80 FARMERS ASKING AID

Flood-Stricken Owners To Receive Cost-Share Practices for Land

More than 80 applications have been received by the local Agricultural Stabilization Conservation committee for cost-share work on repairing flood damaged Floyd county farms, it was said Wednesday by Elder Goble, office manager.

This is the second time in two years that the federal government has offered help to Floyd county landowners for repair of flood-stricken farms. Work was completed last year on damages incurred in January, 1962, and the most recent flood was in March this year. The March flood damage was considered the most extensive.

Cost-share practices include removal of accumulated debris, filling and shaping of gullies and waterways preparatory to vegetable stabilization, renovation of terraces damaged by rainfall in excess of storm design, restoration of pond dams, renovation of diversion channels damaged by rainfall in excess of storm design, shaping eroded land and stream restoration and restoration of intermittent stream courses and drainage systems damaged or destroyed by excessive rainfall or floods in March.

The Soil Conservation Service technician is responsible for developing design and specifications for each job. He will also be responsible for supervision, installation and certification of performance.

The landowner must sign a statement of eligibility in order to apply for cost-share aid, it is noted.

REYNOLDS BODY PLANT LOCATES NEAR ALLEN

WIDE VARIETY OF PRODUCTS IS PROPOSED

Operation Scheduled By September 15; To Cost \$100,000.00

The Big Sandy plant of the Reynolds Body Company, now under construction on U.S. 23, north of Allen, will employ 20 persons, according to Marcum Reynolds, president. Work was started on the plant two weeks ago.

The plant there will manufacture truck bodies, steel stairways, coal hoppers and, as Reynolds expressed it, "anything that can be made from steel."

The building, now under construction on land acquired from Forrest Burchett, will cost \$35,000 and equipment will increase the plant cost to approximately \$100,000. It will get into operation by September 15, Reynolds said.

The Reynolds Body Company was organized three years ago, and the first plant was built at Hazard. It employs 23 men and manufactures, chiefly, truck bodies for the truck mine industry.

The new plant is being rushed to early completion by a crew under the supervision of Reynolds. Most of the work has been sub-contracted. Reynolds is optimistic about the possibility of manufacturing and selling steel products in the area.

"There has always been a big demand for steel fabricated products in Eastern Kentucky and the plant here as well as the Hazard plant will offer a service in this field to mines and other industry," he said.

Reynolds is a native of Beaver, this county, and has been in the steel fabrication business for years, at first as a plant superintendent for other companies.

The Floyd county plant will eventually be larger than the Hazard plant, it is viewed.

TROOPER NABS BEAVER MAN

Tenth Man Is Arrested In Whiskey Raid Series; Intoxicants Confiscated

Liquor law violation arrests last week by the Kentucky State Police in this county rose Saturday to 19 when State Trooper L. Hatton captured Nathaniel Moore, of McDowell, and confiscated two and a half cases of whiskey found in Moore's truck.

Moore was booked on three counts—illegal transportation of whiskey, use of a farm truck for commercial purpose and failure to signal for a turn. He was placed under \$500 bond and his trial was set for July 22, the same date nine others arrested on liquor charges last Wednesday are scheduled for hearing in quarterly court.

Seven persons were booked at the county jail last Sunday by Sheriff Henry C. Hale and Deputy Sheriff Sam Hale on drunkenness charges. Five of the seven were listed as having been drinking at Jenny Wiley State Park.

Lee Howell, of McDowell, leader of the mine picketing staged earlier this year in the county, was arrested Saturday by State Trooper Hatton and charged with drunk driving. He pleaded guilty Monday and was fined \$100 and costs. His driver's license could not be revoked, County Judge Henry Stumbo said, because he did not have a Kentucky license but was operating only with one issued in Ohio.

YOUTH JOBS UNDER STUDY

Federal, State Officials Set Paintsville Meeting; Educators To Cooperate

Paintsville will be host to Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, other federal officials, a group of Eastern Kentucky educators and prominent Kentuckians Saturday. The scheduled conference will discuss youth employment problems of the area.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell Butler has asked superintendents in the mountain area to attend and bring their principals, guidance counselors and school-board members.

Other officials coming are Wilbur Cohen, assistant to the secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare; Governor Bert T. Combs; Congressman Carl Perkins; Economic Security Commissioner Earle Powell, and E. P. Hilton, director of the vocational education division in the Department of Education.

Butler said discussion will focus on problems Kentucky faces in training Eastern Kentucky youths.

"We hope to impress upon the federal officials the severity of our unemployment situation and to come up with some plan of action," Butler said.

Wirtz is expected to outline a new literacy-training program and an expanded program to train jobless teen-agers the Kennedy administration is urging Congress to enact.

The Manpower Development and Training Act and the Area Redevelopment Act provide training for unemployed adults, but Butler said little relief has been offered to Kentucky youth.

The state's share of manpower funds last fiscal year was slightly more than \$3 million. About 1,500 students have been enrolled in courses throughout the state under the Manpower Act program.

The meeting will be at 10 a.m. at Mayo State Vocational School.

HAGER NAMED IN WARRANT

Rape Attempt Charge Jails Weeksbury Man; \$10,000 Bond Asked

Accused of the attempted rape of a 15-year-old girl who is described by her mother as retarded, Joe Hager, about 45, of Weeksbury, is in jail here, held for want of \$10,000 bond asked for his release till the September grand jury convenes.

Hager was jailed Sunday by Deputy Sheriff J. Hall on a warrant sworn out by the girl's mother. He was held to \$10,000 bail Wednesday morning when he waived examining trial before County Judge Henry Stumbo.

The alleged offense occurred, the mother said, last March. The affidavit accusing him was signed July 6. It was explained that action against Hager had been delayed because he had been out of the state.

The mother's affidavit described Hager's attempts at intimacy with the girl. She added that she later took the girl to a doctor for examination, and that the doctor said the girl had been molested and injured.

FLOYD HEALTH SERVICE WORK NOTED BY HALL

Dr. Russell L. Hall, Floyd county health doctor, said this week that this county already has had more than 60 cases at the University of Kentucky Medical Center and that to these services worth an estimated \$100,000 have been rendered.

Heart and brain surgery as well as other types of operative and medical service have been afforded patients sent there, he said.

The pediatric clinic held at the Health Department here, serving counties of this area, is a service, he said, the value of which cannot be realized without detailed knowledge of the various cases and the highly specialized treatment resulting from examination.

The t. b. outpatient clinic held here July 2 drew 101 cases from Floyd, Johnson and Magoffin counties and a part of Knott county. The first such clinics were held every three months but the number of patients grew till it became necessary to reduce the time between clinics. Now, the clinic is held the first Tuesday of each month, with a monthly average of 70 patients being examined.

The outpatient clinic saves many inpatient t. b. sufferers and persons who have been treated for the disease the expense of going to a sanatorium for examination or treatment.

BLANKENSHIP IS ARRESTED

On Auto Mishap Charge Russell Adkins Killed Near Menifee-Co. Seat

Hubert Blankenship, 31, truck driver for Mattingly Bridge Company, was jailed Saturday evening at Frenenburg following charges that the tractor trailer he was driving caused the death of Russell Adkins, two miles from the Menifee county seat.

Blankenship, who was employed on a bridge job at Sutton, Pike county, was later released on \$10,000 bond, it is said. He was arrested near Frenenburg by the Menifee county sheriff.

The construction worker, who lives at Louisville, was en route home for the week-end and expected to return Monday with a load of steel for the Sutton project. It is said that rain obscured the driver's vision, causing the trailer to swing into the Adkins car. The victim was accompanied by his wife who was not seriously hurt. The Adkins car was knocked from the highway and over an embankment.

PLANE MISHAP CLAIMS SIX

Near Jackson, Sunday; Storm-Struck Aircraft Down Near Mt. Parkway

Federal investigators supervised removal of six broken bodies Monday from the wreckage of a private plane whose pilot took off Sunday despite a warning of thunderstorms in his flight path.

There were no survivors of the crash that wiped out four members of one family and another couple early Sunday night, seven miles north of Jackson and only 60 feet from the new Mountain Parkway.

The victims, all from Statesville, North Carolina, were identified as Paul Edinger, 28, believed to be the pilot; his wife, Joyce, 25; their daughter Paula, 4, their year-old son, Victor Paul; Fred Wilson, 23, and his wife, Violet, 16.

The plane left Blue Grass Field at Lexington about 4:45 p.m. after refueling for a flight to Statesville. It had enough gas for a 400-mile trip.

ALTERNATES BID PRICES ARE LOWEST

Immediate Start, Plan Of Meade & Kendrick After Earth Fill Work

The Prestonsburg Community College will be built by the Prestonsburg contracting firm of Meade & Kendrick (Astor Meade and W. R. Kendrick).

Contract for construction of the college was awarded the firm Wednesday by the Department of Revenue on its bid of \$899,690, which includes the base bid of \$882,000 and \$17,690 in alternate additives.

Although the base bid of \$873,000 offered by the Southeastern Construction Company, Charleston, was low, the firm's bids on alternates raised its total bid to \$902,000—\$2,310 above that of the Prestonsburg contractors.

Work will be started next week by the Kentucky Road Oiling Company, sub-contractor, on the earth fill to be made at the college site, and this phase of the undertaking is expected to be completed within six weeks, Meade and Kendrick said.

They added that they will begin work immediately thereafter and make every effort to have the structure ready for occupancy for the beginning of the fall term next year.

Edinger and Wilson were employees of the Kewanee Technical Furniture Company at Statesville. A business associate said the Edingers had flown to Jackson, Michigan, where they formerly lived, for the holiday week-end and had picked up the Wilsons for the return flight.


The bodies were taken to the Breathitt Funeral Home, Jackson. The funeral for the Edinger family will be today (Thursday) at Jackson, Michigan.

Senator Cooper will address the opening business session, a joint meeting with the American Legion Auxiliary at the Kentucky Hotel, Friday morning. Governor Combs

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

in the base bid; \$3,060 for an intercom system.

The college here will be one of five two-year community colleges to be established for the University of Kentucky in various parts of the state under 1962 legislation. The U. K. center at Elizabethtown is now under construction.

The Prestonsburg structure will be an air-conditioned, one-story building of approximately 35,000 square feet. Its exterior facing of brick and translucent fiberglass panels will be features of the modern design.

The college will have 12 classrooms, three laboratories, a library, a multi-use room for band and meetings, a seminar room and a director's office.

The contract will include heating, air-conditioning and electrical systems, clearing and grading of site and construction of driveways and parking areas.

The building will accommodate 300 fulltime students and 200 adults on a part-time basis.

The college tract of 33.8 acres is between old U. S. 23 and U. S. 490 and the new U. S. 23, near the Cliff bridge. The Big Sandy College Development Corporation, a local group, supplied \$92,030 of the land cost and the state supplied \$101,170. Another six acres is under option.

University of Kentucky community colleges will also be built at Somerset, Hopkinsville and in the Hazard-Blackey area.

The curriculum will provide basic two-year professional and arts and science courses, plus courses leading to certified degrees and technical training below professional levels. It will also serve as a facility for programs of a general cultural nature for people with specialized needs.

Mrs. Lehman was a daughter of T. J. and Annie Allen and was a native of Allen. She was first married to the late Dr. Edward Stumbo, of this county, and later to William Lehman, who survives. Mrs. Lehman moved to Oklahoma about 35 years ago, later going to California.

Besides her husband, she is survived by one brother and three sisters, George Homer Allen, of Anadarko, Oklahoma, Mrs. Rebecca King and Mrs. Elizabeth Tilson, both of Riverside, California, and Mrs. Mae Wilson, of Rittman, Ohio. Burial was made in California.

An Ordinance Adopting the State Plumbing Code for the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Regulating the Installation of Plumbing, Drainage and Sewage Disposal Systems; Designating Approved Types of Materials, Fixtures and Methods of Installation; Requiring Plumbing Construction Permits To Be Procured Prior To Installation and Providing for Plumbing Installation Permit Fees, Plumbing Inspection Services; and Prescribing A Penalty for Violation of Code.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. Definition of Plumbing. Plumbing means the art of installing in buildings the pipes for distributing the water supply, the fixtures for using water and drainage pipes for removing waste water and sewage, together with fittings, appurtenances, and appliances of various kinds, all within or adjacent to the building. It shall include:

- (A) The water service pipe which forms the connection between the property line and the building;
- (B) Private water supply systems;
- (C) House sewers which convey the waste water and sewage from the building to the property line or other points of disposal; and
- (D) Storm sewers, rain water piping and private sewage disposal systems.

SECTION 2. State Plumbing Code Adopted by Reference. The State Plumbing Code promulgated by the State Board of Health on file with the Legislative Research Commission, Frankfort, Kentucky, a copy of which is on file in the office of the City Clerk is hereby adopted by reference and made a part hereof to the same extent as if set out in full herein. Provided, however, that Section I of Regulation PC-1 of said State Plumbing Code shall not apply and provided further that this Ordinance shall not apply to "Farmsteads" as defined by KRS 318.010 (9). Permits to construct, install, or alter plumbing, sewerage or drainage within the City of Prestonsburg may be issued to any person upon proper application and payment of the prescribed fee as set forth in PC-1, Sections 2 and 3 of said State Plumbing Code.

SECTION 3. Plumbing Installation Permits Required. No person shall construct, install or alter any plumbing, sewerage or drainage system within the City of Prestonsburg without first having procured a plumbing installation permit from the County Health Department; provided however, that no permit shall be required for the repair of leaks, cocks, valves, or for cleaning out waste or sewer pipes. All plumbing shall comply with the State Plumbing Code.

SECTION 4. Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation who violates any provision of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00), or imprisoned in the city jail for a period of not more than ninety days, or both so fined and imprisoned, in the discretion of the court or jury. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 5. Partial Invalidity. Affect Of. If any word, clause, section or paragraph of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, the invalidity of such word, clause, section or paragraph shall not affect the validity of any of the remaining provisions.

SECTION 6. Repeals. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances of the City of Prestonsburg in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective and be in full force when passed, published and recorded according to law.

Hunting, Fishing Film Is Completed by State; Distribution Readied

For many years sportsmen of Kentucky have been requesting movies of fishing and hunting in this state and of the activities of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources in its effort to preserve and perpetuate the fish and wildlife of the Commonwealth.

Well, their requests are being fulfilled. Already this year the Department has completed a film on hunting, a 14-minute sound and color movie showing the different species of game that may be harvested and the actual harvesting of such game by hunters in the field. This film was completed late in the hunting season and hunters will be seeing more of it this fall and winter.

Due to be ready for distribution soon is a similar picture on fishing in Kentucky. Most of the shooting has been completed and the work of editing the film and providing the narration is now underway. It should be ready for showing in a few weeks. Of course, this film may be a bit late for this fishing season, but it is sure to get a big audience early next spring. It, too, shows the type fishing offered in Kentucky, although, to be sure, all phases could not be covered in a 14-minute run, but, we believe, this film will be interesting and well worth seeing. These two films were made by Public Safety Pictures, Dallas, Texas, in cooperation with the Department.

A third film, covering generally the overall program of the Department, the manner in which it operates and its aims and purposes, is in the making and should be ready for showing this fall. This film is a sound-on, 23 minute color movie and is being made by Karl Maslowski, of Cincinnati, an expert in the field of wildlife photography. We believe this will be one of the finest films of its kind produced in any state and this was brought about by the action of the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission and the commissioner of the Department who ordered the making of this film last fall. So, again, we believe that the sportsmen will have their wants as concerns movies. But, this is not all. The Commissioner and the Commission have also requested that at least one film be made each year dealing with a particular phase of the fish and wildlife management program in Kentucky.

We believe these films will bring Kentuckians closer together and make them realize more clearly the vital need for fish and wildlife management in Kentucky.



Examination Scheduled At Pikeville To Recruit Regional Social Workers

A special examination to ease critical shortages of social workers in Eastern Kentucky will be given at Pikeville Junior College on Saturday, July 20. Harold Bennett, director of examinations and recruitment in the State Department of Personnel, said that applications for public-assistance social workers and social worker-I will be taken in the college administration building beginning at 8 a.m.

Bennett emphasized that interested persons need not apply before reporting for the examination in Pikeville.

Applicants for public assistance social worker must have two years of college work. Beginning salary is \$324 per month.

Applicants for social worker-I must be college graduates. Beginning salary is \$358 per month.

No experience is required for either position, Bennett said.

There are a number of vacancies for both positions in the counties of Floyd, Johnson, Martin, Pike, Knott, Perry, and Letcher, Bennett said. All vacancies are in the Department of Economic Security and involve working with the aged, dependent children, needy blind and disabled in these counties.

Although applicants need not apply in advance, details on the vacancies are available from local offices of the Kentucky Employment Service or from the Department of Personnel, Frankfort, Ky.

Local Employment Service offices are located on North Lake Drive in Prestonsburg, College street in Pikeville and on High street in Hazard.

Law Enforcement Group Announced by Matlick

Frankfort, July 8 (Sp.)—Establishment of a law enforcement and safety section in the State Division of Forestry has been announced by State Conservation Commissioner J. O. Matlick. The division is in Matlick's department.

Matlick said that Scott Barbour, Frankfort, will be chief of the new section, which will increase law enforcement activities relating to forest fire control and will set up a safety program for division employees. Barbour will work directly under Gene L. Butcher, division director.

Matlick said that Kentucky has just experienced its worst forest fire season and expressed hope that stepped-up law enforcement can reduce future losses. He said that at least 3,000 fires were reported this spring and that many were apparently set deliberately. Others were caused by violation of trash and brush burning laws, he said.

Forestry employees now operate more than 500 vehicles and other pieces of mechanical equipment and their use will come under the safety functions of the section, Matlick said.

Barbour is a former director of the Division of Boating in the State Department of Public Safety.



The 1937 Flood At Prestonsburg

The Big Sandy River was one of the tributary streams of the Ohio River that contributed heavily to the latter's flooded condition in 1937. Catlettsburg, Ashland and Huntington were gravely stricken.

Court street, Prestonsburg, was flooded. In this photo is seen the area at the old Irene Cole Memorial Baptist church building. The picture was taken Jan. 23, 1937. Two persons were drowned in Floyd county as an indirect result of the flood, a man near Winchester and a woman at Martin.


A relief train for Catlettsburg and Ashland loaded at Prestonsburg and other valley towns. Four full carloads of clothing and food and three cars of boats were sent. Prestonsburg initially contributed one car of food and clothing, 14 boats and 50 cots. Relief supplies to the stricken Ohio river towns continued to pour out of the valley for days.

All interested persons are advised that the construction of Floyd County S 746 (4)—The Prestonsburg-Jenny Wiley State Park Road, is being planned by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Department of Highways. The contemplated location will be approximately as follows:

From US 23 at Lancer to junction with KY 1499 for a distance of 1.724 mile.
