

Noting that the courthouse 'leaves much to be desired', the grand jury said it favors "serious county buildings.

The magnitude of school truancy was referred to, and it was pointed out that about 1,000 children who should be in school are absent. This, the report said, is costing the Floyd county school system about \$800 a day and is a problem which merits the close attention of school officials and the County Judge and the Magis trates of the county. The repor pointed out that very few parents have been required this year to show cause why their children are not in school. Asking the cooperation of trial officials, the jury urged the County Superincases to them.

It was noted that the Jailer's records show that some persons have been arrested at one time and charged with several violations such as drunk driving, disturbing the peace and reckless use of a deadly weapon, and each charge booked to a different court The jury said it was unable to get testimony as to why this was done, adding that the effect of such booking of prisoners might require the defendant to pay separate costs of \$6 each for only one arrest.

Juvenile delinquency here and elsewhere in the county came in for the jury's attention, and the jury placed the heaviest responsibility on the parents. It suggested school and church and Sunday School attendance for juveniles and asked that ministers use their influence in the pulpit and out to warn parents and their children of the problem and to offer suggestions. Rigidly enforced curfews were suggested for several towns of the county.

The jury commended the Sher-iff for his efforts in procuring a radio network, adding that Floyd towns should equip their police cars with radios and so join this system of rapid communication between officers

The county jail, the report noted, is clean, sanitary and well kept. Baths for prisoners are needed, however, it added.



The bond issue was authorized in an act of the first special session of the General Assembly of 1956. It was approved at the polls November 6 by the margin of 6 to I.

The act violates Section 47 beause it originated in the Senate and contains provisions for raising revenue. This section requires rev-

enue measures to originate in the It violates Section 27, 28, and 29 because it attempts to delegate unconstitutional legislative powers to the State Property and Buildings

Commission It violates Section 230 because it seeks to divert road-fund revenue from the purpose for which the taxes were levied.

The act violates Section 46 because the General Assembly did not pass it according to the terms and provisions laid down in the section. It violates Section 177 because

this section does not permit the

State to pledge its credit for construction of highways. It violates Section 178 because it does not "adequately" specify the purpose for which the borrowed

money is to be used. Moreover, the suit charges that the act is violated because it states operation and maintenance of toll bridges shall be paid out of the road fund. Despite the fact that tollbridge bonds were outstanding when the toll-road act was passed, the act tries to give the bond issue first claim on the highway fund.

"The act, by reason of this provision," the suit goes on, "impairs the obligation of the contract holders of the bridge bonds and deprives them of their property without due process of law.'

The act also violates Section 177.480 of K. R. S. for the same general reason. But this reason involves the prior obligation of the road fund to operate and maintain the Kentucky Turnpike if tolls are not sufficient.

The act was attacked further for hese reasons. 1. Some sections of it are in error

or inconsistent. 2. The secretary of state did not meet requirements of the act in her

notices of election, etc.

3. The title fixes the total debt at \$100,000,000, but the body of the act contains interest provisions that make the total higher.

4. The State will use part of the issue to match federal money 1-to-9 but the act permits only 50-50 matching.

Your Income Tax (Questions and Answers



### HEALTH NOTES By Fleyd County Health Department

Multiple sclerosis is a disease of the central nervous system. It attacks the protective covering or "insulation" of the nerves. This covering is called the myelin sheath. The disease usually attacks the spinal cord and the base of the brain. It is not a mental disease as it does not affect the mind of the diseased per-

The disease is progressive. It does not have any set pattern of deelopment. During attacks of multiole sclerosis, damage may occur to any part of the central nervous ystem. The order in which the ymptoms appear varies with each patient. The rate of development oes also.

Multiple sclerosis is characterized y periods of variable lengths, some f them for years, in which the disease does not progress. Often the patient shows marked improvement between acute episodes. In other periods conditions become rapidly

When patches of the myelin heath are damaged, the ability of the nerve to carry messages is impaired. It may be completely destroyed. The patches are scattered throughout the central nervous system, impairing the activity of those parts of the body controlled by the damaged nerves.

Nerve tissue cannot renew itself and therefore the body cannot repair the damage caused by the disease. Although there is no known cure at the present time, the picture is not entirely hopeless. With proper treatment, many of the symptoms can be materially helped. Physical therapy, proper diet, and avoidance of emotional stress and over-fatigue are means by which the condition of patients is often improved, according to the Kentucky State Department of Health.




