



> The area's big need, he pointed out, is 65,000 new jobs. "Twenty thousand fewer men are employed in Eastern Kentucky than five years ago; one out of five is working, and for every one who is employed there are four dependent on him," he said.

> Recommendations made by Grossman include flood damage protection, general rehabilitation and economic development.

> Protection against floods, he pointed out, is not to be achieved by any single technique. Dams, floodwalls and similar structures will solve only part of the probabout one-fourth of the area. "We cannot second-gues the Corps of Engineers who say some of the dams are not feasible because their cost is out of proportion to the benefits to be obtained," the speaker said.

Better methods of weather forecasting, including use of radar within the next year or two; flood-plain zoning-that is, the restricting of building to keep new homes and business away from areas that cannot be protected; conservation, erosion control, opening of stream channels -these were mentioned as meas-

ures to be considered. Discussing economic development, Grossman said, "To attract industry, the community itself must be attractive to industry. Many have not been attractive.' In this connection he suggested community planning for which tehenical and professional aid is, or will be made, available; new sites found or created for industry; scientific methods of growing and harvesting forest; modernized agriculture and development of the tourist business.

Of highway and other transportation needs of the area, Grossman said these will not be recommended till it is proved that area improvements demand improved transportation.

Eastern Kentucky agriculture, he said, cannot, in general, hold out to 50,000 farmers of the area hope of modern living standards with farms remaining small in size as they are. Small-scale, intensive farming was recommend-

The forest income can be tripled, and much can be done in this field, the speaker pointed out. Large forest acreage is needed for the practise of scientific methods.







One quart of milk weighs 2.15 bounds. To make a pound of butter 9.77 quarts of milk are required, and 4.65 quarts for a pound of cheese One quart of milk is required for pound of evaporated milk, and 3,72 quarts for a pound of white milk powder.

Homogenized milk has had the butterfat mechanically broken up and dispersed evenly throughout the milk. There is no cream line, as the fat globules are held in suspension, producing a uniform flavor and softer curd. Homogenized milk was first successfully sold in Ottawa, Ont., in 1927, but was not commercially introduced in the United States until 1932.

In vitamin D milk, the milk has been fortified with vitamin D, the vitamin that has the special property of preventing rickets. Vitamin D is added by exposure of milk to ultra violet light, or by introducing

a vitamin D concentrate. Milk is outstandingly important for the mineral, calcium, for vitamin B, riboflavin, and for highquality protein.







More than 500 Kentucky widows stand to lose money unless they apply for increased compensation payments within the next two weeks, Ray R. Adams, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Louisville, has announced.

They are widows whose husbands died of service-connected causes before this year, and who may have the higher payments dated back to January 1 if they apply by July 1, Adams said.

He added that all Kentucky widows eligible for the increased benefit have been notified and that many of them already have made application.

Widows who have not made application for the higher payments are urged to contact the nearest Veterans Administration office or the Regional office at 1405 West Broadway in Louisville.


