Gen Howard W. Penney, acting director of Civil Works, to Congressman Car D. Perkins who had inquired about the progress made in negotiations between the Corps of Engineers and the C. & O. Railway Company to ward effecting relocation of the rail road in the reservoir area.

of Martin, Kentucky Member Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in Kentucky is one of the highest in the nation. This disease has been on the increase since 1955 when there were on the average of 17 cases per 1,000 persons in the state; in 1961 there were approximately 100 cases per 1.000.

While the total number of syphilis cases dropped from 2,212 in 1960 to 1,898 in 1961, the number of infectious cases, those in the primary, secondary, and early latent stages, increased from 153 to 222. In considering these figures it is well to remember that they refer to reported civilian cases only. Countless numbers of cases are unreported to the State Department of Health. Gonorrhea is also on the upswing with an increase of 243 reported cases over 1960's 3,195.

Since 1911, when central registration for births and deaths began in Kentucky, vital statistics reports have been compiled annually. Before work is started on the annual Vital Statistics Report, necessary information must be sent from all counties in Kentucky. The report is delayed in its publication since causes of death must be investigated and copies of death certificates for persons dying out of the state have to be received at the State Department of Health before tabulation may begin. Preliminary figures for 1962 are now ready in temporary form for those who request them. Facts other than those found in this report are available at the local, state, and federal level.

This Vital Statistics Report is being sent to state registrars, county health departments, high school, university, and college libraries, and sociology and commerce departments of state universities and colleges. A Statistical Summary for Professional Use will also be distributed to individuals upon special request.

Brooks have played a secondary role in Harm's self-education. Often he tells his audiences that he has spent more than half his life sleeping under the open sky."

On impulse he once parked his car along the highway and hiked into the New Mexico continental divide country. He stayed 43 days with no tools except a pocket knife, yet he actually gained weight living off the land

Now married and the father of three children, he is forever studying plants, birds, and animals in the woods and thumbing through books. Yet he has a tendency to sell himself short.

"There's been a lot of fuss about the painting and studying I've done, he offers, "but I deserve little credit. I was fortunate enough to have been born in beautiful mountain country. Nature has always been my background.

As an artist, he is a perfectionist Patience is his forte. He spent nine weeks on a perch 30 feet high studying bald eagles for one of his more recent paintings. Sometimes he sketches an idea as many as two dozen times before he adds the first touch of color. His paintings of birds are done feather by feather, layer by layer

Born near Elkins, in the West Vir ginia mountain country, Harm got an early indoctrination into the hows and whys of nature. His father was a naturalist, herbist and outdoor lover

Both parents were concert violinists. Ray, at the age of five, began to learn to play classical music on the violin. Later he learned two other stringed instruments - the guitar and uke.

Harm left home at 13 to go West. He worked for a circus, for dude ranches and wild west shows, and as a cowboy for cattle outfits at roundup time

He followed the rodeo circuit in season, doggin' and calf-roping and riding saddle broncs, barebacks and bulls. He remembers having his share of "busted bones.

"Needless to say, this kind of work kept me in the out-of-doorsand on the move," he recalls. "I could watch prairie chickens courting at daybreak in one state and in the same week catch a sight of mountain quail. My sketch books stayed full.

1.1 "Sewage Works" shall mean treating and disposing of sewage. 1.2 "Superintendent" shall mean the Director of Sewage Works of the City of Prestonsburg, or his authorized deputy, agent or representative. 1.3 "Sewage" shall mean a combination of the water-carried wastes from residences, business buildings, institutions and industrial establishments, together with such ground. surface and storm water as can not be eliminated.

1.4 "Sewer" shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying sewage.

1.5 "Public Sewer" shall mean a sewer controlled by the City of Prestonsburg to which owners of the abutting properties may have access. In general, the public sewer shall include the main sewer in the street and the service branch to the curb or property line, or a main sewer upon private property and any sewers which are connected with the sewage system of the City of Prestonsburg to the extent of ownership by public authority.

1.6 "Combined Sewer" shall mean a sewer receiving both surface runoff and sewage.

1.7 "Sanitary Sewer" shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and to which storm, surface and ground water are not intentionally admitted. 'Storm Sewer'' or "Storm shall mean a sewer which carries storm and surface water and drainage, but excludes sewage and polluted industrial waste.

1.9 "Sewage Treatment Plant shall mean any arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage

1.10 "Industrial Waste" shall mean the liquid waste from industrial or other technical processes.

1.11 "Garbage" shall mean solid waste from the preparation, cooking and dispensing of food, and from handling, storage and sale of produce

After serving in the Navy as a radio operator (1945-47), he returned to cowboy life. Two years later he made a fateful decision-to enter art school.

He graduated from the Cooper School of Art in Cleveland, and later attended the Cleveland Institute of Art. While in Cleveland he met and married his wife, Carmella, and was named staff artist for the Cleveland Audubon Society.

Harm found the going rough as an artist. He drove trucks, trained saddle horses, and farmed to supplement his income

His life changed, however, when a Louisville businessman, Wood Hannah, Sr., saw his paintings and liked them so much he commissioned Harm to do 20 pictures. Then other Kentuckians - among them Gov. Bert Combs and University of Kentucky President Dr. Frank G. Dickey-became interested in his work. He is the first Herman L. Donovan Artist-in-Residence at the University, Dr. Donovan is president emeritus at the University.

Harm is grateful. He has settled permanently in Kentucky, near Berea. He calls the state the "key to my success.'

Besides art, there are other evidences that Ray Harm has educated himself well. He built his own house. He speaks four languages-Spanish. Italian and Japanese, as well as English. He has an ardent interest in history, civics, literature, science, government and politics. It has been a long climb for a

boy who left home at 13.
