MAN ARRESTED HERE IN \$17,000 ROBBERY

LANCER RAID FRIDAY NIGHT ENDS SEARCH

Most of Bank Funds
Taken Found; Marson
Held to \$20,000 Bond

Less than a week after he had allegedly robbed a Baltimore, Md., bank of \$17,000, Jack Leslie Marson, 27, was a prisoner here and most of the loot was in the hands of officers.

Marson was taken in a raid staged around midnight last Friday on the home at Lancer of his father-in-law, Darwin Rose, by federal, state and county officers.

His bond was set at \$20,000 Monday when he was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Kessinger, in Lexington. A preliminary hearing was set for him at Lexington, Wednesday morning.

Officers here said Marson is accused of robbing the First National Bank of Baltimore and of shooting his way out of a police trap. The trail to Lancer apparently opened up to FBI agents when they learned that he married a girl from there and that her parents still lived at Lancer.

When arrested, Marson had \$2,490.71 in his wallet. Later, his father-in-law found \$14,000 packed into a polaroid camera case which had been hidden beneath a pile of scrap iron at the rear of the Rose home.

Arrest of Marson, who is said to be a native of North Carolina, was effected without gunfire, but it had its moments of drama and threatened violence. Special FBI Agent-in-charge Cliff Carmona, two other agents and State Trooper Orbin Combs guarded the rear of the Rose residence while State Trooper Donald H. Goble and Deputy Sheriff Lonnie Herald went to the front. As Goble stepped to the living room door he saw a man dash into a rear room. He walked inside and was at the doorway between the two rooms when Marson, after apparently spying the

P'BURG MAN CARRIES CASE TO PENTAGON

A former Army officer from Prestonsburg picketed the Pentagon in Washington Monday, dressed in his uniform, that of a lieutenant colonel, in an attempt to get a hearing on his complaint that he has been deprived of his benefits as a veteran.

The demonstration was staged by James D. Stephens, who from a position outside the building displayed a sign listing questions which, he says, demand an Army answer. The demonstration ended after a Pentagon duty officer promised to look into his case.

Stephens claims long and persistent efforts to get a hearing before the Army's Physical Examination Board on his claim for a pension on the grounds of disability have never resulted in more than promises, that he has never been given a hearing.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1937, entered the Army in 1941 and served in the European Invasion with the Third and Seventh armies under Generals Patton and Patch. (A photograph taken in 1945 and published in The Floyd County Times shows Stephens, then a lieutenant colonel, with a Polish general who had been freed from a German prison camp by Stephens' command.)

FOREST FIRE DRIVE MADE

Crackdown Is Begun On Floyd Violators, Foresters Announce

The Kentucky Division of Forestry announced this week that an all-out campaign against forest fire law violations has been launched this season.

Charles Foster, district forester, said that the drive on violators began March 1, with all Division of Forestry law enforcement officers, rangers and guards exerting a maximum effort in enforcing the laws.

Oliver Hall, forest ranger, said Monday, that he alone issued 10 citations during the week-end.

The citation is a new tool which will speed up law enforcement and will be a courtesy to violators. The violators will be cited into court at a scheduled time and place, but, if the violator fails to appear, a warrant will be issued for his arrest. This will add additional court costs for the accused, if convicted.

The laws most commonly violated are:

1. No person shall set fire or cause to have fire set on any forest land not owned, leased or controlled by him.

TAX OFFICE NOW CLOSED

Assessment Deadline Past, Office Closed Thru Next Tuesday

The Tax Commissioner's office closed at the end of business Tuesday, the deadline for taxpayers to list property for taxation, and will remain closed through next Tuesday.

No further assessments will be received.

It was estimated Wednesday that 75% of the Floyd county assessment has been completed, but it was admitted this is a guess, since no tabulation of assessment returns has been made.

The office is being given State Department of Revenue assistance, and property of those who did not file their lists will be assessed on the basis of data at hand and, in some cases, after inspection.

Taxpayers may inspect the assessment lists during Inspection Week, the first week of May, and also may appeal to the board of supervisors which will be in session for five days during the following week.

The tax rate cannot be established until the total assessment figures are known, which will be after the board of supervisors meets.

FIRM LEASES P'BURG SITE

Tastee-Freez To Begin Building of Restaurant Here Within 90 Days

One of 75 Tastee-Freez installations planned for Kentucky this year will be located in Prestonsburg, and construction of a building to house the business is slated to begin here within the next 90 days, it was announced here last Friday.

The Harlee Company, Chicago, parent firm of the Tastee-Freez chain of restaurants, has taken a 20-year lease on a lot owned by the Music-Colvin Motor Company, on South Lake Drive. On this site, which is the former NYA Shop location, the building will be erected and parking areas provided. The lot fronts on Lake Drive (US 23) 125 feet.

The structure planned will be mainly of glass and masonry. It will have a seating capacity of only about 20, since Tastee-Freez primarily renders curb service. Its menu headliners are hamburgers, hot dogs and ice cream products.

Prestonsburg was selected for the first Tastee-Freez location in the valley and was appraised by a company official as "one of the finest towns in Eastern Kentucky." Paintsville and Pikeville are also being considered as locations while on duty in Okinawa.

HALL CITES DANGER FROM STRAY DOGS

Dogs — particularly, stray dogs — constitute a real public health menace, Dr. Russell L. Hall, Floyd county health officer, said this week.

Dr. Hall said that more than 30 children in this county are known to have been bitten by dogs last year. He added that the number reported is seldom, if ever, half the total bitten. Of the dogs reported as having bitten children, he said, 40% or more had no known owners and were classed as strays.

Fearing an outbreak of rabies, the Health Department has made two recommendations aimed at mitigating the danger:

1. Step up the enforcement of the law requiring that every dog must be licensed and have anti-rabies vaccine;
2. Establish a pound for stray dogs.

Health Department sanitarians assist at clinics held each year for the administering of anti-rabies serum to dogs. Dr. Hall said that these clinics are held at about 60 places in the county to make the service easily accessible to every dog-owner but that the number of dogs receiving the immunization is only about 500 a year. These are given the three-year immunization serum, which means that no more than 1,500 dogs — less than 20% of the county's total canine population — is immunized at a given time.

"It has been several years," Dr. Hall said, "since we have had a human death from rabies in Floyd county, but we can push our luck only so far. We will have more deaths from rabies unless the recommendations we have made are carried out."

HITS A SOUR NOTE

The apparent disintegration of public morals, which is marked by an ever-increasing crime rate and a growing unconcern for public decency, has caused the President of United States to call for the most intensive efforts toward stemming the tide which has been running against the nation for many years now.

President Johnson has called for action designed to make America's streets and parks and homes—wherever people live and congregate—safe for human habitation.

It is well that not only the face of America be made beautiful but that something be done to the inside of the cup. That will require a lot of doing, more than official proclamations and scattered individual protests. The people of the land will have to do much toward changing their thinking. Some of the old terms will have to return to the public lexicon: Mother will have to take the place of the Ma Barkers; love must have a place among us, without a nest; even CARE cannot take the place of caring.

Even the federal government may have to revise its thinking to the end that it will no longer sanction certain types of crime, simply because those who commit them pay federal taxes.

ITEM 1. It is a crime in Floyd and many other counties of the United States to sell intoxicating beverages. The offense is commonly known as bootlegging. But if the bootlegger gets a federal permit and purveys liquor on which U. S. taxes are paid, he is without reproach in the eyes of federal law, county and state laws notwithstanding.

ITEM 2. Gambling is an offense in most places in this country. But if the gambling house buys a stamp from the proper federal agency, it is as legal in the eyes of the highest court of the land as the oldest bank in these United States.

These may be minor instances of federal dereliction. But, since the top official in the department is talking about crime, it does not seem amiss to suggest that cooperation rather than opposition be given local authorities in their fight on what some of us yet are so naive as to consider crime.

Sometimes the bugler sounds the "Charge!" and it comes out a sour note.

that order it could be reasoned that he still is in the service. So, he said, when he picketed the Pentagon he wore his Army uniform with lieutenant colonel's insignia.

Stephens was accompanied to Washington by his father, former Circuit Judge Henry Stephens.

Stephens said that ruling out his eligibility for servicemen's benefits after his long military career was an Army decision that his heart disease had existed "prior to service."

The contradiction here, he said, was obvious for he had been discharged from active service in 1954—prior to his later Reserve service—in good health.

He said that since 1957 he has been seeking to obtain a hearing before an Army physical evaluation board to determine officially his degree of physical disability and thus indicate what retirement and disability pension benefits he could be entitled to.

When asked by the Pentagon duty officer why he was picketing, Stephens replied that this was "the only way I've been able to bring these things to anyone's attention" since he never had had a hearing.

THE BIBLE... RICHEST SOURCE OF BOOK TITLES

By the Rev. Robert B. Pattison

"The Bible alone would suffice to show the whole extent of the beauty and power of our language," Thomas Macaulay once stated.

His estimate finds its full proof in the constant usage of Biblical phrases as book titles, by writers of fiction, poetry and drama. The Bible is regarded by the literary world as the richest of all reservoirs of English. There is a picturesqueness, a poetic quality, a dramatic sense, an artistic rhythm that distinguishes it from all other literature. Authors, poets and playwrights have acknowledged this consciously or subconsciously, and a list of such of their works as employ Biblical phrases for titling purposes bears emphatic witness to the fact. Their debt—and ours—to the Bible's English translators is great indeed.

Shakespeare depended heavily upon the Bible as a source book. So did Milton, Bunyan, Ruskin, Addison, Cowper, Browning, Tennyson, Whittier and too many others to list here.

It is not surprising that modern authors of non-religious books continue to rely upon it, particularly for titles. Although the Bible is a book of religion—a spiritual treatise—these writers apparently look upon it as The Book of Life as well.

Some years ago, while preparing a talk entitled The Bible as Literature, the writer compiled a brief list of books with titles taken from the Bible—about 70 titles. Later the list was extended to some 200 titles and appeared during

summer of 1938 in the Methodist publication, Religion in Life.

The American Bible Society became interested and offered the use of their library. Since the day of my first talk, the modest list has grown to some 2,600 titles. As my prime object on this particular project was to illustrate only one aspect of the Bible—its worth as pure literature—all religious books were excluded. Such titles would have swelled the listing immensely. There is no way of knowing what the list would be if it included all of the Bible-derived book titles of all kinds. It must be remembered also that this listing includes only English-language books published in the United States.

Which of the 66 books of the Bible, it will be asked, is the most frequent source? Psalms leads with 315. Genesis is the second richest source, with 240. Isaiah supplied 138, and is third on the list. As an entity, The Lord's Prayer must be rated most popular with writers. Phrases from it are responsible for 47 recorded titles. Also prominent on the list are titles taken from the imaginatively written books of Proverbs and Ecclesiastes. The Four Gospels have yielded 600 titles to date.

However, the words of Jesus, as a classification, are far and away the most often seen on book covers, the Sermon on the Mount alone (Mt. 5, 6 and 7) providing 160 titles. Jesus had the power of clothing his statements in beauty, of speaking great truths in simple, moving

words. Truly, "Never man spake like this man!" With authors of today, as with listeners of His day, Jesus' words resound with compassionate authority.

In the opinion of G. Stanley Hall, "From His day to ours, Jesus has appealed also as titles for the drama. In my research I found some 100 play titles, among these being "Green Pastures," "The Foolish Virgin," and "The Little Foxes."

(Editor's note: Just for an exercise, or to learn how to title that book you plan to write some day, try this. Open the Bible to almost any page and run your finger down the columns. Regardless of the page, it is fairly certain that you will spot a familiar book title within minutes. At Mr. Pattison's suggestion we tried the above exercise. The Book opened at page 604 of the King James Version. We began reading the Song of Solomon. In chapter 2, verse 12, we found the title of a well-known play, "The Voice of the Turtle," written by John Van Druten. On our second try we opened the Book at random






officers at the back of the house, suddenly appeared in the opening, revolver in hand and pointed at the officer.

Goble snatched at the weapon, contrived to hold it away from him and he and other officers finally disarmed Marson. Meanwhile, Mrs. Marson had gained control of Goble's revolver, and Deputy Sheriff Herald said he suddenly found himself threatened by her. An FBI agent seized her and disarmed her.

The household was a scene of wild disorder during the struggles for the weapons, with the crying of women and children contributing to the uproar. Mr. Rose, who had retired, did not rise till comparative quiet had settled onto the place, Herald said.

Marson made no statement at the time of his arrest or while he was in jail here. His wife contended he was at home at the time of the robbery but later became silent, also, officers said. No charge has been placed against her.

It was said that the Marsons arrived at the Rose home, five days prior to his arrest and a day after the date of the robbery. Officers indicated they were convinced that Mr. and Mrs. Rose were unaware of their son-in-law's connection with any crime.

Rose and Deputy Sheriff Herald searched the home and surroundings for the remainder of the bank loot, the day following Marson's arrest. Finding nothing, Herald returned to his home on Cow Creek. When he arrived there he was told that Rose had telephoned to tell him that he had found the missing money.

A large sum still had the unbroken First National Bank wrapper around it.

The Marsons have three children. He was employed in a Baltimore plant. Officers said they had learned that the couple had sold their household belongings before leaving Baltimore for Kentucky.

Lake, aren't ready to write off the place as done for, no good and a hopeless case.

We maintain that rototone and drawdowns and old car bodies do not constitute all that can be done for a body of water which comes from a stream that once was regarded as, potentially, the best bass stream in Kentucky.

How about taking a second hitch, a long breath and attacking the matter from new angles? How about chemical analysis of the water? about determining why the stream-bed was red with iron or some other chemical when the lake was drawn 'way down? about taking a look to see if, perhaps, those open coal banks that are beneath the conservation level of the lake aren't pouring acid and other noxious matters into the water?

We are not one to dispute the findings of the fellows who work for the Division of Fisheries. They have worked hard. But about this matter of sunlight penetrating no more than two feet beneath the surface—how come, then, that scuba divers tell us they can see at a depth of 20 feet beneath the surface?

The Division of Parks has a stake in Dewey Lake that is perhaps the biggest of all. Wonder if it is willing to write the place off, too?

This limerick comes our way at a time when we have our flocks aloft:

One group held a meeting afight
In a capsule much faster than light.
They opened one day
In a relative way
And adjourned on the previous night.

2. During the periods, March 1 through May 15, it shall be unlawful for any person to set fire to any flammable material capable of spreading fire located within 150 feet of any woodland or brush land except between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 12 midnight, or when the ground is covered by snow.

3. Between 4:30 p.m. and 12 midnight, it shall be unlawful for a person to set fire to any flammable material upon land owned or leased by him unless he previously shall have taken all reasonable care and precaution to prevent spread to lands of another.

4. No person shall set fire to any forest land, hollow tree or stumps to capture or destroy wild birds or game.

Complete copies of the forest fire laws and penalties are available from the Division of Forestry. Foster said the assistance and cooperation of all law enforcement agencies and court officials is being enlisted. He is hopeful that by a comprehensive public information program that citizens will become aware of the forest fire laws and that a reduction in forest fires will result.







ASSEMBLY IN LAST WEEK
OF ITS CURRENT SESSION

Frankfort, Ky.—The teachers' pay-raise and natural resources bills—handed by Governor Edward T. Breathitt as ultra-important—were among those which broke through the legislative logjam and became law as the 1966 General Assembly labored toward final adjournment March 18.

A number of other measures were nearing final action—such as the bill to require annual mechanical inspection of automobiles; the one to reapportion the state's seven congressional districts as equal as possible in population; and the one aimed at giving Kentucky a new Constitution.

In signing the teachers' pay-raise bill, Breathitt called it the most important school law passed in the last 12 years, since establishment of the minimum foundation program.

Besides providing pay raises ranging from \$450 to \$1,100 for teachers over the next two years, depending on education and experience, the bill authorizes local school districts to use one of three new taxes to raise money for other school needs, such as buildings.

the House a bill to create a commission to plan and construct an office building in Frankfort for the exclusive use of the legislature. The commission would consist of two senators appointed by the senate president, two representatives named by the speaker of the house, and three members appointed by the governor.

A bill to update Kentucky's 1910 garnishment law was passed by the House and sent to the Senate. It would exempt from garnishment 75 percent of wages and up to \$1,500 of personal property, including a car used in getting to work. The present law exempts \$16.87 a week and mentions "two work beasts" but not an automobile.

The Senate passed and sent to the House the bill which would increase the salaries of governor, other elected officials and 30 appointed commissioners and department heads, if the governor saw fit to raise the latter. The salary of the next governor—after Breathitt—would be increased from \$18,000 to \$30,000 a year. Neither would the raises affect any other elected official during his present term.

The Senate and House both gave final passage to a number of bills and sent them to the governor. He may approve or veto a bill or let it become a law without his signature.

The Senate passed and sent to the governor House Bill 164, which would require institutions having the care of infants aged 28 days or less to administer the "PKU" test which detects the potential of mental retardation in a child.

This bill was introduced by Reps. H. Foster Pettit, D-Lexington, and Kenneth F. Harper, R-South Ft. Mitchell.

Among other bills passed and sent to the governor, and their sponsors, were:

HB 250—Rep. Mitchel B. Denham, D-Maysville—To raise employee contributions to the county employees retirement system, with corresponding increases in benefits; and HB 251—Reps. Denham and John M. Smothers,



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Former Johnson-Co. Sheriff Sued By Paintsville Board

The Paintsville Board of Education has filed suit in circuit court against former sheriff Ray Preston and the Aetna Casualty & Surety Company, asking for a declaratory judgment to recover what was termed "amounts in excess" of reasonable cost in tax collections.

Basis for the suit is the collection cost withheld by Preston, said by the school board as plaintiff to be 3.39 percent.

The board maintains that the "reasonable cost" did not exceed one percent.

The total amount involved is \$506,525.07 collected, of which \$489,322.50 was remitted and \$17,202.57 withheld as a commission.

The suit maintains that a controversy exists between the plaintiff and defendant on "reasonable cost," with the former sheriff contending that the amount withheld was reasonable.
