WILLIAM R. McCOY, SR. (1873-1950)

William R. McCoy, Sr., prominent Martin county leader, was born March 18, 1873, eldest son of Pleasant P. and Sarah McGlothlin McCoy. He was educated in the public schools of Martin county; attended several terms of school at Prestonsburg taught by Prof. Walter S. Byington; studied law in the office of Patton and Copley and was admitted to the bar in 1896. He taught school in Martin county from 1892 to 1899 and worked four years in the office of the Martin County Circuit Court Clerk. Elected Martin County Attorney in 1906, he served until 1914. He was actively engaged in the practice of law at Inez from 1900 to 1949.

The veteran attorney married Bertha Marrs, daughter of Harmon and Maranda Weddington Marrs, of Prestonsburg, in July, 1898. She is still living and will be 88 years of age, May 1, 1965. William R. McCoy, Sr., died March 12, 1950. One son, William R. McCoy, Jr., is a prominent Inez attorney.



Boy Scouts Schedule Attendance At Church During Observance

Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Explorers in Lonesome Pine Council, Boy Scouts of America, will fulfill their obligations to be "faithful in their religious duties" by attending religious services in connection with Boy Scout Week which observes the 55th anniversary of the national boys' organization.

Scouts of Jewish faith will attend Sabbath services on Friday evening, February 5, and Saturday, February 6, while other Scouts in uniform will attend their own churches with their parents on Sunday, February 7.

Many churches plan to use the Boy Scout Week theme, "Strengthen America's Heritage" and to recognize their leaders and Scouts as part of services or special programs, according to George F. Leatherman, of Wheelwright, chairman of the Scout council's camping and activities committee.

While not a religious teaching movement, the Boy Scouts of America believes that no boy can grow to a successful manhood without a firm belief in God. Leatherman said.

"No matter what the boy may be-Catholic or Protestant or Jew-this fundamental need of good citizenship should be kept before him," Leatherman said. "The Boy Scouts of America recognizes the religious element in the training of the boy, but it is absolutely nonsectarian in its attitude toward that religious training. Its policy is that the organization or institution with which the Boy Scout is connected shall give definite attention to his religious life.'

The local plant separates the earth and ore through a complex process into component minerals. Further processing will be required to produce the purified product, Browning said.

Browning said Thursday his company's first operation will be to extract industrial abrasives from the area. It is presumed that this means tungsten, the metal used to harden steel and die cutting tools.

He said also that the firm was interested in extracting titanium. Then he added, "We plan also to extract several other minerals such as circonium concentrate and fibrous minerals."

Bulldozers leveled the plant site last week on Hamilton Branch. This is a tributary of Little Fork in eastern Elliott not far from the Lawrence and Carter county lines. It is on nearly the exact spot where an English company did mining operations in 1910 and 1911, and just over a hill from Ison Creek where the Kimberlite Diamond Mining Company did exploratory digging in 1882.

The area first drew attention in 1880 with publication of the first geological survey. It showed the dikes and described the formation as similar to those in

"I recently found an old friend of 65 years ago, now of Tioga, Louisiana, near Alexandria, He is 83 and I am 78. He is a disabled man but his son, Glenn Colvin, has explained the family history. I knew the family in Wayne county, Illinois, in the nineties. He, Aden Colvin, and his brother Charles and sister Lena were the children of Tom Colvin merchant and postmaster. Cisne, Illinois, Tom was a Civil War veteran. He was a son of Amos Colvin. Amos, born in Highland county, Ohio, early in 1800, was a son of a Thomas Colvin. Evidently Thomas married Hannah Ashcraft, likely in Fayette county, Pennsylvania. After his service in the Revolutionary War he moved to probably Mason county, Kentucky.

"About 1804 Thomas Colvin moved to Highland county, Ohio. He lived there nearly 40 years and became successful. Two brothers, John and James, Jr. followed him to Kentucky and Olrio. We think they were sons of a James Colvin who was known in New Castle in 1740. We have much on his military career but none on his family or all of his children. We find many Colvin families. One found recently is in Bedford county, Pennsylvania.




