a \$30 fee for the elk permit. Hunters must also possess an annual Kentucky hunting license.

Mike Cassity joins Kentucky football staff

LÉXINGTON — Mike Cassity, former University of Kentucky player and coach, has returned to his Bluegrass roots as the defensive backs coach for the Wildcat football team, head coach Joker Phillips has announced.

Cassity has 37 seasons of coaching experience, including 22 as the defensive coordinator at the NCAA Division I level. He already has knowledge of the current Kentucky defensive scheme, having coached with Wildcat defensive coordinator Rick Minter on two occasions. He also is a good fit with the UK staff, having been associated with five of the Wildcat coaches during his career. He has coached more than 30 players who have gone to the National Football League.

"We are happy to have Mike back with the Big Blue Nation," Phillips said. "Mike's skills in coaching and recruiting made him a very attractive candidate. He has the ability to teach fundamentals well and have his players play at a high level. He is an outstanding recruiter, especially in Ohio and Florida."

Cassity began his coaching career at UK as a student coach in 1975, while completing his degree. He was an assistant at Filtham High School in Paducah, from 1976-78, before returning to UK. He was a part-time assistant coach in 1979, working with the defensive backs, and was a full-time assistant as the DBs coach in 1980-81.

From there, the trail wound through Morehead State (1982), Western Kentucky (1983-88), Northeast Louisiana (1989), East Carolina (1990-91), Georgia Tech (1992-93), Cincinnati (1994), Wisconsin (1995-96), Baylor (1997-98), Oklahoma State (1999-2000), Illinois (2001-03), Louisville (2004-07) and Marshall (2009-11).

Cassity was the defensive coordinator during his term at Louisville, inheriting a unit that was 93rd in the nation in total defense and 72nd in scoring defense in 2003. The team improved to 15th in total defense and 24th in scoring defense in Cassity's first season in 2004. His teams finished in the top 40 nationally in total defense from 2004-06.

Cassity helped the Cardinals win the 2004 Conference USA championship and the Big East title and advance to three bowl games,

highlighted by a victory in the 2007 Orange Bowl. In the Orange Bowl campaign, Louisville finished second in the nation in quarterback sacks and 17th nationally in scoring defense.

Cassity was named the 2011 Big Ten Recruiter of the Year by St.com/Rivals.com and was chosen one of the nation's top-25 recruiters by Rivals.com in 2005. Cassity also was defensive coordinator at Illinois, the 2001 Big Ten champion and participant in the 2002 Sugar Bowl, and at Baylor, Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, East Carolina, Northeast Louisiana and Western Kentucky.

During the 1991 season at East Carolina, the Pirates posted an 11-1 record, capped by a victory in the Peach Bowl. The ECU coaches were selected as the National Coaching Staff of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

Cassity returns to UK from Marshall University, where he coached the defensive backs in the 2009-11 seasons. He helped Marshall win a pair of bowl games following the '09 and '11 seasons.

All totaled, 10 of Cassity's collegiate teams have advanced to postseason play. His teams have a 6-2 record in bowl games and he also participated in the Division I-AA playoffs in 1987 and 1988 at WKU.

"Being a homegrown Kentucky coach, and having experience playing and coaching at UK, it is an honor to come home and be a part of Coach Phillips' staff," Cassity said.

Cassity has been directly associated with five coaches on the UK staff, including Phillips, who was a freshman on the '81 Wildcat squad when Cassity was an assistant coach.

"Even as a freshman, it was apparent that he is a tremendous competitor and how very personable he is," Cassity said of Phillips. "Those traits have continued throughout his career."

A native of Ft. Campbell, Cassity is a graduate of Ft. Campbell High School. He was a two-sport athlete at Kentucky in football and wrestling. In football, he played from 1971-74, starting his final two seasons at safety. He received the Kiwanis Club 110 Percenter Award for his effort and dedication. On the mat, he placed third at the 1974 Southeastern Conference meet at 190 pounds. He earned his degree in physical education in 1976.



Each team registered 31 rebounds.




