## Stumbo, Combs unveil bill to make UPike public

FRANKFORT — Despite tenuous economic footing for Kentucky higher education, the quest to make the University of Pikeville a state institution was set in motion Tuesday, when Rep. Leslie Combs and House Speaker Greg Stumbo filed a bill in its favor.

According to Kentucky Legislative Research Commission, House Bill 260 is designed to fill the need for a "comprehensive university" in southeastern Kentucky, which would effectively make the University of Pikeville the eighth state-sponsored university of higher education in Kentucky. The bill has not been without controversy, largely from fellow institutions Morehead State University

and Eastern Kentucky University.

Stumbo says Kentucky would invest \$12 million a year and receive \$170 million worth of facilities. The move is being heralded as a job-creating economic boon for Eastern Kentucky.

"The missing link is getting people educated. Jobs is the key thing for future generations, but for jobs, you have to have an educated workforce," said Pike County Judge-Executive Wayne T. Rutherford in a report by WYMT.

However, the bill comes just as Gov. Steve Beshear presented a budget proposal that calls for deeper cuts into services that have already been drastically reduced and includes no new revenues to address funding shortfalls. According to See BILL 1A3


Topics to be discussed include creating projected income statements, cash flow statements and balance sheets.

## Big projects included in highway plan

FRANKFORT — Gov. Steve Beshear's recommended six-year State Highway Plan includes funding for a couple of big-ticket projects for the Big Sandy region.

Beshear's recommendation includes \$80 million to widen the Mountain Parkway to four lanes, from Campton to Salyersville. Of that amount, \$8.5 million is set aside for design, \$6.8 million is reserved for right-of-way acquisition and utility relocation, and \$64.5 million is slotted for construction.

The Mountain Parkway projects, if approved, would still not fully complete the road, and what construction is planned is pushed to 2017 and beyond, making them more susceptible to being changed or scrapped, later on. Generally, only projects in the first two years of the plan are considered certain for completion.

The plan also calls for spending \$269.3 million to complete the U.S. 460 corridor in Pike County, which involves relocating the highway between U.S. 23 and

the Virginia state line.

"Our 2012-2018 Recommended Highway Plan represents an aggressive investment in Kentucky's primary road system," Gov. Beshear said Thursday, during the annual conference of Kentuckians for Better Transportation. "This plan is calculated to improve mobility through system expansion and necessary maintenance. The result will be less traffic congestion, increased safety, greater ease of interstate commerce and growth in Kentucky's economy, which means jobs for Kentuckians."

The plan also includes 11 projects in Floyd County. They include:

- \$3.1 million for hazard mitigation along U.S. 23, between Route 80 and Town Branch, in Prestonsburg. The plan calls for \$400,000 for design in 2013, \$400,000 for right-of-way acquisition in 2014, \$500,000 for utility relocation in 2014 and \$1.8 million for construction in 2015.
- \$79.7 million for continued construction of the Mingo-to-Harold Connector. The plan has two projects for the road. One of

the projects calls for \$48.4 million for construction of 3.8 miles of the road, from Route 122 at Minnie to Little Mud Creek Road, in 2013. The other project concerns another 2.8 miles, from Little Mud Creek Road to the mouth of Tackett Creek, and includes \$2.75 million for right-of-way acquisition in 2012, \$550,000 for utility relocation in 2012, and \$28 million for construction in 2014.

• \$15.3 million for improvements along Route 979, between Branham's Creek and Stumbo Elementary. The plan calls for \$1 million for design in 2014, \$1.5 million for right-of-way acquisition in 2016, \$1.3 million for utility relocation in 2016, and \$11.5 million for construction in 2018.

• \$4.77 million for curve revision, a left-turn lane and improved sight distance at the junction of Route 122 and Route 680. The plan calls for \$530,000 for right-of-way acquisition in 2012, \$290,000 for utility relocation in 2012, and \$3.95 million for construction in 2014.

The Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, state funding for higher education in 2011 was already 20 percent lower than rates in 2008. The governor's budget includes cuts of over 6 percent to universities and the community college system.

The impact of these cuts severely felt over the last few years if the federal government had not provided emergency education aid as part of recovery-related legislation. Kentucky received \$137 million in federal dollars for higher education.

Still Stumbo is optimistic that coal severance funds will make UPike viable. "While overall revenues are down, coal severance revenues are strong and growing. Since that is where the funding would come from to bring the University of Pikeville into our public postsecondary system, I believe the state would be missing an ideal opportunity if we don't act this year. Nothing else could give our region the boost this school would if it becomes public."

## Guest View State university in coalfields key to Kentucky's future

The Appalachian region of Kentucky has produced a multitude of cultural and economic icons ... to defining who we are as a State. Unfortunately, many of the socio-economic conditions prevalent throughout the mountain region have hindered Kentucky's overall development.

Much of this is due, in part, to the absence of an affordable, state-supported university, in and amongst the largest concentration of poverty of our state. Designating the University of Pikeville as a state-supported, more affordable institution of higher education, deep in the heart of the coalfields, would fill a need which the region has long desired.

While Morehead State, Eastern and the University of Kentucky are of great service to the region, these institutions are located on the periphery of the region. Independently, they are unable to solve the lack of educational attainment in the coalfields, where the largest concentration of impoverished counties is situated.

Despite Morehead, EKV and UK's best efforts, the percentage of bachelor's degrees of citizens in the proposed service area of UPIKE is 9 percent compared to that of 17.1 percent for the rest of Kentucky.

A new approach must be taken. Universities encourage the cultivation of life-long social relationships that develop on a college campus among students and faculty; resulting in cultural, social and economic spin-offs, which improve the quality of life, often primarily in areas of close proximity to such an institution. The economic conditions of Richmond, Morehead and Lexington are evident of their capitalization of the human capital provided by its universities.

Unfortunately, many young folks from the coalfields venture off to these institutions and never return. Funding a university in the mountains, such as Pikeville, provides a mechanism for the region to provide an overall college experience to Appalachian

Kentuckians close to home; with the hope they will stay and prosper in the region upon graduation. Additionally, the potential increase in the number of graduates living in the coalfields gives better incentive for employers to locate here, resulting in jobs for these students upon graduation.

Moreover, proponents of a state-supported UPIKE have a funding mechanism in place which capitalizes on a tax of natural resources which has defined the region over the past century, coal.


The original idea behind the coal-severance tax was to aid communities in building long-term prosperity after the extraction of a limited natural resource. Although the coal-severance tax has been of great benefit to the region since its inception, it is often squandered on political pet projects which have produced less than desirable results. Funding an institution of higher education, such as UPIKE, located in and amongst Kentucky's highest concentrations of poverty, is an ideal way to utilize the money within the original legislative intent of the coal-severance law.

Coal has fueled development of Kentucky, especially parts outside the mountain region. Unfortunately, East Kentucky, which produces the majority of our coal, has not derived the potential benefits. Using this existing tax, from the extraction of our own natural resource, enables Kentucky to fund an institution, in the heart of the coalfields, which will improve the standard of living for all Kentuckians. It is important the General Assembly take this into consideration.

As the old saying goes, "a rising tide, raises all ships." A state-supported, more affordable University of Pikeville will better enable this institution to provide young, mountain folks a college experience close to home and raise the standard of living in the mountains, while raising the overall educational attainment of Kentuckians as a whole.

## Beyond the Beltway What I'm giving up in 2012

I generally make New Year's resolutions in hopes of becoming a better person — more disciplined, healthier, or, at the very least, less pathetic. Some of these resolutions last until nightfall. Some don't. None ever sees February.

This year, I'm taking a different approach. I'm going to concentrate on giving up things. Not things like smoking — been there, done that. I mean giving up on ideas I have pursued through the years into, one blind alley after another.

Ideas like climate change, for example. You and I both know that the earth is heating up, right? Everybody knows that, with the possible exception of oil executives, the owners of coal mines, and Republican politicians.

Yet no number of hurricanes, droughts, floods, wildfires, melted glaciers, or columns by granola liberals like me has inspired a somnolent Congress to confront the problem.

I'm also giving up on gun control. Over the years, I've written I don't know how many columns urging that some control be placed on the sale of weapons that go bang. Dozens probably, possibly even scores of them.

Every time some clown would go berserk and mow down a baker's dozen of his fellow citizens, I would deliver a rant about the idiosyncy of our failure to do something about the proliferation of guns in our society.

Did it do any good? Even less than my global warming columns. There are more guns out there now than ever and states have grown increasingly permissive about where and how people can pack heat.

In other words, the battle has been

lost. The absurd arguments of the National Rifle Association and the Merchants of Death lobby have carried the day.

Why? Money, of course. Too many politicians have learned that to deviate even the slightest degree from the NRA's absolutist positions is to invite a truckload of money into your opponent's campaign, ensuring your electoral defeat.

The argument I find most absurd, by the way, is the constitutional one. Yes, the Constitution guarantees the right to bear arms. But "arms" back then had as much resemblance to modern weapons as an 18th-century schooner has to a nuclear submarine.

Do you think our founding fathers would have looked at an assault rifle that can fire at a speed of 400 rounds a minute and said: "Oh yeah, that's a good thing to have around the house"? Or "Everybody should have one"?

Get real. The Constitution is a wonderful document, but it's outmoded in many ways. Consider the preposterousness of North Dakota having the same number of senators as California. But it's not going to change any time soon, at least not for the better.

Ladies and gentlemen, the Forces of Darkness are in the saddle, and they're wearing spurs.

## Letters To Editor Cervical cancer is preventable

January is Cervical Cancer Prevention Awareness Month. Cervical cancer is a very large public health concern. Since cervical cancer is highly preventable, it is the responsibility of Floyd County Health Department and other health providers to raise awareness about cervical cancer prevention and detection. Our goal is to ensure that all girls and their parents are educated about the safety and efficacy of the HPV vaccine and its role in cervical cancer prevention. Routine vaccination is recommended for 11- and 12-year-old girls and teens, who have

not been vaccinated. All vaccinations for youth under the age of 18 must have parent consent forms signed.

Parents may make an appointment with a nurse at the health department or attend informational sessions provided by health department nurses located in schools throughout the county. These informational sessions will provide information about the benefits of the HPV vaccine and explore myths surrounding their safety.

Floyd County Health Department nurses can administer the vaccine at Prestonsburg or Betsy Layne health

department locations by appointment or in schools, as scheduled by school health nurses.

Floyd County Health Department encourages parents to consider the vaccine for young girls as a way to prevent cervical cancer risk for the next generation.

## Taxation with misrepresentation

One thing I have learned after 20 years in government service is that real change happens only if citizens get involved. People can become involved by contacting their elected officials and letting them know of their concerns. If enough people voice their opinion elected officials will listen. If you take the time to vote someone into public office, you should take the time to let them know they are public servants. They are working for you.

The Tea Party and Occupy Wall Street movements have motivated me to write this letter because both demand change. The 2012 General Session begins in January. This is your opportunity to be involved in positive change by contacting your legislators during this time.

There is one issue in which I need your help for positive change. The Waste Tire Trust Fund was created after whole tires were banned from landfills. The Waste Tire Trust Fund created a fee that was designed to ultimately protect the environment. These funds should be used to

do just that. They should not be used for administrative costs or as a mechanism to prevent citizens from participating. Money has been diverted from the Waste Tire Trust Fund in years past.

If the "State Legislature" is not willing to make positive changes to the program, why must we continue to be "Taxed with Misrepresentation"?

This is not just a waste issue it is also

a health issue. The mismanagement of waste tires creates a breeding ground for the "Asian Tiger" mosquito. Tiger Mosquitoes are known to spread infectious diseases among humans, livestock and wildlife.

## Eagles drop home game to Murray State

**MOREHEAD** — The upset-minded Morehead State University men's basketball team led by nine points with 13 minutes to play on Wednesday night, but No. 10/12 Murray State University finished the game on a 29-14 run to escape with a 66-60 victory before a crowd of 6,036 at Johnson Arena.

The Racers, who are the Ohio Valley Conference's first nationally-ranked team since 1997-98, improve to 19-0 overall and 7-0 in conference action. The Eagles, who began the day with a 57-9 home record over the past five years, fell to 9-11 overall and 3-4 in the conference.

The contest featured the first nationally-ranked men's basketball team to ever play at Johnson Arena, which hosted its first game on Dec. 3, 1981. Morehead State had not previously hosted a top 25 foe since No. 9 Western Kentucky came to town on Feb. 20, 1971.

Murray State and Syracuse, both 19-0, continue to be the nation's only undefeated teams at the Division I level. The Racers also continue to build on their longest winning streak in school history.

"Give Murray State a lot of credit," Morehead State Coach Donnie Tyndal said. "They have experienced guards and several great players. They made some timely threes tonight when we missed defensive assignments in our matchup zone."

Morehead State jumped out to a 15-4 advantage less than nine minutes into the affair. The lead was pushed

necting on 15-of-23 free throws.



# Hunters find sandhills challenging during Kentucky's inaugural season

**FRANKFORT** - Larry Dreamis Hill failed in his quest to take a bird during Kentucky's inaugural sandhill crane hunting season but says it wasn't for lack of effort.

"These birds were extremely challenging and seemed to change their patterns a little every day. I really enjoyed the challenge and look forward to future seasons of pursuing this bird. I remember when the first sandhill cranes showed up in Cecilia (in Hardin County) years ago now I have the opportunity to hunt them. It's very exciting," said Hill, Cecilia's retired fire chief.

Kentucky's first modern hunting season for sandhill cranes came to a close Sunday, Jan. 15. The month-long season marked the first time in nearly 100 years that Kentucky sportsmen and sportswomen had the opportunity to hunt sandhill cranes in the Commonwealth. By closing day, hunters had harvested 50 birds. Kentucky had allowed

for a maximum harvest of 400 sandhill cranes.

"The harvest number was not surprising to us because Kentucky does not have a tradition of sandhill crane hunting," said Rocky Pritchett, Migratory Bird Program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "These are extremely wary birds and are a challenge to hunt. Sandhill cranes are hunted in a fashion similar to geese, using decoys in fields. Sandhill cranes are hunted for their meat. They are generally regarded as the finest table fare among migratory birds."

Kentucky was the first state to allow sandhill crane hunting on the Eastern Population of sandhill cranes. The Mid-Continent Population of sandhill cranes has been hunted for more than 50 years in the United States.

Last fall, a survey coordinated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service counted a minimum of 72,000 sandhill cranes in the Eastern Population. "This popula-

tion has experienced significant growth over the last decade and has reached a point where we can allow a limited harvest without impacting the population," said Pritchett. "As a biologist it is my responsibility to ensure harvest does not negatively impact the population and this season will not harm the Eastern Population of sandhill cranes."

This season, most of the cranes were harvested in Hardin and Barren counties. These are traditional wintering areas for sandhill cranes in Kentucky.

Hunters had to pass an online identification course before being issued a permit. Hunters will have to complete a post-season survey as well.

"The information obtained from these surveys helps us better understand how the season went," said Pritchett. "The information obtained from this hunt will help us manage future hunts of sandhill cranes in Kentucky and other states that might potentially hunt sandhill cranes."

# Davis, Kidd-Gilchrist named John Wooden Award finalists

**LEXINGTON** - University of Kentucky freshmen Anthony Davis and Michael Kidd-Gilchrist are among 25 players honored as the mid-season finalists for the John Wooden Award it was announced live on ESPN's show "The Experts" Tuesday afternoon.

Davis leads the nation with 4.6 blocks per game and is merely two rejections shy of becoming UK's best single-season blocker. The Chicago native averages 13.1 points and 10.2 rebounds per game for the second-ranked Wildcats. He's notched nine double-doubles this season which ranks ninth nationally.

Kidd-Gilchrist has started all 18 games for UK and is the squad's second-leading scorer at 13.4 points per game. He has logged three double-double efforts and 13 double-digit scoring games. He was named the SEC Player of the Week for tallying career-highs in points (24) and rebounds (19) in a win over Louisville.

The 36th annual Wooden Award ceremony marks the 25th anniversary of the selection of the Naval Academy's David Robinson as the inaugural Wooden Award winner.

The Player of the Year is selected each year by a large panel of voters. Voters are sports writers or sportscast-

ers who collectively represent each of the 50 states, with the number of voters from each state dependent on the state's population.

The Award's criteria does include that the student-athlete must have a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or higher throughout the candidate's college career. The top candidates are announced prior to the NCAA Tournament and are listed on a ballot that is sent to over a 1,000 voters for the men's award and over 250 voters for the women's award.

The winner will be announced the weekend of April 6-8.

to double figures on four more occasions before halftime.

The Eagles shot 52 percent (11-of-21) from the field and 77 percent (10-of-13) from the free-throw line over the first 30 minutes en route to a 37-31 upper hand at the break.

Outside of 2-0, Murray State didn't lead until the 7:40 mark of the second half. The Racers used a 10-0 spurt midway through the final period to get back in the mix. The lead changed hands several times over the next few minutes until the visitors pulled away for good in the final four minutes.

Sophomore Drew Kelly led Morehead State with 20 points, six rebounds and two blocks before fouling out with 3:03 to play. He drilled 6-of-6 from both the field and free-throw line.

Senior Lamont Austin added 11 points, four steals and three rebounds for the Eagles, while freshman Angelo Warner contributed 10 points, three rebounds and

three assists.

"Drew was fantastic - and he's only a sophomore," Tyndall added. "I don't think Murray State had anyone who could guard him tonight. They don't play zone, so we went to him in the post. He also had a couple of pick-and-pop threes. It was great to see him play with confidence in a big game."

sult of 27 Morehead State fouls. The Racers were whistled for 21 infractions, which led to the Eagles shooting 73 percent (16-of-22) from the foul line.

Morehead State played down the stretch without Kelly, Austin and junior Kahlil Owens, who all fouled out in the second half.

"I'm still proud of my team," Tyndall added. "I thought our kids played extremely hard for 40 minutes tonight. We put Murray State at the foul line 34 times, which really hurt. # Movies from the Black Lagoon

## 'Pursuit'

A savvy spy matches wits with a domestic terrorist in this "race against time" thriller from the late Michael Crichton.

The film opens with a dimly lit nighttime sequence that barely sees a military truck hijacked. Luckily, the rest of the film takes place during the day. One day, in fact, and it is a beautiful one to be staying in San Diego.

On this day, the FBI is set to take down a rich political extremist named Wright. Turns out he is wrong about some things and has been acting suspiciously of late. Agent Graves has been assigned to the case and he opts to wait till the end of the day to arrest the man in order to try and figure out what he's up to.

While tracking Wright, they observe him leaving a suitcase with a suspicious character. They detain the guy and find out he is an information thief. He is an excellent one, too, because he hacked the government's computer, back when they only had a dozen or so. He retrieved two bits of information for Wright. One was the shipping routes for something called "Binary 75776." The other thing he stole was a complete psychological profile on a specific government employee, Graves.

Graves winds up interviewing his own psychiatrist, who reports that he already shared his perceptions of Graves with a federal agent. They deduce that the agent was actually

Wright, and Graves realizes that his adversary may just have the upper hand.

They opt to arrest Wright earlier than expected, but now they can't find him. Eventually, they track him to a hotel where they observe him (from across the street using high-tech 1970s spy gear) putting the final touches on a bomb and then booby-trapping the room. They don't look too surprised when Wright finishes the job by facing them through the room's window and saluting.

They arrest the man and he reveals that the bomb was to mix the two stolen gases into a lethal cocktail that will kill millions. Apparently, that's what "binary" gases do. Separately, they are powerless, but they are now sealed in a hotel room that is laced with traps.

Wright drops these bombs and makes a break for it. He may be a genius and all that, but even he can't pilot an automobile properly after being filled with lead.

Now that Wright is dead, Graves must try to outwit a guy who has had his number from the beginning, and time is running out. His first idea is not a confidence builder. They cut the power to the whole building, but the bomb emits a short burst of gas that kills the guards stationed out in the hallway. Graves devises a plan to break into the room from a window, but he has no idea if the diabolical Wright told him everything he needs to know.

There is no hacking out when they learn that the president has dropped by

for a surprise visit to the convention. This is very ominous, as Wright anticipated it, but no one on Graves' team knew. This development ratchets up the tension of the finale, as you really have to give Wright the advantage and it doesn't appear that being dead is hindering his plan whatsoever.

This is fun stuff and as good as a "Movie of the Week" gets. TV movies struggled with the same budgetary problems as drive-in flicks, but they usually compensated with good writing, ambitious directors and top-notch actors. This film has all three.

The script is based on a novel by John Lange. That is a pseudonym for Michael Crichton ("Jurassic Park"), who also made his directorial debut here. Crichton passed on three years ago, but he sure left his mark as novelist, filmmaker and television producer ("ER" was his baby).

The film also benefits from good casting, with Ben Gazzara and E.C. Marshall cast as Graves and Wright. It isn't often that character actors get to carry a major film, but they frequently had the leads in TV films, and these guys bring their A-game. Martin Sheen also deserves mention for his turn as the first computer hacker type villain.

Fun and short (only one hour and 15 minutes, without commercial breaks).

Best line: "I'm beginning to understand James Wright's preoccupation with impotence." — 1972, unrated.

Four better-than-average releases made for a promising start of the new year for renters, downloaders and video pirates this week.

**"The Ides of March"** — A well-meaning Pennsylvania governor wants to take a run at the White House. In this political drama, George Clooney stars as the liberal candidate who appears to eschew religion while pushing an enlightened agenda. The character also shows a willingness to trade favors for political gain. You have to like a movie that doesn't pull punches, and this one is a regular Mike Tyson, as it reveals that one must be able to set aside their moral compass, if they want to do some good.

**"Abduction"** — Hopes were low for this thriller starring Taylor Lautner, of "Twilight" fame. Turns out, this is a crackjack effort about spies and how far a group will go to keep secrets. Lautner stars as a young man who begins having nightmares about his parents being strangers. They sit him down and reveal that they are, but they are killed before telling him more. His home gets blown

up and he is soon on the run and needing a friend. Sigourney Weaver steps in as a family friend, but will she guide him to safety or the clutches of the enemy? Don't expect too much here and you will have a ball.

**"Age of Heroes"** — If you enjoy a good, old-fashioned action yarn, then this World War II flick is just for you. Think "When Eagles Dare" and you will have an idea of what to expect here. Sean Bean ("Game of Thrones") stars as the leader of a squad sent behind enemy lines to retrieve a machine that Germans are using to break jamming frequencies. Good stuff with lots of gunplay, but more emphasis on adventure than gore.

**"Last Hard Men"** and **"Sky Riders"** — James Coburn fans will thrill to this double feature of action flicks he made in the late 1970s. He plays an outlaw squaring off against Charlton Heston in the first flick. The second one finds him leading a team of gliders to rescue a kidnapped girl from terrorists. Good stuff that shows how much harder stuntmen had to work before CGI.

Next week brings a big budget remake of an old "Twilight Zone" episode with "Real Steel."

## Bill that will require doctors to have KASPER accounts, state drug policy

A bill is likely to be filed in the General Assembly that will require drug prescribers to have an account with the state's drug monitoring system known as KASPER, news that was met with applause at the Different Faces of Substance Abuse conference yesterday.

"We've got to get KASPER out of the dark," said Van Ingram, executive director of the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy. "Let's take the guesswork out of this, and let's use the data proactively."

The bill would also propose using the Kentucky All-Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting system to "mine data toward patients," Ingram said, meaning analysts would look for people who have gone to an unusually high number of physicians or other providers within a short period of time, presumably to doctor shop for drugs.

Ingram said the KASPER Advisory Council, chaired by Gov. Steve Beshear to identify prescribing thresholds in various medical disciplines, is discussing targeting providers who write 6,000 to 8,000 prescriptions a year — or the top 5 percent of prescribers. Kentucky's Office

of the Inspector General, which is in charge of maintaining KASPER, would find the information and refer it to the various licensing boards, which would then take appropriate action. The move is quite a paradigm shift, since it would be using data proactively, rather than reactively, Ingram said.

"Since some providers aren't in the same location for a year at a time, Ingram said the counsel will likely advise KASPER to be analyzed on a per-day basis, since many "problem prescribers are here for a day."

Dave Hopkins, KASPER program manager in the Office of Inspector General, said 6.6 percent of Kentuckians have used prescription drugs for non-medical purposes, second highest in the nation behind Oklahoma. He said 15,000 Americans die annually of overdoses involving prescription drugs.

KASPER monitors all Schedule II, III, IV and V controlled substances that are dispensed in Kentucky, data that is required by law to be reported by pharmacists and other dispensers. That translates to more than 11 million controlled substance prescriptions each year, Hopkins said.

To use KASPER, doctors and providers can request reports

about specific patients and see their prescription history over the internet. In 2004, 122,469 such reports were requested by providers. In 2011, that number jumped to more than 800,000. "When we started this in 1999, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services estimated there would be a maximum of 200,000 reports a year," Hopkins said.

Still, while 95 percent of the reports were requested by prescribers, just 32 percent of them have KASPER accounts. And though pharmacies are required to input the information, just 26 percent of them have accounts.

Ingram would not say yesterday who would file a bill that would change those numbers, just said he expects one to be filed "today or tomorrow," and that he feels hopeful about changes to come. "I'm really excited for the first time in a long time that we're going to get some things done," he said.
