·State Grants Reprieve For Floyd Schools

The State Board of Education unanimously approved recommendations made by Superintendent of Public Instruction John Brock to improve irregularities in the Floyd County school system, according to Jim Parks, spokesman for the Department of Education.

The recommendations were ap-

proved Tuesday afternoon, and put to Parks said rest, at least temporarily, fears that the local school district would be declared academically bankrupt.

The board approved a curriculum audit, which was proposed at the program committee meeting Tuesday morning, and implementation of an educational improvement team,

Dr. Betty Steffy, deputy superintendent of public instruction, announced during the Tuesday morning meeting that the Department of Education and the Floyd system will conduct a curriculum audit beginning Monday, Parks said.

A six-member team, comprised of

three Department of Education officials and three out-of-state officials. will thoroughly review the county's teaching program and make recom-

The board also approved a plan for the Department of Education to send a team to work with Floyd School Superintendent Ronald Hager and the local board to develop an educational improvement plan, and to monitor implementation.

The team will initially include three people, with provisions for adding members as necessary, dependant upon issues and problems encountered, said Parks. The team will arrive in the county this month.

After the recommendation was approved, Hager fielded questions from state board members about deficiencies in the 1988 accreditation report. and discussed the possibility of eliminating managerial positions





IMPRESSIVE DEVELOPMENTS IN EASTERN KENTUCKY

Just a few weeks ago, I visited the Hazard area to talk with local officials of the Kentucky River Area Development District. The site of our meetings was on land reclaimed after strip mining and developed into valuable commercial property.

I was extremely impressed with this example of the cooperative. grassroots approach that we must take in a continuing struggle for economic growth and stability in the mountains and across Kentucky.

As area development districts throughout the state have demonstrated for many years, a regional approach is absolutely necessary to the success of any bootstrap efforts to improve our

A joint project recently completed in Hazard turned a \$1.5 million investment on a 300-acre site into a \$100 million development, including a medical complex and shopping center. A new project - the Starfire Project - is being undertaken by the University of Kentucky, Cyprus Coal and the Kentucky River ADD. Some 17,000 acres of land in Perry, Knott and Breathitt counties will be developed after mining in the area is

As you know, usable, flood-free land is hard to come by in our Appalachian area. These mine reclamation efforts provide land for recreation, industry. and even agricultural and wildlife projects.

I have supported the efforts of area development groups since my days as governor. Now I am privileged to be among those working for a continuation of federal assistance for these very worthwhile programs.

We have survived the outgoing administration's repeated attacks on programs vital to this work. It now appears that such funding mechanisms as the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Economic Development Administration and Community Development Block Grants will hold their own in the new budget. Through such programs, we can help to build a grassroots partnership of public and private groups to improve the quality of life in Kentucky

Local development groups also can benefit from my proposal for a twoyear budget cycle for the federal government. Such a process would allow groups to stretch each dollar further when they can anticipate federal contributions for a two-year period

We are also pushing a bill to create a rural development financing authority to offer interest rate subsidies to relatively new businesses in communities of less than 20,000 population.



Literacy Tutor Training: Rewarding Experience

Sister Mary Gervase and Charles Wilson are two of the people in the area actively working to combat illiteracy in the area through teaching adults to read.

Although the morning was beginning to cloud up, the sound coming from the meeting room at the Christian Appalachian Project was full of sunny optimism, as Sister Mary Gervase and literacy volunteer tutor Charles Wilson told how they and many others are teaching adults to read for the first time

It all begins with the literacy

volunteer tutor. Many volunteers find out about the training programs "mostly by word of mouth. Someone takes the training and then tells someone else," said sister Gervase, who is coordinator of the Christian Appalachian Adult Education Advancement Program.

Gervase, with her gentle face and heart, told how she became involved in CAP's literacy program in 1984.

'I felt the call to the area." Gervase said. "I was in the area in 1976 and I loved the people and wanted to come back

'Anybody that's willing to give up their time to take the training and has a sensitivity to the non-reader is the ideal volunteer," Gervase said.



Strong Second Half Powers Blackcats To Victory At BL

way to win in its first three games Betsy Layne, with a weaker schedule than that of the Blackcats, had managed to squeeze out one victory in its three previous starts.

Early season expectations had taken a turn from enthusiasm to heart-breaking, but when they met Friday night, either Prestonsburg or Betsy Layne would find a more successful outcome

For everyone who enjoyed the night, there was another who suffered from it. The Bobcats proved to be the latter, and when Prestonsburg scored three second half touchdowns. Betsy Layne supporters went away from Mile High Field feeling the disappointment of a 21-0 loss.

Tailback Dennis Smith scored Prestonsburg's first touchdown early in the third quarter, going over from 14 yards out, and quarterback Tim Trusty added scoring runs of 1 yard and 2 yards to lead the Blackcats to

"We really had a great defensive effort tonight," Prestonsburg Head Coach Bill Letton said after the game. his first win as a Blackcat coach.

"We finally put two halves together." Letton added. "We didn't score any points in the first half, but our defense kept us in it until we could get our offense together.

The Blackcat defense held Betsy Layne to less than 100 yards in the first half, but the Bobcats didn't help themselves offensively, committing several mistakes that eliminated possible scoring opportunities.

They outplayed us in the second half. What they did worked. We just didn't do what we had practiced." Bobcat Head Coach Vince Tucker said. "We had a chance to get on top of them in the first quarter. We went for a field goal, but it didn't work."

The Bobcats, running several option passes and misdirected plays. Kevin Spurlock, who recently joined the team, to back Brian Osborne. moving Betsy Layne from the Prestonsburg 49 to their 10.

But from there, the biggest play was a 1-yard gainer on a fumble. Quarterback Craig Hunter lost 1 vard, and an incomplete pass brought about a fourth and 10.

The Bobcats were certainly in field goal position, but an illegal participation call pushed them back five yards. and the 32-yard field goal attempt sailed just wide left, and Betsy Layne had missed its scoring chance with 10:25 left in the second quarter.

Although the first half was a nonscoring one, it wasn't without excitement and successful plays.

One of those came on the first play from scrimmage of the game. Smith, after Prestonsburg took the opening kickoff on its own 23, broke loose for a 35-yard scamper. But like so many after it, the play was called back because of a penalty.

The illegal block call put the Blackcats back on their 13, but fullback Kevin Dotson got them out of the hole with a 15-yard run. The Blackcats moved the ball to the Betsy Layne 44, when Trusty hit split end Jamie Howell with a 15-yard completion, but Prestonsburg fumbled the football away on the next play.

Three plays and 7 yards later, the Bobcats gave it back to Prestonsburg when Jimmy Nelson recovered a Betsy Layne fumble on the Blackcat 46.

Prestonsburg mounted one of its few sustained drives, moving the football to the Bobcat 17, helped along by a 20-yard burst by Dotson, but gave the football back on downs when a fourth and 16 reverse to Ray Collins came up 12 yards shy of a first down.

The Blackcats, rolling up 137 yards in the first half, failed to find the end zone until the 8:21 mark of the third period - and they needed a blocked

Betsy Layne, which was penalized for over 100 yards in the game, moved the opening third quarter kickoff out to their own 36, but a personal foul on third and four pushed them way back.

The Blackcats, when Betsy Layne was forced to punt, blocked the kick and took over on the Betsy Layne 22. After Aaron Flannery, who ran for 46 yards on eight carries, took Prestonsburg to the 12 with a 10-yardrun, the Blackcats were moved back to their 17. But on a second and 12 play, after heading off to his left, Smith cut back across the line, picked up a couple blocks along the way and out-sprinted the Betsy Layne defense to the end zone. Smith, a 5'9" 140-pound senior, had 48 yards on the ground, despite having lost gains totaling 43 yards due to penalties.

Prestonsburg, which scored all three times via the ground, was led in rushing by senior fullback Dotson, who carried 10 times for 68 yards.

'We ran the ball more," Letton said of his team's approach to the game. "We thought we needed to establish a running game. We haven't been a real good running team, but we put it together tonight. I'm real pleased with the effort.

One example to truly explain Prestonsburg's preference to run the football, instead of throwing it Friday night, was that Tim Trusty ran for more yards than he threw for. The senior quarterback was averaging over 100 yards per game, through the air, but against the Bobcats, he ran for more yards - 48 - than he got passing. Trusty hit on three of his seven passes, with at least two easy catches dropped, for 31 yards.

Betsy Layne was led on the ground by Chris Kidd, who ran for 56 yards on 16 carries. The Bobcats' passing game was five for eight for 60 yards. Spurlock, Kidd and QB Craig Hunter

The game could certainly have gone the other way. In fact, Magoffin County had no less than three chances to take a lead in the final few minutes of the fourth quarter — two of them in the final three minutes.

The Hornets, after recovering a Parsons fumble on the Allen Central 29, moved inside the Rebel 5 yard line, but a field goal attempt was deflected by Brian Meadows. With just over 31 seconds left in the game. Magoffin County, after stopping Allen Central on three running plays, got a long punt return from Mike Ratliff, and moved to the Rebels' 24 yard line. Conley, who hit on nine of his 12 passing attempts for 120 yards, connected with Scott Howard on a 5-yard gainer.

With only 2 seconds remaining on the clock, the Hornets attempted a 41-yard field goal which came up well short, enabling Allen Central to pull out its first win of the season.

"We played hard and we played inspired football. Maybe this will help us get ready for Raceland." Daniels said. mentioning his team's contest Friday night against the Rams.

Magoffin County, which had only 68 yards of total offense in the first half, fell behind 12-0 before they could get any points on the board.

Parsons, who had almost as many yards rushing as the Hornets had as a team, scored both of Allen Central's touchdowns, and Jamie Hall booted a 27-yard field goal to lead the Rebels to the win, their third in the past three seasons.

Parsons, who was held in check on his first four carries (gaining only three yards), rushed the football 28 times for 206 yards, enjoying the biggest day of his high school career. The junior tailback scored the Rebels first touchdown on a 1-yard run with 2:46 remaining in the second quarter, capping off a seven play drive in which Parsons ran all seven times. The Rebels were helped out by two offsides penalties on Magoffin County, and Parsons had runs of 34 and 12 yards.

Applications Available For Goose—Duck Hunts By Norm Minch

Application forms for goose hunting at the Ballard and Sloughts wildlife management areas (WMAs) are now available from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Dates for the goose hunts at Ballard will be December 12 — January 28, and ducks may be taken December 12 — January 4. Goose hunting dates for the Sloughs WMA are December 10 — January 28, and ducks may be taken December 10 — January 4. Hunters will be asked to indicate a first choice and alternate choice of hunting dates. Hunters will be drawn for only one hunt at each area.

To request an application for goose hunts at Ballard or Sloughs WMAs write: Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Wildlife Division, #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, Kv. 40601.

Ballard WMA hunts will be for a maximum of two days (excluding Sundays and Christmas Day) while Sloughs WMA hunts will be for a half-week segment, either Monday through Thursday of Friday through Sunday. The deadline is September 30 for both Ballard and Sloughs WMA goose hunt applications.

Hunters may apply only once for the random drawing on either WMA. More than one application from the same hunter for a single area will disqualify his application. Hunters must apply individually.

At the Sloughs WMA, if drawn hunters do not occupy their blind or pit by legal shooting hours, it becomes a public blind on a first-come, firstserved basis.

Non-toxic steel shot is required for all waterfowl hunting on both wildlife management areas and hunters may not possess lead shot or steel shot larger than size F while hunting. Hunters under the age of 18 must be accompained by an adult.

Hunting hours at Ballard WMA are from sunrise to 12 noon, and from sunrise to 2 p.m. at Sloughs WMA. All hunters are required to report their waterfowl harvest efforts on forms-povided at each wildlife management

area office.

Ballard WMA is located in Ballard County along the Ohio River bordering Illinois. The Henderson/Sloughs WMA is located in Henderson and Union counties along the Ohio River bordering Indiana.





Wherever you are, those of you who were crudely referred to as scabs during last year's strike, hit the weights and the road. Be quick about it, too. because your services may be needed

The NFL. grand in its intentions and bold in its actions, has taken direct measures to curb drug use in professional football. But the league may have embarked on a much bigger adventure than it first planned

In less than six weeks, the NFL, in fulfilling its drug rules and regulations, has suspended several players. including bigtimers such as Richard Dent. Dexter Manley and Bruce Smith. If the trend continues, it may force owners to recall some of 1987's replacement players.

Well, maybe not. Players aren't leaving in strike-line numbers, but the league has placed plenty of performers on the 30-day list, and some on the 12-month plan.

The NFL kicked off its "clean-up" campaign in 1986, establishing its ground work toward a drug-free football world. Even though they knew it was coming, some still failed to take necessary precautions.

The league, according to the program, gives first-time offenders a chance to clean themselves of the dreaded substances, but the second time brings a 30-day suspension. So far this season, 16 players have been given 30-day suspensions, several of whom are impact players. New York Giants' linebacker Lawrence Taylor. possibly the most valuable defensive player in the league, was suspended. then refused to enter a rehab center.

The suspension does not subtract time until the player seeks professional help. As of Friday, though, Taylor had shown no interest in finding that help

Dent, a star on the Chicago Bears' defensive line, was suspended because of his refusal to take the required drug test. He and Bears' teammate Calvin Thomas were suspended Wednesday

Indianapolis Colts' running back Tony Collins, a former New England Patriot, was given a 1-year suspension. He was a third-time offender.

Of the 17 suspended, nine played defense with five playing along defensive lines. Offensively, five of the eight were running backs. No quarterbacks have been suspended this season

That last factor, though, could hurt the chances anyone had of naming their 1988 all-drug suspension team. But just take a look at that defense. and maybe you think we could go without a true quarterback.

Although a couple could be moved from the line to possibly the linebacker spot, the defensive line would certainly rival those of "alltime greats" fame.

Dent has the speed to play at linebacker, and we could use him in the fashion of a Carl Mecklinburg. Hell join Taylor, and Cincinnatis Emanuel King, in the middle of our

The Raiders' Greg Townsend would have to move inside to a tackle position, leaving the defensive spots to Buffalo all-pro Bruce Smith and Manley. Denver defensive tackle Richard Reed would line up alongside Townsend in this 4-3 setup.

Our defensive backfield would be a bit weak. Only two backs. Bengal Daryl Smith and Seahawk Terry Taylor, have been penalized due to the drug matter. But an offensive backfield of Collins, White and Buffalo's Rob Riddick would be explosive and powerful. Oh, heck - we've just got two offensive linemen.

What's that? Some of these guys such as Riddick, Reed, Townsend and Manley are back with their own teams

We probably don't have rights to them anymore, but how about an expansion draft? We'll take some replacement players, as long as they can't avoid failing a test they know is coming, when it is coming, and what they need to do to pass it.

More will come along, and while we may be a bit shorthanded now, soon we'll have some for the whole season.

It might not be a bad idea at that. Establish a team, or a league if need be, for those who get suspended. Heck, let's make money, at least, from all this bad publicity football is

It's OK, you know, to establish this team or league. After all, society couldn't control alcohol, so was legalized. Said something like, "We might as well tax it. They're going to sell it anyway.

Some say drugs are ruining football. Others say drugs are ruining the people of football. But it's hard to feel sorry for a man such as Lawrence Taylor. He's a wealthy man, but is he not a sick man?

How about Charles White? A former Heisman Trophy winner. White had seen his life turn back on itself until last season. He had been arrested because of cocaine. He struggled just to stay in football, and even when the sport gave him another chance he took advantage of it for only a short time.

Last season, after the league reinstated him and the LA Rams reinserted him, he led the whole NFL in rushing, proving to the world what the real Charles White could do. Or was it that this past week he proved what the real Charles White could do? He was suspended, reportedly because of alcohol. White, each day of his life, had to take a drug test. To a clean person, that's no problem, but White does have a problem, and it showed itself

The NFL, even though it was merely because of public pressure, took bold steps toward curbing the league's drug problem. But to subject its employees to such embarrassment may be a bit much, and won't go very far in solving the nation's drug pro-

It could be joked about, this suspension thing, or it could be taken seriously. But either way, it will change things little; probably about as much as the whole idea of drug testing will clean up professional foot-

NFL News And Notes

Cody Carlson proved to be a master at bringing his team back. Joe Montana proved to be the master of his team, and the Cleveland Browns, last vear's top AFC scoring team, is still looking for a touchdown, plus a healthy quarterback.

All three teams, the Oilers, 49ers, and Browns, went into battle Sunday without their number one quarterbacks, but as the story of week two unfolded, all except Cleveland enjoyed successful outings.

Carlson, filling in for the injured Warren Moon, threw two touchdown passes, and tailback Allen Pinkett. replacing injured Mike Rozier, ran for three scores as Houston rallied to defeat the LA raiders, 38-35.

Pinkett, from Notre Dame, crossed the goal line from 6 yards out with 31 seconds remaining, giving Houston a three-point advantage

Steve Beuerlein passed for three touchdowns in the third quarter, but he is expected to return to Los Angeles' bench next week in favor of recently-acquired Jay Schroeder, a strong-armed passer formerly with Washington

Carlson, who sent a message to the Oilers' coaching staff that they might have been using the wrong quarterback, was a fill-in who managed to handle the situation successfully.

Steve Young wasn't, though, Playing without Montana (suffering from a bruised elbow), the 49ers went with Young on the road against the New York Giants. Young, who has often proven himself a capable NFL quarterback, fumbled early in the game, which led to a Giants' touchdown, and he later gave way to

Late in the fourth quarter, Phil Simms threw to wide receiver Lionel Manuel to give New York a 17-14 lead. 

"Our kids could have quit. They could have let them roll over us. which they did anyway, but the kids showed a lot of character in the second half," Johnson said. "The kids came back in the second half and hit with them. They still had their first squad in there, leading 38-0, and we got two quick scores on them.

But Hazard had built a huge lead, thanks to its passing game, and the Trojans, 1-2 in district play, could never catch up.

They came out and played flawlessly," Johnson said, praising the Bulldogs' execution. "I don't think they're any match for Paintsville, but Friday night, nobody could have beaten them.

The Trojans, who are 1-1 at home. return to Brackett Field Friday night for a battle with Johns Creek. The Bearcats enjoyed their best season ever last year, and made their first playoff appearance, but Johnson said this year's squad may not be quite as talented.

"I don't think they are," he said. They still pass the ball well. . . if we can contain them inside, keep them from getting outside our ends. then I think we can play with them. the coach added

Hazard, which led 31-0 at halftime, evened its season record at 2-2, and claimed its first district win.



"There was a man from Michigan who said he drove all the way for the festival, and it was worth every minute of it," Lowe added.







From UMW To Basketball, History Is Here

New books about Kentucky and things that affect the state are constantly being published. The following books are some of the new titles that have been added to the shelves at the PCC Library

Kentucky's Thomas D. Clark, with Bill Cunningham. An extended interview, this book is a recording of the author's visit with the south's most respected historian Bill Cunningham, lawer and author from Kuttawa. Ky., questions the colorful and articulate Clark about Kentucky's past, present and future.

A transplanted Mississippian. Clark has spent the last 60 of his 84 years in the Commonwealth. He has authored 18 historical books dealing primarily with Kentucky and the South, and edited 12 more. The authority on the state's history, he retired as chairman of the University of Kentucky History Department in 1965, and how spends his time writing. speaking, and serving on numerous local and statewide boards.

Cunningham's conversation with Thomas Clark will leave the reader with a greater understanding and appreciation of Kentucky and its peculiar strengths and weaknesses. Clark provides interesting anecdotes of his distinguished career as historian, as well as some perceptive insights into the development of, in Clark's own words, "one of the most romantic and colorful states of

His life and career paralleled the forces that pushed America from Woodrow Wilson's New Freedom to Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal, into two world wars and a cold war, from the Great Depression to unprecedented affluence, and from national selfassurance to self-doubt. A legend and hero to many Kentucky coal miners. Lewis built the UMW into the nation's strongest labor union and changed forever the conditions under which coal was mined.

Nightmares in Dixie, edited by Frank McSherry. The people of the American South are natural story tellers, and scary is their favorite mode of telling. Don't read this book on a dark night if you are alone and the house squeaks. Listen to this from the introduction: "You're holding horror in your hand like a black rose." There are little dolls that kill, forgotten gods that inflict a terrifying vengeance, ghosts that walk at night, a visitor from a future of horrifying destruction, and much, much more

This anthology of 13 nightmares is told by such authors as John D. Mac-Donald, a best-selling mystery writer: Jesse Stuart, one of Kentucky's most loved regional writers: Karl Edward Wagner, a psychiatrist whose knowledge of the depths of the mind gives his tales of terror extra credence; and William Gilmore Sims, a contemporary of Poe's whose work was praised by that master of the macabre as the best ghost story he'd

One tale for every southern state, from the mountains of Tennessee to the sand dunes of Florida and the bluegrass of Kentucky, each one telling something for the state it was set in Read it - if you dare.

Digging Our Own Graves, by Barbara Smith Dedicated to "coal miners and their families all over the world," this book is about the occupational disease that is killing them. Digging Our Own Graves is the first comprehensive analysis of the controversy over black lung disease.

Beginning with doctors' testified accounts of it in the 1830s, the author traces the shifts in the medical

perceptions of this disease. In a discussion of bituminous coal mining from the hand-loading era to the present. Smith analyzes the production of black lung and relates it to the changing technology and social relations of the workplace. Put in perspective by historical material, the recent black lung movement is chronicled through selections from intensive interviews with miners, widows and other participants.

Although it highlights the victories and significance of the black lung movement, this book also tells the story of frustrations and bitter unresolved conflict. It raises questions about the limitations of scientific medicine, the nature of disease. and the possibilities for genuine occupational health.

The Winning Tradition, by Humbert Nelli. A picture book story of Kentucky Wildcat basketball, this is a coffee table book that no one will leave on the table. Action pictures of all the greats are here - the renown and the lesser known. Complete with statistics for games and players, it will answer trivia questions and settle

Beginning with a short history of the sport, the book focuses on basketball at the University of Kentucky Starting with statistics from 1903, it continues to chronicle the era of Adolph Rupp and Joe Hall,

Complete with an index that will lead you to stories and pictures of favorite personalities, it is a book that portrays an important aspect of Kentucky's history

Kentucky Basketball's Big Blue Machine, by Rice Russell. The game of basketball had its beginning in 1891 when James Naismith, using peach baskets and a soccer ball, started the game at an International YMCA Training School in Springfield, Mass. It has since spread and come to rest in Kentucky. This book is the first complete history of basketball at the University of Kentucky

With chaptesr titled "The Fabulous Five", "Rupp's Runts," "Gentleman Jim" and "The Twin Towers," this is a book that tells the tale through pictures, letters, interviews and statistics: A natural companion to The Winning Tradition, these two books are for sports lovers and historians alike.



Dropout Prevention Program Working Well At Betsy Layne

The Dropout Prevention Program, in its fourth year at Betsy Layne High School, deserves some recognition for its success, according to principal Adrian Bentley.

According to statistics compiled by the BLHS counselor's office, the program has reduced absenteeism 10 percent, increased grade point averages more than 10 percent, and increased retention rates for ninth to 12th grade students an impressive 64 percent.

"It is projected that this program has saved the Floyd County Board of Education more than \$40,000 in per diem funds," explained Bentley.

The Dropout Prevention counselor, tutor and advisor at BLHS is James Brooks. He assists students in developing self-esteem, relating to others and gaining academic skills.

Potential dropouts are identified by teachers, guidance counselors, parents, social workers or principals. Instead of a scheduled study hall each day, students in the targeted group attend a tutoring class held by Brooks. The group is composed mostly of ninth graders with previous poor at tendance in school, and those with poor averages academically.

"Keeping our children in school and preparing them for a productive future is a goal that the citizens of Floyd County should all work to attain," added Bentley.

ORDINANCE NO. 10-88 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG. KENTUCKY, CREATING A COMPREHENSIVE. REGULATORY ORDINANCE FOR THE CONTROL, LICENSING, OPERATION, ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES BY THE DRINK, UNDER THE DIRECTIVES OF THIS ORDINANCE AND CREATING DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES ASSOCIATED

THEREWITH WHEREAS, the Kentucky General Assembly, during its 1988 Regular Session adopted Senate Bill 273, which was Legislation providing for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink under a special license; and,

WHEREAS, we, the City Council, being the Legislative Body of the City of Prestonsburg, have determined that an economic hardship exists within the City and that the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink could aid to economic growth; and,

WHEREAS, the provisions of Senate Bill 273 became law on April the 4th. 1988: and

WHEREAS, the 1986; General Assembly did adjourn sine die on Friday, April the 15th, 1988; and,

WHEREAS, the provisions of Senate Bill 273 shall become law in this Commonwealth ninety (90) days upon adjournment of the General Assembly, which day shall be July the 14th, 1988;

WHERAS, the provisions of Senate Bill 273, shall be incorporated into Chapter 242 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg is a Fourth Class City in which prohibition is not in effect, and, therefore, the provisions of Senate Bill 273 are related

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT OR-DAINED BY THE CITY OF PRES-TONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

A. GENERAL

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Economic Development Special Alcoholic Beverages Ordinance" of the City of Prestonsburg.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. Words used through this Ordinance, unless the context requires otherwise, shall have the same definitions as set out in the Kentucky Alcoholic Beverage Control Law (Chapters 241, 242, 243, and 244 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes) of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and all amendments and supplements thereto, unless specifically defined herein.

SECTION 3. SCOPE. Irrespective of title or headings, the sections of this ordinance shall be construed to apply to the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on premises lying within the boundaries of the City and shall apply to malt beverages, distilled spirits and wine where the context permits such application.

Nothing in this Ordinance shall excuse or relieve a licensee or the agent or employee of any licensee in the City, from the restrictions, requirements and penalties of any other Ordinance or Ordinances of the City or of any Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky relating to violations pertaining to alcoholic beverage.

SECTION 4. ADOPTION OF STATE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL LAW. The provisions of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (Chapter 241, 242, 243 and 244, Kentucky Revised Statutes) and all amendments and supplements thereto, are adopted so far as applicable to this Ordinance, except as otherwide lawfully provided herein. SECTION 5. CITY ALCOHOLIC

BEVERAGE CONTROL ADMINI-STRATOR-APPOINTMENT;

(a) The City Administrator shall, consistent with the provisions of KRS 83A.150 (7) (b) and KRS 241.170, appoint a City Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator (hereinafter City ABC Administrator) subject to approval of the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, hereinafter referred to as the City Council.

(b) The salary for said office shall be fixed from time to time by the City Council

(c) The functions of the City ABC Administrator shall be the same with respect to city licenses and regulations, as the functions of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter ABC Board) with respect to state licenses and regulations, except that no amendment to these regulations proposed by the City ABC Administrator may be less stringent than the Statutes relating to alcoholic beverage control, or than regulations of the ABC Board. No regulation of the City ABC Administrator shall become effective until it has first been approv-

ed by the City Council. SECTION 6. OATH; BOND:

(a) The City ABC Administrator before entering upon his duties as such. shall take the oath as prescribed in Section 228 of the Constitution and shall execute a bond with a good corporate surety in the penal Sum of not less than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), faithfully to perform the duties of his office pursuant to the provisions of Section 62.060 of Kentucky Revised Statutes, et. seq.

(b) The cost of bonds given under this section shall be borne by the City of Prestonsburg (hereinafter the City). B. LICENSES

SECTION 7. LICENSES. As used in this section "license" means any premises licensed by the City to sell alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises, and relates where applicable to the sale of distilled spirits, wines and/or malt beverages, or any combination thereof

As used in this section "bonafide restaurant" means a premise which can demonstrate to the City ABC Administrator that the gross sales of the restaurant for the twelve (12) months prior to the applying for said license from the sale of food for consumption on the premises is found to be not less than 50% of the total gross sale of the applicant restaurant. The City ABC Administrator shall review all records which the applicant restaurant must submit as part of its application for a icense under this section, and the City ABC Administrator shall determine if said restaurant meets the criteria

contained herein. The applicant shall publish in the local newspaper, having the largest circulation, at least twice within a thirty (30) day period, the intentions of the applicant to apply for said license, and the applicant shall be responsible for ti e publication fee. Any resident of the City of Prestonsburg may file with the City ABC Administrator exceptions of the applicant's request and the City ABC Administrator shall conduct a hearing upon said exceptions. The City ABC Administration shall thereafter reduce his findings and recommendations which shall be presented to the City Council for acceptance, in whole or in part, or rejection in whole or in part. Any party aggrieved by the final action of the City Council may file an appeal with the Floyd Circuit Court, and no license shall be issued until the matter becomes final and non-appealable. Said appeal to the Floyd Circuit Court shall be filed within thrity (30) days after the action of the City Council. Any other applicant for the issuance of a license pursuant to this Section to be issued to a hotel, motel or inn, which shall be eligible if it is found by the City ABC Administrator that said hotel, motel or inn contains not less than fifty (50) sleeping units and has dining facilities for not less than one hundred (100) persons or bona-fide restaurants open to the general public having dining facilities for not less than one hundred (100) persons as defined herein, and upon application, the City ABC Administrator shall immediately inspect personally the premises and file his report with the City Council that said inspection revealed that the applicant in fact had the requisite number of sleeping units and dining facilities and the City Council may thereafter approve the issuance of said license. Any party aggrieved by the action of the City Council in respect to the issuance of said license to a hotel, motel or inn, shall, within thirty (30) days from the action of the Council, file an appeal in the Floyd Circuit Court; however, since the issuance is based upon the ac-

peal nonwithstanding. Nothing contained herein shall be in any way interpreted to allow for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises in connection with any business in which a substantial part of the commercial transaction consists of selling, at retail, staple groceries, or which is used solely as an entertainment facility and does not meet the criteria of a "bonafide restaurant" as defined herein.

It shall be permissible for a licensee, who under K.R.S. 244.330 is permitted to operate one bar, counter or similar contrivance in said licensed premise under said retail drink license, due to modern business practices and the inhancement of economic development and opportunities, particularly associated with meeting or convention business, and the larger interior areas of some licensees, and the recreational facilities directly associated therewith, that it may be necessary to provide for more than one bar within said hotel/motel/inn licensed premises under this Ordinance to effectively serve the patrons at such premises. A supplemental bar shall be allowed to said hotel/motel/inn licensee if such licensee can show the City ABC Administrator the need for such supplemental bar. A supplemental bar license may be issued to a hetel/ motel/inn retail drink licensee upon a showing to the City Administrator of good cause and need for the supplemental license, and the license may only be issued for the use on the premises directly associated with the applicant's existing retail drink license as part of the entire business of said license facility.

SECTION 8, APPLICATION.

(a) The City ABC Administrator shall not receive or take any action on any application for an original license to sell alcoholic beverages within a limited sale precinct prior to July the

(b) Such application shall be subject to the applicant having caused to be published Notice of its application in a newspaper meeting the requirements of KRS Chapter 424.

The advertisement shall state the name and addresses of the members of partnership if the applicant is a partnership, as well as the name of the business and its address, or, if the applicant is a corporation, the names and addresses of the principal offices and directors of the corporation, as well as the name and addresses of the corporation itself, the location of the premises for which the license is sought.

(c) Applications for the issuance of licenses, as set out herein, shall be in writing and upon the forms provided by the ABC Board as amended and supplemented from time to time or if such forms are unavailable, the applicant may provide the information as set out herein in the form of a verified affidavit, which shall serve as an

application. The applicant shall provide a copy of the application or affidavit to the ABC Board in Frankfort, and each applica-

tion shall be accompanied by a certified check, cash or a postal or express money order for the license fee as set out herein, which shall promptly be given to the City Clerk

SECTION 9. HEARINGS Should a request for a hearing be desired, the City ABC Administrator is to hold said hearing, pursuant to the general practice procedures found in the Kentucky Rules of Civil Procedure and the

following shall apply: (a) Definitions. All words are used as defined in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Law of Kentucky (KRS Chapters 241, 242, 243 and 244), unless otherwide

(b) Appearances. Any applicant or licensee may appear and be heard in person, or by duly appointed attorney, and may produce under oath evidence relative and material to matters before the board.

(c) Briefs Briefs may be filed at the

option of the applicant or licensee. (d) Rules of Evidence. The rules of evidence governing civil proceedings in Courts in the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall govern hearings before the City ABC Administrator; provided however, that the hearing officer may relax such rules in any case where, in his judgment, the ends of justice will be better served by so doing.

(e) Subpoenas. The City ABC Administrator shall have subpoena power for such hearings and shall at request of applicant made with names and addresses of those desired issue with

(f) Transcript. Upon request and at the cost of the applicant or licensee the hearing may be transcribed.

(g) Decisions. All decisions shall be

written and based upon the evidence developed at the hearing. SECTION 10. FORM OF LICENSES

All licenses issued hereto shall contain the following information:

(a) The name and address of the

(b) The number of the license;

(c) The type of the license; (d) A description by street and number, or otherwise, of the licensed

(e) The name and address of the owner of the building in which the licensed premises are located;

(f) The expiration date of the license

(g) A statement in substance that the license shall not be a property or vested right and that it may be revoked at any time pursuant to law.

SECTION II. EXPIRATION DATE; DATE FEES DUE: FRACTIONAL FEES. All licenses issued pursuant to this Ordinance, shall expire on June the 30th of the year following the year in which said license was issued. Application for renewal of licenses shall be submitted no later than thirty (30) days before expiration thereof and shall be made pursuant to Section 8 above.

SECTION 12. PAYMENT OF LICENSES FEES. The fee for said license as set out in this Ordinance shall be \$600.00.

SECTION 13. LOST OR DESTROYED LICENSES. When a license shall be lost or destroyed without fault on the part of the licensee or his agent or employee, a duplicate in lieu of the original license shall be issued by the City Clerk after the City ABC Administrator is satisfied as to the facts, provided, however, that the person applying for said duplicate license shall pay a fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for issuing said duplicate to City Clerk.

SECTION 14. REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION. Any license may be revoked by the City ABC Administrator if the licensee shall have violated any provisions of this Ordinance or Kentucky Revised Statutes 241, 242, 243 or 244 or any rule or regulation promulgated by the ABC Board or by Ordinance by the City Council.

SECTION 15. TRANSFER OR ASSIGNMENT. No license as issued hereunder shall be transferred or assigned either as to a licensee or location except with prior recommendation by the City ABC Administrator and approval of the City Council and not then until a payment of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) shall be made to the City Clerk.

SECTION 16. POLICE INSPEC-TION. Police officers of the Prestonsburg Police Department shall concurrently have the jurisdiction coextensive with the state alcoholic beverage control administrator and the City ABC Administrator to inspect any premise licensed under this Ordinance. They shall have the power to confiscate

any contraband property SECTION 17. HOURS FOR THE SALE. Premises licensed under this Ordinance may remain open for business daily from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. prevailing time, and shall have their "last call for drinks" at 1:30 a.m., except that no sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink as called for herein may be made after 2:00 a.m. on Sunday until 9:00 a.m. on Monday and said licensed premises shall be closed during the hours that election polls are open on election.

SECTION 18. CONDITIONS, PRO-HIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS. All licenses granted under this Ordinance shall be subject to the following conditions, prohibitions, and/or restrictions and all other provisions of K.R.S. 241, 242, 243 and 244 other Ordinances and regulations of the City applicable

(a) Every licensee hotel/motel/inn shall be entitled to serve such beverages as said licensee is entitled to serve under this Ordinance and in such room or rooms at banquets, dinners or where meals are served; however, no hotel/motel/inn shall maintain or operate or permit to be operated more than one bar or room where alcoholic beverages are sold

which is open to the general public without first obtaining a separate license for each bar or room which is open to the general public in accor-

dance with this Ordinance. (b) Each licensed premises shall at all times be conducted in an orderly manner and no disorderly, riotous or indecent conduct shall be allowed at any time on any licensed premises and no nuisance suffered, permitted or maintained thereon.

(c) No gambling or game of chance shall be permitted in any form on such heensed premises. Dice, slot machines, or any device of chance is prohibited and shall not be kept on such premises.

(d) It shall be unlawful for any licensee licensed under this Ordinance to have or maintain any radio receiving apparatus on such premises which is intentionally adjusted so as to receive police messages broadcast from the Prestonsburg Police Radio Station as it is now or may hereafter be operated. In addition to other penalties provided for the violation of this section, the Chief of Police or the City Administrator shall have the authority to confiscate any and all such radio receiving apparatus.

(e) It shall be unlawful for any licensee under this Ordinance to sell. to smoke or keep or permit to be sold. smoked or kept upon the licensed premises any marijuana. It shall be unlawful for any licensee, except licensed drug stores, to keep or sell or permit to be sold or used on the licensed premises any narcotic or barbiturate drugs. In addition to other penalties set out in this Ordinance for the violation of this section, the City ABC Administrator shall also have the authority to revoke the license issued to said premises.

(f) The licensee shall be responsible for maintaining security on his premises including providing adequate outside lighting to permit customers to utilize the parking area and to promote the safety, health and welfare of the general public utilizing the licensed premise. Security standards are further necessary to discourage unlawful activity in and around the licensed

(g) No license shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation for the sale at retail of any alcoholic beverage at any store or other place of business where the majority of its business consists of the selling of school books, school supplies, food, lunches or drinks for such minors irrespective of the distance of such store or other place of business from a church, school or hospital.

(h) It shall be unlawful for any licensee under this Ordinance to give away or offer to give away anything tangible of value as a premium or prize in connection with the sale of alcoholic

(i) No licensee or agent or employee

of a licensee shall permit any person to become drunk or intoxicated on the premises, nor shall any licensee permit any drunk or intoxicated person to re-

main on the licensed premises. (j) No licensee or agent or employee shall permit any person or persons, other than employees of the licensee, to open any bottle of distilled spirits. wine or malt beverages, and no container of distilled spirits, wine or malt beverage shall be opened nor its contents consumed on the licensed premises unless the licensee holds a retail drink license.

(k) No person under twenty-one (21) years of age, shall enter any premises that is licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for the purpose of purchasing or receiving any alcoholic beverages. No person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall possess for his or her own use, or purchase or attempt to purchase or have another purchase for him or her, any alcoholic beverages by the drink, no person shall aid or assist any person under twenty-one (21) years of age in purchasing or having delivered or served to him or her any alcoholic beverages by the drink, no person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall misrepresent his or her age for the purpose of inducing any licensee or other employee of any licensee, ot sell or serve any alcoholic beverages to such person. No person under twenty one (21) years of age shall use or attempt to use any false, fraudulent or altered identification card or paper or any document of purchase or attempt to purchase or otherwise obtain any alcoholic beverage.

(1) It shall be the duty of every licensee hereunder to display at all times, in a prominent place, a printed card at least eight (8) inches by eleven (11) inches in size which shall show, in thirty (30) point or larger type, substantially as follows

WARNING TO MINORS

Persons under the age of twenty-one (21) are subject to a fine of up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) if they:

1) Enter a licensed premises to buy, or have served to them alcoholic

2) Possess, purchase or attempt to purchase, or get another to purchase alcoholic beverages.

3) Misrepresent their age for the purpose of purchasing or obtaining alcoholic beverages.

(m) No retail license shall be issued for any premises unless the applicant for the license is the owner of the premises or is in possession of the premises under a written lease for a term of not less than the license period.

(n) The issuance of said licenses as provided herein, shall be those permitted by K.R.S. 243,070, and shall conform to the requirements of K.R.S. 241, 190, and the directives of Senate Bill 273, which shall be incorporated in-

to Chapter 242 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes

SECTION 19. ENFORCEMENT, City police officers are authorized to enforce this Ordinance for alleged

SECTION 20. PENALTIES. The following penalties shall be in addition to any criminal prosecution instituted in Floyd District Circuit Court against an alleged violator and fines hereunder shall be payable to the City ABC Administrator.

(a) Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance, which no other penalty is hereby provided, shall, for the first offense, be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than six (6) months, or both and for the second and each subsequent violation, he shall be fined not less than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) nor more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500 00) or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than six (6) months. or both. The penalties provided for in this subsection shall be in addition to the revocation of the offenders license. If the offender is a corporation, joint stock company, association fiduciary, the principal officer or officers responsible for the violation may be imprisoned.

(b) Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of section 18 (i) of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or imprisoned not less than five (5) days nor more than thirty (30) days, or both.


SECTION 21. SEVERABILITY. Action by a Court of competent jurisdiction declaring any section, subsection, phrase or word of this Ordinance to be invalid, unconstitutional and/or void shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 22. FORCE AND EF-FECT. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication, as required

SECTION 23: All ordinances or any parts in conflict with the provisions herein are expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Principals and coaches of existing academic teams and Floyd County Assistant Superintendent Gary Frazier have worked together to create a program to allow Floyd County schools to participate in their own academic conference.

Named the Jenny Wiley Academie Conference, it will consist of middle school and high school divisions. The middle school division will include teams from elementary schools, with students in the seventh through eighth

To help the schools defray the cost of equipment, the School and Community Partnership has agreed to pay for all quiz questions that will be needed for competition. They have also agreed to pay for half the cost of the buzzer systems, or comparable amount for other purposes, at each







SECTION 7 The grantee of this franchise may make such rules and regulations, covering the furnishing of said electric energy, as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee. Said grantee may charge such rates for electric services as shall be fair and reasonable. The said grantee shall render service under said franchise of like quality, that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable, to that now being rendered to said City.

The consideration paid by the successful bidder for the franchise, privilege, right and authority provided for herein shall be complete compensation and consideration for said franchise, privilege, right and authority, and for the use and occupancy of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City, in lieu of any street or alley rental or of any charge for the use or occupancy of said streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways or other public places of said City, and in lieu of any pole tax or meter tax.

Mull's 'White Marriage' is charmingly predictable

Marriages are held together by things more innocuous than wedding bands and two-bathroom ranch houses. But the role that boredom and familiarity play in sustaining (and sometimes threatening) the conjugal combo is rarely explored - probably because the subject is too boring and familiar.

On Tuesday, Sept. 20, pseudo-sociologist Martin Mull, who has already explored "The History of White People in Ameriprobes the world of velour bathrobes and runny breakfast eggs in 'Martin Mull in 'Portrait of a White Marriage, airing on Cinemax. It also airs Friday, Sept. 23.

In the two-hour movie. Mull plays himself, as a talk-show host whose "infotainment" makes Oprah Winfrey look like the Avon lady. Already, however, this Mull's audience-blushing shows on such topics as sex in the afternoon and lesbian fidelity are failing to attract attention or ratings.

Enter Joyce Harrison (played by Mary Kay Place) of Hawkins Falls, Ohio. A longtime fan of the "Ask Martin" show, she licks her last green stamp and journeys to Pittsburgh to see him in the flesh. Her husband Hal (Fred Willard) stays behind to organize the town's annual Hawkins Falls Founders Day

parade. Lured by Joyce's accounts of legions of Haw kins Falls boosters, Mull and his producer, Al Silvers (played by fellow comic Harry Shearer, who also directed the movie), take their show there. Which is where the trouble begins.

Encouraged by Mull and in the face of the creative team's writing block, Joyce starts coming up with sensational segment ideas. "Women maimed by household ap-pliances" is her coup de grace in this department.

Soon Mull falls for Joyce, and a jealous Hal goes to see a rather un-balanced marriage counselor. When Joyce learns that Hal's therapy has included, among other things, lessons on the "language of touch," she runs into Mull's arms.

Punctuated with subtle humor and everyday ironies, "Portait of a White Marriage" does drag in spots, and you can pretty much guess the outcome. But when you think about it, doesn't the same apply to most marriages?

Former Olympians bring expertise to Seoul Games

For Olympic athletes, victory brings a gold medal. For American Olympic athletes, especially, victory also brings product endorsements, paperback book deals, maybe a chance to pose for a Wheaties box or tour with "Holiday on Ice." And for the lucky ones - those fortunate enough to win in prime time - there's the promise of part-time work as an expert commentator at the next Olympics.

It's a fair deal for the athletes, who have had the misfortune of being too good, too soon - of becoming the best in the world while most people their age are still in school. And it's a fair deal for the networks, too. Why force real broadcast ers to learn the fine points of the heptathlon, the equestrian and the single scull? scull? These are skills they'll use only once every four years - if the U.S. doesn't boycott, that is.

So the networks' Olympic staffs always include a few former Olympians. ABC has always had Dick Button, who won a skating gold so long ago that most viewers don't know he was once an athlete. It has had Bruce Jenner, whose decathlon win in 1976 opened the door for him to emcee tug-of-wars on "The Superstars." Kathy Rigby, Eric Heiden, Mike Eruzione and Bill Koch have also been given the chance to wear the

BETRAYED (R - United Artists) Starring Debra Winger and Tom Berenger. **1/2

"Betrayed" is clearly a warning, an admonition against bigotry, racism and violence. Many people think, or at least hope, that groups like the Ku Klux Klan are things of the past, that violence against blacks and Jews is the work of a deranged individual or a lunatic fringe. No, this film in-sists. Racism, bigotry and the violence they breed are widespread and institutionalized, with the perpetrators including high-ranking government officials.

The film's premise is as terrifying as the graphic images of racial violence it depicts. Debra Winger stars as Cathy Weaver, an FBI agent who is sent into a rural community to infiltrate ultra-rightist groups and determine if they are responsible for several murders, including that of a radio talkshow host whose car was sprayed with the letters ZOG, standing for Zionist Govern-Occupational ment. She falls in love with Gary Simmons (Tom Berenger), a leader of one such organization and a principal suspect in the

murder investigation.

Their romance, though, is a dispensable plot device, as is her relationship with her boss, Car-nes (John Heard). The romantic triangle is a tedious, almost ludicrous element of the film, a soap-opera conceit that detracts from rather than enhances the issues at hand. All the performances, however, are superb, especially that of Winger, who is eventual-ly repulsed by Simmons, yet must continue in the relationship to expose the group.

Director Costa-Gavras, whose best-known film is "Missing" (1982), can set up a scene as well as any director in the industry today. But the script, by Joe Eszterhas ("Jag-ged Edge"), lays bare its manipulative structure far too often. In trying to alert us to its issues, it tries to instill paranoia in the viewer with blunt violence and melodramatic relationships.

For what it's saying, "Betrayed" is worthy of high praise; how the film says it deserves somewhat less credit.


