Man charged with fleeing scene of accident

PRESTONSBURG — A Hi Hat man was arrested Thursday after he allegedly fled the scene of an accident.

Wallace E. Rackey, 29, was arraigned in district court Friday morning after his arrest on charges of leaving the scene of an accident, fleeing police, driving under the influence and driving while his license was suspended.

The incident began with a call to the Prestonsburg Police Department from a victim who claimed a car had struck her vehicle while it was parked at the Tiger Mart. The victim was able to describe the vehicle and had written down the license plate number. The police were told that the vehicle had proceeded north on U.S. 23.

The Floyd County Sheriff's Department spotted Rackey's vehicle near the Highlands Regional Medical Center intersection on U.S. 23 and attempted to pull it over. The vehicle fled into Johnson County but eventually pulled over.

Officers suspected that Rackey was driving under the influence but he refused to consent to alcohol and drug tests.

Judge Eric Hall placed Rackey under a \$25,000 cash bond and granted a preliminary hearing on July 31.

Man pleads guilty to drug trafficking

PRESTONSBURG — A Wheelwright man accused of drug trafficking who lost out in his bid to have evidence in his case suppressed at a hearing on Tuesday entered a guilty plea to the charges on Friday.

Arthur Redford agreed to serve two-

and-a-half years in jail and spend three years on supervised probation following his release on the condition that the commonwealth not seek perjury charges against his wife, Tara, who acted as his witness at the hearing.

Tara Redford took the stand Tuesday and testified that she never met the Operation UNITE officer who got her permission to search the

Redford residence following her husband's arrest on trafficking charges which were brought against him last August following a traffic stop.

Testimony by two law officers in the hearing stated that Redford was the passenger in a traffic stop that was conducted on a vehicle after Kentucky State Police received a tip to be on the lookout for it. Trooper Brad Hamilton

testified that he stopped the car after it crossed the center line on Route 122.

Hamilton observed a plastic bag thrown out of the passenger side and retrieved it. The bag contained a white powdery substance later proven to be cocaine. He arrested Redford and Operation UNITE went to Redford's

Jail gets grant to offer drug counseling to inmates

PRESTONSBURG — The regular meeting of the Floyd County Fiscal Court on Friday saw Jailer Roger Webb announce that a drug treatment program will commence at the facility this summer.

The program, the 12th instigated in a Kentucky jail, is funded by a grant from the Justice Cabinet.

Webb credited Floyd County UNITE Coalition president Mike Vance with applying for the grant after observing that such a program had been instituted in Pike County.

The treatment program will see a drug treatment counselor in place at the jail five days a week to aid inmates who are addicted to controlled substances and/or alcohol. The program will isolate the inmates from the general population and

will have room for 24 inmates at a time.

Jailer Webb credited Sheriff John K Blackburn, Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner, Floyd County's judges and Prestonsburg Police Chief Mike Omerod for writing letters of recommendation for the program to be implemented at the county jail. Webb also stressed the need for such a pro-

Second surface miner killed within week

PIKEVILLE — A Pike County miner was killed in a machinery accident at a surface mine, the second Kentucky surface mining death in three days, state officials said Friday.

The fatality brings this year's number of mining fatalities in the state to 13, the highest since 1993 when the toll was 18, according to the Office of Mine Safety and Licensing.

"Thirteen fatal accidents are 13 too many," said LaJuana Wilcher, secretary of the Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet, which oversees mine safety and licensing, in a statement Friday.

John May, 39, of Hardy, a road grader operator, was struck by his machine about 7:30 p.m. EDT Thursday as it rolled backward "at a high rate of speed" at Cam Mining's Slate Branch Mine at Freeburn, according to the state's accident report.

May was apparently trying to remount the grader, according to preliminary findings by MSHA. The machine, used for cutting ditches and plowing, came to a

stop with its engine running and transmission set at neutral, MSHA said.

May, a 20-year mining veteran, was taken to Pikeville Medical Center and pronounced dead about 8:50 p.m. by deputy coroner Ernest Casebolt.

Federal and state mine safety officials were investigating the incident on Friday.

Bill May, human resource manager at CAM Mining, unrelated to the victim, said the company was cooperating with investigators.

"We are definitely investigating the accident so we can make sure we don't have the same problem in the future," he said, declining to comment further.

On Tuesday, a Knott County miner died at a surface mine near Hindman. Jason Mosley, 28, of Hindman was killed when a rock, measuring 32 feet by 19 feet, fell on him at the Hendrickson Equipment's Smith Branch No. 1 mine.

Both mines have been cited numerous times by MSHA since each opened last fall.

The Pike County mine has been cited 16 times this year, mostly for

PRESTONSBURG — The Thunder Ridge Racing and Entertainment Complex is once again hosting the East Kentucky Fair on Route 3 in Prestonsburg, beginning on Wednesday, Aug. 10 to its final day on Aug. 13. Loads of fun, including fair and carnival events, entertainment, and competitions will be held over this four-day celebration and fair admissions will be reduced compared to last year's prices.

At a press conference Thursday, at the Big Sandy Area Development District office presented by Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin and Pike county judge-executives, Mark Wiete, treasurer of

the East Kentucky Fair Board, along with other members of the board, expressed their concern over last year's admission prices. They felt that because of the steep prices the previous year, many families simply could not afford to attend.

In response to that, they have decided to cut admission prices significantly. There was also talk about possibly transporting local children. Wiete wanted to make sure that patrons understand that ticket sales are separate, but the carnival is offering discounts on several nights.

General fair admission for adults will be \$5, \$3 per day for students, veterans, seniors, and groups of 25 or more. Children under three will get in free. Friday and Saturday

night, admission after 5 p.m. will be \$10 for adults.

This year's carnival will be provided by Jules and Beck Combined Shows. Pike County officials say that they have used this carnival for several years for the Hillbilly Days Festival and that Jules and Beck has superior quality over others. The carnival will kick off with "Pepsi Pal Night," which will feature a "Buy One, Get one Free — Ride All You Want" arm band. Coupons can be found on liter bottles of Pepsi. This will take place from 5 to 10 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 9. There is no admission fee to the fair on this night, however, the carnival will reopen the next day with usual ticket prices.

The East Kentucky Fair will also be honoring

Kentucky families by designating Thursday, Aug. 10, as "Coal Miners and Veterans Appreciation Day." Miners and veterans will receive free fair admission and family carnival discounts.

Board members said that they have sent out over 2,500 coupons to local coal companies to insert into employee paychecks, but they say if any miner did not receive one, he or she will still be welcomed with free admission.

Officials across the Big Sandy region said they wanted to show their appreciation to all of the families that make this state the wonderful place that it is.

Fair exhibits and local bands will also be displayed

A public hearing on the content of the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) will be held at Big Sandy Community and Technical College, post secondary building, room 131, 1 Bert T. Combs Drive, Prestonsburg, Kentucky 41653, on Thursday, July 27, 2006, starting at 6:00 p.m. The public hearing will give the public an additional opportunity to provide comment on the content of the DEIS.

BACKGROUND: In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Huntington District has prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) which documents planning analyses undertaken for a proposed flood damage reduction project in the Levisa Fork basin in Floyd County, Kentucky. The study area includes the incorporated areas of Prestonsburg and unincorporated areas in Floyd County which are subject to flood damage from the potential of a reoccurrence of the April 1977 flood. The study area does not include the City of Martin, Kentucky, where a separate flood damage reduction project is underway. The DEIS documents agency evaluation of four alternatives, two of which include floodwall/levee alignments intended to protect Prestonsburg and non-structural flood-proofing measures, a total non-structural alternative, and the No Federal Action alternative.

The USACE has distributed copies of the DEIS to appropriate Members of Congress, State and local government officials in Kentucky, Federal agencies, and other interested parties. All persons and organizations that have an interest in the Levisa Fork Basin flooding problems as they affect Floyd County and the environment are urged to participate in this NEPA process. Attorney General's office says state overpaid for logo, slogan

FRANKFORT — A Louisville advertising agency that developed Kentucky's "Unbridled Spirit" campaign was overpaid about \$1.4 million, the state attorney general's office said.

Assistant Attorney General Robert S. Jones asked state Auditor Crit Luallen to look into the state's contract with New West and recommend steps to correct problems or recover the funds.

The state prepaid New West before the company performed any services for the state, Jones said. Those payments exceeded a cap on fees set out in the contract and "allowance of excessive hourly billing for purely clerical services," Jones

said the investigation showed.

Becky Simpson, chief executive officer of New West, said the state wasn't over billed.

"The state's been given a wonderful deal because it is spending about \$1 million less per year with New West than it was spending before by using multiple ad agencies," Simpson said.

George Ward, secretary of the Fletcher administration's Commerce Cabinet, said he did not know whether New West had been overpaid. Payments under the two-year contract are now being reconciled in the wake of the end of the fiscal year on June 30.

New West will be required to send a refund if the state paid too much under the contract, Ward said.

No decision has been made to audit the contract, said Jeff Derouen, a spokesman for the auditor's office.

The Commerce Cabinet hired New West in July 2004 to design a single state brand, including a slogan and logo. New West oversaw the process that included a public vote for proposed brands, which produced "Unbridled Spirit" in late 2004.

The contract grants New West the advertising, marketing and public relations for all executive branch agencies.

Jones started his investigation last September after state employees alleged that their agencies were being overcharged by New West. Jones wrote in a letter sent to Luallen on July 10.

State Democrats lagging behind Republicans when it comes to fundraising

FRANKFORT — Despite the political struggles of Republican Gov. Ernie Fletcher, the state Democratic Party lags behind its Republican rivals in the fundraising less than four months before the fall elections.

The state Democratic Party's executive committee had just \$61,000 its main accounts on June 30 according to state and federal finance records, while Republicans had more than \$771,000 in the bank.

In reality, the difference between the two parties isn't quite so disparate. All told, the Democrats have \$333,753 split between several entities, while Republicans have \$821,682.

Still, the gap has some of the state's leading Democrats wondering if the party will be up for the fight in November.

"There's a big controversy out there as people are saying, 'How much have we raised and

how much have we spent?'" said Rep. Kathy Stein (D-Lexington).

While Fletcher's legal problems — he is currently facing three misdemeanor counts of conspiracy stemming from allegations that he gave protected state jobs to political allies — may have fired up the state Democratic base, it hasn't translated into a financial windfall for the party.

Save for an appearance by Hillary Clinton at a fundraiser last December that leaders say raised \$600,000, the party has been quiet. Stein said she's concerned Democrats may let a chance to strengthen its position in the General Assembly in the fall slip away because the financial backing isn't there.

Democratic Chairman Jerry Lundergan said he doesn't expect the current lull to last long.

"We're sort of out of the campaign cycle right now," Lundergan said. "We'll get

back in the fundraising cycle over the next month or so."

Lundergan said the party spent \$19,000 to help Perry Clark run in a February special election in the state's 37th Senate district. Clark beat Debbie Peden to win the seat.

The party has also been spending money on technology and consultants. Democrat strategist Jonathan Hurst has received more than \$70,000 this year from various Democrat accounts.

Democratic State Treasurer Jonathan Miller said he hasn't been told how the party plans to make up the fundraising gap.

"You always want to enter a campaign season at least on a level playing field or have more money than your political opponents," he said. "I haven't heard from anyone in the party as to whether there's a strategy to level the playing field and enter November with more in the bank."

Making the best of a bad situation

University of Kentucky law professor Robert Lawson believes the state is housing too many of its prisoners in county jails, and he is probably right. But it is a situation that is unlikely to change.

Kentucky ranks only behind Louisiana in the percentage of state felons serving out their time in local jails, reports Lawson. More than 6,000 Kentucky state prisoners are housed in county jails, which are typically designed to house inmates for a few weeks or months as they await trial or serve short sentences.

Thirty percent of Kentucky's 20,585 state felons — those sentenced to a year or more — are housed in county jails. That is four times the rate in Indiana, five times the national average.

Lawson said the problem with housing so many state prisoners in jails is that the local lockups generally are not equipped to provide adequate rehabilitation programs. Nor do many of them offer prisoners adequate exercise time.

On the positive side, county jails do allow inmates to remain closer to their homes, making it easier for family members to visit them. But then some state inmates are housed in county jails far from their home counties, which negates that advantage.


Instead of being a shortcoming, both Department of Corrections and county officials often see the housing of state inmates in jails as a win-win situation. For the state to find space to house more than 6,000 inmates now in county jails would require the construction of several more prisons to avoid massive overcrowding. It's less expensive to simply pay counties to house in their jails those prisoners convicted of less serious felonies.

In turn, the housing of state inmates helps counties pay off construction costs and operate their jails. Indeed, state prison officials have promised counties that if they build larger jails, they will help them pay for those facilities by housing state inmates. In short, without the income they receive from housing state and, in some cases, federal prisoners, many county jails would have trouble paying their bills and the cost to local taxpayers would be much greater.

While rehabilitation opportunities may be virtually nonexistent in county jails, they unfortunately are far from adequate in most state prisons. Kentucky for the most part warehouses its inmates, giving them minimal opportunities to improve their education or learn job skills.

We agree with Lawson that the status quo is not the best situation, but because of how much money the state saves and counties earn from housing state inmates in jails, it is not likely to change. However, this is an issue that needs to be carefully studied as the state ponders the possibility of assuming the operation of county jails.

Government by and for The New York Times

Who made Bill Keller, the executive editor of The New York Times, the nation's classification czar? By running the nation's foremost newspaper, Keller gets to decide which secrets of the U.S. government are maintained and which aren't — and his default position is to expose them all.

The Times published a long story recently exposing a secret government program to track the international bank transfers of terrorist suspects. The story reported that the program is legal, effective and, as far as any Bush anti-terror initiative can be in the current poisonous environment, uncontroversial. Nonetheless, Keller defended its publication as "a matter of public interest."

If the program had violated laws or allowed the government to rifle through the routine banking transac-

tions of Americans (it doesn't on either count), Keller might have had a case. But there is nothing about the program that countervails the clear public interest in limiting terrorist financing.

Every time the press exposes a secret anti-terror program, the media's apologists shrug it off as no big deal, since terrorists already know that they are being tracked and monitored. But clearly not all terrorists knew that the U.S. was tracking cross-border transactions, say, from Saudi Arabia to Pakistan. Otherwise, the program wouldn't have helped net a couple of major terrorist figures in Southeast Asia, or figured in terrorist prosecutions. Now they know.

On the one hand, the implicit contention of the Times is that the public almost never has an interest in secrecy, in having classified matters kept that way. On the other, it jealously guards the identity of its secret sources and wants its ability to do so in defiance of governmental investigations written into law. Here is the ultimate arrogation of public power — the Times demanding legal protection for its own secrets so it can bet-

ter expose the government's.

This attitude reflects what is, in the minds of the members of the press, an ongoing crisis of legitimacy of the U.S. government, going back to Watergate and the FBI and CIA scandals of the 1970s. It was these abuses that created the decaying, but still regnant Imperial Press, which now reflexively adopts an adversarial stance toward our government even when it is acting in an effective way, fully within its power and abusing no one.

As the pendulum swung toward media power in the 1970s, it should swing away from it now. Yes, the press has a role in exposing government abuses, which will sometimes involve reporting on secrets. Yes, the press deserves deference in keeping with the First Amendment. But it cannot be a government unto itself. The U.S. government should reassert itself by vigorously pursuing the leakers who broke the law to describe the tracking program to the Times.

The reporters who wrote about it, Eric Lichtblau and James Risen, should be subpoenaed, and if they refuse to reveal their sources, they should go to jail. There, they can reflect on why their secrets are so much more sacred than those of the people of the United States, as represented by their duly constituted government.

Reinstate the draft — congressmen first

I see by the paper that things aren't going too well in Iraq. They keep blowing each other up over there. Last week, over a three-day period, more than 100 Iraqis were killed and many hundreds more injured.

If this is what they call democracy, maybe they should try something else.

The upshot of it all is that if we want to settle down that country, we're probably going to have to send over more troops; even General Casey, the American commander in Iraq, says so.

Meanwhile, in North Korea they set off rocket tests — seven of them — despite the fact we warned them not to. Just about everyone warned them not to, to tell you the truth, but it didn't seem to make any difference. The North Korean leader — Most Precious Sonny Boy, or some such — responded by showing us his collection of Italian gestures and went on with his plans.

A former defense secretary has said that we have to bomb those missile sites or else leave ourselves open to nuclear blackmail. And he was Jimmy Carter's Secretary of Defense, so you can imagine what Bush's gang thinks.

Then there's Iran. We, along with most of Europe, want it to stop its work on nuclear weapon technology but it refuses. "The Iranian nation will not retreat one iota on its way to

realizing all of its rights, including complete nuclear rights," said its slightly wacky president, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad.

Does that sound like someone who's asking for a bombing and invasion or what? And who do you think is going to do it, Switzerland?

Have I mentioned Afghanistan? Remember when we knocked over the Taliban and ushered an era of freedom into that country? Well, it seems the era is over. When we were saying "Mission Accomplished," they were saying "End of Round 1." They are now in a comeback mode and the government there is holed up in the cities, afraid to come out.

It looks like we're going to have to bolster our troops there, with more troops.

There are other concerns: The United Nations-backed government in Somalia is just about ready to say uncle to a radical Islamic militia that would provide a welcoming environment for international terrorist camps. We can't have that, can we? I don't think so. The point here is that we are going to need more troops everywhere, a lot more. And, with enlistments increasingly difficult to inspire, there's only one way to get them:

Reinstate the draft. That's right; return to those days of yesteryear, when going to war meant that you actually knew someone who went. I wouldn't use the draft structure we used in Vietnam, however. That was patently unfair. It was weighted toward sweeping up the young and disadvantaged. We should learn from our mistakes.

I would make eligible all reason-

ably able-bodied persons from the ages of 18 to 68 (just to make sure the pool is big enough to satisfy requirements) and I wouldn't allow any deferments for students or fathers of mothers or any of those military irrelevancies.

But, I would choose candidates not by lottery but by utility, least useful groups considered first. This would be the order:

1. Congresspersons and their family members.
2. Lobbyists.
3. Lawyers.
4. Golfers.
5. People who vote in the American Idol

contest.

6. SUV owners.

7. People who use their cell phones while driving.

8. Little League parents who scream at umpires.

9. Litterers.

10. Everybody else.

This would ensure we had enough bodies in uniform to fight multiple wars, with the added advantage that there wouldn't be as many wars to fight.

You think that Congress would back the president every time he said "Charge!" if there was even a remotest chance that they'd be the ones getting shot? Fat chance.

As Dick (Deadeye) Cheney said of his repeated deferments from service in Vietnam, even though he supported the war, "I had other priorities."

So would the rest of Congress.

Work begins Monday on Route 80 in Knott

Resident Engineer Chuck Childers of Highway District 12 announced today that concrete pavement repair will begin Monday on KY 80 in Knott County. The work zone is from the Perry County line to mile point 5 at Montgomery.

For about three weeks, the westbound slow lane will be closed to traffic. Then the construction crew will move to the eastbound slow lane, closing it to traffic. The final weeks of the work will result in both fast lanes being closed.

"When we move from one lane to another, the first lane will re-open," Childers explained. "For example, after the work is finished in the westbound slow lane, it will

re-open while the crew closes the eastbound slow lane. Traffic will be moving in both directions at all times. It's just that drivers will have to slow down because they will be traveling on one lane instead of two."

Childers said Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement officers are expected to monitor the

traffic in the construction work zone. "We want everyone to be safe while they are working and we want all the motorists and their passengers to get through the work zone as quickly and safely as possible. The reality is that this can happen only if everyone is alert and drives no faster than the maximum speed limit."


Webb also took time to address his growing concerns about space at the jail. He said that the jail has 102 beds and is currently housing 146 inmates. He pleaded for additional housing for the jail and suggested that it was an ongoing problem and that thus far he has received what help he could from the courts. He noted that judges try to use

home incarceration and work release whenever possible and that they have been willing, if not always pleased, to set bonds at 5 a.m. to facilitate release from the facility.

Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson agreed that crowding is an ongoing problem and that it merited consideration.

machinery violations and allowing combustible materials to accumulate. The Knott County mine has been cited eight times for faulty equipment and allowing loose, hazardous materials to accumulate atop pits and highwalls.

Both mines were shut down this week, but Smith Branch was allowed to resume parts of its operation Wednesday, said Chuck Wolfe, spokesman for the state Office of Mine Safety and Licensing.

This year's 13 deaths is

eight more than in 2005, according to the Office of Mine Safety and Licensing. The largest disaster this year occurred at the Kentucky Darby Mine No. 1 in Harlan County, where five men were killed in an underground explosion in May.

May's death will be counted as Kentucky's 14th by the U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration, which lists all fatalities at mines, not just those of miners. The state did not count the July 7 death of a

construction worker at a Hopkins County mine.

The most recent fatalities occurred just days after the state's new mine safety law went into effect on July 12. The law requires mine managers to report within 15 minutes a serious injury or fatality to state officials; have two air packs available for each underground miner; and conduct escape drills every 90 days, among other new rules.

"While the need for constant attention to safety is

obvious, our mine safety analysts will continue to remind miners to make safety a personal priority," Wilcher said.

Both of this week's fatalities were reported to state officials by Kentucky State Police, not the mine companies, according to accident reports.

Wolfe said whether the companies violated reporting requirements under the new law will be addressed in the state's investigation.




Moore, Haddix grab preseason honors

BOWLING GREEN — Western Kentucky University seniors Lerron Moore and Justin Haddix are considered among the top 25 returning players in I-AA football at running back and quarterback, respectively.

A 5-foot-10, 205-pound Columbus, Ohio, resident, Moore was rated eighth by The Sports Network. One of only three running backs in school history to post two 1,000-yard seasons, he enters the year fifth on the school's all-time rushing list with 3,505 yards, which also ranks sixth in the Gateway Conference record books. Moore has 17 100-yard games, which is tied for second on the WKU career list and is tied for fifth all-time in the league, to go along with 34 career touchdowns — which leaves him tied for third in

school history — as he stands seventh with 204 total points.

He ranks third among all active NCAA Division I-AA players in rushing yards and is fourth in touchdowns.

Haddix was 16th among the top 20 returning quarterbacks by TSN, as he enters his fourth and final season as the Hilltoppers' starter fifth among the active career leaders in NCAA Division I-AA football in total offense while ranking seventh in both passing yards and pass efficiency rating. The 6-foot 215-pound native of Jackson, is the school's career record holder in both completion percentage (55.4 percent) and pass efficiency rating (137.25) — he also stands second among the all-time leaders at WKU with 370 completions, 5,743 passing yards and 36 touchdowns, and is third with 6,679 yards of total offense.

Haddix ranks 10th in the Gateway Conference record book in total offense as well.

WKU will begin the season Saturday, Sept. 2, at I-A Georgia. Game time in Athens is still to be determined.

Kentucky Wesleyan names Gallup AD

OWENSBORO — Kentucky Wesleyan College named Gary Gallup athletic director on Tuesday, less than a week after the school's athletic program was hit by NCAA sanctions.

Gallup will replace Larry Moore, who stepped down in May 2005.

Gallup comes to Kentucky Wesleyan from Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, La., where he spent the last five

years as the school's associate athletic director for external relations.

Previously Gallup served as athletic director at Texas-Pan American, Lamar and Southern Utah.

Kentucky Wesleyan received three years probation from the NCAA on Friday for using 45 ineligible athletes in eight sports between 1998 and 2005.

The men's basketball team will also lose one scholarship as part of the sanctions imposed by the NCAA Division II Committee on Infractions. The sanctions did not include a postseason ban, as the school had feared.

Kentucky Wesleyan's eight men's basketball titles are the most of any Division II school.

"I am looking forward toward helping restore credibility to a great athletic program," Gallup said in a statement.

Six Wildcats named to Coaches' Preseason All-SEC Team

LEXINGTON - Six Kentucky Wildcats were named to the preseason All-Southeastern Conference team, selected by league coaches, that was released Thursday by the league office.

No Wildcats were chosen for the first team, but two were selected to the second team and four tabbed for the third team.

UK's second-team selections featured junior Rafael Little as both a running back and kick returner, along with junior tight end Jacob Tamme. Little rushed for 1,045 yards and nine touchdowns last season, caught 46 passes for 449 yards, averaged 16.9

yards per punt return, and also returned a kickoff for a touchdown. He led the SEC in punt returns and all-purpose yardage, ranking fifth in the nation in both categories. Tamme caught 29 passes for 251 yards and one touchdown.

Third-team picks included junior linebacker Wesley Woodyard, junior strong safety Roger Williams, senior offensive guard Michael Aitcheson, and sophomore offensive tackle Aaron Miller. Woodyard led the team last season with 100 tackles (also fourth in the SEC in tackles per game), seven tackles for loss, and four fumble recoveries. Williams was third on the team with 69 tackles while adding two pass breakups, one

interception, and causing two fumbles. Miller is an intriguing selection, as he did not play last season for personal reasons, but the SEC coaches obviously recalled his performance from the 2004 campaign.

LEXINGTON - On Thursday, just one day after receiving a new five-year contract, University of Kentucky baseball coach John Cohen was named the National Coach of the Year by CollegeBaseballInsider.com.

After leading the Wildcats to the best season in the 102-year history of the program, Cohen has been filling his trophy cases up, winning Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year and the College Baseball Foundation National Coach of the Year awards.

"Kentucky was the biggest surprise in college baseball this season," said Sean Ryan, co-founder of

CollegeBaseballInsider.com. "You would be hard-pressed to find anyone - even optimists in Lexington - who could have predicted the Wildcats would win a share of the SEC title. We congratulate John Cohen, his staff and his club on a terrific season."

Cohen directed the greatest turnaround in the storied history of SEC baseball, turning the Kentucky program from a last place finish in 2005 to claiming a share of the SEC Championship with a school-record 44 wins.

CollegeBaseballInsider.com, the five-year old website, is devoted to covering college baseball on a national level. Cohen was selected from a group of three finalists, which included UCLA's John Savage and Hawaii's Mike Trapasso.

Cohen, who led the Wildcats to the school's first Southeastern Conference championship last season, has signed a new five-year contract worth approximately \$295,000 annually. UK Athletic Director Mitch Barnhart announced Wednesday.

Autopsy set for high school player in western Kentucky

HENDERSON - The autopsy of a high school football player who died while leaving the practice field earlier this week proved inconclusive on

Thursday, meaning it could take up to six weeks to determine the cause of death, according to the Henderson County coroner's office.

Ryan Owens, 16, a junior lineman for Henderson County High School, died after a Wednesday morning practice.

Owens collapsed while he was leaving the football field with other members of the team after a nearly 90-minute practice. Football players were given water breaks and sprayed with a hose to

combat the early morning heat, the school district said.

The temperature in Henderson at 9 a.m. Wednesday was 88 degrees with 71 percent humidity, said Mike Crow, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Louisville. The heat index was 99 degrees.

There was nothing obviously wrong with Owens physically, Henderson County Coroner Bobbie Cantley said after the initial autopsy.

Marshall baseball coach announces resignation

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. - Dave Piepenbrink, head baseball coach at Marshall University, resigned from the position, effective Aug. 1, athletic department officials announced this week.

Head coach for parts of the past nine seasons after replacing Craig Antush midway through the 1998 campaign, Piepenbrink is the second-longest tenured coach in program history. He ranks No. 2 in school annals with 170 wins, behind only his former Marshall coach Jack Cook (422). He leaves the program with an all-time record of 170-285-3 (.374).

Piepenbrink, 39, said his resignation was not an easy choice to make.

"It came down to a family decision," he said. "I have an opportunity to pursue other career avenues with State Farm

Insurance in Inwood, W.Va., and after giving it serious thought, this opportunity was too good to pass up.

"It is sad for me to leave Marshall, but I hope whoever replaces me wins twice as many games as I did. I'm a Marshall guy, and always will be a Marshall guy, and I want what's best for the university and the athletic department."

From 2002-04, Piepenbrink directed Marshall to its best three-year win total, 66, in the history of the program. He was MU's head coach for all but 20 games of the Herd's Mid-American Conference era (1998-2005) and guided Marshall to its first league tournament appearance since 1995 (Southern Conference) when it qualified for the 2006 Conference USA Tournament. C-USA was rated the fifth-best conference in the nation this past season.

The 2006 Herd also enjoyed the program's first win over a nationally-ranked opponent since 1995, when Marshall swept a doubleheader from No. 25 James Madison in March.

Piepenbrink joined the Marshall coaching staff in 1996 as an assistant after a standout playing career under Jack Cook and Howard McCann from

1987-90. During his playing days he set school records - since broken - in doubles (41), runs scored (150) and at-bats (480). He now ranks second in career runs and total bases (308), and third in doubles and walks (98).


Piepenbrink was a first-team All-Southern Conference performer in 1990 and was named to the all-tournament team that same season after guiding Marshall to a semifinal berth in the league tournament.

"We appreciate all of the hard work and tremendous effort Dave brought to the program," Marshall Director of Athletics Bob Marcum said. "He fielded a very competitive team in our inaugural season in Conference USA and we wish him the very best in his future endeavors."

"I enjoyed working with Mr. Marcum over the last four years," Piepenbrink said. "He has been very understanding and supportive throughout this process."

The athletic department will immediately conduct a national search for Piepenbrink's successor.

Martin's Fork, other WMAs focus of enforcement against illegal ATV use

FRANKFORT — New efforts are underway to prevent illegal all-terrain vehicle use in Harlan County's wildlife management areas.

"Hunters and anglers help buy public land through their purchase of hunting and fishing licenses," said Jon Gassett, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "That is why we set these areas aside specifically for wildlife. Unfortunately, wildlife needs are incompatible with all-ter-

rain vehicle use."

Employees of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources are building new gates to control vehicular access to these areas, putting up new signs to notify the public of the no-vehicle regulation and increasing law enforcement efforts. All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are prohibited on all state wildlife management areas. Riders on these areas risk being cited by officers with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

Affected areas include Martin's Fork Wildlife

Management Area (WMA) and State Natural Area, Cranks Creek WMA, Stone Mountain WMA and State Natural Area and Shillalah Creek WMA.

Four-wheel-drive trucks and ATVs are allowed at nearby Black Mountain Recreational Park, a 7,000-acre area operated for the public by Harlan Fiscal Court.

Kentucky's wildlife management areas are set aside for hiking, nature viewing, hunting and fishing. The areas in Harlan County are home to rare plants and animals.

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife officials are stepping up enforcement efforts due to continued problems with erosion and off-trail use by ATV riders. All wildlife management areas in Harlan County are clearly marked with signs or yellow paint on boundary trees.

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife owns or manages these areas in cooperation with the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission and the Kentucky Division of Water. These areas were acquired with the goal of protecting

their natural beauty and unique habitats while providing wildlife-related recreational opportunities for the public.

The 7,500 combined acres of these wildlife areas are part of a unique corridor along Stone, Cumberland and Brush Mountains that provide habitat for deer, turkey, grouse, furbearers, bears and songbirds. Also present are at least 12 plants and five animals that are considered endangered, threatened or special concern species by the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission. There are also

historical landmarks, such as the Wagon Tunnel Road or "Hole in the Wall," that require protection for preservation.

Access to these areas is by foot traffic only. Development is in the planning stages for additional parking areas and hiking trails. Duck numbers up from last year

The preliminary 2006 Waterfowl Breeding Ground Population and Habitat Survey conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service estimates a total duck population of more than 36 million; or a 14 percent increase from last year's estimate and 9 percent above the 1955-2005 average, according to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

The survey indicated an increase in the quality of waterfowl breeding habitat in the United States and Canada from 2005. Improvements in Canadian and U.S. prairie habitats were primarily due to average to above-average precipitation, warm spring temperatures and the good

summer conditions of 2005.

The higher number of ponds counted in Prairie Canada this year relative to last are a strong indicator of the improved habitat conditions.

"There's a lot of good news in the survey this year for the total duck population and waterfowl breeding habitat," said H. Dale Hall, Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "Most species increased above the estimates of last year and numbers were above the long term baseline.

We're especially excited about the fact that while pintail populations are below their historic average numbers, the survey shows a 32 percent increase in pintail population from the previous year. However, wigeon and scaup are not experiencing those positive trends and that's cause for concern."

The Waterfowl Breeding Ground Population and Habitat Survey, the largest and most comprehensive survey of its kind in the world, samples 1.3 million square miles across the north-central United States, south-central and northern Canada, and

Alaska.

The survey estimates the number of ducks in the continent's most important nesting grounds. Annual survey results help guide the Service in managing waterfowl conservation programs under authority of the 1918 Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

The Service works in partnership with state representatives from the four flyways - the Atlantic, Mississippi, Central and Pacific - that waterfowl and other birds use during their migrations to establish regulatory frameworks for waterfowl hunting season lengths, dates and bag limits.

Highlights from the survey in the north-central United States, south-central and northern Canada, and Alaska include:

Mallard abundance was 7.3 million birds, which was similar to last year's estimate of 6.8 million birds and the long-term average.

Blue-winged teal abundance was 5.9 million birds. This value was 28 percent greater than last year's estimate of 4.6 million birds and 30 percent above the long-term average.

The estimated abundance of green-winged teal at 2.6 million was 20 percent greater than last year and 39 percent above the long-term average.

The estimated number of 2.8 million gadwall was 30 percent greater than last year and was 67 percent above the long-term average; whereas the estimated number of 916,000 redheads increased 55 percent over 2005 and was 47 percent above the long-term average.

Canvasbacks numbered 691,000, 33 percent higher than last year and 23 percent over the long-term average.

Northern shovelers at 3.7 million were 69 percent above their long-term average.

Although the numbers of most species increased over last year and were greater than their long-term averages, American wigeon at 2.2 million and scaup (lesser and greater combined; 3.2 million) were 17 percent and 37 percent below their long-term averages, respectively.

The estimate for scaup was a

record low for the second consecutive year.

The abundance of northern pintails at 3.4 million was 18 percent below the 1955-2005 average, although this year's estimate was 32 percent greater than that of last year.

YearOne Auto Cross At Ride Revolution Nights to debut street cars, drivers Tuesday

SPECIAL TO THE TIMES

BRISTOL, Tenn. — For the past six years, "timed runs for street cars at Bristol Dragway" meant straight-line runs in the quarter-mile at Ride Revolution Nights.

Starting Tuesday, YearOne Auto Cross at Ride Revolution Nights gives drivers the opportunity to make timed runs in their street cars on a controlled road course consisting of several right- and left-turn handling maneuvers.

Drivers will be timed electronically on a tight course marked by traffic cones in a paved area between Bristol Dragway and Bristol Motor Speedway. Penalties will add time if a driver knocks down a cone or knocks a cone "out of its box." A cone may be moved a few inches without penalty, but if it is moved completely from its position, it is out of its box. Once a driver receives two penalties on a single run, the driver receives no time.


Because the course requires maneuvering around a tight handling course, only cars may drive through the YearOne Auto Cross course — no high-profile vehicles, like trucks, SUVs or vans.

Like the Ride Revolution Nights drag racing program for street cars, the YearOne Auto Cross at Ride Revolution Nights gives regular drivers the chance to test their skills


and their cars' performance in a controlled environment. Licensed drivers 18-and-older may participate after signing a personal and property liability waiver. Anyone under 18 must have a parent/guardian sign a waiver form in front of a Bristol Dragway official to drive in the YearOne Auto Cross at Ride Revolution Nights. The waiver is good for the entire 2006 Ride Revolution Nights season.

Cost to make three runs through the YearOne Auto Cross course is \$10. Three additional runs by the same driver in the same car is an additional \$5.

Gates for YearOne Auto Cross at Ride Revolution Nights open at 5 p.m., first runs begin at 6 p.m., and the track closes at 10 p.m., and the course will be open at every remaining Ride Revolution Night, beginning Tuesday through September.

Australia has a reputation for cute indigenous animals (koala bears and kangaroos) but the outback region is not to be taken lightly as it is also home to all manner of deadly crocks, snakes, spiders and, if these films are any indication, psychopaths.

Here are two movies which explore the wide stretch of no man's land down under, commonly referred to as the bush.

"Games" is your best bet if you have a weak stomach, as it relies on suspense and clever writing. American Stacy Keach stars as a long haul trucker who's route takes him through a remote three-day stretch the outback. Keach keeps him-

self amused with a steady stream of one-sided conversation with his pet dingo. All that changes when he picks up a young hitchhiker, Jamie Lee Curtis. Unfortunately, he also picks up a stalker who kidnaps Curtis and leads him on a longer haul to get her back.

The long stretch of highway that Keach travels is a character in the film, too. It is the only route to Perth, where he is supposed to deliver some slaughtered hogs, and so he sees the same vehicles and travelers throughout his trip. Normally this makes for endless musings on what these random travelers are actually up to, but this road game, normally used to kill time, takes on an urgency when Keach becomes suspicious of a green van on his route. Is he on the right track or has the endless road hypnotized him into imagining the whole thing (listen closely to the radio in his cab as it provides a few clues). Eventually this leads to a showdown that will keep you glued to the screen.

It all works due to the sure hand of director Richard Franklin, who studied with the master of suspense himself, Alfred Hitchcock. Franklin employs several devices reminiscent of the master's. Most notably he employs an eclectic cast of background performers and an intense musical score that echoes Bernard Herrmann's work on the classic "Psycho."

"Creek" takes another tack and serves up its horror with heaps of gore as it charts similar territory. It starts out like a teen road movie, with three coeds splitting the purchase of a junked car to get them across the outback. They enjoy the road for almost 45 minutes when the film takes a sharp turn and deposits them squarely in hell.

When their junker breaks down, they are rescued by an affable Crocodile Dundee type bushman who talks in quaint outback-isms and offers to fix their ride free of charge. They take him up on his kind offer but

Last summer I found myself in the Santa Monica Mountains, hiking among chaparral, canyon sunflower and wild rabbits with Roberto, an 11-year-old boy who has AIDS. In his hand he clutched a clear plastic jar, and together we were looking for something to put in it.

Every August, children affected by HIV and AIDS come to this sum-

mer camp in the majestic headlands of Malibu, Calif., and find a sanctuary. Camp Pacific Heartland is a typical summer camp, free from the social misunderstanding these kids face elsewhere. There they can enjoy the same opportunities that other children have for learning and playing in nature.

We had given each camper a clear plastic jar at the beginning of their visit and encouraged the kids to place mementos and souvenirs from their week at camp into their jars, creating

a collection of memories to enjoy at home.

Roberto excitedly showed me what he had already collected: a rock he found on a nature hike, a flower that was growing outside his cabin and a Polaroid photo of him and some new friends on carnival night.

"What else would you like to put in the jar?" I asked.

He looked around at the brown and green hills, down to the dark-blue sea where we had seen a pod of playful dolphins the day before, and took a deep breath. Then he paused, laughed a bit and said, "Camp air."

I knew what he meant. If Roberto could crack open that jar sometime during the long year ahead and take a

deep breath of fun, love and support, then maybe the tough drug regimen he was on, the painful loss of his parents years ago and the ongoing struggle to live in a society that still cannot completely embrace him — well, maybe these obstacles would be a little easier to handle.

Camp air smells like the morning mist from the ocean and the afternoon sun on the mountains. It comes from the glee of children. It is part hilarity, part tears. It has the aroma of safety and

freedom. It contains a brush of colored chalk on the sidewalk, a flash of disco lights on dance night, a taste of macaroni and cheese in the cafeteria, a few notes of a camp song.

I laughed with him, and together we screwed the lid on tight and held the jar up to our eyes. There was the rock, the flower and the picture — and, swirling around, I swear I could almost see, inside, Roberto's precious supply of magical air.

Dear Tom and Ray:

I listen to your radio show almost every week and have learned a lot. But right now my life is going through a great change, since my husband wants a divorce. I need to know how to plan for car maintenance and its costs. I have a 2004 RAV4 (in his name), and I love it. It has 31,000 miles on it, and I have kept up with the oil changes. But I haven't a clue as to how to budget for its maintenance. Can you help me? — Marilee

TOM: Well, the first thing you can do to save money, Marilee, is to make sure you hold on to the RAV4 in the divorce. Tell him he can have the Jaguar. He'll be confused, but trust us.

RAY: You're lucky, because you have a car that's

relatively new, and it's a car that's known for its reliability and infrequent need for repairs. So, you're off to a good start.

TOM: I would say that you should plan to have the car serviced once or twice a year, at the mileage intervals called for by Toyota (7,500, 15,000, 22,500, etc.). Some of those will be "minor services," and some will be "major services."

RAY: What's the difference between a minor service and a major service? About 300 bucks.

TOM: All services include oil and filter changes. In addition to that, minor services usually involve checking a bunch of stuff. Major services involve actually replacing stuff.

RAY: And if I had to take a wild guess, I'd say that if you have it serviced at an indepen-

dent garage rather than at the dealer, you'll probably spend about \$500-\$600 a year on these services. All you need to do is bring your owner's manual to a reliable independent shop, and they can do all the services Toyota lists as "required."

TOM: If you don't already have a mechanic you trust, check out the "Mechanics Files" at our Web site, www.cartalk.com. It's a database of good mechanics, personally recommended by other readers and our radio-show listeners.

RAY: In addition to the money you earmark for regular maintenance, you also should put aside some money for repairs and replacements. At some point you'll need brakes, tires, shocks and probably some sort of mechanical repair work. If you put aside another \$400 a year, and carry it over from year to year and bank it if you don't use it, I think that should cover most of your needs.

TOM: So \$1,000 a year for maintenance and repairs should cover you, Marilee.

But just to be sure, have your lawyer demand another \$500 a year for a fuzzy-dice allowance.

Dear Tom and Ray:

What is the primary reason why car manufacturers have switched to lighter-weight oils? I've heard several explanations. But once and for all, what is the real reason for this change? I would feel truly blessed to receive your thoughts and opinions relating to this question! I know you guys have the answers. Thanks. — Dan

RAY: They've switched over to lighter-weight oils because the guys loading in the cases at Kmart were continually complaining of backaches, Dan.

TOM: Actually, the main

impetus for using lighter (lower-viscosity) oil is to improve gas mileage.

RAY: The thicker, or more viscous, the oil, the harder it is for the moving parts of the engine to "push" their way through it. The more resistance those parts

get, the more fuel that is required to make them move. So, by lightening up the oil, you make it easier for the parts to move, and you reduce your fuel consumption.

TOM: It used to be that thicker oil was used because it provided more protection to those moving parts, especially at higher temperatures, when all oil thins out. But oil technology has improved so much that today's 5W30 oils provide even more protection than yesterday's thickest glop.

Director Greg McLean shows a lot of promise here as he engages viewers with plot developments they are fully expecting and then totally subverts them. His best tool is actor John Jarratt, who excels as the lovable bushman who morphs into a sadistic hunter of humans without batting an eye. Jarratt manages the mean feat of coming off like your favorite uncle one minute and Jack the Ripper's soul brother

the next. The scene where he calmly explains why he is ripping open a woman's spinal column is delivered with the same brevity as his light hearted speech about the glorious taste of rain water. It's a chilling moment and you will long remember the phrase "head on a stick" after experiencing it.

Director Robert Rodriguez ("Sin City") loved Jarratt in this movie and made room for him in his next film, "Grind House," in which he and Quentin Tarantino will direct an homage to those 1970s films of the drive-in. These movies do for the outback what "The Texas Chainsaw Massacre" did for the lone star state. Be warned, however, because even the Wiggles will creep you out after watching these movies.
