State inspects QuestCare ambulances

PRESTONSBURG — The QuestCare ambulance fleet was brought out for inspection Tuesday, following two months of speculation about the company's future.

Investigators with the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services

were out in force Tuesday morning, at Big Sandy Community and Technical College campus in Prestonsburg, to inspect the fleet of QuestCare ambulances.

Mike Poynter, executive director of KBEMS, said the inspection was called by his office to determine the current state of QuestCare's fleet of ambulances, follow-

ing recent decisions by the board to park over half of the vehicles after reports that many of them lacked air conditioning.

"We're here to help them, but they've got to meet the minimum standards according to law," said Poynter. Poynter called the time leading up to the August 2 deadline a "grace period"

that was a courtesy extended by KBEMS to help QuestCare fix the problems with their ambulances.

Poynter said that no resolution would come Tuesday, but that the investigators would take their findings back to the board to review, and then a decision would be handed down.

Terry Dossett, vice presi-

dent of operations with QuestCare, says he expects his full fleet to be deemed ready to go back into service, though admits that he will have to replace some of the older ambulances.

"We're going to buy some new trucks that's just the facts of life."

According to Dossett, there is significant problem

with the Ford six-cylinder, diesel ambulances, and he said all of the ambulances cited for air conditioning defects were of that type.

Dossett described more than half the fleet being out of commission as "just a little out of the ordinary."

When asked about the complaints made about the


MIDDLE CREEK — A Floyd County schools employee was killed in a motorcycle crash over the weekend just outside of Prestonsburg.

According to Kentucky State Police, officers at Pikeville Post 9 were alerted to a single-vehicle accident involving a motorcycle Saturday on Route 114.

Authorities say the preliminary investigation indicates that 33-year-old Christopher Shepherd, of Prestonsburg, was traveling west on Route 114 when he lost control of his motorcycle.

Shepherd was an informant.

Farmers market brings fresh produce to downtown

PRESTONSBURG — Downtown Prestonsburg is this summer's source for locally-grown produce, as the Floyd County Farmers Market is held in the municipal parking lot every Saturday.

Vendors were set up this past Saturday with an array of vegetables, including squash, tomatoes, potatoes, cucumbers and onions. Also on sale were fresh eggs and a

variety of locally-produced meats from Appalachian Meats.

Todd Howard, manager of the market, said none of it would be possible without the city's support.

No charges after sick, malnourished dog found

GERMAN BRIDGE — A county employee is being held blameless after a horribly malnourished and neglected dog was found chained up on his property at German Bridge Monday morning.

Shauna Brown, manager of the Floyd County Animal Shelter, says the dog,

a Great Dane, was found chained up on the property of Duane Conley, who works as the caretaker of German Bridge campground.

Brown says the dog, which the staff has taken to calling, "Moo," was ravaged by infection, red mange and insect bites, and is severely malnourished.

Moo's malnourishment is so severe, that as a nearly 1-year-old Great Dane he

only weighs 48 pounds. Typical weight for 1-year-old male would be over 100 pounds.

Brown said Moo's recovery will be a slow process, but she hopes he will make a full recovery and a suitable and loving home will be found for him.

"Because of the breed of dog, there is a worry that his stomach could become

twisted, so we can't just give him a lot of food," said Brown. "We have to give him three spoons of food, then wait an hour and give him three more."
Brown says Great Danes are not a breed that enjoys a long lifespan, and the humane treatment of Moo has probably shortened his lifespan to five years.
According to Brown, Moo is currently receiving Ivermectin for the skin issues. He was transported to a veterinarian for treatment Monday afternoon, where he received treatment for the red mange.

According to Brown, Moo was taken to the county attorney's office so that they could see, firsthand, the condition in which he was in when recovered from Conley's property. Brown said she believes Conley should have been charged with at least second-degree cruelty to animals. First-degree cruelty to animals is a charge now reserved only for dog fighting cases.
According to Assistant County Attorney Tyler Green, however, Conley was not charged because he claimed the dog was a stray he found.

Animal Control officer Paul Marsillett says Conley advised him that Moo was not his, and that he was a stray that had been found a week earlier. "What we were told by Mr. Conley is that the dog came in there in that condition," said Marsillett. According to Marsillett, Moo was found chained up with a water dish, and an overturned food dish. Marsillett said he could not prove that the dog belongs to Conley. "It would be my word against his," Marsillett said that Conley initially did not want for Marsillett to take

Moo because he stated that his wife was "nursing him back to health." When asked about Moo's skin condition, Marsillett said that Conley produced some ointment, but that the ointment was actually for use on horses.

Two bodies found in Knott car fire

TOPMOST — A burned-out vehicle on an abandoned mine was the focal point of an investigation by Kentucky State Police over the weekend.
According to KSP officials, late Friday evening, Post 13 was contacted concerning a burned vehicle on an abandoned mine site near Mullins Branch Road at Topmost.
An early report from the scene indicate that suspected human remains had been found in the vehicle. KSP and Knott County sheriff's deputies converged on the scene and confirmed the

presence of suspected human remains found inside the remnants of the burnt vehicle.
No identity has been established at this time, but officials say there were two bodies found in the vehicle. They added that the bodies were burned beyond recognition.
The vehicle and remains were transported to the State Medical Examiner's Office for further examination. The case remains under investigation by Kentucky State Police.

air conditioning in the ambulances. Dossett said that KBEMS notified them of one complaint, but never actually provided any complaint in writing.
A three-member panel was convened July 5 to hear the case of QuestCare Ambulance Services and make recommendations after several violations were found, including a lack of air conditioning in more

than a dozen of the ambulances. All but six of the 21 ambulances listed on QuestCare's license have been, and remain, parked due to maintenance issues, though Dossett said on Tuesday that seven of those ambulances parked for maintenance issues were already parked when KBEMS notified them of the complaints about the air conditioning.
On Monday, an agent of Trans-Star Ambulance Service and former 95th Dis-

trict Rep. Brandon Spencer released a statement concerning QuestCare's recent troubles.
"There has been an overwhelming amount of public concern due to the possible shutdown of QuestCare Ambulance service. There has also been a large amount of negative media attention directed toward QuestCare in which Trans-Star Ambulance Service has not been mentioned. The management team of Trans-Star

Ambulance Service wants you to know we are still providing countywide services to your communities. In addition, we want to insure you that our ambulances are in optimal operating condition, as required by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services."
Dossett declined to comment on whether or not he believed rival ambulance companies were the driving force behind the KBEMS investigation.

officials in the jail, no booking photo was taken.
According to court records, Wade Conway, the complaining witness, alleges Layne pulled into the yard of the residence he is

According to Conway, Layne then got into his truck, put it in gear and struck him in the left leg.
Layne was charged June

6 with fourth-degree assault and third-degree terroristic threatening. On Monday, his charges were reviewed by the court, and his charge was amended to a superceding charge of second-degree assault due to the alleged use of a deadly weapon, in

this case, an automobile.
Layne was released from jail on a \$5,000 surety bond. Second-degree assault is a class C felony. If found guilty, Layne could be imprisoned for up to 10 years in prison.

Act. Under the act, states are required to establish the exchanges where people making up to 400 percent

of the federal poverty level can purchase health insurance at a discount through government subsidies. Under one example provided by the government, a family of four making \$35,000 a year could obtain health insurance for roughly \$100

a month.
Representatives of the state Department of Insurance and Cabinet for Health and Family Services will be at the meeting to explain various aspects of the exchange and the health reform law.

Similar meetings will be held around the state, including in Erlanger, on Wednesday; Louisville, on Thursday; Somerset, on August 1; Paducah, on August 16; and Owensboro, on August 17.

Our View Safety is first priority, but growth a close second

As the state continues to look for options to address safety issues along a dangerous stretch of U.S. 23, at Watergap, we hope planners will keep in mind all aspects of community life in their search for solutions.

Undoubtedly, finding a way to prevent the car crashes that frequently occur between Town Branch and the Route 30 interchange is the top priority. Nothing is more important than minimizing the potential for danger along that stretch of road that has already claimed too many lives and hurt too many people.

The second priority to saving lives is saving the ability to make a living. Floyd County must preserve its commercial areas, and it is obvious that stretch of highway is a key spot for locating future business and industry. There are precious few areas along the Floyd County section of U.S. 23 suitable for development, and the Watergap area is one of them. If at all possible, it must be preserved as such.

The final consideration is cost, and it remains secondary to the first two we listed. If the state narrows its options to two that will address the safety issues — one more affordable that will reduce the potential for development and another, more expensive option that will save just as many lives while preserving the potential for commercial development — the more expensive option should outweigh the cheaper solution.

If there is no option that will improve safety along the highway without forsaking development, then that is a bitter pill that must be swallowed. Nothing is more important than saving lives. If, however, planners are able to find a way to make the highway safer while preserving the area's development potential, cost should not preclude that option.

It would be a shame if the state were to eliminate a key area for future growth, just for the sake of short-term savings.

A legislative perspective

There wasn't a birthday cake or a lot of fanfare, but Kentucky hit a major milestone earlier this summer when it celebrated its 220th birthday.

Over the years, the commonwealth has been blessed to have quite a few of its citizens make a sizeable mark on the country and even the world. Daniel Boone, President Abraham Lincoln and Henry Clay are arguably the most famous, and others readily known include Colonel Sanders, the Clooney family and Muhammad Ali.

Many others have garnered fame and recognition as well. For example, we can lay claim to the father of abdominal surgery, Ephraim McDowell, who's memorialized with one of the five statues anchoring the Capitol Rotunda. He is remembered primarily for his work in removing a 22.5 pound ovarian tumor from a Green County woman on Christmas Day in 1809. With anesthesia unavailable, the patient sang hymns to block the pain, but the surgery was a success and she lived for 32 more years.

The others sharing space with him, Lincoln and Clay in the Rotunda include Jefferson Davis, the only president of the Confederacy, and Alben Barkley, who was

vice president under President Truman. Another famous government figure to call Kentucky home is former U.S. Senator John Sherman Cooper. He also served as our country's first ambassador to East Germany (he was ambassador to India as well), and he was on the Warren Commission, which investigated the assassination of President Kennedy.

One area where Kentucky especially excels is in the arts. Bill Monroe is the father of Bluegrass music, and our own Route 23 is known as the Country Music Highway because it connects such stars as Loretta Lynn, the Beatles and Ricky Skaggs. Thomas Edison only called Kentucky home for a brief time, but the first public showing of his light bulb was in Louisville, a city that also lays claim to the song "Happy Birthday," the first commercially sold chesburger and popularizing aluminum foil.

Duncan Hines may conjure up cake mixes, but he was first famous for helping travelers with his reviews of restaurants. He also wrote a well-regarded food column that appeared in newspapers nationwide.

Kentucky is home to the inventor of the modern traffic light — he added the yellow light, greatly increasing safety at intersections — and the country's first female mechanical engineer. The only woman to win

the Congressional Medal of Honor lived in Kentucky for a time, too.

There are two Nobel Prize winners from the state — both of which were earned for pioneering work in genetics — and several Pulitzer Prize winners, including the first African-American to win one for photography.

In addition to these historic figures, Kentucky's Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet lists several other notable events that are also worth mentioning. We were the first state to name a city after President Washington, for example, and Lexington was home to the first American production of a Beethoven symphony. Mammoth Cave is not only the world's longest cave, it's also the country's second-oldest paid tourist attraction, after Niagara Falls. It was in Kentucky where the world's first self-contained artificial heart was implanted, and we also had the nation's first successful hand transplant.

These are just a few of the interesting people and events that have helped to put Kentucky on the map over the last two-plus centuries, but there are of course many more people and stories that could be shared. That will have to wait for another column, though.

House week in review

Concussions. Cardiac trouble. Heat-related deaths. Overuse injuries. All of these can happen when kids play school sports, including middle school sports.

But an athlete who is between 11 and 14 years old is going through physical changes that most high school athletes have already endured: puberty; growth spurts in their tendons, ligaments, and neural motor development; key cognitive development, and so on. Physicians tell us that, overall, an 11 to 14 year old child's body grows at a faster rate than it has since the child was between the ages of 0 to 2.

Still, when it comes to what one physician calls "high level medical evidence" — to support any distinct difference in sports management and care of a middle school athlete versus one in high school, the "evidence" isn't there, says the physician, Dr. Trevor Wilkes, an orthopedic surgeon with Lexington Clinic. What there is, said Wilkes, are trends in middle school sports management that are being relied upon while physicians and other wait for high level evidence and distinct guidelines on middle school sports to develop.

A new state legislative Task Force on Middle School Interscholastic Athletics, established during the 2012 Regular Session to study interscholastic athletics at the middle school level and made up of state lawmakers and non-lawmakers, met last week to review the medical trends and other data. In coming months the task force will review existing policies and practices concerning middle school interscholastic athletics along with options for creating "best practice" guidelines for each middle school sport and for

supporting for non-profit organizations that strive to improve those sports. And it invited Wilkes, who provides care to high school and college athletes in the Bluegrass region, to testify on exactly what the medical trends are.

Topping the list is the pre-participation exam (PPE) which Wilkes said is used to screen athletes for cardiac, joint, or cognitive issues. While not everyone agrees on what all should be included in a PPE (should there be an EKG or a baseline neural cognitive test, for example), Wilkes said following routine physical protocol — carefully listening to a child's heart, for example — is invaluable. Sometimes, he said, diagnosis of a potentially fatal condition like an enlarged heart begins with listening to the heart.

Overuse injuries are so common in middle school sports that trends have developed on how to avoid them. Wilkes said current medical evidence says that middle school athletes should do no more than 16 to 20 hours of vigorous physical activity a week, and no more than five days in a row of the same sport per week.

Guidelines on how to avoid heat-related injury or illness are pretty well accepted across the sports spectrum now. Wilkes said following published heat guidelines, with which most school sports personnel and associations are familiar, makes it safe for middle school athletes to exercise in the heat. Since evidence shows that middle school athletes do not have less thermal regulatory ability than high school athletes, Wilkes said it is safe for middle school athletes to exercise in the heat as long as they stay hydrated and rest between events.

When it comes to concussions,

a lack of research on the effect of a concussion on patients under age 14 leaves physicians without "established" baseline data to get those children back to play, said Wilkes. But that doesn't mean physicians take concussions lightly in young athletes. One study, Wilkes said, indicates that two or more concussions statistically lower a student's grade point average. "That said," said Wilkes, "...there's a lot of concern for the role that the cognitive damage of a concussion plays on the rapid brain development of these kids."

Permitting and encouraging modified strength training programs in middle school athletes is another trend that Wilkes said is in play. While middle schools offering strength conditioning will need a different standard than high schools to accommodate younger students' hormone and strength levels, Wilkes said modified strength training poses no threat to a middle school athlete's growth. Kentucky High School Athletic Association Commissioner Julian Tackett, a member of the task force, said some have even advocated that strength training be added as a module to a sports safety course that coaches take.

When it comes down to it, Wilkes said communities have a big responsibility to impact middle school athletes' health. The task force is seizing that responsibility, and will report its findings and make recommendations to improve middle school interscholastic athletics late this year — just in time for the 2013 Regular Session of the Kentucky General Assembly that begins in January. I'll keep you informed of the panel's progress.

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Council offers support to veterans' hospital

PRESTONSBURG — The city council expressed its support Monday night for a veterans' hospital in the Fifth Congressional District.

The council approved a resolution expressing support for a hospital to be built somewhere in the Fifth District, after receiving copies of a petition from representatives of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Mayor Jerry Fannin then went a step further, telling

the VFV the city would allow the group to place copies of its petition at city hall, where people could sign it.

Members of the council asked if any preference for a location had been established, but were told that decision would be left up to Congress.

Toward the end of discussion about the project, council member Tim Cooley had one message he wished to pass along to members of the VFV: "Thank you for giving me a free country to live in."

The council also voted to ap-

prove a zoning change for a restaurant being built near the S curve. Developers of the Brick Oven Pizza being built in the old Hyden residence at the corner of South Lake Drive and South Central Avenue sought the change, after discovering one of the three tracts they had purchased for the restaurant was zoned residential, rather than mixed residential and commercial, like the other two tracts.

Fire Chief Bobby Carpenter told council members the Planning and Zoning Board had approved

the zone change, with some conditions to address concerns from residents living near the planned restaurant, involving lighting, parking, limited nighttime hours for an outdoor patio and limits on outdoor music.

City Attorney Jimmy Webb, however, told the council it could not approve a conditional zone change. He said the council could either accept or reject the zone change without conditions, it could create a new zone which included the restrictions, or it could apply the same conditions to all

properties in the city that are zoned for mixed residential and commercial use. He said singling out one property with additional restrictions would not be fair.

In the end, the council voted to approve the zone change, without any restrictions. Afterward, the council also approved a variance for a construction of a fence that would provide some separation between the restaurant and adjacent residences.

All members of the council were present, except for Roy Roberts.


The city will be staging its second children's bicycle safety workshop Friday morning, and organizers have upped the bonuses available to those who take part.

Stumbo receives leadership award from AARP



Bears picked to finish fifth in MSC East

LOUISVILLE — Georgetown College and Bethel University are the preseason favorites to win their football divisions in the Mid-South Conference this season, according to the preseason coaches' poll announced last week.

Georgetown is projected as the favorite in the East Division with 25 voting points, including five of the six first-place votes from the East Division coaches. Bethel is the team to beat in the West Division after picking up 32 voting points, including four of the seven first-place votes.

Coaches were not allowed to vote for their own team in the poll.

Georgetown enters the 2012 season following a MSC East Division championship in the 2011 and a trip to the NAIA Football Championship Series national semifinals a year ago.

The Tigers finished last season with a 12-1 record, including a 5-0 record in

the MSC East Division.

Georgetown owns four East Division crowns and 17 overall regular season titles in its history.

University of the Cumberlands is projected to finish second in the East after picking up 17 voting points, including the final first-place vote. Cumberlands returns to the East Division after a two-year stint in the MSC West Division.

Prior to the move, Cumberlands had claimed at least a share of three straight East Division titles (2007-09). University of Virginia's College at Wise is projected to finish third with 14 voting points followed by Union College - who also completed in the West last season - in fourth with 13 voting points.

University of Pikeville (11 voting points) and Kentucky Christian University (10) completes the East Division preseason poll.

In the West, Bethel is coming off the program's third MSC divisional title in

2011. The Wildcats also captured the West Division in 2005 and 2007.

Bethel finished 2011 with an 8-3 overall record, including a 5-1 divisional record, and a trip to the NAIA Football Championship Series.

Cumberland University is projected to finish second in the West after receiving 31 voting points, including two first-place votes.

Campbellsville University (23) and Lindsey Wilson College (20) is third and fourth respectively in their first year in the West after finishing tied for second last season in the East.

Belhaven University is fifth in the preseason poll with 18 voting points and Faulkner University is sixth after receiving 17 voting points, including the final first-place vote. Bluefield College - playing in its first season since 1941 - is seventh with six voting points.

The 2012 season begins in late August.

Adkins among three set to enter MSU Athletic Hall of Fame

MOREHEAD — Three individuals who made a lasting impact during and after their Morehead State careers will be inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame this fall. The 2012 class includes golf standout Wes Martin, All-Ohio Valley Conference football tackle Ernie DeCourley and baseball record holder Charlie Adkins.

This year's honorees will be inducted during a banquet on Oct. 26 and recognized during the Homecoming football game on Oct. 27.

"The Athletic Hall of Fame is the highest individual accolade our department can award," said Director of Athletics Brian Hutchinson. "It's a pleasure to welcome these accomplished individuals to the prestigious list. In addition to being

elite individuals of their time, these three inductees were also members of OVC championship programs."

Martin was a member of MSU's first OVC golf championship team in 1973. He fired a 212 at the league tournament that year and finished as the runner-up only to teammate and fellow Athletic Hall of Famer Eddie Mudd. He was named All-OVC in 1972 and 1973. Playing for Head Coach Ed Bignon, Martin and his teammates never lost a dual meet, and the Eagles won the 1972 Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference crown.

Originally from Winchester, Martin went on to a professional career. He played in a number of Web.com Tour events where he posted two top-25 finishes. Martin's brother Wayne is a former Head Men's Basketball Coach at MSU and

a member of the Hall of Fame. Wes' son Brad is currently a sophomore on the MSU golf team.

DeCourley ranked among the OVC's top linemen during his two-year MSU career. A transfer from Northwest Mississippi Junior College, DeCourley was the team's tallest lineman at 6-foot-5. Lining up as both an offensive and defensive tackle, he was named All-OVC in 1961 and 1962. He culminated his collegiate career by guiding the Eagles to an OVC championship while earning OVC Defensive Lineman of the Year.

A native of Savannah, Tenn., DeCourley was selected in the seventh round of the 1963 National Football League Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. He later settled in Ironton, Ohio, and passed away on June 2, 2006.

Adkins, a four-year letterwinner for Head Coach

Rex Chaney, recorded a 1.48 ERA in 1964, an MSU record that still stands today. He posted a 12-8 career record and led the Eagles with 55 strikeouts in 1965. He helped MSU win the 1963 and 1964 OVC East Division titles.

A native of Paintsville, Adkins went on to an illustrious 34-year career as his hometown's head high school baseball coach. Adkins totaled 305 victories and led the Tigers to the state title in 1990. He retired from coaching in 2005 and passed away on April 21, 2010.

Established in 1985, the Athletic Hall of Fame honors former Eagles whose achievements in athletics and as ambassadors of the university have had a profound impact on Morehead State. The Hall of Fame has enshrined 125 members.

Eastern Kentucky picked to win OVC

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Eastern Kentucky University football team was picked as the favorite to win the Ohio Valley Conference title this fall in a poll conducted by the OVC coaches and sports information directors. The announcement was made Monday at the OVC football media day event. This was the first time since 2009 that EKV was picked first in the preseason poll. The Colonels, who have won a record 21 OVC titles including a share in 2011,

received 12 of the 18 first-place votes. Jacksonville State notched the remaining six first-place votes and was tabbed second in the poll. Murray State and Tennessee Tech were picked third and fourth, respectively, in the preseason voting. Eastern Kentucky advanced to the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs one year ago thanks to finishing 7-5 overall and 6-2 in the OVC. The Colonels finished in a three-way tie with Jacksonville State and Tennessee Tech for the 2011

conference title. Eastern returns 10 offensive and seven defensive starters including a league-high 10 players who were named to the 2012 preseason All-OVC team. Five offensive starters earned preseason all-conference honors — senior offensive lineman Aaron Adams, senior running back Matt Denham, senior offensive lineman O.J. Enabosi, senior offensive lineman Patrick Ford and senior wide receiver Tyrone Goard. The EKV offense switched gears last year from a spread scheme to more of a pro style attack. The change

brought significant results as Denham finished third nationally in rushing (130.8 yards per game). Earlier in the month, Denham was one of just two OVC players named to the initial Walter Payton Award watch list, which is handed out annually to the FCS offensive player of the year. Meanwhile, four defensive players were recognized on the preseason All-OVC team — senior defensive back Justin Bell, junior linebacker Anthony Brown, senior defensive back Brooklyn Fox and junior linebacker Ichiro Vance.

The EKV defense ranked first in the OVC in scoring defense (23.3 ppg) and turnovers forced (31) one year ago. Junior punter Jordan Berry was Eastern Kentucky's final selection on the preseason team. He ranked second in the conference in punting in 2011 (41.0 yards per punt). EKV will kick off the 2012 schedule on Sept. 1 at Purdue. The season opener will be televised by the Big Ten Network beginning at 3:30 p.m. The Colonels' home opener is scheduled for Sept. 8 against Morehead State at 6 p.m.

MSU volleyball team earns fifth straight AVCA Team Academic Award

MOREHEAD — Morehead State University football players Zach Lewis, Donté Sawyer, Joey Clegg, Rainer Duzan, Dexter Geohagen, Zachary Senvisky, Eric Matteson and Quentin Brooks have all been selected to Preseason All-Pioneer Football League teams by College Sports Madness.

Lewis, Sawyer, Clegg, Duzan, Geohagen and Senvisky have been recognized as part of the first team, while Matteson is a second-team choice and Brooks is a third-team pick. Lewis, a native of Manchester, set Morehead State records for completion (324), attempts (513) and passing yards (3,585) in 2011. He also shattered four PFL standards during the year. Sawyer, who hails from Acworth, Ga., finished the 2011 campaign with 60 catches for 904 yards and a school-record 12 touchdowns. He also owns MSU's career record for TD receptions (16). Clegg, a native of Westerville, Ohio, blocked for a unit that led all Football Championship Subdivision schools in first downs (25.2), while ranking second in total offense (478.9) and passing yards (358.2) per game. Duzan, a product of Dublin, Ohio, led all kickers in the conference with 85 points in 2011. He knocked down 12-of-17 field-goal attempts and 49-of-51 extra-point tries.

Geohagen, who hails from Far Rockaway, N.Y., tallied 44 tackles a season ago. He also led the Eagles with 14 passes defended, 10 pass break-ups and four interceptions. Senvisky, a native of Union, recorded 21 tackles and picked off three passes last year. Matteson, a product of Saline, Mich., joined Clegg on the offensive line to help Morehead State establish eight team school records and nine individual institution standards. Brooks, a native of Bardonia, N.Y., paced the Eagles with 17 punt returns for 116 yards. Morehead State will begin regular-season action on Thursday, Aug. 30, when Southern Virginia visits Jayne Stadium at 7 p.m. ET. It will be the first of six home games for the Eagles in 2012.

'Hit By Pitch' procedure revised in high school softball

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. — Batters in high school softball no longer will have to make an attempt to avoid being hit by a pitch in order to be awarded first base. This revision to Rule 8-1-2 was one of four rules changes approved by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Softball Rules Committee at its June 11-13 meeting in Indianapolis. All rules changes were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors. A batter will be awarded first base if "a pitched ball is entirely within the batter's box and it strikes the batter or her clothing. No attempt to avoid being hit by the pitch is required; however, the batter may not obviously try to get hit by the pitch." Theresa Wynns, NFHS director of sports and officials education and staff liaison for softball, said this rules change clears up the gray area of whether the batter made an attempt to get out of the way of the pitch.

"Since a batter is penalized for prohibiting a pitch from entering the strike zone, the committee thought there should be a penalty when the pitcher hits a batter when the pitch is completely inside the batter's box," Wynns said. In Rule 6-1, the committee approved the following exceptions to the penalty for an illegal pitch. 1) If the batter reaches first base safely and each other runner advances at least one base, the illegal pitch is nullified. All action stands and the illegal pitch is canceled. 2) If the batter does not reach first base safely or if any base runner fails to advance at least one base, the coach of the team at bat shall have the option of the result of the play or the penalty of the illegal pitch. 3) If the batter is hit by an illegal pitch out of the strike zone, the batter is awarded first base and each base runner is awarded one base. 4) If ball four is an illegal pitch, the batter is awarded first base and each base runner is awarded one base. A change was approved by

the Softball Rules Committee regarding the color of gloves/mitts. As a follow-up to the change last year that required the color of all softballs to be optic yellow, the committee revised language in Rule 1-4-1 to state that gloves/mitts must not be entirely optic yellow or have that color of marking on the inside or outside of gloves/mitts that would give the appearance of the ball. The final rules change was Rule 3-6-10, which will allow stopwatches to be used in the coach's box. A complete listing of all rules changes approved by the committee is available on the NFHS Web site at www.nfhs.org. Click on "Athletics & Fine Arts Activities" on the home page, and select "Softball." Fast-pitch softball is the fourth-most popular sport for girls at the high school level, according to the 2011-12 NFHS Athletics Participation Survey, with 373,535 participants nationwide. The sport ranks fourth in school sponsorship with 15,338 schools sponsoring the sport.

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
